

The next Artful Afternoon will be held on Sunday, April 5 from 1 to 4 p.m. at the Greenbelt Community Center and will feature art for everyone, with a free American Sign Language (ASL) art project, performance and workshop given by Quest artists. Quest is a 10-yearold Lanham-based organization of artists, educators and volunteers commit-

ted to using the arts to reach all people.

So begins "Mosaic," an exploration of societal pressure to conform and the individual's need for freedom. Performed by Quest's international touring company and incorporating mime, movement, gesture, dance and sign language, "Mosaic" touches the soul. The play will be offered at 2 p.m. and is meant for both deaf and hearing people of all ages. The work is





Wrestling for Renewal

The Wrestler opens Friday at Greenbelt, starring Mickey Rourke and Marisa Tomei. Both actors received Oscar nominations for their performances in this film. Rourke portrays a wrestler past his prime, trying to repair his relationship with his daughter (Evan Rachel Wood) and rebuild his career by a rematch with his old arch-nemesis. He also works part-time as a bagger at a grocery store, lives in a trailer and is courting a stripper (played by Tomei).

The film was directed by Darren Aronofsky (Pi, Requiem for a Dream) and written by Robert Siegel (former editor-in-chief of The Onion). The Wrestler is informed more by Aronofsky's dark view of family relationships than the satire of The Onion's fake news. Rated R for violence and nudity, this movie runs







in 2002.

"We can't pay you any more money these days but we can thank you," County Councilmember Turner said emphatically as she shook the hand of award recipient Heather Forest.

Forest, who teachers English as a Second Language at Springhill Lake Elementary, said it was "an incredible honor to be recognized for something I love to do.'

Terri Childress, sixth grade teacher at Magnolia Elementary School, spoke of her family's legacy in education as she received the ACE Educator Award.

"It starts with your family. . .' she said, adding that her grandmother was one of the first black women to earn a college degree.

Turning Point Academy third grade teacher Knakia Nelson was recognized as a "dynamic and effective educator" who is "committed to improving the quality of education for all students," as she was introduced by Gardner.

Nelson, who has been at Turning Point Academy for three years, said she was "truly blessed to work with the great people and staff" at Turning Point Academy.

When introducing Lynne Gekas, first grade teacher at St. Hugh's School. Gardner read comments from her students, who said that she "turns work into fun" and that "she's awesome."

Gekas thanked her family for their support, saying they make her job easier. "For 13 years my family has had my back," she said.

As she received her ACE Educator Award, Portia Moore, the sixth grade counselor at Greenbelt Middle School, said that she has "always wanted to be a light in darkness," helping others to achieve their potential and know they're cared about.

She is an educator who "consistently goes above and beyond the call of duty," Gardner said as he introduced her.

Kathleen (Kate) Deery, a social studies teacher at Eleanor Roosevelt High School, expressed gratitude to the City of Greenbelt for their support of her school. "You've always been there for us," she said.

Deery said her colleagues at Eleanor Roosevelt High School are also deserving of ACE Educator Awards and that working with them is like playing tennis with someone who's more skilled than you: It makes you better, she said.

After each award recipient was introduced and honored, the entire group posed for a photo with members of ACE and the government officials in attendance.

her staff and the staff at Green-

belt Middle School (GMS). All of the city elementary schools want to work with the GMS to bring over their outgoing 6th graders for a visit near the end of the year to assist in their own transitions.

Sherwood added information about the transition from Pre-K to kindergarten and says having that early start does a great job readying young students.

Parent Teacher Groups

There was a discussion about the role of the parent teacher organization or association in the schools. Gillens said that the Magnolia Elementary School (MES) PTO is much more active this year - due in part to their dynamic president. They have arranged many events such as family movie night, dances, guest speakers - and have been supported by their parent liaison surveying the parents to learn what they are interested in. The PTO is also working on projects to obtain school security cameras and a fence beautification. MES continues to need more volunteers for extracurricular activities.

The ERHS PTSA is hoping to get more student involvement in their organization this year. They have a membership of 300 paid members. One very successful event was their father-son breakfast which brought in 200 people. They usually have 30 to 40 people at the monthly meeting. McNeil expressed concerns that there is not enough participation in extracurricular activities by ERHS students.

The GMS PTO continues to struggle. Although Austin reports they have 50 paid members, they only have about three active members. She is stumped as to how to get more parental involvement. She thanked ACE liaison Dave Whiteman for his extra support and for sometimes being the only representation at school events - such as basketball games. Other principals suggested she acknowledge parent participation with a trophy or extra credit for students whose parents attend. They all agreed that having teachers present at meetings can be a big draw - although it is sometimes difficult to get them there.

Jones explained that at Turning Point Academy (TPA), parent involvement is part of the charter school contract, part of the admissions process and therefore he actually is able to take attendance at their PTA meetings.

GES has an incredibly active and supportive PTA that writes grants, puts up murals, brings in speakers, develops a student directory for all parents and donates books to the library. Students get a homework "pass" if their parent attends the PTA meeting.

At Springhill Lake Elementary

School there is an active PTA but it has to deal with the transient nature of the school population. Sherwood reported that half of the students who start the school year are not there in June. The school population is quite diverse; about 50 percent African American (and half of them are directly African), 50 percent Hispanic and about four percent others. They currently have 69 homeless children in the school. Therefore, the school needs lots of unique supports for these children and bilingual presenters for their PTA meetings and events. SHL is always in need of socks, white shirts and coats for their kids. The uniform has been very helpful in making the children all feel more equal. The Strengthening Families program at SHL run by Greenbelt CARES is very popular as it offers a Spanish component.

Parent Liaisons

All the schools gave specific examples of how their parent liaisons contribute to the success of the relationship between the parents and the schools. The principals are all very concerned about the possibility that this position will be eliminted due to budget cuts.

Anti-littering Law **Enforcement Week**

Jeremiah C. Jones pled guilty August 14, 2008, in federal court to nine counts of arson at the Springhill Lake Apartments (now Empirian Village). Jones had lived in the complex when the fires were set between March and August 2007. According to The Washington Post, the fires caused more than \$2 million in damages.

Jones also admitted setting other fires over the past three years. He faces a sentence of a minimum of five years and a maximum of 20 years for each count, according to the U.S. Attorney.

requirement for this position that they don't tell you when you apply," she says. Her office is responsible for a wide range of testing including the Praxis test for teachers seeking to be certified by the state, as well as students taking GRE, ACT and LSAT tests. The center also offers the proctoring of tests for those needing to complete a specialized test.

Greenbelt

Mitchell is concluding her term as chair of GHI's Sustainable Design and Practice ad hoc committee after chairing that group for more than three years. That committee developed the rain barrel program and held a number of workshops concerning various areas of sustainable living.

Together with Cynthia Newcomer, Mitchell is a founder of a small informal group, Greenbelt Neighbors Alliance (GNA). Though still developing, GNA was formed after discussions on the Greenbelt listserv contained postings Mitchell thought seemed divisive - especially concerning the Spellman overpass. She decided to post a note to the listserv herself, brief and not accusatory. Several residents wrote back supporting her thoughts.

Though still quite new, small and "feeling its way," GNA is emerging as an organization concerned with community unity, she says, through an informed approach to community issues. One area on which GNA has focused is bringing the various residential and racial/ethnic groups together, as well as on voter education, turnout and electoral reform. GNA hopes to work with other community groups and provide city-wide communication. Not an official city group, the alliance

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searches for ways that all three sections of the city can come together – One Greenbelt.

Author

Mitchell is proud co-editor of the recently published "Making Good on the Promise: Student Affairs Professionals with Disabilities," a book with 20 authors from across the country. All the authors are student affairs professionals; most of them have disabilities. The book was published by University Press of America (UPA); information can be found on the UPA website, www.univpress.com.

Mitchell is especially proud that this book was simultaneously published in paper and in a format accessible to readers with vision impairments or other disabilities that make printed text a challenge. Those who need books in a different format often have to wait to have a book "translated" into a format they can use.

Others who do not need that format can pick up and read any book they wish from the moment it is published. Mitchell commented, "When a book is not simultaneously published in both print and in accessible text, it unfairly places the person with the disability at a disadvantage. If instead, we work 'from the get go' to publish materials in an accessible format, everyone starts from the same place."

She noted that many publications, such as brochures and other information sources, could take the same approach with some forethought, the kind of forethought that builds a truly inclusive community, across not only race and ethnicity but other areas of human difference as well.

When asked about free-time activities, Mitchell laughed. She

"Greenbelt is Great" says Mitchell, echoing the mantra on sweatshirts sometimes seen around town.

"The people with whom I work at University of Maryland think I am the official promoter of the city based on my comments," she laughs.

City Explores Upgrading Streetlights at Empirian Village

The Greenbelt city staff is exploring the possibility of joining with other local governments through the Metropolitan Council of Governments (COG) to utilize stimulus funding to upgrade streetlights. Greenbelt already has a Community Development Block Grant award of \$100,000 to be used for upgrading lighting in the Empirian Village neighborhood. These funds must be spent by December 31 of this year according to David Moran in a series of emails released by the city manager's office between him and George Nichols, a staff member at COG.


In Empirian Village most streetlights are high-pressure sodium vapor lights of 70 or 150 watts with a few others at major intersections at 250 watts and others at 100 watts. The city is considering replacing the 37 70-watt fixtures with ones at 150 watts.

Moran said in his emails that the city would like to utilize some sort of new energy technology (like LED or induction) but based upon initial conversations with representatives of PEPCO that does not appear to be a viable option. He suggested to COG the possibility of a demonstration project if it could be done within the year time frame.

Nichols responded that there was similar interest in other local governments and that PEPCO was also interested in moving forward. It is anticipated that the matter will be pursued in future meetings.

Cherry Trees Bloom On Arboretum Tour

From March 28 through April 12, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., the U.S. National Arboretum will offer a free self-guided tour of the arboretum's diverse collection of flowering cherries to display the wide range of sizes, shapes, colors and bloom times of this popular ornamental tree.
