Your nomination should include the various organizations and activities in which your nominee has served, along with any information you believe makes him or her particularly deserving of this award.

Nominees must be volunteers; city employees and elected officials may not be considered. The nomination deadline is August 2, with the winner announced on Friday, September 3 at the opening ceremony of the Labor Day Festival. Prizes will be awarded, proclamations will be presented and the winner will be the Grand Marshal of the Labor Day Parade on Monday, September 6. Then his or her name will be added to those of previous recipients to a plaque that hangs in the Greenbelt Community Center.

Often there are several nominees deserving of honor and recognition. The committee must then make the difficult choice of

Basketball Noise Complaint Aired at Council Meeting

The Greenbelt City Council meeting on Monday, June 21 opened with a short presentation by the Director of Government Affairs of Comcast Cable Network Karmen Bailey Walker concerning the company's new Xfinity upgrade, which promises more channels and higher speeds but – she said – no changes in pricing.

Complaint

Council then turned to a pre-scheduled citizen complaint.

Betty Sonneveldt of Lakeside Drive, whose home is adjacent to the University Square development's basketball court, presented a well-documented noise complaint against what happens there at all hours of day and night. She described "an invasion of vulgar and offensive language" so loud and continuous that she had been sleep-deprived "four nights in a row."

In addition, she added, University Square management allows large, noisy parties of young people to carry on in the party room at the nearby private swimming pool, often lasting until hours after midnight. Management officials for the development, however, are not on the premises, Sonneveldt said; they depart at the end of the work day for homes in Virginia.

The situation is so bad, Sonneveldt said, "I'm not spend-

ing a night in this town." She described how she was hosting relatives from Denmark and had to leave home, taking them on trips elsewhere because the noise was so unbearable they could not sleep.

Lakeside resident Kelly Ivy supported her account. He added that street gangs "not from Greenbelt" come into the area at 11 or 12 at night, using car lights to illuminate the space and conduct "street games" worth "three or five thousand bucks."

He himself had dropped by to see what was going on, he said. The gang members were older men and not from University Square, he emphasized.

Packets Prepared

Sonneveldt had prepared packets for each member of council, including records from May and June this year detailing accounts of each night's aggravations. This was only a small part of records she had been keeping for several years, she said. The packets also contained copies of correspondence and a formal written record of her complaint to the city.

Councilmember Edward Putens called for a council worksession with representatives from University Square. "They should be shut down at 9 p.m.," he said.

Donations are Sought Now For Arts Center Restrooms

The Greenbelt Arts Center in Roosevelt Center seeks support to bring its theater restrooms into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

A restroom makeover has been a goal of the theater's board of directors and the City of Greenbelt for several years. Some existing walls must be moved, the plumbing excavated and reconfigured and the interiors totally replaced: stalls, toilets, floor and wall tile, grab bars, sinks, mirrors, doors, sprinklers and lighting, soap and towel dispensers.

Based on bids by a number of contractors, an estimated up to \$50,000 would be needed to complete the project. Restroom Rescue, a committee charged with executing the plan, has begun applying to area foundations. Committee Chair Joan Jacobs is assisted by Michael Hartman and Betsy Marks Delaney, general manager for the theater.

Three local supporters of GAC who are disabled – Sydney Jacobs, Shirley Middleton and Courtney Ritz – have agreed to join the committee as technical advisers. Inquiries or comments can be addressed to Restroom Rescue, Greenbelt Arts Center,

A \$5,000 grant has been received from the Weissberg Foundation of Arlington, Va. Because foundations take into account the level of support exhibited by members and friends of the applicant organizations, the success of this drive is vital to reaching the goal. Restroom Rescue has established \$10,000 as its membership goal, keeping in mind that GAC's supporters contributed \$8,000 to the "Light Brigade," which raised \$18,000 in 2006-07 for the theater's new lighting system.

As part of the membership drive, guitarist Alex Gordon will give a benefit concert at the Greenbelt Arts Center on Friday, July 16 at 7:30 p.m. More information is available at www.whoisalexgordon.com.

Change to Bus Service Is Topic of Discussion

Plenty of intelligent exchange, which didn't quite morph into heated debate, ensued at a meeting in the Greenbelt Community Center on June 2 on proposed changes to Metrobus service to Greenbelt. Chair George Branyan of the Advisory Planning Board (APB) opened the floor to discussion following Larry Glick's presentation of the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority's (WMATA) proposed changes.

Glick attempted to allay fears that WMATA's new restructuring plan will leave riders with poorer service, as some Greenbelt residents think.

His presentation, though armed with charts, maps and stats, seemed to convince few of the 15 people present. Earlier criticism of WMATA's proposed changes by Transit Riders United of Greenbelt (TRU-G) was detailed in a three-page report written by Anna Socrates for TRU-G, which all attendees had in hand.

She asserts that "the Proposal (for WMATA's changes) is not a restructuring or 'service adjustment,' but rather a 'service reduction' . . . The effects on Greenbelt's 1,600 riders daily would be disproportionate as well as devastating."

Socrates was not at the meeting but all seven APB members were present as well as all seven city councilmembers.

Glick said that WMATA's service changes will shorten passengers' trip lengths, maximize connectivity within Greenbelt and eliminate service redundancy, among other benefits.

Many Questions

Most questions addressed to Glick were concerned with safety, others with how late service would run. Councilmember Emmett Jordan expressed concern for the safety of ERHS students waiting for buses at Greenbelt Road and Hanover Parkway after school. Bill Orleans was worried about the riskiness of bus service at Crescent Road and Kenilworth Avenue. Staff liaison Terri Hruby, Councilmember Ed Putens, Diane McFadden, John Stith, Mayor Judith Davis, Deborah Seward and others all asked questions that Glick and James Hamre, director of the Office of Bus Planning, fielded at length.

Glick said he "would do the best I can to keep Greenbelt service as late as it is now" and to give Greenbelt residents "the biggest bang for your buck. We're not trying to hide anything or put anything over on you."

Hamre said it was imperative to implement the proposed changes now. "We have an opportunity to make something happen now. Further delay may get us caught up in next year's budget problem. Strike while the iron is hot."

Hamre complimented Glick for his "transparency and detailed information. He gave us a college course tonight."

Deborah Seward said her primary objection to WMATA's proposed changes is the disparity of costs borne by Greenbelt riders compared to Montgomery County riders. "Disparities across the state could drive away our (Greenbelt) riders," Seward said.

Former Greenbelter Jean B. Crabill, age 76, of Fairfield Township, Ohio, died on Wednesday June 16, 2010, at Otterbein Home in Lebanon, Ohio.

Mayor Judith Davis agreed. "We need to rev up the action," she said.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts said the issue was "a matter of enforcing the laws."

Councilmember Leta Mach felt use of the facility should be restricted to residents and Councilmember Konrad Herling felt that security lights should be installed on the extended guard house. Putens suggested that a camera should also be installed.

Davis requested that both the Police Department and Code Enforcement provide reports for the next council meeting, which will take place on July 12. The entire discussion, which on the part of the petitioner became very emotional, consumed about a half hour of council's attention.

Following Sonneveldt's presentation and their response, council then turned to a number of routine business matters – house-keeping issues perhaps – which will be the subject for a later issue of this paper.


Cadettes, Skin Care

One-act Play Festival at GAC Showcased Great Talent

A cute vampire in a party dress, a sinister bureaucrat in a black suit, a possibly murderous ex-girlfriend and an imaginative children's story – if you missed the Local Playwrights One Act Festival two weeks ago at the Greenbelt Arts Center (GAC), you missed these and more.

Six one-act plays, interspersed with four very funny interludes entitled Freshly Squeezed Excerpts, were produced by Greenbelt's Penny Martin. The festival was performed on June 11 through 13. The Friday night performance was sold out and several people had to be turned away.

The first play, "Mama Says," was written by longtime Greenbelt resident and published author Peggy Rooney. Her touching play starred the talented Meg Nemeth as a woman describing her life; she ages from 17 to 80 in the course of the act.

Matt Arbach, president of the Greenbelt Writers Group, authored the play that one of the main actors, the News Review's own Jim Link, called "Kafkaesque." It was a taut cat-and-mouse interaction as a nameless bureaucrat questions a man for unknown purposes.

"This Play Sucks" was done in play-within-a-play format, with audience participation. It won a prize for best original work at the Maryland State One-Act Play Festival in 2009, so its name isn't entirely fitting.

Vampires

John Hayes, author of "The

Pranksters" is a published poet as well as playwright. His Halloween-themed play showed two vampires going trick-or-treating with a bad outcome for one homeowner. Janet Walenta played the brassy female vampire so well it's hard to believe this was her first time onstage.

The high-energy comedy "4,3,2,1" told the story of a group of young friends dealing with what appear to be murderous attempts by an ex-girlfriend of one of the guys.

"The Magic Dream Machine" was a sweet story about an adventure tale a wheelchair-bound boy has dreamed. Featuring two fourth-graders and several young teens, it was fanciful and well done. Elizabeth Gardner, daughter of Anne and Jon Gardner, narrated beautifully the story of a young girl's adventure of living as various animals.

Suzette Agans, GHI president, performed in two of the very funny Freshly Squeezed Excerpts. It was hard to believe this was also her first time onstage.

Great performances and imaginative plots left the audience wishing for more than just one act of each of these plays. The Local Playwrights One-Act Festival provided a great evening of entertainment.

Treeless Site at Goddard Found for New Cell Tower

Engineers at NASA Goddard Space Flight Center have selected a site of open space for location of a new Verizon cell tower on NASA property after their originally selected site was rejected because the City of Greenbelt had not sent a letter of concurrence on the project to the National Capital Planning Commission (NCPC).

Last March the Greenbelt City Council had reviewed a plan submitted by NASA, expressing concern to the NCPC because of tree loss required by the plan. NCPC then rejected the plan because of the city's failure to support it, even though the Prince George's County Council had agreed to it.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts suggested that the city send NCPC a letter of appreciation for supporting the city's views on the rejected plan.

The new tower will be 100

feet high and located just north of Greenbelt Road near the Goddard Visitor Center in an area designated as a buffer zone. No trees will be removed to install this tower. It is deemed unlikely that the tower will be visible from within the city limits.

After council unanimously agreed to send a letter of concurrence on the new plan to NCPC at its regular meeting on June 7, Mayor Judith Davis told Alan Binstock of Goddard that she appreciated that NCPC and NASA had listened to the city's concerns. Binstock said NASA officials modified the plan's design to address the city's concerns and to "be good neighbors."

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

A Review

Shakespeare Adaptation
At Arts Center Set in 50s

The guest productions at Greenbelt Arts Center are always interesting and somewhat mysterious. Will the production be more experimental than tried-and-true? Since often the actors are new to the GAC stage, will the show be of the high quality expected from GAC? For the current production of Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night," by Thunderous Productions at GAC, the answer to both questions is "yes." It's an unusual adaptation of the play and although only one actor is well known to Greenbelt audiences, it's a well-done production.

"Twelfth Night" is one of Shakespeare's comedies and as is typical of his comedies, it contains two love stories, plenty of disguises and impersonations, lots of action, several comic characters and ends happily. It's the perfect lighthearted show for such warm weather. Thunderous Productions has updated it to the 1950s doo-wop era, while retaining the old English wording. There's a waitress on roller skates and some well-chosen music to

set the stage.

Thunderous Productions has won two Maryland community theater awards this year – one for ensemble acting and another for an original script. It's easy to see why the company has been recognized – it has some very fine actors. It would be difficult to single out a few but Sarah Eberhardt, a senior at Towson State University majoring in theater, is excellent as the Fool – a good stage presence, lots of talent and a great singing voice. But GAC's own Trix Whitehall steals the show as one of the comic characters, Dame Toby Belch. Whitehall is wonderful as the drunken, somewhat bawdy woman whose antics propel the action.

"Twelfth Night" will play on Friday, June 25 and Saturday, June 26 at 8 p.m. A Sunday matinee is scheduled for June 27 at 2 p.m. Reservations may be made through the box office at 301-441-8770 or at the Arts Center at 123 Centerway, located beneath the Co-op supermarket.

A Hot Night in Our Town

The Hot Club of DC is hosting a jazz jam at the New Deal Café on Sunday, July 11 from 5 to 8 p.m. after a regular performance on Friday, June 25 from 8 to 11 p.m.

The Hot Club of "gypsy jazz" performances track to a music genre founded in the 1930s by Django Reinhardt, a gypsy guitarist from Belgium. When Reinhardt and violin virtuoso Stephane Grappelli met and started the Quintet of the Hot Club of France, their concept was revolutionary, says guitarist Stephan Caucheteux, founder of the Hot Club of DC. It was a European answer to the traditional American jazz band, with only stringed instruments – two rhythm guitars, bass as rhythm section, guitar solo and violin solo. The two key instruments in gypsy jazz are violin and guitar.

"But really what Reinhardt and Grappelli played at the beginning," says Caucheteux, "was inspired by French songs and standard jazz, as they (also) incorporated some traditional tunes drawn from the Eastern European repertoire. Gypsy jazz musicians are jazz musicians first and foremost."

Greenbelt's Hot

Caucheteux agrees that "there are a few Dixieland tunes in gyp-

sy jazz, picked up from swing jazz, which borrowed them." But like Django Reinhardt in his day, the Hot Club of DC draws from a wide variety of musicians and friends from the area; "that's why every performance is different."

In their last regular performance at the Café, Barry Holober, a drummer with the Fabulous Hubcaps who lives in Greenbelt, played drums with the group that night, while his wife, Becky, served as the Café's emcee. Besides Caucheteux, the group's core includes Craig Bumgarner on guitar, Ben Brooks on violin and Rick Netherton on upright bass. They play widely in the area (see <http://hcofdc.com> and newdealcafe.com).

If you're going to see "Greenbelt Voices" at the Greenbelt Art Center on opening night, Friday, July 23 why not stop by the Café for dinner and drinks before the play and The Hot Club of DC afterward, as Jim Giese and his group did on the opening night of "Man of La Mancha" in March which he wrote about in the News Review? As Giese said, why go to Broadway or DC when you have fine talent in Greenbelt?

Rank Number One

Maryland public schools rank first in the nation in the percentage of high schools offering – and students taking – college-level courses, according to a press release from the Maryland State Board of Education.

Newsweek magazine, in its annual "America's Top High Schools" issue, lists 98 Maryland high schools among its top 1,622 schools, the top six percent in the nation. Among those listed from Prince George's County High Schools are Eleanor Roosevelt, High Point, Laurel, Bowie, Parkdale, Central and Oxon Hill.

The Newsweek list is based upon the Challenge Index, developed by the Washington Post. It looks at student enrollment in Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate and Cambridge courses and tests, which have been shown to be good preparation for higher education.

Senator Paul Pinsky Files for Reelection

State Senator Paul G. Pinsky filed paperwork this week with the Board of Elections officially declaring his candidacy for reelection as senator for the 22nd District, which includes Greenbelt. He will run in the Democratic primary. Elected to the Maryland State Senate in 1994 after two terms in the House of Delegates, he is a member of the Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee and chair of both its Education Subcommittee and its Environment Subcommittee. He is also Senate chair of the Joint Committee on Administrative, Executive, and Legislative Review.

Pinsky, an advocate for environmental protection and health care reform, has focused on improving education, both across the state and in Prince George's County. He has worked to close corporate tax loopholes, promote

the public financing of campaigns, remove private money and influence and provide health care for all Marylanders.

Pinsky worked for the Prince George's County Public Schools for 20 years teaching high school history. He is currently a teachers' union organizer with an affiliate of the Maryland State Educators' Association.

Progressive Maryland gave Senator Pinsky their highest score this year as well as the highest overall score for the past four years. The League of Conservation Voters noted in their endorsement that Senator Pinsky was the only senator to receive a top score of 100 percent. Besides endorsements from these two organizations, Senator Pinsky has been endorsed by the Prince George's County Educators' Association and the Service Employees International Union.

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
