158 Greenbelt Homes Now Relying on Wind Power

In Maryland 50 percent of the electricity that powers homes, schools and workplaces comes from coal. In Greenbelt, however, 158 households have stopped paying for coal-fired power by signing up for wind energy.

Coal-fired power plants, even with modern-day filters and scrubbers, spew pollutants into the air. This occurs because the carbon that is trapped in coal as decayed plant and animal material gets released as carbon dioxide when the coal is burned. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, in 2008 electricity generation in the U.S. contributed about 94 percent of all carbon dioxide that was emitted into the air.

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, a group of scientists formed by the United Nations, has spent over 20 years studying the impacts of increased carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Most carbon dioxide is released by human activities, so the level of carbon dioxide in our atmosphere will continue to increase unless people change some habits.

The planet itself is changing in ways that will greatly disrupt the way people live on Earth. Permanent water shortages are already occurring in some areas. These shortages are caused by changing snow patterns, shrinking glaciers and increased human demand. Although fresh water that people depend on is diminishing, scientists predict that parts of U.S. coastlines will be under water because of rising sea water. **Greenbelt Groups**

The Greenbelt City Council worksession/stakeholder meeting with University Square Apartments on August 11 began and ended cordially but several contentious moments occurred during the meeting. The meeting's purpose was to address ongoing complaints by nearby residents of Lakeside Drive of noise and disorderly behavior at the apartment complex.

These included the transfer of large sums of money and loud cursing at the development's basketball courts, especially after the posted hours during which the courts may be used. Another complaint included loud music, more people than the legal capactial management for Lerner Management, owner of the complex; and L. Patrick May, an attorney for Lerner, represented University Square, located on Westway near Lakeside Drive.

Mayor Judith Davis opened the meeting by asking participants to "lower the tension" in the room and to work together for a resolution. She pointed out that the apartment complex did not want complaints to ruin its reputation and the city wanted to achieve a high quality of life for tenants and neighbors of the complex.

I am writing to express my sympathies, to you all, for the passing of your former colleague, Dorothy Sucher.

You may not remember me, as I wrote only a few articles for the paper, covering the City Council but I recall Mary Lou telling me something of the case that had gone to the Supreme Court and the effect it had on the paper and especially on Mr. Skolnik and Elaine, of course.

I don't believe I ever met Ms. Sucher. But while studying Mass Media Law at College Park I came to appreciate the dedication and patriotism of every newspaper person who has ever had to stand for the 1st Amendment against those (usually the powerful) who would try to control or manipulate the independent press, in furtherance of their own ends.

I really enjoyed my years living in Lakeside and I have always been proud to claim I had been a miniscule part, as a reporter for the News Review, of a stalwart of press independence and a group of people who should always be proud of that legacy, made in a very small town but, once upon a time, on a very big stage.

Although I did not pursue journalism as a career (mostly because the City Council in those days was more boring than watching paint dry and seemed more stuck on itself than already-dried paint, having a similar effect on me as might, say, Thorazine), I am an avid reader of newspapers (though I do it online) and have always held you folks in print journalism in the highest regard.

I continue to do so and I express my sincere sadness at your loss of Dorothy. Keep after them, for they are still out there. *Jim Harnisch*

Narcolepsy Network Has Picnic at Lake

The Narcolepsy Network and the Washington, D.C. Area Narcolepsy and Hypersomnia Support Group will co-host a free community picnic at Buddy Attick Lake Park in the group picnic area on Saturday, September 25 from noon to 4 p.m.

All are invited to attend the picnic and to learn whether they or someone they know might have narcolepsy and to find support in living with this disease. Narcolepsy is a widely misunderstood autoimmune neurological disease which causes excessive daytime sleepiness but does not always cause involuntary sleep episodes. Narcolepsy may also cause temporary loss of muscular control in response to strong emotions, "fainting" episodes, temporary inability to move on awakening, hallucinations, nighttime insomnia, sleeping 10 or more hours per day, mild to severe difficulties with memory and attention and problems in school.

People with narcolepsy are commonly misdiagnosed with ADD, ADHD, depression, schizophrenia and other psychiatric disorders. Although the disease begins most often during the teenage years, it can develop at any age. People with narcolepsy and hypersomnia, their family and friends and the general public are all welcome to attend the community picnic.



Hanover Apartments Purchased by Harbor

The Harbor Group has purchased the Hanover Apartments for approximately \$40 million. The Norfolk, Va.-based group is the beneficiary of seller Federal Capital Partners' wide-ranging overhaul of the Hanover Road complex. FCP had bought the 320-unit project for \$23.5 million in 2006. 





Reel & Meal Features Women in War Zones

Monday, September 20 at 7 p.m. is the next in the Reel & Meal at the New Deal Café film series, organized by the Peace and Justice Coalition, featuring "Women in War Zones." The free movie, 53 minutes long, is co-sponsored by four Greenbeltbased community organizations; food can be bought at 6:30 p.m.

One of the deadliest but neglected war zones is in the Democratic Republic of Congo (formerly Zaire), where 5.5 million people have died. After the 1994 Rwandan civil war, refugees fled to the neighboring Congo, including the militia partially responsible for the Rwandan genocide. Despite a 2003 peace agreement. armed militias continue to torture and rape hundreds of thousands of women and children to foster fear in the population and build cohesion within their own ranks.

"Women in War Zones" takes place in the 400-bed Panzi Hospital along the Rwandan border and focuses on a young woman and a girl, 22-year-old Helene and 13-year-old Bijoux, who become friends during their hospital stay while grappling with the atrocities they experienced. are working to address environmental issues. Several of these organizations, including Greenbelt Climate Action Network, Greenbelt Homes Inc. (GHI), Greenbelt Community Foundation (GCF) and the Advisory Committee on Environmental Sustainability (GreenACES) have teamed up to encourage Greenbelt households and businesses to sign up to have all or part of their electrical usage generated by wind power through Clean Currents, Viridian Energy or Washington Gas Energy Services.

Wind power is clean energy that contributes no carbon dioxide to the atmosphere. Currently wind energy rates cost less per kilowatt hour than traditional power. Over the past two years, 158 Greenbelt households made the switch to wind power supplied by Clean Currents.

Greenbelt resident Zach Feris reports that his 3-bedroom GHI home has seen a \$10 decrease per month on each power bill. Other residents report they have experienced no change in service, except for a less costly power bill, because Pepco is still responsible for transmission and for maintaining power lines.

At a recent Greenbelt Farmer's Market, Megan Hughes of Green-ACES assured potential future customers that there was no fee to make the switch and that no wind turbines would be installed on customers' lawns or rooftops. Instead, the wind energy involved is produced in Texas and other states and added to the national grid in the form of wind power.

In this way, Greenbelters can add to the demand for clean energy and producers will have a financial incentive to increase supply. As supply thus increases, competition will result in lower prices and potentially spur the greater production of wind power in the Mid-Atlantic region.

Green Energy

Greenbelt is currently enrolled in Clean Currents' Green Neighborhood Energy Challenge. For every Greenbelt household that signs up for wind power and indicates they heard about Clean Currents from "Greener in Greenbelt," Clean Currents will donate \$15 to the Greenbelt Community Foundation to be used in green projects.

The current campaign ends on October 1. Last year's check funded the beginning of the Three Sister's Garden project.

they are not aware of." He mentioned that missing signage about the basketball court hours had been replaced.

Schinner reported that eight incidents near the basketball courts had been reported by routine patrols, although there is no evidence of drug activity in the area. He then introduced Officer Jermaine Gulledge, one of the resident officers.

Gulledge reported that similar complaints arose every summer and that the events "are not as bad as they are blown up to be." He denied that illegal activities were taking place at the basketball court and said he allows his own children to play there. Gulledge reported he has spoken to some of the Lakeside residents who he knew to have complained to the city and that these residents told him that the noise has lessened. He reported that the youths disperse readily when told the courts are closed.

Possible Solutions

Discussions took place about ways in which use of the courts after hours may be prevented and the difficulty of measuring episodic noise. Turning off the lights, installing a motion detector on the lights, the installation of noise barriers, a device that disables the hoop, even removal of the basketball courts were all discussed and rejected as not practical. Schinner said that police patrols would be increased as much as possible.

Council emphasized that residents must report noise or disorderly behavior to the authorities at the time it is occurring. Several councilmembers recognized the problem that the youth had nowhere else to go to congregate. Council asked the Lerner staff to send a letter to residents telling them that use of the basketball courts after hours was a violation of their lease and requested that the signs which posted the hours of use of the courts remain up.

The meeting then proceeded to the second complaint regarding misuse of the party room. Council said it had been reported to them that on July 10 a party was held in the party room at the complex community center at which there was loud music and yelling. About 50 people were also noted outside the center.

Wynn said the party room is not rented very often and that the contract of rental includes the rules that no alcohol may be on the premises and that the event must end by 9 p.m. Davis pointed out that the contract must be enforced. She suggested that the contract include the information that a violation of the contract may result in the security deposit being retained.

May said a warning must be given first under the law, as renting the party room is an extension of the tenant's lease.

Davis asked the Lerner staff how future complaints may be avoided. They responded that they must be made aware of the dates and time of the problems so they can deal with problems effectively, including the possibility of increasing security patrols.

Councilmember Emmett Jordan lightened the discussion by saying it was his first council meeting with University Square. He asked if there was anything else they would like to discuss. A short but more friendly discussion then took place.

Smooth Operator Final Push on Enforcement

Through September 18 the Greenbelt Police will continue stepped-up enforcement of traffic violations during the final wave of the Smooth Operator program against aggressive driving. Extra officers will do enforcement using state-funded overtime.

Smooth Operator is a public safety initiative partnering law enforcement, public safety officials and other experts in the District of Columbia, Maryland and Virginia and Pennsylvania.

The program is a model for a coordinated, intrastate and interstate program designed to combat the aggressive driving problem and find short- and long-term solutions for it. Law enforcement agencies, trauma experts, government officials and other professionals have worked to educate motorists of the risks involved with aggressive driving and to stigmatize aggressive driving behavior.

The program was founded in 1997 and involved 18 D.C.area law enforcement agencies, resulting in 62,000 citations in the first year. There have been 3.2 million citations issued to aggressive drivers since the program began.

A public awareness and education component was added to the program to inform people about aggressive driving and encourage them to be aware of their potential for driving aggressively, especially in congested traffic or when stressed.


Four City Officers Are Now TSS Certified

Several City of Greenbelt police officers have been recogized for their experience and lifesaving traffic safety efforts with Traffic Safety Specialist (TSS) designations by the Maryland Police and Correctional Training Commission.

Sergeant Gordon Pracht and Master Police Officers Scott Kaiser, Scott Yankowy and Gordon Rose were among Maryland police officers who recently received Traffic Safety Specialist (TSS) certification. Over 100 Maryland officers including Pracht, Rose and Yankowy received TSS 1 designation, while Kaiser was one of four officers in the state to receive TSS 2 designation. The TSS program recognizes police officers for their experience, training and proficiency in traffic safety enforcement operations. Certification is open to all officers, deputies and troopers in the state.

Sponsored as a joint partnership between the Maryland Police and Correctional Training Commission, the Maryland Chiefs of Police Association, the Maryland Sheriff's Association and the Maryland Highway Safety Office, the TSS program is a multi-tiered program that recognizes officers for their advancing achievements in traffic safety.

"Traffic safety is a priority for the Police Department," said Greenbelt Chief Jim Craze. "Effective traffic enforcement is a primary function of public safety. Few people are affected by crime but everyone who travels our roadways has to deal with traffic issues one way or another. We are very proud that these officers have attained this professional training which will result in safer streets in Greenbelt."

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
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Smithsonian Readers Offered Free Entry
