Proposed Sectional Map Changes Will Necessitate Zoning Changes

This is the third article describing important elements of the Preliminary Greenbelt Metro Area and Md. 193 Corridor Sector Plan and Proposed Sectional Map Amendment released for public review in July.

The first article (News Review, September 6) covered the release and availability of the 426-page document, the schedule for review and submission of comments and the nearly two-year history of the plan's development. The second article provided a summary of listed highlights of the plan, its scope, the plan's several functional elements and an update on upcoming City of Greenbelt meetings where the Plan will be discussed (News Review, September 13).

This article will focus on the Proposed Sectional Map Amendment (SMA), which details specific zoning changes recommended for the Sector Plan area. To implement policies and land use recommendations contained in the plan, its authors indicate that

several parcels of land must be rezoned to bring their zoning into conformance with the Sector Plan.

"Such a comprehensive rezoning process via the SMA provides the most appropriate mechanism for the public sector to achieve this goal. As such, the SMA is approved as an amendment to the official zoning maps concurrently with the approval of the Sector Plan."

DDOZ

The proposed SMA includes 10 recommended zoning changes based on land use and development policies described in the Sector Plan. Those specific rezoning proposals include a development district overlay zone (DDOZ), which is superimposed over the Greenbelt Metro Metropolitan Center (Metro North Core, Indian Creek Stream Valley, Franklin Park at Greenbelt Station, Springhill Lake Community Center, Capital Office Park, Beltway Plaza, commercial and mixed-use zoned properties

along Branchville Road and the commercial properties on the south side of Md. 193 in Berwyn Heights.)

Further, according to the Plan's authors, "Implementation of the long-range land-use recommendations of the Sector Plan for mixed-use, pedestrian and transit-oriented development in designated corridor nodes requires [the] application of mixed-use zoning techniques."

The Plan therefore recommends that an appropriate set of mixed-use zoning categories or techniques be prepared (or existing zones modified), so that there would be an effective set of regulations to achieve fully the Plan's vision. It suggests that a combination of Mixed-Use-Infill (MUI) zone, Mixed-Use-Transportation Oriented (M-X-T) zone and the DDOZ serve as an adequate zoning approach to implement recommendations of the Sector Plan for higher intensity, mixed-use

Council Designates School Zones And Five Speed Camera Locations

At its September 10 meeting with all present, the Greenbelt City Council took the necessary steps to utilize speed cameras to curtail speeding near Greenbelt schools. A resolution designated all streets within a half mile of any of the four city schools to be school zones. Initially cameras will be placed at five locations with Greenbelt Road at Eleanor Roosevelt High School to be added upon state approval.

School Zones

A resolution to establish school zones within the City of Greenbelt was introduced for second reading and then adopted. The resolution follows council's adoption in March 2012 of an ordinance authorizing the operation of speed-monitoring systems (speed cameras) to enforce the posted speed limit in school zones as allowed by Maryland State law.

The resolution establishes school zones on all public roads within the City of Greenbelt within a one-half mile radius of Eleanor Roosevelt High School, Greenbelt Middle School, Greenbelt Elementary School, Turning Point Academy and Springhill Lake Elementary School.

Practically every street in Greenbelt is in at least one of the zones. However, the neighborhoods of the lower Boxwood

community and Lakeside North; a good part of Greenbelt Homes close to the city center; and the Lakeside, University Square, Charlestowne Village and Belle Point communities are not within any of the five school zones. Portions of 31 roadways are designated School Zone Roadways.

Although the resolution would enable the city to use speed cameras on any of the designated roadways, city staff recommend that the initial five locations for speed cameras be: 1) Crescent Road between Northway and Greenhill Roads; 2) the 7700 block of Hanover Parkway; 3) the 7700 block of Mandan Road; 4) Edmonston Road at Springhill Court and 5) the 5900 block of Cherrywood Lane. A sixth location on Greenbelt Road between Hanover Parkway and Mandan Road will likely be recommended at a future time if first approved by the Maryland State Highway Administration.

Speed Cameras

Much council discussion focused on the recommended locations for placement of the speed cameras. Jordan objected that up to six cameras would be located in the immediate vicinity of Eleanor Roosevelt High School.

Several of his colleagues asserted, however, that only four, not six, cameras would be placed

at those locations, because two cameras would be alternated at Mandan Road and Hanover Parkway and another two would operate on Greenbelt Road when state approval is granted. A resident of Woodland Way expressed her concern that the segment of Crescent Road recommended for speed cameras was just barely within the boundary for Greenbelt Elementary School and that the camera deployment would cover such a short distance.

To the question "Why not on Ridge Road, closer to the actual school?" staff responded that Ridge Road currently is controlled by several stop signs. A city staff memo had indicated that Brekford Corporation, the city contractor for the program, evaluated 18 locations within the city, finding speeds in excess of 12 miles per hour over the posted speed limit at all locations.

Davis expressed the view that the speed camera program would augment the work of the Police Department in controlling speeds on city roadways. Councilmember Konrad Herling saw the program as a proactive approach to assure safe roads within the school zones.

In response to questions from the audience, the mayor asked

75th Anniversary

Treasure Hunt Cabarets Offer Gems from 1937

In honor of Greenbelt's 75th anniversary, the Recreation Department will hold a Treasure Hunt Cabaret this weekend and next in the form of a musical birthday party celebrating the songs the first Greenbelters danced to – and romanced to – during the zenith year of American popular song.

Host Chris Cherry, pianist Stefan Brodd, guest vocalists Ole and Ingrid Hass and six teen performers from Camp Encore 2012 will present two free afternoons of music, lively commentary and classic film clips. The cabarets will take place in the Greenbelt Community Center gym at 15 Crescent Road on Sundays, September 23 and September 30 from 3 to 4:30 p.m., with refreshments afterward.

The September 23 show will feature songs from shows that played on Broadway during the 1937-38 season, with the September 30 cabaret showcasing songs from movies of the same period, including films that played at the Greenbelt movie theater.

"Greenbelt had the good fortune to be born at the peak of the American songbook," said Cherry. "Entertainers such as Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers, Bing Crosby, Bob Hope, Judy Garland and Shirley Temple introduced enduring hits by Irving Berlin, Cole Porter, George and Ira Gershwin, Harold Arlen, Richard Rodgers and Lorenz Hart and other legendary songsmiths."

Swing Era

The Swing Era and the hey-day of the big bands was just beginning. In the spring of 1938 Benny Goodman and his orchestra became the first non-classical musicians to play at Carnegie Hall. Throughout the preceding fall, Goodman broadcast from the Manhattan Ballroom in the Hotel Pennsylvania in New York City. Greenbelt pioneers would have heard those broadcasts and others like them.

"This is the music that the first Greenbelters listened to and danced to," said Cherry. "It's as

New Signs for Attick Park Approved by City Council

Getting back to a full schedule of meetings and worksessions, the Greenbelt City Council meeting on September 10 offered a little bit of everything. With two presentations, an enabling resolution establishing the use of speed cameras within school zones (see ajoining story) and approval sought for reflective signs with emergency information and to replace part of the Municipal Building roof, a relatively light but still lively agenda was created. All seven councilmembers attended.

Presentations

The first item of business was the presentation of a proclamation honoring the Greenbelt Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) for their promotion and training of preparedness and emergency procedures for the city and its residents. Ken Silberman, coordinator of Greenbelt CERT, accepted the proclamation.

The second presentation was an update briefing by Paul Des-Jardin, director of Community

Noisier than Necessary

Bill Norwood's letter of September 13 concerning loud music is not the first complaint to the city about loud music.

For many years I have complained to city officials, the police, code enforcement and the New Deal Café concerning the loud music played by the bands at Roosevelt Center. The city doesn't care nor does the New Deal Café. Several years ago, I called the police about the loud music. I requested that an officer come to my apartment building. The officer responded, agreed that the music was too loud and said that the department couldn't do anything as the New Deal Café had a permit. I gave up contacting the New Deal Cafe as the employees and management were unresponsive and uncaring.

I have hand delivered letters of complaint to the mayor and city offices. I have called councilmembers at home. I have sent emails. They don't care. They don't live close enough to Roosevelt Center to be exposed to the noise.

Last year the city manager promised "we will arrange to have noise checks done by Code Enforcement." On Saturday, September 15 the bands were again too loud. I contacted the police. The response I got from the police chief was "city sponsored event, there is no violation of a noise ordinance."

On Sunday September 16 the noise was even worse. An outdoor religious service was being held, with the speaker and music even louder than the bands of the previous day.

Roosevelt Center is small, with limited seating. It is a makeshift, temporary venue. Set the sound levels for the audience at the center, not the apartments across the street. I am not in favor of stopping outdoor events, I just don't want to be subjected to the loud noise.





In Memoriam

NASA Pioneer Dr. Jaylee Mead

We have lost another of the great pioneers of the Space Age, and a dear friend, Jaylee Mead. She was one of the first women scientists hired by NASA back when Goddard Space Flight Center opened in 1959.

She was also one of the founding members of the Goddard Astronomy Club (GAC) when it formed in 1961. Dr. Mead and her late husband Gilbert Mead lived in Greenbriar for many years while they worked at Goddard.


I was lucky to have a nice conversation with her about this when she gave her last talk at Goddard last year. She told me, in her very enthusiastic voice that was the trademark of her great character, that back in the early days of Goddard: "Astronomy was considered a big deal, even though there was not much official astronomy going on as yet at NASA." The GAC was a reflection of this. She was a patron of the arts and a champion to the Astronomical Society of Greenbelt (ASG), giving us a matching grant with husband Gil for the City of Greenbelt Observatory, which was dedicated in 2009 during the International Year of Astronomy.

Montgomery College had donated an observatory dome and 14-inch SCT telescope to the ASG in March 2001. With the help of the City of Greenbelt and this much needed grant from the Mead Family Foundation, the City of Greenbelt Observatory has become a reality. The ASG was spawned by members of the GAC in 1992, of which Jaylee was a founding member. It is probably fair to say that in more wavs than one she helped foster growth in amateur astronomy in the Greenbelt area in a big way. She was a giant among our citizens and a lover of the performing arts, music, science and nature.





much a part of Greenbelt's heritage as the Community Center or the Mother and Child statue in Roosevelt Center." And speaking of the Community Center, Cherry noted that according to the first issues of the Greenbelt Cooperator (original name of Greenbelt's weekly newspaper), social dances were a popular activity for the new residents, the majority of whom were young couples. "It's fitting that we are holding our two Treasure Hunt Cabarets in the very room where those first dances took place," Cherry said.

Along with perennial hits such as "They Can't Take That Away From Me," "My Funny Valentine" and "This Can't Be Love," the cabarets will feature some rarer songs now out of print. To get the music for the title song to Little Miss Broadway, the first film shown at the Greenbelt movie theater, Cherry had to travel to the performing arts library in New York's Lincoln Center, where he filmed the sheet music in a special archive room where no photocopying or scanning is allowed. The same archive yielded another gem, a rollicking number titled "F.D.R. Jones," about a family who names a new baby after the president.

Film Clips

Among the film clips to be screened during the cabaret are movie excerpts showing how Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt were affectionately spoofed in musicals of the period. Reflecting the fact that the president's disability was unknown to the general public, he was portrayed in these films not only as able to walk, but as a proficient tap

Other highlights of the cabarets will include classically trained vocalists Ole and Ingrid Hass presenting a Nelson Eddy/Jeanette MacDonald duet – and then pivoting to the romantic ballads from Walt Disney's Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, which debuted during Greenbelt's first year. (The audience will get to pitch in on "Heigh-Ho, It's Off To Work We Go" and "Whistle While You Work.")

Six cast members from this summer's Camp Encore production will prove that the up-and-coming generation knows how to swing it like Crosby or Garland. Greenbelters Kristen Beauchamp, Megan Winner and James Fahey will be joined by Carlos Castillo, Isobel Springer and Sam Goldstein in captivating renditions of standards such as "Where Or When," "I Can't Get Started," "I'll Be Seeing You" and "Our Love Is Here To Stay."

That final number, the last song written by George Gershwin, provides a fitting ending to the cabarets. Like Gershwin's imperishable music, our love for Greenbelt is here to stay.

Planning and Services for the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG) on the 2012 Region Forward program for "Activity Centers" in the COG jurisdictions. The program identifies major existing or planned employment centers, based on COG's Cooperative Forecasts.

While in the past such activity centers had been a technical exercise, they have become both a technical and policy tool that identifies existing urban centers, priority growth areas and traditional towns and transit hubs. DesJardin described core attributes required for designation as an activity center.

One is to have the area designated in a jurisdiction's (usually county's) adopted comprehensive/general plan or other landuse-plan. The other, relating to population density, requires that the activity center, by 2040, have a person-per-acre density (employment + population) that falls within the top one-half of densities within the jurisdiction.

In addition, the activity center should have any two of the following attributes: at least 55 intersections per square mile; high capacity transit; an adopted landuse plan that encourages Mixed-Use development; and combined housing and transportation costs that do not exceed 45 percent of regional median income.

The Region Forward program encompasses the breadth of the COG region from Fredrick County in the north to Prince William County in the south. DesJardin's Activity Centers map listed a total of 136 activity centers with 52 within Maryland, 27 within the District of Columbia and 60 within Virginia.

Based on the COG presentation, Greenbelt satisfies the two core attributes and all four additional attributes to be an activity center

The COG presentation was part of the outreach phase of

the program. In November, the COG Board of Directors will consider and approve the Activity Centers. Mayor Judith Davis is a member of the COG board and Councilmember Emmett Jordan is a member of the COG Development Committee.

Business Items

Council had earlier accepted a Public Safety Advisory Committee report on proposed placement of "mile-marker" signs for the Greenbelt Lake path at Buddy Attick Park. On the agenda this evening was a recommendation for design and placement of reflective signs both in English and Spanish at the main entrance and the other three park entrances to alert walkers and others of numbers to call in case of emergencies.

It was recommended that reflective metal signs would offer better visibility during evening hours but would increase the cost three-fold. MPO Ronald Walter of the Police Department had suggested the idea for the signs.

Following the discussion, council approved the project at a cost of \$2,250 for the reflective signs. Councilmember Rodney Roberts voted no, however, because of its cost.

The last item of business was the award of a bid for replacement of the roof of the Municipal Building. Staff recommended council award the bid to J.E. Wood & Sons.

Although the second lowest bidder, the firm utilizes Carlisle products, as specified in the city's bid documents. It was also noted that the firm was offering lower unit pricing for associated decking replacement and provides consistency for new flat-roof installation for city facilities.

Assistant City Manager David Moran said that the city's Building Capital Reserve fund includes \$30,000 to remove and replace the flat roofs (1978 wing) on the Municipal Building.

City Manager Michael McLaughlin what the law allowed for the city's use of proceeds from speed camera violations. He responded that revenue obtained from the program could be used only for funding of public safety related expenditures and only up to 10 percent of the city's budget for Public Safety.

Greenbelt residents should see advertisements, flyers and signs alerting drivers about the implementation of the speed camera program within the next few weeks. Information will also be on the city website. A warning period will occur during the first 30 days of actual operation of the cameras.

According to the city ordinance authorizing the program, the city must accomplish the following before the system can be activated: 1) Publish notice of the location of the speed monitoring system on its website and in a newspaper of general circulation in the city; 2) Ensure that each sign designating a school zone indicates that speed monitoring systems are in use in school zones; 3) A speed monitoring system in a school may operate only between 6 a.m. and 8 p.m.; 4) For a period of at least 30 days after the first speed monitoring system is placed in the city, a violation recorded by any speed monitoring system may be enforced only by issuance of a warning; and 5) The civil penalty for a speed monitoring system violation may not exceed \$40. Failure to make the payment within the specified time will result in additional late fees for delinquent amounts owed.

Generally, speed camera violations result when the posted speed limit in the zone is exceeded by 12 miles per hour.

development in areas designated by the Sector Plan.

Zoning Changes

- 1. 75.46 acres owned by the State of Maryland adjacent to the Metro Property encompassing the Indian Creek stream valley park is changed from the M-X-T zone to Reserved Open Space (R-O-S.)
- 2. 64.94 acres of commercial property, including the Beltway Plaza shopping center and additional commercial property to the west along Greenbelt Road to Branchville Road, is changed from Commercial Shopping Center (C-S-C) to M-U-I.
- 3. Just under 33 acres of Board of Education property (bus lot and Greenbelt Middle School) is changed from Rural Residential to Open Space (O-S).
- 4. 4.36 acres of land on the south side of Greenbelt Road from 63rd Avenue to Edmonston Road is changed from Commercial Office (C-O) to C-S-C to allow for a small scale mix of commercial office and retail uses compatible with uses to the east.
- 5. 7.5 acres owned by the State of Maryland (Md. State Highway Administration District 3 Offices) on Kenilworth Ave. is changed from C-O to O-S.
- 6. 2.66 acres, the historic site of the Walker Family Cemetery adjacent to the southbound ramp from Md. Route 201 to I-495 and the Golden Triangle Office Park is changed from C-O to O-S.
- 7. 8.5 acres Commercial Miscellaneous (C-M) and C-O is

changed to the C-S-C zone in order to reduce the potential under the C-M zone for uses counter to the Sector Plan recommendations for pedestrian-friendly, mixeduse development on a parcel adjacent to the ramp to eastbound Md. 193 from I-495 northbound in the vicinity of the Maryland Trade Center office park.

The circle near the Metro Station in Greenbelt was one of many topics discussed at the meeting because of individuals' concerns with its safety, efficiency and overall use.

Other issues addressed at the meeting were Recreation Center fees, funding for the Senior County Lunch Program, the ex-

treme loudness of bands at the Labor Day Festival, the Greenbelt Connection shuttle and an array of activities that will comprise the 75th anniversary of Greenbelt.

Many positive changes have come from these forums, Mach said. The forum led some years ago to building a bridge for a path to get to cross a stream to the lake, so that now people don't have to walk on stepping stones, she said.

Members of the Senior Citizen Advisory Committee also feel that the forums are a great way to get problems in the community resolved.

"There have been things asked about in these meetings," Committee Member Bunny Fitzgerald said, "that the departments of the city have taken over and responded to."

Fitzgerald and fellow Committee Member Phyllis Budin said that Greenbelt's GIVES and GAIL programs have been direct results of meetings such as this one.

Special City Connections – Greenbelt and Roosevelts

Greenbelt was a planned community built in 1937 as part of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal. One of three green towns built during the Great Depression, the project put struggling Americans to work and provided low-income housing in the Washington, D.C. region. It was a bold experiment in town planning and cooperative living. Its first residents enjoyed modern homes, schools, a pool, a library and a town center complete with cooperative businesses and a movie theater all within walking distance in a utopian park-like

As the result of the daring and vision of a group of New Deal officials, the city was strongly supported by President Franklin Roosevelt and his wife Eleanor. It is now a National Historic Landmark that continues to thrive and is celebrating its 75th Anniversary.

Both the President and Eleanor Roosevelt visited Greenbelt multiple times. When budget concerns threatened Greenbelt's completion, Mrs. Roosevelt stepped in to see that the project was completed.

Eleanor Roosevelt's letter was published in the January 5, 1938, edition of the Greenbelt Cooperator (now known as the Greenbelt News Review). She notes "I am very much interested in the cop-

ies of the Greenbelt Cooperator which you are sending me, but I think I am more interested in the fact that you formed a journalistic club and will carry this venture through on a cooperative voluntary basis"

Mildred Parker, the first grade teacher at the elementary school, said, "we had visitors from all over the country Eleanor Roosevelt came to the school a number of times, and usually it was a shock when the door opened and she would appear with her secret-service escorts."

Greenbelters recognized and appreciated Eleanor Roosevelt's personal interest in the development of the city. On November 2, 1968, Mrs. James Halsted, Eleanor and Franklin's daughter, unveiled a plaque dedicated to her mother at the site of the Eleanor Roosevelt Tree on Crescent Road opposite the lake. This location is on "Greenbelt's Significant Tree Tour" being held Saturday, September 22. Register for this timed motorized tour by calling 301-507-6582.

On Saturday, September 22 James Roosevelt, the grandson of President Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt, will present an address at the Greenbelt Community Center at 2 p.m. All are invited.



New Downs Twig Art Show "Night of the Stick Bubbles"

Artist Paul Downs has created a unique style of art using sticks from the forest. Instead of using charcoal or paint, he renders his designs of animals, nature scenes and Native Americans by drawing on the forest itself as the medium for his artistic creations which will be displayed in an upcoming exhibit at the New Deal Café.

"My palette is the white oak, the wild black cherry, tulip poplar, sassafras, red twig dogwood and maple sticks," says Downs.

Throughout his career Downs has honed his skill down a trail no one else has ventured. His artistic expressions range from an "otherworldly" party of stick people on a bridge, to scenes from a West Virginia railroad trestle to a sea horse. He brings the viewer into a world of color and design and seemingly gravity-defying wall-hung sculptures that delight and amaze and at the same time bring the feeling of peace one might gain from a stroll in the woods.

A native of Greenbelt, Downs grew up exploring, playing and falling in love with the woods - the Great North Woods, as he calls them – of Greenbelt. This 225-acre belt of green came under the threat of development in the late 1980s. Downs was a leader in the successful crusade to save these woods – now named the Greenbelt Forest Pre-

His art form has developed alongside his conservation career over the past 25 years. The woods and his art now enjoy a certain freedom which expresses itself in the very grain of his

During those 25 years Downs also initiated the now traditional Children's Pumpkin walk as a way to get people out into the woods. He has a long-standing interest in the thrill and scare of Halloween, with his most recent show, "The Night of the Stick Bubbles," featuring 18 new bubble-shaped pieces. Many of these works engage the themes of peace and nature.

For the first time, Downs has brought his sense of humor around Halloween themes into his work. These take the form of Comic Sticks with such works as "Waiting for the New Renters," "Goat Man Livz" and "Tombstone Pumpkin." Also highlighted in the show are some of his most intricate and beautiful pieces, including "Gladitude," "The Sea Horse" and "The Bridge to Everywhere."

Penny Poll Results Announced by P&J

What would happen if people could spend taxes their own way was the thrust of a penny poll offered by the Prince George's County Peace & Justice Coalition at the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival's Information Day on Saturday, September 1.

The "Penny Poll" on the federal budget at the coalition exhibit invited visitors to parcel out 10 pennies – standing for their taxes - among nine jam jars representing slices of the federal budget pie. The poll sponsors are part of a grassroots campaign called "Fund Our Communities - Bring War Dollars Home," whose aim is to shift some of the military allotment to other ways to build national security, such as supporting the environment, economy and the general welfare.

More than 60 visitors to the Information Day table voted for personal federal-budget priorities:

- Military current operations, 5%
- · Central government administration, 5%
- Veterans' benefits, 8%
- Civilian space exploration, 9%
- Transportation, commerce, housing, 9%

National debt payment, 10%

- Social Security, other income supplements, 12%
- Agriculture, energy, natural resources, 17%
- · Health care, education, human services, 25%

The route is flat and mostly off-road but there are a couple of hills in Cheverly.
