

## Like Greenbelt's Recent Weather, FY15 Budget Outlook Is Bleak

The annual City Manager Update Work Session was held on Wednesday, January 29 at the Community Center. This worksession, a prelude to the city's yearly budget review, provides an opportunity for City Manager Michael McLaughlin to brief city council on the state of the city finances at the midpoint of the current fiscal year (Fiscal Year 2014) budget. He offered a tentative prognosis as well of the fiscal outlook for the city as he begins to prepare the proposed Fiscal Year 2015 budget.

This presentation is slated to take place at the March 24 council meeting. That meeting will then be followed by weekly budget worksessions and public hearings, culminating in adoption in early June.

At this worksession, McLaughlin focused on a

December 2013 financial report, including a memorandum outlining the city's relative position on revenues and expenditures at the halfway point of the year. A separate memorandum contained his outlook or projections as he begins to formulate the new budget.

McLaughlin also provided updates on the city's planned capital projects, a so-called top 10 list of projects and issues on council's overall agenda for its current term. Other offerings listed goals/priorities identified at the council worksession of January 15, (GNR issue of January 23, 2014, Review of Goals and Visions for the New Term) and Council Action Request (CAR) list.

### Revenue Outlook

City revenues collected through December 13, 2013, are

tracking at just under 75 percent of the FY14 budget estimates while the historical average at the midpoint of the fiscal year is slightly higher, at 76.77 percent. While the outlook for real estate tax revenue is very near historical averages, McLaughlin expressed caution. He is not yet sure, he said, how tax abatements that may be made by the State assessor's office before the end of the fiscal year will reduce real estate tax collections.

His forecast for income tax revenue is tracking higher than that of last year and he believes, he added, that revenue source can meet the budget estimate of \$2,230,000. Other revenue sources are also tracking projections thus far as well, but the city manager indicated they will need to finish strongly

Today he returns the favor by giving Eleanor Roosevelt High School students their first work opportunity. When frequenting

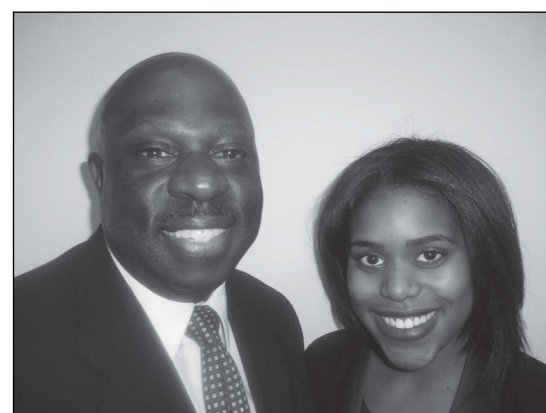

## Activist Mary McLeod Bethune Is Remembered at Program

Dr. Ida Jones spoke about the life of civil rights activist Mary McLeod Bethune before a small crowd at the Greenbelt Library on February 11. Jones's lecture, entitled "Mary McLeod Bethune in Washington, D.C.: Activism and Education in Logan Circle," focused on Bethune's efforts for African Americans while she lived in the capital. Her presentation on Bethune comes in the wake of a book (of the same title) Jones has published.

Jones is senior manuscript librarian in the Moorland-Spingarn Research Center as well as an adjunct faculty member in the Department of History at Howard University. Her lecture touched briefly on Bethune's early life before delving into details of her time as an activist in Washington, D.C. "Her life as a whole would need to be done in four or five volumes; there's no way it could be done in one particular volume," Jones said.

Bethune was born in Mayesville, S.C., in 1875 to Samuel and Patsy McLeod. She gained inspiration from religious leaders as she grew up, using this as motivation to better the lives of others. "Her consistent endeavor was to shore up her people, to instill the vital spark of aspiration and confidence in their innate abilities," Jones said.

Bethune incorporated the Daytona Educational and Industrial Training School for Negro Girls in 1904. The school eventually became Bethune-Cookman University. Years later, Bethune moved to Washington, D.C., where she became a trusted advisor to Eleanor Roosevelt.

### Founded NCNW

In 1935, Bethune founded the National Council of Negro Women in Washington, D.C. "She envisioned the NCNW to be an 'organization of organizations' that would represent the national and international concerns of

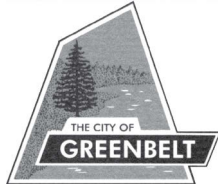

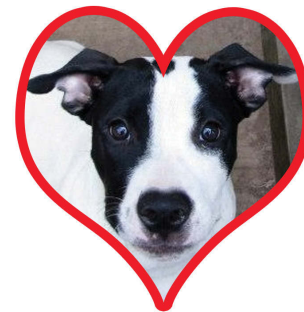

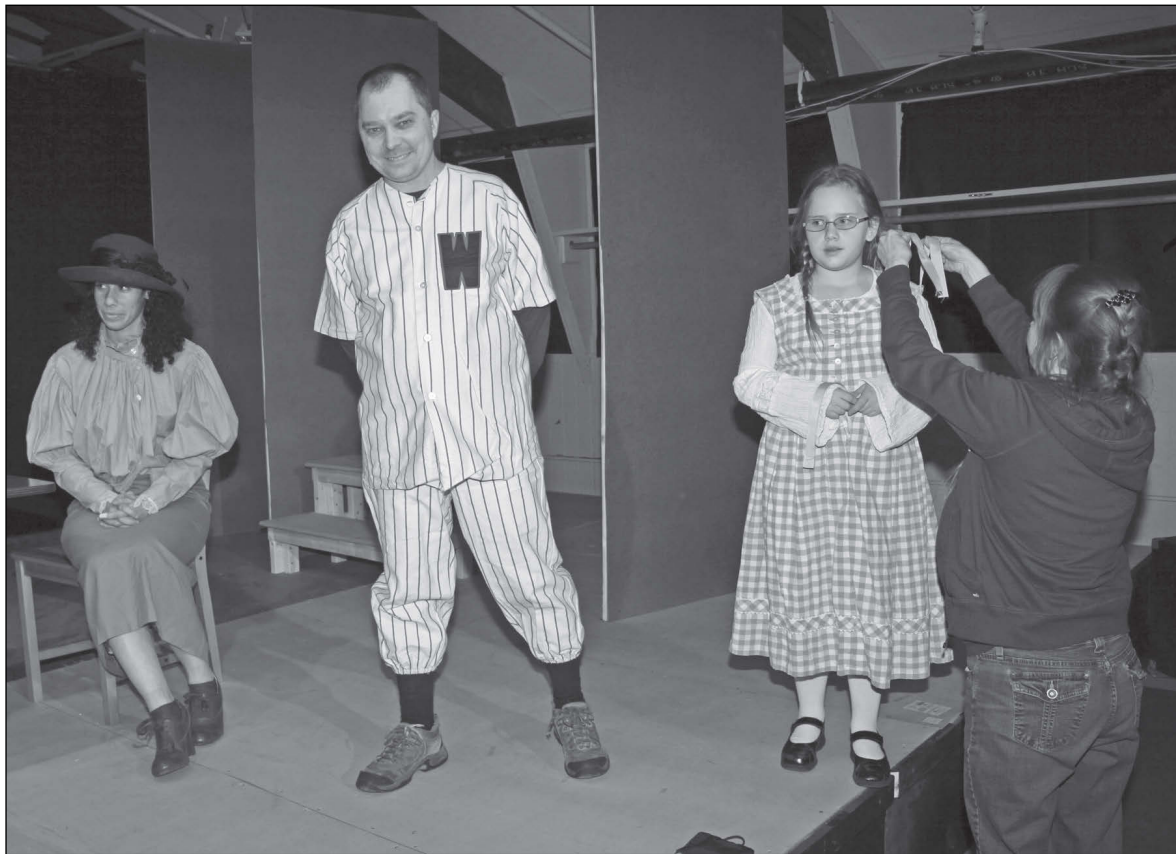

during the balance of the year to meet budget projections. These revenues include Admissions and Amusement taxes, Hotel/Motel taxes and Recreation Department fees for special programs.

While the city's speed camera operations in school zones is on track to meet or exceed its income budget of \$150,000 for FY14, McLaughlin noted that the trend for revenue from the cameras is decreasing. If that continues (due to increasing compliance by drivers to posted speed limits), he expects that revenues for FY15 could be less.

**Expenditure Forecast**

City expenditures thus far are slightly under 60 percent of the adopted FY14 budget which is just a little above the historic level (58 percent). Police Department expenditures factor into the marginal increase in expenditures – namely retirement payouts this year, which usually are not budgeted.

In his report the manager noted that there have been no significant savings and while most other expenditures are trending close to their budget amounts, he believes that General Fund Expenditures for the fiscal year will exceed the adopted budget. He reminded council that the FY13 budget had also exceeded expenditures by \$754,000.

**Budget Preview**

In a January memorandum McLaughlin wrote that work on the FY15 budget has begun but that it was too early to provide much detail. He sees revenues for the coming fiscal year as remaining in the range of \$24.6 to \$25 million.

Attached to the memorandum was a chart mapping city revenues and expenditures for the past 10 years. For Fiscal Year 2005 revenues totaled \$18.8 million and by 2008 (before the economic downturn) it had reached \$23.8 million. Revenues peaked in 2011 at \$25.5 million and since then have hovered just under that level.

Staff expects to receive real property assessments for Greenbelt from the assessor's office by mid-February and believes they will be close to current assessments. Other revenues are also likely to remain flat, except for slight increases in income taxes. McLaughlin also believes State Shared Highway User Revenues will be the same or slightly greater for FY15.

On the expenditure side, the bottom line in the General Fund should be in a similar range as the projected revenues (\$24.6 to \$25 million). Renovation of the Greenbelt theater and other recommended projects will put pressure on available Capital Project funds.

**Foreboding Note**

McLaughlin's memorandum ends on a foreboding note: "In recent years, the budget has been balanced with actions which were relatively painless, such as refinancing the city's debt and eliminating some vacant positions, and actions which were painful, such as paring back employee benefits and a tax rate increase in FY14. At this point, it appears balancing the budget for FY15 may require additional cuts and/or increased revenue just to maintain core services, none of which would be painless."

said the student is one of many who have come from Roosevelt's work study program.

In 1976 when Freeman graduated from high school, his father sent him to an agent he knew with the goal of buying an insurance policy. The agent was so impressed by Freeman's manner and track record at Woodies, he hired him. Freeman sold Life Conquest insurance and said income from that job financed his college education at Prince George's Community College (PGCC). Before graduating from PGCC in 1981, Freeman obtained his life, health, property and casualty insurance licenses. He continued working for Life Conquest until 1984 when he joined Allstate. Five years later, he and another agents opened an Allstate office in Lanham. Later, he relocated his office to College Park and to Beltsville in 2010.

"I like running and owning my own business," said the oldest of four siblings. "I enjoy sales and interacting with people and having the ability to help individuals and families with various insurance policies as well as business."

Freeman's brother is an IT specialist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, his younger sister works at the Prince George's County courthouse and his other sister is studying to become a registered nurse like their mother who retired from the D.C. Health Department. His father retired after a career in the Government Printing Office.

Freeman said Black History Month "makes us look back over our achievements over the years," stating that he never thought he would see a black President elected in the United States. He said he remembered the race riots of the 1960s in D.C. along H Street, Nichols and Benning Roads.

"My parents made me stay in the house," said Freeman. "I was a little confused."

Instead of focusing on racism Freeman said he conducts self-examination.

"I looked at my own abilities and if it wasn't happening, I'd find ways to make it happen." For instance, Freeman said, if sales needed a boost, he would educate himself better and find the adequate market. If a customer objected to the price, he would emphasize value. "There are ways to make it better."

Freeman said he has always been self-directed. "I know what my goals are and what it takes to achieve them. I always believe in being professional and giving clients undivided attention. I want to be successful in meeting goals."

Freeman said his long-term vision is to have a large agency with several sales producers. Currently he has a bilingual agent working in the office to attract the Latino market and he also has a producer who works outside the office selling life and health insurance.

"It starts with a vision. Nobody can tell you what you can't do."

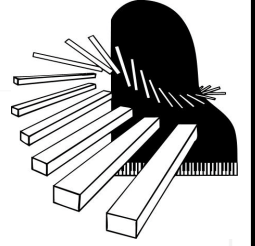

# Review of Gray's Art Show At the New Deal Café

Marjorie Gray's art show at the New Deal Café was a great surprise. As I walked into the first room I felt I was going to witness something very expressive and unique. Her works – collages and paper sculptures interwoven with accompanying poems – are truly original statements.

And as I ventured into the back room and met Marjorie, I was to experience more of this singular talent. Marjorie handed us a brochure with photos of her paintings and generously escorted us around each room, explaining each work and telling us how she put everything together.

As Marjorie talked about each piece the whole room took on a quality of intense emotion.

"Poemburst" could be a moon, a sun, a clock. "The most positive of all the pieces," I thought, with the silvery background, splashes of color, small images of forms and fragments of poems.

Then there is a small work "alive?" representing the harsh and cruel elements of our own human predicament. I stared at this image and asked myself, "Is this who I am?" My understanding opened to the harsh reality of our environmental disasters. I began to ask, "What can I do about this?"

The piece "Danced in the Morning" was more positive and showed a fine construction of circles, triangles and strings interwoven with Marjorie's poems. At this work, Marjorie explained her faith – confiding to us that she is of the Christian Left, not the Right. I am positive that it is her faith that gives her the strength to make such powerful statements.

"Going on" forces us to look at the sad faces of exploited children who live in a world of poverty where "dollar signs and questions fume above molten debris."

The saddest painting was the most beautiful. At first I thought it was an old Dutch windmill, a place of calm beauty. But it was actually about the destruction of our planet due to hydraulic

fracking – scarring our earth and sky as we say goodbye to the poisoned gardens, wetlands and dragonflies, as we say a sad farewell to that precious light blue, that lovely gray-green.

I was humbled and moved to be a part of this very unusual opening night.

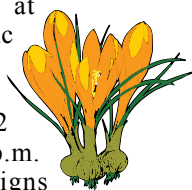
The music of April Vega – soft strums on an Irish harp – provided a background of comfort and sweetness, as if an Irish woman sitting beside a stone fireplace was putting her children to bed after a long day's work.

A great tribute should be given to Marjorie for taking our planet's worst problems and raising them up as art forms and, in so doing, also raising our consciousness.

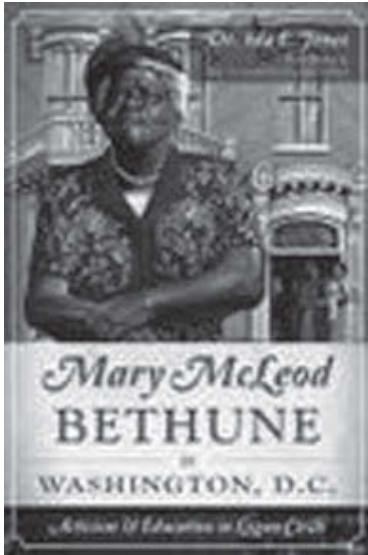

black women,” according to the NCNW website. Today the original headquarters stands as a monument to Bethune’s civil rights efforts.

While in the nation’s capital, Bethune worked tirelessly to end the segregation that gripped the city. Her lifelong friendship with Roosevelt enabled her cause to be heard by the nation’s most important policy makers.

Jones’s lecture shaped a perception that Bethune touched many lives in her time as an activist in Washington, D.C. The audience, which grew in size as Jones’s lecture went on, listened with rapt attention and asked numerous questions during the presentation.

The lecture is one of many in a series coordinated by C.R. Gibbs, a “noted historian of the African Diaspora,” according to a flyer Gibbs handed to audience members. The “2014 African History and Culture Lecture Series” aims to educate members of the surrounding communities about the African American experience. “[Our goal] is to increase the knowledge of and awareness of the achievements of people of African descent around the world, and bring it to a local audience,” Gibbs explained. Gibbs will be giving many of the lectures himself in

the coming months.

The talk lasted roughly an hour, ending with Jones emphasizing the different types of people on whom Bethune had had an impact: ambassadors, university presidents, diplomats, students and teachers. Bethune’s achievements live on today, he said, with the numerous institutions and organizations she had shaped.

“My intentions are to keep her [Bethune] in the mind of who we are as citizens and human beings,” Jones said.

The lecture series at the Greenbelt Library will continue on February 25 with Grand Theft Africa (see page 3 for more details).
