Yes, There Really Will Be An Election on June 24

To many voters, it may be a surprise that a primary election is coming up on June 24. Primaries in years of gubernatorial elections in Maryland are now held on the last Tuesday in June rather than, as used to be the case, the second Tuesday in September. This change, made in 2011 when the governor and General Assembly were also changing dates for the presidential primary, was in part a response to federal legislation designed to provide military and overseas voters sufficient time to receive absentee ballots and participate in elections.

Because it was thought that too many folks would be at the beach in July and August, the primary date was moved to June, which also has the effect of extending the general election campaign period (and the robocalls) by three months.

Another effect is that many pundits are predicting a low turnout. Skeptics who would prefer to take a pass on their polling place on June 24 should mark their calendars for getting an absentee ballot or for voting early at a polling place.

Early Voting

Early voting will be available for eight days from Thursday, June 12 through Thursday, June 19 from 10 a.m. until 8 p.m. Voters may vote only at early voting centers within their own county, but there are now eight locations where Prince Georgians can vote. All early voting centers are accessible to voters with disabilities. The voting process is the same at early voting centers as it is on election day. The same voting machines are used, and election judges are available to direct and assist voters.

The polling locations for early voting closest to Greenbelt in order of distance are the College Park Community Center, 5051 Pierce Avenue, College Park; the Wayne K. Curry Sports & Learning Center, Landover Room A, 8001 Sheriff Road, Landover; the

At its final budget worksession on May 19 the Greenbelt City Council found itself between a rock and a hard place making choices among about 15 socalled wish list items that could or should be added to the city's Fiscal Year 2015 budget. In the end, they reached consensus on 10 expenditure items. These would add \$200,500 to City Manager Michael McLaughlin's proposed budget.

On the revenue side, only \$50,000 in health insurance savings could offset the new expenditures. To make up the difference, a majority of council agreed to increase the city tax rate by 3/4 of a cent, an increase providing about \$142,000, thus bringing the budget close to balance.

At that point, the city manager said the small shortfall (\$2,300) could be met by use of unappropriated funds.

Six councilmembers were present; only Judith Davis was unable to attend. The worksession was

held in council chambers and viewed on the city's website.

Davis had provided her colleagues with a written report on her positions on the wish list items. She had indicated that a slight increase in the city tax rate would be necessary.

Councilmember Leta Mach also provided council with her preferences among wish list items, suggesting a 3/4 cent increase to fund some of the items.

Council discussion on the wish list items led to a substantial amount of give-and-take, resulting in modification of several items, especially those that called for new staff positions.

Budget Additions

Consensus positions taken at the final worksession will be incorporated into a revised FY 2015 budget and will be on the agenda of the Wednesday, June 4 meeting and for adoption by the city council.


Credit Card Use Suspended At Co-op, Affects Many Locals

The Greenbelt Coop Supermarket and Pharmacy temporarily suspended all credit and debit card use by patrons last week due to a possible security breach in its online payment system, though no evidence confirms a breach at this time. Purchases must be paid for by cash or personal check until this issue is resolved.

Davis stated, "The Co-op apologizes for any inconvenience related to not being able to use credit and debit cards while its assessment is conducted. We sincerely appreciate your continued support throughout this process." Davis was unable to provide additional information due to the ongoing nature of the investigation.

issued a notice (via the Co-op website, patron emails and signs at registers and at the doors) that credit and debit cards of many Greenbelters were compromised during the week ending May 23.

The online payment system was taken down to reduce any further fraud risk for customers. It will remain down until additional security measures are in place and the Co-op is 100 percent confident that customer financial accounts are not vulnerable to potential security threats.

The availability of an independent ATM in the store has helped customers access cash needed for groceries.

Management is working with a security assessor company to determine if the Co-op is the source of a security breach and, if it is, how it occurred and what other measures can be taken to improve electronic security in the future.

Greenbelt FCU

The Greenbelt Federal Credit Union is closely monitoring the situation according to Treasurer-General Manager Cynthia A. Comproni, who added, "The credit union was not the point of compromise."

She stressed the need for people to be on alert for phishing scams which increase in number once word about a possible security breach is made public. She said it really worries her, and she



Museum Annual Roosevelt Bike Ride Is Scheduled for Sunday





No reason or excuse is required to vote absentee. Any qualified voter who prefers to vote in a location other than a polling place may request an absentee ballot from the Prince George's County Board of Elections no later than Tuesday, June 17. When the county has approved the application and sent out the ballot, the voter must either bring or mail the ballot to the county board office by election day, June 24.

How can one get an application for an absentee ballot? There are three ways. Those who have a Maryland driver's license or an identification card issued by the Maryland Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) may apply for the ballot online. An online form may be printed out and returned to the Prince George's County Board of Elections in Largo by mail, fax or email (scanned as an attachment). The voter may also go to the county board of elections office to fill out a form or call to have one sent. In applying for the ballot, the voter will designate a preference for receiving the ballot either by mail or email.

Voters who cannot themselves go to the board of elections office may also designate someone to take their completed application form to the county board and pick up the ballot. Doing so requires completion of a Designation of Agent form, which is available online or from the county board of elections office. The ballot itself will contain detailed instructions for completing and returning it.

A voted absentee ballot must either be mailed with a postmark no later than June 24 or delivered in person to the board of elections office by 8 p.m. on June 24. It cannot be submitted online or by email or fax. Nor can it be taken to an early voting center or to a polling place on election day.



is sharing her own experience with the hope it will educate the public.

She just received a text from a bank alerting her about a security breach and wanting her to confirm her confidential information. "No financial institution will ask you for your information. They already have it," she said.

Co-op manager Davis urges store patrons to reduce future risk by following measures recommended by the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau at www.consumerfinance.gov. This includes checking statements for fraudulent charges both large and small; calling one's credit card company or bank immediately if fraudulent charges are suspected; replacing credit and debit cards, changing PINs and online passwords; and ignoring anyone calling to verify account information.

Star-Spangled Banner Manuscript Travels

Francis Scott Key's original, handwritten manuscript of the Star-Spangled Banner will temporarily leave its home at the Maryland Historical Society in Baltimore to travel to other Mid-Atlantic venues commemorating the bicentennial of the War of 1812, which includes the events of summer 1814. The society is lending the manuscript to the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History for a shortterm display from Flag Day, June 14, through July 6, 2014. The manuscript depicts the flag as Key saw it at "dawn's early light" on the morning of September 14, 1814.
