Emmett Jordan Gets Top Vote, All Incumbents Are Re-elected

"It's deja vue all over again." What Yogi Bera once said is applicable to this year's election for members of the Greenbelt City Council. All incumbents were reelected, and all but two held the same rank in the number of votes cast as in the previous election in 2013. Emmett Jordan received the most votes once again and will most probably be reelected mayor by the council at its organizational meeting this coming Monday. With 140 votes less than Jordan's 1,552 votes this time, Judith Davis placed second and is expected to become mayor pro tem.

Compared to the 2013 election, only two incumbents changed position in rank for number of votes cast. Rodney

Roberts who was third in 2013 placed sixth – a significant drop in position. Replacing him in third position was Silke Pope, who had placed sixth in 2013. She had 1,223 votes. Whether her position as first on the ballot helped her in this election will be debated by local politicos. Prior to 2009, Roberts had often placed second and served as mayor pro

In the same position as to number of votes received this year and in 2013 are: Konrad Herling 4th, Leta Mach 5th and Edward Putens 7th. With 1,092 votes, Putens beat out challenger Susan Stewart by 135 votes. In 2013, Putens achieved 172 more votes than Stewart. In both elections, Stewart placed eighth.

This year there were two additional challengers: George Boyce, who placed ninth, and Kathleen Shaw, tenth. Trailing far behind the rest of the field in both elections William Orleans with 231 votes this year; 86 fewer than in 2013.

Jordan was first elected to the Greenbelt council in 2009 at the first election held following a city charter amendment that expanded the number of councilmembers from five to seven. At that time he placed second to Davis by 49 votes, becoming the mayor pro tem. Two years later, Jordan trailed Davis by only 16 votes and then in 2009 he became top vote-getter and became mayor.

Number Voting

According to preliminary city results, there were 78 more voters voting at this election than in 2013. This included 355 early voters and 26 absentee ballots, bringing the total number of voters to 2,039. At 18 percent, the percent of registered voters voting was also higher than the 15 percent in 2013.

Precinct 6, North End, claimed the highest percentage turnout of registered voters at 31% percent while Precinct 3 Center South had the highest number of residents voting, 732. As usual, Precinct 8 Greenbelt West, had the poorest turnout with only 4 percent of those registered voting. Still, that was 1.5 percent better than in 2013. In Greenbelt East, Precinct 18 (south) did slightly better than Precinct 13 (north), both in number of persons voting (262 vs 250) and percent of registered voters voting, 12 percent vs. 10 percent.

Santa Resets Reindeer GPS For Tree Lighting at Center

Arguably the biggest news from the Greenbelt City Council's October 19 regular meeting was that council agreed to move the tree lighting ceremony, which opens the annual Festival of Lights on the first weekend of December, from its most recent location on the lawn in front of the Community Center to a new site within Roosevelt Center. All members of council were present, with Assistant City Manager David Moran sitting in for City Manager Michael McLaughlin.

Although Mayor Emmett Jordan expressed some anxiety about whether there was still time to give adequate warning to Santa about the change in venue, Recreation Department Supervisor Greg Varda assured him that Santa and his reindeer would be able to find the Center with no problem.

The lighting of the tree was moved to the Community Center

lawn in 2002, when a 14' evergreen was planted there for the purpose. Prior to that, the location was in somewhat cramped space on the east side of the Municipal Building, where the Police Department had concerns about holiday merrymakers toppling into traffic. According to Varda, safety is also a concern at the lawn location, which is near both Crescent Road and the driveway between the Community Center and the Municipal Building. The greater concerns were that the crowd tended to hinder the artists and craftsmen moving into the Community Center at about the same time, a lack of good light in the location, and that in rainy weather the lawn quickly becomes muddy, leaving the audience with cold, wet feet.

Further reminiscences suggested the tree lighting might at

Council, New Residents Review Commuter Trail

The Greenbelt City Council held a worksession on a proposed trail to Metro on October 21. The trail will provide pedestrian access between the Metro station in the North Core and the new Greenbelt Station development in the South Core. Planners expect the trail will primarily be used by commuters

In accord with prior development agreements, the trail has been designed by Woodlawn Development Group LLC, developer of Greenbelt Station. The alignment was designed to avoid existing wetlands and wetland buffers.

City Planner Jessica Bellah said the trail is proposed to be eight feet wide and that 80 per-

cent would be made of asphalt on top of an old dirt raised roadbed, which is out of the flood plain. A bridge over Narraganesett Run connected by boardwalks would constitute the remaining 20 percent of the trail.

Woodlawn is required to construct the trail up to a cost of \$470,000 on Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) property. To use the land, the city had to sponsor the project, and so take responsibility for maintenance of and safety for the trail. Said Bellah, "The city's willingness to sponsor the trail shows how much the city is committed to getting the trail in place."


On Screen

The two urns containing the funeral ashes of Ruth and her husband were interred in the Greenbelt Cemetery, located off Ivy Lane.





one time have occurred at the Center and revealed that even longer ago the city tree stood at the intersection of Southway and Greenbelt Road.

Varda said the Recreation Department had been considering the idea of moving the ceremony to the Center ever since the Old Greenbelt Theatre reopened. Council quickly agreed with him about the appeal of having the tree be part of Roosevelt Center decorations. Caitlin McGrath, executive director of the theater, spoke on behalf of the Roosevelt Center Merchants Association to convey their enthusiasm for the plan to bring the tree to the Center.

Councilmember Judith Davis said initially she was concerned about what would happen to the faithful evergreen on the Community Center lawn but had been reassured that the Recreation Department was proposing to continue to decorate that tree as well. Council voted unanimously to support the plan.

Peace on Earth

The council also voted unanimously to approve installation of the city's Peace Pole at the site of the memorial benches and tree that had been placed earlier in honor of the activism of deceased residents Esther Webb, Doug Love, Bob Auerbach and Bert Donn on behalf of peace and justice.

This pole was given to the Greenbelt Peace Committee in May 1987 by an organization now known as the World Peace Prayer Society.

Although there was some reservation on the part of city staff about setting precedent in adding extra components to permissible memorials, council agreed to approve the addition of the peace pole to the memorial as a one-time exception. Davis suggested that doing so was in reality "rectifying an omission." Councilmember Edward Putens agreed, saying it was an appropriate recognition of the four who were remembered there.

New Equipment

This year's city budget included funding for replacement of two pieces of aging equipment in the Public Works Department. These purchases were also approved unanimously by council, though Councilmember Rodney Roberts was of the opinion that the 18-year-old backhoe could have been usable for a longer period with appropriate maintenance and repair. According to staff, the backhoe was suffering from extensive corrosion in the operator's station, in addition to outdated pins and bushings that were causing operational problems. The replacement fund included \$100,000 for the new backhoe, which operates nearly emission-free and will also allow use of a stump grinder and other attachments. It will be purchased for \$94,900 from Folcomer Equipment Corporation in Upper Marlboro.

Also to be replaced is a 10-year-old refuse truck that is two years past its replacement date. The budget includes \$180,000 for a new Freightliner with a 25 cubic yard commercial rear loader manufactured by Leach. Including a \$20,000 trade-in credit, it will be purchased for \$145,050 from GranTurk Equipment Company in Baltimore.

Transportation

Assistant Planning Director Terri Hruby presented the state's Draft 2016-2021 Consolidated Transportation Program (CTP), which includes all the planned transportation projects that would receive some level of funding over the next five years. Funding proposed for the program totals \$15.5 billion, \$454.8 million of which has been added this year.

According to Hruby, from Greenbelt's perspective there are not many changes to the program except for the moving of the full Beltway interchange at Greenbelt Station forward into the construction stage. The Purple Line continues to be listed as funded, while the widening of the beltway and the extension

of Md Route 201 continue to be on hold. Funding for TheBus continues, over \$200 million is included for bicycle and pedestrian improvements, and the State Highway Administration program continues to include U.S. Route 1 improvement projects.

Hruby reminded everyone that the operative word in the title is draft, with the county not yet having had time to respond.

Council voted to submit a letter of support for the above-referenced projects and further agreed with a staff recommendation to include resuscitation of the Route 193 Greenbelt Road Neighborhood Improvement Project for planning funding. This program was put on hold in 2002. Because of its importance to College Park and Berwyn Heights, support from the Four Cities Coalition will also be sought.

Street Work

Council also approved submitting the city's application for \$115,500 for street improvements to Breezewood Drive to the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program for the next program year. In this project, the city proposes to resurface Breezewood Drive from Springhill Lane to Cherrywood Terrace, including base repair, replacement of curb and gutter, installation of concrete bus pads and landscaping improvements.

For the current year, the city was awarded \$75,000 in CDBG funding of the nearly \$119,000 it had requested to reconstruct a portion of Springhill Drive. Final approval of the award is still pending and the city hopes to proceed with that project in spring 2016.

Vegetation

In yet another unanimous vote, council also agreed to support legislation being drafted by Delegate James Tarlau of Mt. Rainier for the 2016 General Assembly session to allow counties and municipalities to adopt and enforce local laws and regulations on vegetation management undertaken by electric companies.

Teens Writers' Club Holds First Workshop at Library

The Teen Writers' Club held its first workshop at the Greenbelt Library on Monday, November 2. The club is designed for teenagers aged 13 to 18 to meet with other teens who share an interest in writing. They can learn to develop new techniques and approaches to improve their writing skills.

The workshop was led by Colleen Kables, who is a member of the Maryland Writers' Association and a master's student in fine arts and creative writing at the University of Maryland. "I think writing is super important to help kids find their voice and it also provides a creative outlet for them," said Kables.

"I think learning how to write is useful at a young age because when you get older, creativity tends to die out as soon as you come in contact with the world," said Edward Bernnan, 16, who attends Elea-

nor Roosevelt High School.

The topic for the workshop was on learning how to understand the levels and elements in developing a character within a story. The objective was for participants to develop characters who are able to speak to readers and make them relatable.

"Follow the character," said Kables, "but let them plan the plot for you. They will lead you in the right direction."

Teen Writers' Club workshops also take place in Annapolis, Silver Spring and other locations in Montgomery County. Club leaders plan to publish anthologies of writing produced in the workshops.

The next meeting will be on November 9 at 6:30 p.m. and thereafter will be held twice a month.

African History and Culture Lecture on Civil War

A Personal Civil War Sesquicentennial Journey: The Highlights was presented on October 27 at the Greenbelt Library, as part of the African History and Culture Lecture Series. Guest lecturer Asa Gordon has been lieutenant general of Sons and Daughters of the United States Colored Troops since 1998.

Gordon spoke on the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, focusing on the actions and major contributions of colored troops, and also recognized the 50th anniversary of the Voting Rights

"I believe it is important for people to become aware of the historical legacy of the Civil War. African Americans must realize the significant role that those of African descent had in the victory of the war," said Gordon.

Gordon discussed key locations and events where African American troops fought and made major contributions.

"African American troops fought and contributed in the War of Independence and the Civil War," said Lois Rosado, who attended the event. "The wars were largely won by the efforts of black troops," she said.

Gordon said three fugitive

Gordon said three fugitive slaves escaped to the Union lines at Fort Monroe in Virginia. Under Major General Benjamin F. Butler, they were declared "contraband of war" and assigned to support the Union Army. As a result, Fort Monroe came to be known as the Freedom Fortress.

"This was the beginning when those of African descent transformed the Civil War from a war of union to a war of liberation," said Gordon. Gordon reflected that he played as a kid at Fort Pulaski in Savannah, Ga., and found Civil War artifacts. Here General David Hunter freed all of the slaves from the territory he was occupying. He also advocated for the enlistment of black soldiers but President Abraham Lincoln overturned the orders.

"He [General David Hunter] set the stage for the practice of accepting former slaves in the armed forces and then setting them free," said Gordon.


Gordon also discussed the 150th anniversary of the Harriet Tubman Memorial Bridge in South Carolina. Tubman was the first woman in American history to lead men into combat. It has been said that she freed more slaves near this bridge than through her efforts on the Underground Railroad, according to Gordon. Gordon also mentioned that Tubman was a well-paid spy for the Union.

Gordon spoke about other major events and locations where African American troops made major contributions: Fort Decatur in Alabama, Fort Pocahontas and the Battle of New Market Heights in Virginia, The Battle of Tennessee and when the Union Army entered Richmond.

"I didn't know that black troops set up schools for their own education," said Rosado when asked what she learned from the lecture.

The lecture series is organized by historian C.R. Gibbs. Other sessions will be presented Tuesday evenings through November

The trail will be ADA compliant with grades less than or equal to a 5 percent incline except for a few locations. The plans also show a side trail which could allow Franklin Park residents a new path to Metro. This trail would start on the west side of Cherrywood Lane opposite Breezewood Drive and connect with the main trail leading to Metro.

Bellah showed a video walkthrough of the proposed alignment. A tree inventory projected that 95 trees would be impacted by or within the trail area. Only 25 percent of the impacted trees would be removed under the plan. The impacted trees range from 4 to 9" in diameter with an average of 6". The wetland crossing area contains significant invasive plants.

To improve safety through the wooded area, lighting and call boxes are shown on the plan. Councilmembers suggested that staff investigate the use of regular patrols of the trail. Another safety concern is the trail's crossing of a ramp that leads motorists from the eastbound Beltway to the Metro parking lot. Even though the speed limit is 35 mph on the ramp, council wants staff to look into some kind of warning system to alert drivers before they reach the crossing, and to review how other such crossings in the Metro system are handled.

The meeting was attended by approximately 15 to 20 residents of the partially-developed Greenbelt Station. Some asked about the trail's width. Typically a trail of this type would be somewhat

wider, but staff explained that the raised roadbed would not accommodate more than an eight foot width.

Homeowners also had comments about lighting and use of the trail by emergency vehicles.

Staff stated that the trail is not intended to allow the weight of vehicles, but that emergency responders would be able to adequately reach an incident. Council requested that staff look into the cost of beefing up the trail to allow emergency vehicles. Council also expressed a desire for placement of a slip-resistant surface on the boardwalk, as well as consideration of benches and gazebos along the trail. Mayor Emmett Jordan said that "he was impressed with the trail design and believes it will be an amenity for residents."

The next step is for the proposed trail to be reviewed by the many entities with an interest in the trails – WMATA, Woodlawn Developers and Renard Development Company. Renard holds an option from WMATA to develop the North Core. Renard must be assured that the trail will not

unduly preclude their development rights.

After approval, WMATA will give the city a 20 foot easement for the trail. Council would prefer to have a more permanent right-of-way instead of an easement, which could be changed in the future. The easement must be recorded, and a legal agreement with WMATA must be executed. The review period will take about 18 months. Construction will then take an additional six months. This scenario puts the trail opening at around November 2017.

Staff has not taken a position on the trail plan yet. The Advisory Planning Board has reviewed the plan, and will take another look at the proposal. The trail plan has been referred by council to both the Park and Recreation Advisory Board as well as the GreenACES. Council could schedule the trail plan for action at an upcoming meeting in late November or early December.

The meeting was a preliminary review of the proposal; no votes are taken at worksessions.



Scouting for Food Program Tries New Approach in 2015

This coming weekend on Saturday November 7, Greenbelt Boy Scout Troop 746 and Cub Scout Pack 202 will be distributing bags around Old Greenbelt as part of the Annual Scouting for Food program.

Scouting for Food is an annual food collection orchestrated by the Scouts from National Capital Area Council. Local Scouts distribute plastic bags to homes across the region on November 7 and return to pick up the bags, now filled with food, one week later on November 14. Collected food is distributed to needy families throughout the communities of the Council. In Greenbelt the food is to be distributed between the St. Hugh's food Pantry and Help by Phone, a food pantry based out of College Park.

This year and moving into next year the scouts are planning to perform the collection in a more ecologically friendly manner, utilizing fewer plastic bags as compared to prior years, by giving people the opportunity to 'opt in' by sending an email to Scout4FoodGreenbelt@hotmail.

com and sending their home addresses. In this manner, those that do not receive bags can still arrange a food pick up or those that have received bags may also ensure the items are picked up by contacting the troop at the above email address. Next year the plan is to use social media to fine tune this approach and further reduce the amount of plastic bags that are distributed.



Fall Festival 2015 Featured Fun and Educational Games

The Green Team's Zero Waste Circle and Climate & Urban Systems Partnership (CUSP) teamed up to lead fun and educational games for over 50 festival-goers at Fall Fest on October 24. Zero waste games were reused and several games with new messages related to climate change were introduced.

The classic zero waste game, Choose the Right Bin, was used for its third community event this year, as it continued to teach festival-goers which items are to be composted, recycled or trashed.

Among the new games was a Sustainability Puzzle, which when put together correctly shows the interconnectedness of GreenACES and Green Team's sub-groups, including the Zero Waste Circle, Butterfly Brigade, Greenbelt Time Bank, Sustainable Landcare, Stream/Stormwater Restoration, Pathways of Sustainability and

The Urban Heat Island Effect game shows that local green spaces, such as the Forest Preserve, are cooler than those without, such as Beltway Plaza. Places with heavy impact of human activities create significantly warmer temperatures than those areas with low human impact. In order to reduce the urban vironmental Protection Agency recommends increasing tree and vegetative cover, installing green (mainly reflective) roofs, using reflective or permeable pavements and utilizing smart growth

Another newly introduced game was the True Cost Café, which taught festival-goers about the carbon footprint of manufacturing and shipping various foods and beverages. All of the items are weighted to scale based on carbon footprint, which is why tap water is a lighter and better choice for the environment compared to heavier bottled water.

The Five Fun Facts game presented information on the benefits of recycling, such as recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy to run your television for four hours.

The Terracycle game revealed previously non-recyclable waste that transforms into cool, new products, ranging from recycled park benches to upcycled backpacks. Terracycle offers free shipping for hard to recycle waste, as well as a donation for each piece of garbage that is collected. For more information visit terracycle.com.

The Want to Help the Earth? game compared different lifeheat island effect, the U.S. En- styles and their impacts on the

environment. Most festival-goers were surprised to learn that giving up meat one day a week does more for the environment than trading in a gas-guzzling car for

The Extreme Weather game was a hands-on way to learn about the benefits of installing stormwater best management practices (BMPs) to protect the Chesapeake Bay watershed. Greenbelt's row houses and buildings were made from Legos, Monopoly houses and hotels, and sponges represented green roofs, rain gardens, rain barrels, forests and grassy areas so that festivalgoers could redesign the city using stormwater BMPs.

The Pathways of Sustainability mapping effort was a success, as nine residents shared the addresses of pollinator gardens, composters, rain gardens, rain barrels and cisterns. As more residents of Greenbelt participate, the map will illustrate dense areas of green infrastructure, as well as hotspots in need of remediation. All homeowners, businesses and nonprofit entities are encouraged to take advantage of the Chesapeake Bay Trust in partnership with Prince George's County Rain Check Rebate Program to receive rebates for installing approved stormwater management practices. 

Student Art at Greenbelt Library Uses Math, Science, Literacy

"Creativity is your fuel," said Lauren Hutchison. She is involved in two different art projects — helping write a script for a play version of "Where the Wild Things Are" and editing a short movie produced by her classmates. Lauren is a seventh grader at Greenbelt Middle School.

Opportunities to produce art are increasingly available for Greenbelt students. An art exhibition featuring 50 students from Greenbelt Middle and Elementary Schools had its opening reception on Monday night.

The exhibition, which will be open until November 19 at the Greenbelt Library, is an opportunity for students to exhibit what they have been working on since the beginning of the school year. Cortland Jones, graphic design teacher from Greenbelt Middle School, and Zsolt Nagy, art teacher at Greenbelt Elementary, were the main organizers for the exhibition.

Nagy teaches students from kindergarten up to fifth grade. As part of the school's county-wide Arts Integration initiative, Nagy's lessons combine science, math, literacy and social studies with art. For art projects he assigns, students have to create their own artistic interpretation of a particular cultural theme. Through art students can learn how to use symmetry and patterns.

One of the projects featured from Nagy's class is mola-inspired drawings. Mola art, which was developed by the Kuna peoples from Panama and Colombia, allows students to explore the use of geometrical shapes in art, Nagy said.

"They love art. They think out the whole process," Nagy said. "They do everything step by step. They realize that it's a whole process to create something and, in the end, it's all a creation that's made by them. It gives them self-confidence."

Graphic Design

Students from one of Jones's graphic design classes were assigned to make personal logos using three pictures that represent things they like the most.

"The thing that inspired me to create this image (personal logo design) was make-up. I love to wear things like eye-liner, lipstick and mascara," shared Mickela Reed, an eighth grader from Jones's graphic arts class. "The only class I am able to create is

Students that had a high level of technical skill were given the task to create something from their imagination for the exhibition. Nahili Lemu, from eighth grade, was one of these students. Nahili and three other students from the seventh grade graphic arts class, Talia McGinty, Cristy Sanchez and Ruth Akiyod, were selected to illustrate a children's book

Lauren Hutchison, who is in seventh grade at Greenbelt Middle School, is exhibiting an abstract piece she made by creating patterns using her handprints and tempera paint. Her piece was made as part of a class project called "Project Imagination," in which students had to choose what would inspire them if they had a year to produce artwork.

Starting next quarter, Lauren will be in Jones's graphic art class, where she will be able to explore her interest in combining art with technology.

"I think creativity is important in your education because it plays an important role of who you are in your life and how you interact with other people," Lauren said. "The new technology can also be used to help express your words and feelings, which I think play a very important role in creativity. If you have a really creative mind, these things help you branch out to what you want to be and what you want to do in life"

Elizabeth Stuart, instructional supervisor for Visual Arts for Prince George's County Public Schools, was present at the exhibition's opening reception. Stuart, who supervises all art teachers in the county, is an active proponent for Arts Integration in Prince George's, which is an initiative to integrate the arts across curriculums. Schools participating in the Arts Integration program usually are self-selected.

During the reception Jones and Stuart discussed plans for including Greenbelt Middle School as part of the Arts Integration program, which would entail initiating a dialogue with the school's administration.




