## **New Method of Garbage Collection Given Study**

A letter from the Prince Georges County Commission regarding a new method of garbage collection being studied for communities in the county was read at the meet-ing of Town Council held Monday

According to the new plan, farmers in this county would col-lect the garbage and feed it to their hogs. This would free for other maintenance work the community employees now making

garbage collections.

A hearing on the proposal will be held June 16 at which time communities interested in the project may be represented. Twentythree communities have already indicated their desire to be present at that time and the Council de-cided to have this town represent-

If Greenbelt should adopt such a plan, citizens would be required to be more careful in the disposal of their garbage. Such items as razor blades, glass particles and other articles which would be harmful to the hogs could not be discarded in the same container as the garbage.

## Wild Dogs In Woods **Police Report States**

additional hazard has appeared to those Greenbelt citiappeared to those Greenbelt citizens who, singly or in small groups, like to wander through the woods and the less populated surrounding territory. The new danger is that of being attacked by wild dogs, but there is no cause for alarm. Originally, these domesticated dogs that had bedomesticated dogs that had be-come wild had been five in number. Two weeks ago the local Police Department destroyed two of them. The remaining three will probably be killed shortly. Until that time, it is suggested that Greenbelters, and children in particular, do not expose themselves to danger by walking through the woods in groups of less than four.

Director of Public George Panagoulis reported Mon-day night at Town Council meet-ing that 16 arrests had been made during the month of May, Dis-orderly conduct, use of fire works and fire arms, violation of the shorts ordinance, reckless driving and driving without a license were the violations for which the arrests were made. Mr. Panagoulis also stated that the "Peeping Tom" menace had been effectively handled. There has been an epidemic of "BB" gun users in Greenbelt. The Police Department states as a policy that since the parents of children owning these air rifles fail to properly supervise their use the law must take the necessary measures.

It has been noted that a dozen strangers have appeared recently in the shopping center wearing shorts with halter tops. "There is no excuse for any violation of the 'shorts' ordinance, since all Green-belters have been informed of it." Panagoulis stated. One citizen present suggested that a police-man be stationed at the center permanently to enforce the "shorts" ordinance.

## G. C. A. Dance June 20 Injunction Hinted To Keep Families From Moving Into Defense Homes As FWA Still Holds Back Funds

Finding any discussion of the Federal Works Agency's refusal to advance sums in lieu of taxes halted momentarily by lack of agreement, the Town Council at its regular meeting Monday night came to grips instead with other problems. Confronting the town and discussed by the councilmen was the delay in starting construction of a new school, and a controversy over a pending ordinance governing use of the town cemetery.

Town Manager Roy Braden in reporting on the FWA situation, said, "We were informed tonight (Monday) through representatives of the Federal Public Housing Agency that an agreement is being drafted to present to Council at a very early date." He added that any agreement accepted by Council must be agreeable in all respects. It was hinted that an injunction might be taken out prohibiting the moving in of any more families to the Defense homes if the payment was not made soon.

#### Library Summer Schedule Announced

arising out of the delay on the building of the new school and additions to the high school which has been caused by constant re-vising of the architectural plans, what will be the facilities available what will be the facinities available for kindergarten children, of which at least 200 are expected, according to Mr. Braden. Revisions in the construction plans include the elimination of the originally planned auditoriums in both Elementary and High Schools and the window assembly and reinstel window assembly and reinstell window. steel window casements and reinforcements. If bids are asked for this week as anticipated, said Mr. Braden, two weeks must be allow-Braden, two weeks must be allowed for contractors to figure and bid; two more weeks for contracts to be signed; and 'wo additional weeks for successful bidders to get equipment here and start construction. Since at least five months will be required to complete the work, said Mr. Braden, the school construction could not possibly be completed before January 1. Therefore, he said, with the limited Elementary School facilities now available, it is doubted that any provision can be made ed that any provision can be made kindergarten classes. teachers cannot now be contracted for, since it is not known at this date whether or not their services could be used; and next fall, when such knowledge will be available, it may be impossible to secure the services of teachers. Several suggestions—including the use of apartment house basements, the old and new Athletic Clubhouse, and the importation of abandoned CCC buildings—were eliminated because of inadequacy or limited funds. Councilman George Bauer suggested that a small amount of additional space might be gained by determining just how many out-of-town students attend the Greenbelt schools who might receive their education elsewhere, Bicycle Ordinance Read

An ordinance governing the use bicycles—published elsewhere in this issue—was presented for the first reading, with only one change. Where formerly it stated bicycles could be the sidewalks between the hours of midnight and 7 a. m., it now reads "except between the hours of 3 a. m. and 7 a. m." The exception to the general rule of no riding on the sidewalk according to Mr. the sidewalk, according to Mr. Bauer who offered the clause, is to allow newspaper distributors to deliver their papers as quickly as possible. Inasmuch as no children are on the streets at that time, he said, all danger is prac-tically eliminated.

Cemetery Markers Start Row Another ordinance prepared to govern the use of the town cemetery, started a minor controversy between the councilmen. Councilmen Thomas Ricker and Frank Lastner suggested that people buying plots in the cemetery be allowed to decide the size and type of marker they wished to use. They were voted down, however, when Mr. Braden nointed out that when Mr. Braden pointed out that the maintenance cost would be pro-hibitive if this were allowed. Explained Mr. Braden, care of the lawns would be much simpler and less expensive if the markers are

Previous editors had a habit of leaving Greenbelt's newspaper on the downgrade as they left the editorship. In December, 1940 Editor Fosnight found himself in charge of a dwindling staff and hazardous finances.

During the months that followed he may have left much to be desired in the eyes of some residents, but he put out a paper each week. He worked out a formula for changing over from a photo-offset process to a regular printed paper. He cooperated with Business Manager William R. Stewart in building up a relative stability for the publication's finances. And this month, just before leaving, he enjoyed the return of sports news to our columns.

It has been a long full term of community service, one filled with bickering, threats of lawsuit, threats of organized boycott, petty politics, enmity, and non-cooperation by several individuals in town. Francis Fosnight deserved something better for his work, but no amateur editor of a voluntary small-town newspaper expects much. He does his job because he likes the work—or maybe because he is just a darn fool.

We are sorry to lose Mr. Fosnight from the community -we have lost many outstanding civic leaders in recent months and can ill-afford more. We can only hope for replacements. C'est la guerre!

#### \*American Legion Post No. 136-Legion Auxiliary

Greenbelt Post No. 136, American Legion, held its first regular meeting February 17, 1938, with 21 members present. Since that time it has known regular growth, now numbering 61 members. The large house on the north side of Southway-extended is the Legion Home. It was made the attractive place it now is largely through the cooperative efforts of the Legionnaires who spent many weekends wielding paint brush and hammer. The local Post has sponsored crab feasts and banquets, held in the winter inside the home and in the summer under the trees in the grove. The tank which stands outside the home was driven from Fort Meade to Greenbelt by Judge Freeman, and according to him, it shook around so much that he lost the engine and had to go back 11 miles for it the next day.

When asked to outline the purposes for which the Post was or-

When asked to outline the purposes for which the Post was organized, one Legionnaire offered the list which is quoted below just

"1. To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States

of America

2. To maintain law and order.

3. To foster and perpetuate 100% Americanism.

To preserve the memories and incidents of their association in the Great War.

5. To inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation.

6. To combat the autocracy of both the classes and masses.

To make right the master of might.

8. To promote peace and goodwill on earth.
9. To safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy.

10. To consecrate and sanctify their comradeship by their devotion

to mutual helpfulness." Further purposes, made necessary by the times, have added to the purposes above a new group of ambitions. Again quoting our Legionnaire, they are as follows:

"1. To sponsor and keep operating efficiently our air observation

2. To form and operate a company of Minute Men for the welfare of Greenbelt.

of Greenbelt.

3. To cooperate and take an active part in any civic activity for the good of the community.

4. To foster 100% Americanism in the schools."

Working hand in hand with the Legion, the Auxiliary was formed for the purpose of aiding the Legion in carrying out a peace and wartime service to America, to which the Legion is dedicated. All of its activities are designed to promote the work of the Legion and to help the Legion reach its objectives. Although often working independently on projects of its own, the Auxiliary has no purposes that are apart from the aims of the Legion. It is in every sense an 'auxiliary' to the Legion and its members serve with the members of the Legion in a spirit of devotion to the well-being of the American republic.

## Your Mail Delivery

Home delivery for our mail is within reach this year. but we will have to stand on our tiptoes to get it. Each year has seen the total revenue of our post office boosted a little higher. ### Town Ordinance

(Given first reading June 8) AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE SECTIONS 8.61-8.67 INCLUSIVE OF THE GREENBELT MUNICI-PAL CODE OF 1942 LICENSING AND REGULATING THE USE OF BICYCLES

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Town of Greenbelt, Maryland, the following ordinance

is hereby adopted.
PART I—There are hereby created seven new sections of the Greenbelt Code of 1942 to

the Greenbelt Code of 1942 to read as follows:

SECTION 8.61—The term "bicycle" shall mean and include a vehicle having two tandem wheels, none of which shall be less than 20 inches in diameter, with inflated rubber tires, having handlebars a seet or seat and meaning the state of the state bars, a seat or seats, and pro-pelled by the feet acting on treadles connected with cranks

treadles connected with cranks or levers.

SECTION 8.62—All bicycles owned by residents of the Town of Greenbelt and operated within the corporate limits of the Town shall be registered and licensed. Application for such license shall be made with the Department of Public Safety and shall be affixed to the bicycles in a manner prescribed by the Director of Public Safety. The Department of Public Safety. The Department of Public Safety is hereby authorized to issue and keep records of all license tags. No bicycle shall be licensed unless (a) it is in good mechanical condition (b) has adequate braking and signaling devices (c) a serial or identifying number stamped on the frame. Any bicycle which has no such serial or identifying number shall be assigned such number by the Department of Public Safety and such number shall be stamped permanently on the bicycle by the Department. (d) Payment of original license fee of 35c. The loss or defacement of license tags shall be reported to the Department of Public Safety within 48 hours of the discovery of such loss or defacement and new license tags shall be obtained at an additional cost of 25c.

SECTION 8.63—It shall be unlawful for any resident to operate a bicycle upon the streets or roads within the corporate limits of the Town of Greenbelt, Maryland, unless such bicycle shall have been registered and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Code. No person shall operate a bicycle within the limits of the Town of Greenbelt between ½ hour after sunset and ½ hour before sunrise unless such bicycle shall have a headlamp or hour before sunrise unless such bicycle shall have a headlamp or light firmly attached to the front of the bicycle giving a clear white light visible not less than 300 feet, and a tail light or suitable reflector on the rear of the bicycle visible at a distance of not less than 200 feet.

SECTION 8.64—It shall be unlawful to:

lawful to:

(a) Remove, deface or change any identification mark or number or license tag on any bicycle.

(b) Take or operate any bicycle without the permission of the

(c) Operate any bicycle not in good mechanical condition.
(d) Have more than one person riding on a bicycle at the same time, except for tandem bicycles. (e) Ride 2 or more abreast unless

unavoidable.
(f) Operate any bicycle in any manner contrary to existing regulations governing the operation of motor vehicles in the Town of Greenbelt, Maryland.

(g) Remove both hands from the handlebars at the same time, or perform trick riding.

(h) Fail to keep on the right hand side and give way to motor vehicles at all times.

(i) Operate or park any hievelets.

(i) Operate or park any bicycle without due regard for the safety of the operator or any other per-

of the operator or any other person or vehicle.

(j) Ride upon any public walk except between 3:00 A. M. and 7:00 A. M.

(k) No bicycle shall be parked anywhere within the limits of Greenbelt in such a manner as to injure or endanger any trees.

Greenbelt in such a manner as to injure or endanger any trees, shrubbery, or property and no bicycle shall be parked in the mercantile center except in the bicycle racks provided by the Town of Greenbelt.

SECTION 8.65—The Director of Public Safety shall have authority to suspend the registration and remove the license tag from any bicycle operating contrary to any of the provisions of this ordinance, for a period of 10 days in addition to any other penalties hereinafter provided.

SECTION 8.66—Any person violating any provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction be subject to a fine or not more than five (\$5) dollars.

SECTION 8.67—All bicycles

shall be inspected during the month of July each year by the Department of Public Safety at specified locations as designated by the Director of Public Safety. PART II—This ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after
