Greenbelt Health Association Announces Arrival Of New Doctor

A new doctor has been added to the staff of the Greenbelt Health Association, Mr. Herbert Hertz, president, announces. The arrival of Dr. Louis H. Moody, Jr. of Takoma Park has two-fold significance, according to Mr. Hertz. Not only will it relieve Dr. Wodak of the heavy load he has carried for the past two years; it will hasten the expansion of its service to GHA members.

Dr Moody will practice general medicine as well as his field of special study, obstetrics and gynecology. He will also perform minor surgery. Dr. Moody received his pre-medical training at the University of Maryland and an M.D. from the George Washington University in 1940. He was an interne at Garfield Hospital in Washington during 1940-41 and a resident obstetrician and gynecologist in the City and University Hospitals of Cleveland during 1941-42.

Selection of Dr. Moody was made at a special GHA board of director's meeting May 13. Announcement was withheld at that time pending issuance of a Maryland license to Dr. Moody. He will sign a contract for one year on June 1, although he will assume his duties several days prior to that.

"Dr. Moody comes to us well-recommended," Mr. Hertz stated. "In addition we are considering the hiring of one of several qualified experts to assist and advise us in planning a well-rounded program of services to the members. It can't be stressed too strongly that an increased membership is esential to any expanion program. Accordingly, we will start an intensive membership drive in the near future. If each member introduces just one new member, any expansion program undertaken will be assured of success. Any resident interested in becoming a member of GHA should call 2121."

Full support of Greenbelt Consumer Services in spreading the plan of regular contributions from neighborhood groups has been assured by GCS President Dayton Hull

At least two groups in town have lost no time in adding their support to the CARE program. Courts 1, 2 and 3 of Laurel Hill Road are contributing 25c per week from each of 20 families towards the purchase of one package of food through CARE every three weeks. Mrs. Mary Callanan is in charge of this collection. The neighbors of 57 Ridge Road have contributed \$1 each for the purchase of a food package to Czechoslovakia. Mrs. Dora McNeil has charge of collection for this court.

Don Grimm Wins SSP Scholarship

Donald Eugene Grimm, 16, Greenbelt High School senior, has received an award in a national scholarship competition held by the econdary School Principals, Washington, D. C., it was announced today by Mr. P. Speicher, principal of Greenbelt High School. This award designates the recipient as an alternate for a \$300.00 scholarship and was won in a competition of 5201 selected high ranking students—all senior members of the National Honor Society-in 1274 high schools throughout the nation. Donald ranked seventeenth in the country and was one of two students from Maryland to receive an award. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George B. Grimm, 2-A Northway. He plans to enter the University of Maryland in September.

At Greenbelt High, he was president of the National Honor Society, editor of the school newspaper, treasurer of the Dramatic Club, a member of the Student Council, in the cast of the school plays and operettas and ranked scholastically in the upper tenth of the senior class.

Council Protests Enlarged Airport And Speedway

The following resolution, ordered drawn up by the Town Council at its meeting Monday, May 13, was duly transmitted to the Federal Public Housing Authority May 21:

Public Housing Authority May 21: WHEREAS, it has been brought to the attention of the Council of the Town of Greenbelt, Maryland, that the General Field Office of the Federal Public Housing Authority has recommended the approval of a right-of-way through Greenbelt for a new super-speed highway which brings it within approximately one hundred feet of Greenbelt homes; and

proximately one hundred feet of Greenbelt homes; and
WHEREAS, it has also been learned recently that the General Field Office of the Federal Public Housing Authority has agreed to transfer approximately seventeen acres of land near the center of Greenbelt to the privately-owned Schrom Airport so that the airport can be expanded to handle

large freight-carrying planes; and WHEREAS, the Greenbelt Community was designed, built, and in the past has been operated as a demonstration of modern community planning wherein first and foremost consideration was given to the safety and general welfare of its residents, with special protection from the danger and annoyance of heavy traffic being given to the residents by locating the Town a considerable distance from all arterial highways and with the community as a whole being protected from sprawling, haphazard developments and encroaching industries by the establishment of an encircling greenbelt around the entire Town; and

WHEREAS, the presently proposed location of the right-of-way for the super-speed highway was selected because of the opposition of the owner of the Schrom Airport to two previously surveyed rights-of-way and apparently without regard to the fact it will run almost by the front doors of Greenbelt homes and in an area where children have always been free to live and play without fear of heing crippled or killed; and

of being crippled or killed; and WHEREAS, for a number of years planes using the Schrom Airport have been a source of danger to the safety, health, and peace of mind of the residents of Greenbelt because of low flying and stunt flying over our homes and with the enlarging of the airport for freight-carrying planes we believe the hazards and mental distress will be greatly increased; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Maryland has granted to the Town of Greenbelt "control over all public roads, streets, alleys, and sidewalks within the corporate limits of the Town of Greenbelt" and likewise granted the Town authority "to open, close, and alter public roads, streets, alleys, and walks"; and

WHEREAS, the provisions of the Bankhead - Black Act specifically state that all civil and criminal jurisdiction on resettlement projects rests solely with the State and local political subdivisions:

ects rests solely with the State and local political subdivisions; and WHEREAS, in spite of the provisions of the Bankhead-Black Act and authority granted to the Town of Greenbelt by the Legislature of the State of Maryland, responsible officials of the General Field Office have never consulted with or advised the Town Council regarding the proposed location of the superspeed highway, or the transfer of Greenbelt land for enlarging the

Schrom Airport; and
WHEREAS, we believe that the fundamental principles which guided the planning and development of Greenbelt have been ignored by the General Field Office in approving the location of a dangerous super-speed highway so near our homes and the transferring of Greenbelt land for enlarging an airport which already constitutes a hazard and a nuisance to our community, and that such action results only to the benefit of one (See COUNCIL PROTEST Page 2)

Prizes In Store For Lucky Donors

New impetus for the canned goods drive for overseas relief came this week when a donor who prefers to remain anonymous made prizes available to lucky contributors.

Through the cooperation of the food store, two pounds of butter, four pounds of oleomargarine and a five pound bag of sugar account for seven of the fifteen prizes. As each Greenbelter makes his contribution of food or money for relief at the store tomorrw he will be asked to write his name and address on a small piece of paper which is dropped in a bowl. Tomorrow night at closing time, six p. m., the drawing will take place and fifteen contributors will receive prizes.

The Greenbelt Food Conservation Committee which is sponsoring the drive expects a large supply of canned goods which can be promptly dispatched to the New Windsor, Md., interdenominational relief center, packed there and sent on the way to famine stricken areas. Money contributions, the Committee ruled, will be routed through CARE (Cooperative for American Remittances to Europe).

Airport engineers are at work now on the layout and time schedule for construction, Mr. Schrom said, and will soon reprt exactly which gardens will be affected.

Memorial Sunday

. . . It is for us, the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us - that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion that we here, highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain - that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom - and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

Council Action

The council's resolution directed to FPHA protesting infringements against Greenbelt echoes the feeling of many residents. It is the hope that the council will follow up this good start by actively continuing to prosecute the highwayairport case. The council can confidently take the initiative in this matter knowing that such action is in the best interests of the community. We believe that Greenbelters are just waiting to be shown how to attack this problem and the council is the body to lead the way. But if any good is to come of an organized campaign, the action must be speedily taken before the transaction (a three-way swap in which everybody gains except Greenbelt) is completed.

Left Hand, Right Hand

The opening of a baked goods department by Greenbelt Consumers Services at a time when they are cooperating with the Greenbelt Food Conservation Committee to stimulate gifts of food for famine victims seems incongruous. This action will be confusing to residents who are asked to give aid on one hand but invited to help themselves to products made with materials needed in famine zones on the other hand.

No one questions the need for a baked goods outlet in Greenbelt in normal times but displaying tempting cakes and cookies now puts a hard burden upon those who are trying to conserve.

Freeway A Menace

TO THE EDITOR:

If Greenbelters want a preview their doorstep soon, I would sug-gest they take a ride down Edmonston Road and turn left up Good Luck Road for a good view of the new Freeway. Work is going along seven days a week with all the miscellaneous workers, noise, dirt, and mess that can be expected of some score of giant conveyors and grading vehicles preparing the area for the new highway. Persons viewing panorama will perhaps wonder at the reason for running an expensive S curve around the airport and between it and Greenbelt, instead of running straight through at the other end of the airport.

With this speedway at our doorsteps we will lose the privacy and safety we have enjoyed here in Greenbelt. Motorists will leave the highway "to see what those people look like" and will be unlikely to slow to our 25 mile speed limit thus endangering the lives of our children and adults who have to cross the streets on their way to school and shopping center. Salesmen will multiply by the dozens. Our picnic areas and wild flowers be overrun. It will be impossible to get near the swimming

The expense to the Town of Greenbelt will be greatly increased by salaries of extra patrolmen and firemen needed to enforce speed regulations, patrol the wood-


ed areas, keep children off the speedway, answer fire and accident calls bound to be forthcoming with the greatly increased traffic through our town and wooded areas.

Add to this the terrific noise caused by speeding vehicles and the freight planes many times heavier and noisier than the train-ing planes now in use. To me this paints a very black picture with sound effects.

It seems to me it is about time residents of the Town of Greenbelt assert our rights as citizens of this town and appeal to our duly elected representatives, (paid by the way \$250. each per year) to assume their duties and take every step to protest the action placing the Freeway in its present location and to protest the disposing of property within the Greenbelt area without consultation with the citizens of the affected area save for one who was, it seems, given every consideration without respect to the effect of the action on the other 2,000 or 3,000 residents. Other communities in Montgomery county have successfully protested and forced a relocation of the Freeway.

Our Town Council will be forced to take action if you express your opinion on these matters. A phone call or post card to Mayor Bauer, Councilmen Rogers, Cain, Morrison, Dunbar, Town Manager Gobbel, and to The Cooperator would implement this I'm sure.

private individual without regard to the rights, wishes, and welfare of the residents of Greenbelt;

WHEREAS, we believe that the possible loss of the life of even one child is too great a price for Greenbelt to pay for the failure of the General Field Office to protect the bests interests of the community; NOW

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLV-ED by the Council of the Town of Greenbelt, Maryland, that the members of the Town Council go on record as being utterly and completely opposed to approval of a right-of-way for the super-speed highway along the presently proposed route; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the Town Council go on record as being utterly and completely opposed to the transfer of any land within the Town of Greenbelt for the expansion of the Schrom Airport;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a signed copy of this resolution be sent to the Honorable Philip M. Klutznick, Commissioner of Federal Public Housing Authority, with the request that he disapprove the location of the proposed right-of-way for the new super-speed highway and the transfer of any Greenbelt land to the Schrom Airport.
