Council Rescues Rescue Squad, Votes \$1200 For Service To City

The city council voted to pay \$1200 to the Greenbelt Rescue Squad for services rendered to the city in the past year. Preparation for emergencies in connection with civil defense needs was stressed by council members as the primary reason for the appropriation. Marshall Zoellner, president of the rescue squad, stated that the money would probably take care of all the immediate financial needs of the squad.

Report Chickenpox Warns McDonald

According to City Manager C. T. McDonald, a number of cases of chicken pox have been reported in the community. Mr. McDonald states that apparently a still larger number of cases have not been reported to the public health department.

City ordinance requires all cases of contagious diseases to be reported to the health department. Upon recovery from any contagious disease, a certificate from the health department is required before a child is permitted to return to school. Considerable delay and coniusion may be avoided, if parents will notify the public health department at the outbreak of any contagious disease within their family.

Self-Determination

The vote to allot funds to the rescue squad culminated a twomeeting discussion of the rights of council to determine for itself what services are needed by the city. Mayor Elizabeth Harrington stated last Monday, "Elected officials know what the needs and services of a community are more than PHA". Referring to Public Housing Administration's practice of deciding what services are needed by the city, the mayor remarked, "It is not proper for a municipal government to operate that way'

Most council members felt, however, that PHA would not seriously contest the council's decision to rescue the rescue squad, in view of the preparations underway nationally for civil defense. The importance of a rescue squad and its equipment was emphasized. Some council members stated they were willing to curtail certain other services for "what is needed more".

Mac\On Defense

City Manager Charles T. Mc-Donald presented a report on Civil Defense in Greenbelt. McDonald, local director of civil defense, announced the appointment of George Panagoulis as Chief Deputy Director in charge of police, fire service and warden services. Copies of the Federal blue book "United States Civil Defense" are available for distribution to all section leaders, Mc-Donald stated.

(Following the meeting, Isadore Parker, Cooperator reporter, was appointed deputy director in charge of publicity for civil defense.)

That Tax Again

Preparation of an ordinance to tax the tangible personal property of firms, businesses and professions in Greenbelt was begun by the council and City Solicitor Ralph Powers. The ordinance includes, for the first time, personal property owned by doctors, dentists, and lawyers; and perhaps several repair services operating, in the community. Only that property now assessed by the county will be taxed. The ordinance will be considered at the

The city council took a courageous stand last Monday when it appropriated \$1200 to the rescue squad for services rendered to the city. In the face of an informal statement by Community Manager Walter Simon that PHA would look with disfavor on the city's supplying a service not contracted for, the council deemed the appropriation just and necessary.

Under ordinary circumstances, arguments for and against the payment would both have real merit. At present, however, the necessity of maintaining an ambulance service has become dramatically apparent. Communities throughout the nation in this time of emergency are taking inventory of their equipment and resources in preparation for civil defense. Ambulances, lifesaving equipment, and any established groups properly trained in rescue work are prize assets.

In the preparation of a budget for anticipated expenditures, it is not always possible to foretell what services will be essential. Changing conditions create new needs and place importance on different services. Such a situation has taken place in Greenbelt.

We are fortunate in having a council that is alert to the problems that confront us, and vigilant in its protection of the community welfare.




