Meet Bobby Ward: Twice All-American

Twice All-American Bobby Ward, Maryland University football star, has been living in Greenbelt since September 1950.

The twenty-four-year-old veteran, student and ace lineman and his family - wife Ellen Louise, 11-month old son Jim and 3 weeks old Kathleen - have recently moved from Laurel Hill to 32-F Ridge. At present Bobby is practicing for the Sugar Bowl and boning up for the exam season which always seems to shadow holidays.

At five feet eleven and 185 lbs., Bobby is small for a lineman, who usually tips the scale at 200 or over, but, as he told us, he comes of a footballing family. Two of his brothers at Columbia U. have brought honor to their college teams; Jim, in his second year at law school, was team captain two years ago and Al, now a junior, has proven a fine defensive end. The five Ward boys and their sister Ann, now studying medicine at Maryland U. along with her brother Jack who is halfway through dentistry, were brought up in Elizabeth, New Jersey. The youngest of the family, Peter, is a high school junior and the only one still at home. Bobby, who remembers that he "always wanted to play football," made his mark at Thomas Jefferson High in his home town. After his eighteen months as a paratrooper he came to Maryland to major in business administration - and blocking.

Televiewers are familiar with the dark-haired, pleasant-faced player who has missed only one game in his four years at the college, and that one because of a kick in the chest suffered in a game the week before. This season in the tussle with Georgia Bobby broke his hand, but otherwise, he says, "no serious injuries," although everybody on the squad gets his share of muscle bruises and similar minor annoyances.

A member of Phi Delta and the track team, and a conscientious student, Bobby has little leisure, but what he does have he likes to spend "in action." Golf is one of his favorite relaxations, but reading involves "too much sitting down." Although he says no one in his family ever "showed any musical ability" - in fact, one after another tried instruments as diverse as the trumpet and the violin without success - Bobby likes musical comedies, "good ones," best of all entertainment.

His plans for the future are indefinite, so far. The Sugar Bowl game and graduation are large on the horizon. Once his Senior year is over, Bobby thinks he might like to try his hand at coaching, a profession which involves "more than just being a good football player." A gift for administration is the chief asset and the ability to control a team a necessity. Bobby hopes to try himself out during Spring practise but in the meantime there is one thing the thoughtful, rather deliberate, all-star lineman is sure of: "No desk job for me," Bobby Ward says with determination. "I've got to be out and moving around."

Football fans who have seen him in a defensive play will have no difficulty understanding his feeling on the subject.
