Evades USDA Funding Cuts

Greenbelt's monthly free produce distribution, organized by the Greenbelt Assistance in Living (GAIL) program, is still running despite recent federal funding cuts and confusion among some residents

Attendance at the latest distribution dropped after some community members misunderstood a previous article (see May 8, 2025 issue) about U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) budget reductions, mistakenly believing the program had ended, organizers told the News Review.

USDA cut over \$1 bil-

lion in funding to food banks and schools, which has caused serious strain across the country. The Capital Area Food Bank (CAFB), which provides the fresh produce for GAIL's distributions, has been affected but monthly distributions have not ended.

"It is imperative that residents continue to participate to show

the need for the city to continue to participate in the program," said Assistant Director of Greenbelt CARES and the GAIL Program Christal Batey.

"If our numbers do not warrant the CAFB giving the city the free produce, the program may

Local Free Produce Giveaway Volunteers Explore Aquatic Life In Greenbelt's Canyon Creek

Since March 2023 Greenbelt residents have been leading an effort to characterize the biodiversity of benthic macroinvertebrates living in Canyon Creek, a small stream that flows through the North Woods tract of the Greenbelt Forest Preserve. Benthic macroinvertebrates are small animals, visible to the naked eye, that live at the bottom of streams: in the mud and sand, under rocks and in clumps of sodden leaves. Not only are these creatures fascinating, but they can tell us about the overall health and vitality of the stream.

Benthic macroinvertebrates include the larval, or juvenile, stages of many types of insects, as well as some adult insects, aquatic worms, leeches and snails. Some, such as stonefly, mayfly and caddisfly larvae, are more sensitive and can only live in clean water. Others, like mosquito larvae and aquatic worms, can survive almost anywhere, even if the water is polluted. Scientists have developed metrics that assign a stream health category from poor through excellent based on which macroinvertebrate

groups are present in the stream. In 2023 Catherine Plaisant and Mark Christal assembled an initial team of volunteers to learn how to conduct a benthic survey. Christal provided handson training and, before moving to Texas, donated the net and microscope that had been used in a previous benthic survey project in Beltsville Agricultural Research Center's Beaverdam Creek. Two surveys were conducted in 2023 and 2024. More recently, the team changed

to include American University Environmental Science professor Karen Knee and her student, Charles Sajonia. With Plaisant they continued using the Creek Critters app to identify the creatures they found and assign a stream health rating. This free app was developed by Nature Forward for citizen scientists and uses a simple dichotomous key to identify the most important macroinvertebrate groups based

Council Approves 10-Year Plan To Electrify City's Vehicle Fleet

The Greenbelt City Council voted on June 2 to approve plans to electrify the various city ve-

The Fleet and Equipment Electrification Plan aims "to move the City of Greenbelt away from internal combustion engine vehicles and equipment to reduce our carbon footprint to be more environmentally sustainable," according to the official proposal.

The focus of this electrification plan is from an internal perspective, directed toward city vehicles such as police, Public Works, administrative vehicles and even a trash truck. Handheld equipment, such as blowers and lawnmowers, will also be considered for electric replacements.

The plan is phased over a 10-year period, allowing the city to replace vehicles on the equipment's normal wear-and-tear life cycle and stay within the allocated budget.

"Because electric vehicles and equipment tend to cost more than gasoline vehicles and equipment, we don't want to replace equipment that is functioning right now," said Assistant City Manager Timothy George at the meeting. "As the equipment rolls over in a given year, that equipment,

those vehicles will be looked at for electric replacements."

The timeline also allows for flexibility as new vehicle and equipment technology continues to develop. "We also want to pace ourselves, we don't want to jump too quickly into electric and find that another technology is there in the wind," said George. Greenbelt contracted ICF, a third-party firm, to complete a fleet conversion assessment to gather the data needed to create the timeline.

Heavy Rain, Storms and Then High Temperatures Hit Greenbelt

Fierce storms on Thursday, June 19 brought flooding to the Youth Center, Braden Field and St. Hugh's Church among others. The church was preparing for their annual rummage sale on the weekend and had to leap into cleanup. Falling trees caused damage in the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. residential community and to apartments near Roosevelt Center, also blocking roads and the lake

On the back of the stormy weather came extreme heat, with temperatures in the 90s that

prompted an excessive heat warning. Greenbelt opened cooling centers at the Library, Community Center, Municipal Building, Youth Center and Police Station and urged residents to stay hydrated, limit time outdoors, check on elderly neighbors and not leave anyone in a vehicle. The city also asked residents to put out their refuse and recycling the night before collection as the crews will begin collection services earlier than usual to beat the intense heat. Highs early in the week reached 98 degrees.

l Disagree!

I greatly appreciate the work done by the Greenbelt Museum staff and volunteers. But I must take exception to the planned 10-A Crescent Road visitors' center addition. Greenbelt was intentionally designed with a great deal of green space. Each home had a cozy service side and garden side. Inevitably people wanted to expand, to turn green space into private space. So small garden side and larger end-unit additions were allowed because they made homes more modern and habitable.

But the museum block at 10 Crescent Road should reflect Greenbelt as it was built. The garden side should show the original use, a semi-private open space for a family that passersby on the path can look into. And the very important museum accessibility ramp and ADA bathroom can easily be built inside the garage at 10-A without adding a large building on the side and end of the unit.

The instinct of every organization is to grow. Each army and each museum aspires to be bigger, better and more. One of the charms of Greenbelt is it has generally resisted this trend. Each bit of more comes at the expense of something else becoming less. In this case the less are the window to see into the garden side yard and the yard itself, features that each Greenbelt home was designed to have.

If there were an absolute need, I would say no problem. But especially a museum showcasing the less-can-be-more design philosophy of early Greenbelt should be less, not more. I believe the wisest course would be for the

On Screen at Greenbelt Cinema

David Attenborough: Ocean The film takes viewers on a breathtaking journey showing there

is nowhere more vital for our survival, more full of life, wonder or surprise, than the ocean. The celebrated broadcaster and filmmaker reveals how his lifetime has coincided with the great age of ocean discovery. Through spectacular sequences featuring coral reefs, kelp forests and the open ocean, Attenborough shares why a healthy ocean keeps the entire planet stable and flourishing. Stunning, immersive cinematography showcases the wonder of life under the seas and exposes the realities and challenges facing our ocean as never-before-seen, from destructive fishing techniques to mass coral reef bleaching. Yet the story is one of optimism, with Attenborough pointing to inspirational stories from around the world to deliver his greatest message: the ocean can recover to a glory beyond anything anyone alive has ever seen.

A young, ambitious New York City matchmaker (Dakota Johnson) finds herself torn between the perfect match (Pedro Pascal) and her imperfect ex (Chris Evans). Directed by Celine Song.

The Life of Chuck
Charles "Chuck" Krantz experiences the wonder of love, the heartbreak of loss and the multitudes contained in all of us in a buoyant and often wonderful adaptation of one of Stephen King's more cosmically optimistic tales. The film is a departure for horror film director Mike Flanagan (Absentia, Oculus and Doctor Sleep). Based on a novella by Stephen King, it was called a "touching, beautiful film" by critic Odie Henderson of the Boston Globe.

Nighthawks on the Blue Highway
This is the definitive film about The Nighthawks, America's

hardest-working blues band. The Nighthawks inhabit the soul of blues music. Founded in Washington, D.C., more than 40 years ago by Little Walter-disciple Mark Wenner and guitar wizard Jimmy Thackery, the band thrives on its direct link to the great blues masters, having played with legends such as Muddy Waters, B.B. King, Gregg Allman, Pinetop Perkins, James Cotton and John Lee Hooker. The film celebrates the band's joyous blues music and its deep roots in Washington, D.C., while spelling out the struggles of keeping a band afloat for more than four decades. Featuring original interviews with blues legends, critics and Nighthawks past and present, the film is the first of its kind about this band with a national and international reputation.

Paris Is Burning
This documentary focuses on drag queens living in New York City and their "house" culture, which provides a sense of community and support for the flamboyant and often socially shunned performers. Groups from each house compete in elaborate balls that take cues from the world of fashion. Also touching on issues of racism and poverty, the film features interviews with a number of renowned drag queens, including Willi Ninja, Pepper LaBeija and

Alex the lion is the king of the urban jungle, the main attraction at New York's Central Park Zoo. He and his best friends - Marty the zebra, Melman the giraffe and Gloria the hippo - have spent their whole lives in blissful captivity before an admiring public and with regular meals provided for them. Alan Ralph Huff of Greenbelt died on Monday, June 16, 2025, after several months of hospitalization. Born in Ridley Park, Pa., in 1947 to Elizabeth Lock Huff and Ralph Robb Huff, his family moved to the Washington, D.C., area when he was a child. A lifelong lover of classical music, he played tuba as a young man.

At the age of 22, Alan enlisted in the U.S. Air Force and served two tours in Vietnam. An avid reader, he was very active in the Washington Science Fiction Association in the 1970s and '80s. He was co-owner of the Greenbelt video store for several years with his wife in the late '90s and enjoyed movies almost as much as books.

He is survived by his wife Kathleen (Kate) Terrell, two daughters, four grandchildren, a stepson, three step-grandchildren, his sister and many other family and friends. Visitation will be held at Collins Funeral Home, 500 University Boulevard West, Silver Spring, with valet parking available on Friday, June 27 from 2 to 4 p.m. A memorial service will be held at a later date. Katja Pottschmidt of Southway died suddenly and far too early due to a medical condition while on a run on the evening of Tuesday, June 17, 2025. She was 54. Born on May 31, 1971 in Aurich, Germany, into a military family (her father was in the German air force), Katja grew up in Aurich and Freising, Germany; Norfolk, Va.; and Mons, Belgium, before her family settled in Balingen, Germany, where she finished high school.

Following her life-long interest in astrophysics and an affinity for Star Trek, Katja studied physics at Tübingen University, Germany, where she also received her Ph.D. Her passion for the study of black holes and neutron stars led her to postdoctoral positions in Geneva, Switzerland, and at the University of California, San

In 2007, Katja moved to

Greenbelt to work at Goddard Space Flight Center, employed through the University of Maryland, Baltimore County. Here, she continued her research on black holes and neutron stars and was a member of the guest observer facilities for a large number of X-ray astronomy satellites, last as science lead of the NuSTAR guest observer facility and a member of the guest observer facility for the U.S.-Japanese XRISM mission.

In Greenbelt, Katja first lived on Lakeside Drive before joining GHI. She loved Greenbelt, embracing its cooperative culture, the walkability (she did not drive) and the alternative spirit of the town. She was a regular at the New Deal Café, almost exclusively shopped at the Co-op, always told her partner about all the news items in the News Review, frequently went to the movie theater and pool and every Sunday bought a crepe for breakfast and apples at the Farmers Market.

Her love of reading, especially science fiction, led her to be one of the founding members of Greenbelt's book club. She regularly fed the birds and squirrels in her garden, which was a great source of joy for her. Katja played Pokémon Go every Wednesday evening and whenever she was walking or running, and knew the Greenbelt woods and Greenbelt's history by heart. Young postdocs moving to the area could always rely on her showing them the city, which was her home.

Katja is survived by her loving partner of more than 20 years,

Joern Wilms, of Bamberg, Germany, who came to Greenbelt every four to six weeks since Katja moved here; her parents Juergen and Inge of Balingen, Germany; her sister Antje with partner Wolfgang and nephew and niece Mika and Ronja of Ditzingen, Germany; her family of scientists at Goddard and everywhere in the world; and all of her friends.



The fireworks display will take place at Buddy Attick Lake Park, 555
Crescent Road, on Friday evening, July 4th, at approximately 9 pm
and last 20 to 30 minutes. A Greenbelt officer will be at the main
gate in addition to having officers on foot patrol throughout the area.

The Greenbelt Citizen Engagement Response Toom will have a tent The Greenbelt Citizen Emergency Response Team will have a tent nearby, serving as a hydration station with cooling chairs, and will provide limited first aid assistance.

Please note that alcoholic beverages are NOT allowed at Buddy Attick Park. Violators are subject to arrest. For safety and security reasons, people carrying coolers and packages into the park may have them inspected. Pet owners must keep their pets on a leash at all times and pick up any droppings and dispose properly.

ALL forms of fireworks, including firecrackers, snakes, sparklers and bottle rockets, are prohibited by law in Greenbelt and throughout Prince George's County. Anyone found in possession of fireworks will be subject to arrest. Penalties include fines up to \$1,000 and/or six months in iail.

Traffic and Parking Concerns

The park is on Crescent Road near Kenilworth Avenue. Participants are reminded to observe all posted parking regulations. The parking lot is reserved for handicapped and elderly individuals. Vehicles must have handicapped or elderly persons on board. Handicapped tags and/or placards will not necessarily be required nor will they guarantee a parking space. 

end if there is a lack of participation."

GAIL's food distribution service offers shelf-stable items and seasonal produce to Greenbelt residents in need. In addition, perishable fruit and vegetables will be offered subject to availability. The next distributions will take place at the Community Center on July 17 and August 21 at 1 p.m. while supplies last.

"The GAIL Program currently offers a drive-thru distribution, deliveries to homebound residents through our partnership with GIVES, a walk-up table, door delivery to Green Ridge House residents and a distribution at Springhill Lake Recreation Center all on the same day," said Batey.

To receive food, residents need a CAFB card, which helps GAIL track participation and tailor food options to dietary and cultural needs. The card registration is free at distributions or by stopping by the GAIL office Monday to Thursday between 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Interested Greenbelt residents are encouraged to volunteer by assisting staff at Springhill Lake and Green Ridge House to deliver door to door. Call Flora Li, Green Ridge House service coordinator, at 301-412-2480 to volunteer.

GAIL staff stress that the program's continuation depends on the community showing up.

"We know how important the Food Distribution is, and we're committed to continuing to serve the community. It's important to know that we can only

continue this program if there is enough community participation and need," said GAIL Community Outreach Coordinator Katherine Farzin. "So, if you or someone you know could benefit,

on characteristics like whether the creature has a shell or how many legs it has. It also includes pictures. The team finished the third survey in May, just in time for Sajonia's graduation.

Macroinvertebrates from the "most sensitive" and "sensitive" groups, including dragonfly, mayfly and cranefly larvae, were found during almost every sampling event. One of the most interesting is the casemaker caddisfly larva, which builds its own shell out of materials it finds in the environment, such as sand, small pebbles, and scraps of tree bark. The survey team has also found small fish, frogs, amphibian eggs and salamanders of various sizes. These vertebrate animals don't officially impact the stream health score - which has ranged from fair to good on different days - but their presence suggests that the water is clean and well-oxygenated, since amphibians are sensitive to pollution and low oxygen levels. These results are reassuring for a small creek receiving a large amount of stormwater from Ridge and Laurel Hill Roads. The creek's watershed includes Greenbelt Homes, Inc. homes and yards as well as part of the Greenbelt Forest Preserve, so land use and management decisions in both of these areas affect it.

Plaisant and Knee hope to continue sampling in the coming months to confirm the results.

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












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


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

The assessment determined that the environmental impact of the fleet electrification is equivalent to 2,539 metric tons of carbon dioxide. "This is equivalent to taking 548 passenger vehicles off the road for a year or saving 863 tons of waste from landfills," according to Greenbelt Environmental Coordinator Kevin Carpenter-Driscoll.

Councilmembers raised questions about which charging stations would be designated for city vehicles versus public use and whether city mechanics have sufficient experience with electric vehicles

Council voted 5 to 1 to approve the plan, with Mayor Emmett Jordan opposed and Councilmember Rodney Roberts remaining silent during the vote.

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
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
Babe Ruth Seniors Record First Win of the Summer

It was a busy weekend for bargain hunters and treasure seekers in Greenbelt and neighboring Berwyn Heights on June 21 and 22.

Several events during the weekend offered scores of various, eclectic items of all types at steep discounts, including the steepest of all, for free.

St. Hugh's of Grenoble Church hosted one of its annual sprawling rummage sales on Saturday and Sunday in its large, downstairs community and reception room. The crowds enjoyed a bounty of goods offered for extremely low prices, most for just a few dollars.

Among the many items for sale at rows and rows of tables were a huge selection of jewelry, including rings, pendants, bracelets, earrings, watches and pins; all sorts of toys, games and puzzles; piles of clothing; rows and rows of books; household items, including utensils, silverware, mugs, glasses and kitchenware; linens; housewares; electronics; decorative items for several holidays; numerous home decorations; keepsakes; mementos; and even furniture.

One staffer said that just days before the rummage sale a storm caused massive flooding through the community room main entrance and in the community room itself. Church staff were able to clean up the water and everything was fine by the time the doors opened on Saturday.

Meanwhile, just down Greenbelt Road on Saturday, on the upper level of Beltway Plaza, The SPACE Free Art for All was having a bit of a different type of rummage sale at its soon-to-bevacated large space in the mall, though they'll maintain their smaller spaces on the main level. The SPACE organizers were offering a variety of things for free. Sadly, The SPACE had to unload a huge amount of its inventory because the facility is losing its donated space upstairs after a great 3-1/2-year run. The mall had to ask The SPACE to leave its larger space because a new retail tenant is moving in.

The SPACE officials said they were given a month to vacate. As a result, they had to unload most of their donated items because there isn't enough space for it all at the organization's two downstairs locations at the mall, near the AMC movie theater. The SPACE officials said they were not told the identity of the new retail tenant.
