GESTA Calls for Intervention To Halt Closure of Visitor Center

Goddard Engineers, Scientists and Technicians Association (GESTA) International Federation of Professional and Technical Engineers (IFPTE) Local 29, the union representing federal employees at the Goddard Space Flight Center, is calling on Congressional leaders, local government officials, economic stakeholders and the public to

take immediate action to stop the proposed closure of the Goddard Visitor Center – a decision that, if enacted, it says would inflict irreparable harm on the community, the regional economy and NASA's public mission.

The Goddard Visitor Center is a premier exploration and learning space that creates "a vital link between space explora-

tion and the American public," a union member stated. Closing the Visitor Center is a devastating decision which would greatly impact public engagement and education about the NASA mission. There are guided programs, tours, virtual field trips and various other programs that serve students in the region as well as from other states and countries. The

Visitor Center brings subject matter experts and volunteers who provide a wealth of knowledge to the community via regular monthly programming. Among them are Model Rocket Launch, Science Saturdays, Mission Experiment, Space for Me, Ask a Scientist, HerStory: Women of Goddard, Scavenger

Hunts, Family Science Adventure and several others. The Goddard Visitor Center also offers science home-schooling sessions throughout the year.

A Mission-Critical Public **Outreach Hub**

In 2024 alone, the Goddard Visitor Center achieved the

Greenbelt Labor Day Festival Schedule for Friday, Saturday

At 6 p.m. on Friday, August 29, the Ferris Wheel starts turning and the grills start sizzling as the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival returns to the town center. Carnival rides, bingo, fair food, sporting events, music performances, the big parade and a chance to connect with your community and neighbors are all just around the corner. Here's a quick guide to getting the most out of this beloved summer-ending festival. Friday, August 29

The Carnival Midway and booths open at 6 p.m., and that's when Bingo starts up on the Community Center lawn, sponsored by Greenbelt Youth Baseball. Special memorial games for bigger cash prize amounts will be announced during the games. These activities happen each day for the remainder of the Festival.

Opening Ceremonies At 6:30 p.m., the Greenbelt Police and color guard will lead off the Opening Ceremonies. This will include introduction of dignitaries, a performance of the National Anthem by Melissa Sites and the Outstanding Citizen presentation. There will be a sign language interpreter on stage. A reception for the 2025 Outstanding Citizen follows at 7:15 p.m. in the Municipal Building.

At 8 p.m., brassy multicultural outfit Black Masala takes the main stage, putting on a highenergy show for the Festival's first night.

Saturday, August 30

First thing on Saturday, at 9 a.m., the Greenbelt Museum exhibition on the New Deal art of Lenore Thomas opens and goes until 5 p.m. The two-hour Bricks and Blocks Walking Tour, covering Greenbelt history and architecture, leaves from the Museum at 9 a.m. Visit the museum's website to pre-register.

News Review Needs the Support Of Our Greenbelt Community

We need your help. As the News Review approaches its 88th anniversary as a small independent newspaper, we are facing unprecedented challenges even as our mission to deliver independent news for Greenbelt is more important than ever. With the disappearance of many other news sources, we have expanded our coverage into areas that we traditionally left to larger papers.

We've offered you important coverage of county schools and the school board, the fire department, the maglev, FBI Headquarters proposals, ICE and immigration news and the recent turmoil over federal workforce reductions and the impact on Greenbelt. We've filed Public Information Act requests as we follow actions and expenditures of public bodies and officials, holding them accountable to transparency and public interest. We've participated in community partnerships, ews panels and more. And this fall, for the first time, we will co-host a forum for city council candidates.

For much of our history, we put out the paper on a shoestring. However, our operating costs have increased and our processes have changed over the last 20

Public Comment Period for USDA Reorganization Closes August 26

On August 1, U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Secretary Brooke L. Rollins announced the opening of a 30-day public comment period for stakeholders to provide feedback on the department's reorganization plan, which includes the closure of Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC).

"We value your perspective as we work to ensure that USDA is best positioned to serve America's farmers, ranchers, producers and rural communities," Rollins

"President Trump made clear his second term would include relocating the sprawling federal bureaucracy to locations outside the National Capital Region," Deputy Secretary Stephen Vaden said in his Capitol Hill testimony on July 30, adding the plan "right-sizes the USDA footprint," and maintains the department "within the bounds of its available financial resources." The reorganization proposal relocates approximately 2,600 Washington, D.C., area positions to five regional hubs: Raleigh, N.C.; Kansas City, Mo.; Indianapolis, Ind.; Fort Collins, Colo.; and Salt Lake City, Utah (see the July 31 issue).

Who's Being Political?

I visited the Greenbelt Police Station on August 13 to find out what our city's policy is regarding how they can protect law-abiding residents with no criminal history from ICE's practice of targeting individuals for detainment based on racial profiling, violating their constitutional rights to due process.

The Greenbelt police officer I spoke with informed me that they'll only enforce an ICE criminal warrant, but not an ICE civil warrant. But he wouldn't answer my question pertaining to protecting Greenbelt residents who have no criminal history or criminal warrants from abduction by ICE agents whose faces are covered by masks and wearing no visible identification. When I mentioned what other cities are doing in an attempt to protect their residents, the officer mischaracterized what I said as trying to tell the police what to do. He then sarcastically suggested I contact the chief of police since I'm telling them

what to do, and then even suggested I contact ICE. Throughout our entire conversation, I was met with indifference and zero empathy. The officer remarked several times that he'll not get political, as I kept emphasizing the extreme fear experienced by innocent people from ICE's unconstitutional tactics.

I then went to the Municipal Building to speak with staff. Unlike the insensitivity encountered communicating with this officer, I was met with kindness and understanding from the city's Constituent Services Coordinator Gizelle Alvarez. She informed me that the Greenbelt police have no policy regarding protecting residents from ICE who have no criminal history or criminal warrants. "He didn't tell you that?" she asked. "No," I said, commenting, "why didn't the officer just tell me?"

Whatever happened to community policing in Greenbelt, the goal of which was to foster good relationships between our police and our community's residents? Name withheld at the request of the author.

Deplores Expensive School Board Action

Raiders of the Lost Ark

Dr. Indiana Jones, a renowned archeologist and expert in the occult, is hired by the U.S. government to find the ark of the covenant, which is believed to still hold the Ten Commandments. Unfortunately, Hitler's agents are also after the ark. Indy and his ex-flame Marion escape from various close scrapes in a quest that takes them from Nepal to Cairo.

When a young woman is killed by a shark while skinny-dipping near the New England tourist town of Amity Island, police chief Martin Brody (Roy Scheider) wants to close the beaches, but mayor Larry Vaughn (Murray Hamilton) overrules him, fearing that the loss of tourist revenue will cripple the town. Ichthyologist Matt Hooper (Richard Dreyfuss) and grizzled ship captain Quint (Robert Shaw) offer to help Brody capture the killer beast, and the trio engage in an epic battle of man vs. nature. "Once released, Jaws wasn't just a blockbuster hit - it was a phenomenon, a 'super-blockbuster', in the words of Variety," said Zach Shonfeld. "It became the first movie to break \$100 million at the box office (displacing The Godfather as the highest-grossing film up to that point). It captivated the media. It instilled in viewers such an acute fear of sharks that beach attendance took a well-documented hit."

Echo in the Canyon

This film offers a look at how musical groups such as The Byrds, The Beach Boys, Buffalo Springfield and The Mamas & the Papas birthed the beginnings of the Laurel Canyon music scene and how the echo of these artists' creations reverberated across the world. years or so in ways that make this very difficult. We had to hire several skilled employees to do the essential work of preparing the files for the printer, work that must be done at a set time every week without fail or there's no paper that week - and that's not an option.

Eventually, we also needed to hire a part-time managing editor, which again increased our cost but improved our journalism. With our expanded reporting, with so many more complex stories to cover, this role has also expanded, as evidenced by the depth and liveliness of the paper.

We now print in color and can print more photos, which were few and far between in the era of hot-type press and only black ink. Our readers love the photos, sending us their shots of events, people, animals and plants in Greenbelt and of their journeys around the world with the News Review. Lots of photos make for livelier, more interesting papers, but also bigger, more costly pa-

Throughout our history, we have funded our operations through the sale of advertising. But if we have more copy that "has to run this week" than will fit in the number of pages we can pay for, we will often choose to add more pages, again increasing our costs.

We have taken steps to try to regain our self-sufficiency, such as increasing our advertising rates and applying for grants, including one that will help us try out ways to reach potential new advertisers. While we have been surviving due to reserves that we accumulated over the years, we cannot keep drawing them down. (In fiscal year 2024, despite a





U.S. citizens must be qualified and registered to vote in Prince George's County. Non-citizen residents of Greenbelt may also participate by registering to vote with the City Clerk or by accessing the non-citizen voter registration forms available on the City's website.

To register, you must:

- Be a citizen of the United States of America or Non-citizen of Greenbelt
- · Be at least 16 years of age
- Be domiciled within the corporate limits of the City of Greenbelt as of the date of registration
- · Have completed any court-ordered sentence of imprisonment, parole, or probation if convicted of a felony
- · Not be under quardianship for mental disability

City Council Receives Updates From City Manager and Police

At the August 4 worksession, the Greenbelt City Council received updates from City Manager Josué Salmerón on ongoing activities and accomplishments of city administration and departments during the first half of 2025. First, Salmerón introduced Sanjoy Chakraborty, the city's new information technology (IT) director. Chakraborty, who has 27 years of experience in industry and government, said his goals are to keep things running, protect data and consult with other departments.

Salmerón then gave an overview of accomplishments, and there were many (see agenda packet for this worksession and various reports in the News Review). Council's questions focused on the activities that had slow progress. Salmerón said that installation of EV charging stations near the Community Center is on hold until the electrical line is connected to the grid. Regarding the WMATA trail, the city is still awaiting state approval of the 90-percent design package. Mayor Emmett Jordan asked about the Greenbelt Cinema upgrades, and Salmerón replied that Maryland Historical Trust has not yet approved the digital marquee that the Cinema would like installed so it's no longer necessary to climb a ladder to change the names of featured films.

Upcoming Retirement

City Treasurer Bertha Gaymon will soon retire, and Salmerón said the first round of interviews for a replacement are now complete. Recruitment for both the treasurer and IT director was done through the recently implemented Paycor human resources and payroll system. Regarding American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, which must be fully expended by December 2026, Gaymon said she will prepare a detailed report on the status of funds before she leaves. She expects an audit will be done but said they're prepared for it. When asked by council if ARPA funds could be subject to clawback, Salmerón and Gaymon replied they had heard no talk of it but are aware ARPA funds might be vulnerable.

Police Dept. Activities

Salmerón asked Police Chief Richard Bowers for updates on the Greenbelt Police Department (GPD) activities. Bowers reported that GPD now has 49 of the 53 staff positions allocated. Officer Irelisse Fernandez recently had completed the FBI National Academy program, and soon every member of the command staff will have received executive leadership training. Bowers then requested GPD officers to describe the work of their teams.

Communications, Outreach

Office Michael Apgar reported that six of eight communications positions are filled. A high proportion of staff time involves providing information for expungement requests referred by courts. Officer Amy Sosa leads the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program at Greenbelt Elementary School and hopes to also offer it at Springhill Lake Elementary.

Officer Erick Alvarez, community liaison with Franklin Park, meets with management there once a week and tries to find solutions for residents who are dealing with domestic abuse or other problems. Most of his time is spent in community engagement, including a week-long summer program, this year for middle school boys.

Rachel Tobin of the crisis intervention team described recent efforts to assist a local unhoused person. Eighteen visits, lasting from about 10 minutes to two hours, were made, and they were able to take the individual for showers, locate some family members and eventually get him to a better situation. Bowers noted that all GPD can do for unhoused individuals is to connect them to resources, as it's not a crime to sleep outdoors and unless there's associated criminal activity it's not really a police

Investigations

Officer Aaron Leathery brought along his canine partner Zeppelin, a German shorthaired pointer. Zeppelin is a sniffer dog, trained to detect handguns and bombs. The pair trains with the Anne Arundel County Sheriff's Office and Montgomery County Police Department and have made 24 deployments so far, recovering evidence from an armed robbery and assisting other agencies with bomb sweeps and other tasks

while gaining experience. Bowers said GPD is on a waiting list for a second dog, a comfort dog who likely will be paired with Alvarez for community policing.

Officer Michael Parsley spoke about the Special Assignment Team (SAT), which addresses community concerns by covert means. SAT might focus on individuals with open arrest warrants or observe comings and goings at a site where suspected drug activity had been reported. For example, they recently addressed resident concerns about drug activity at a local bus stop. SAT has a partnership with the U.S. Marshals Service, with SAT officers deputized on a part-time basis, helping to track fugitives or assisting with other tasks that broaden their experience.

Officer Fernandez talked about GPD's four detectives who investigate violent crimes and help traumatized crime victims. They recently executed numerous search warrants and made some key arrests that involved recovery of firearms. Councilmember Rodney Roberts said that he hopes the team is working to solve the Julie Ferguson case, which is now 30 years old. Fernandez responded that with only four detectives, each with 12 to 20 cases, there is little time to work on cold cases. GPD would like

The SPACE Update, Greenbrian Hosts Backpack Giveaway

There is no confirmed retail tenant currently scheduled to occupy the vacant second-floor space at Beltway Plaza that was most recently occupied by The SPACE, Free Art for All, a mall spokesman said last week.

The SPACE's officials were told in June that they had one month to vacate that former second-floor space after three-anda-half years there because a new retail tenant was scheduled to move in. The mall had previously donated the location to The SPACE, which used the expansive, rectangular area for numerous art and community activities.

The mall is currently actively

looking for a new retail tenant to occupy that second-floor location, the spokesman said.



Greenbelt and Lakeland: An Unfortunate Interpretation

by the Greenbelt Reparations Commission

Eighty years ago, an editorial in the Greenbelt News Review (then known as the Greenbelt Cooperator) commented on the 1945 annexation of the Lakeland community, in an editorial entitled A Chance to Cooperate. The annexation set the foundation for the ensuing injustices experienced by the Lakeland residents. The story behind that editorial follows.

In June 1945, the City of College Park used a ballot question, driven by the University of Maryland, to ask residents about incorporating the City of College Park, which would include the African American community of Lakeland and other small neighboring communities within the borders of the proposed new municipality. Lakelanders voted 173-9 against annexation but were outvoted by the rest of the voters in the College Park area. Incorporation won, and the annexation proceeded despite the wishes of the vast majority of Lakelanders.

The June 8, 1945, Cooperator editorial, A Chance to Cooperate, greenbeltnewsreview.com/issues/coop19450608.pdf (p. 2) stated:

"Nearby Lakeland, Maryland, unsanitary, ill-lighted and ill-paved, is about to become the first colored settlement in the state to have a voice in electing a mayor and council, under terms of the recent incorporation voted upon by its residents and those of College Park, Calvert Hills, Berwyn, and the Fifth District."

The editorial discounted Lakeland voters' overwhelming opposition to incorporation into the newly created City of College Park. The editorial characterized the annexation as an opportunity

for racial cooperation and patronizingly suggested that the African American voters in Lakeland, who had nearly unanimously opposed incorporation, must have been misled: "...it is rumored that certain persons spread an impression throughout the colored community that the University of Maryland, under the incorporation, planned to take from Lakeland its lake front property."

Subsequent events, including massive urban renewal that destroyed more than two-thirds of the homes and gutted the Lakeland community, proved that the concern of Lakelanders about losing their homes was in fact entirely justified. (For details, see Lakeland Community Heritage Project, lakelandchp.com/history.)

It is perhaps not surprising that Greenbelt residents and the Cooperator in 1945 would have shown disregard for African American voices. After all, African Americans were excluded from living in Greenbelt. Like Greenbelt itself, writers on the newspaper staff at that time were all white and likely had little contact with African Americans, apart from seeing a few workers in town. As observed in an extensive 1944 study by sociologist William Form, Ph.D., African Americans occupied the lowest social status in Greenbelt. The editorial policy of the Cooperator expressly opposed racial bigotry, and yet this editorial reveals a perspective that disregards African American self-determination.

Many Greenbelters consider our town to be progressive and liberal, a place founded on principles of equality. We tend to associate Greenbelt with the human rights advocacy of Eleanor Roosevelt, whose ideals make her a venerated figure in Greenbelt and worldwide. Those ideals have indeed been a key element of the utopian narrative underlying Greenbelt's origins.

But these ideals are by no means the whole story. A more comprehensive and accurate account might highlight the disparity between the ideals and the historical reality. An origin story that uncritically accepts the myth of Greenbelt's egalitarianism is inconsistent with the African American history in the Greenbelt experience. The Greenbelt Reparations Commission, as part of its charge from the Greenbelt voters and city council, is researching to determine the facts about the development of Greenbelt. The commission plans to engage Greenbelt residents in discussions to broaden understanding and awareness of the conflicts that existed and still exist between the utopian progressive ideals of our planned community and the reality of how African American and Indigenous people were harmed.

What can we learn from the fact that ignoring or discounting African American voices and votes in Lakeland 80 years ago was celebrated in Greenbelt as an "opportunity for cooperation"?

to partner with another agency on Bowers said that both police gen-

Animal Services

Patricia Fillman, head of Animal Services, said that since January she and the other two animal services officers have responded to over 400 calls. They have attended various trainings and done ride-alongs with county shelter employees to strengthen those relationships. In August, a University of Maryland veterinary student is working with them and they hope to get more interns in future. Fillman said that the newly remodeled shelter, which reopened in June (see June 5, 2025 issue), is much improved but space still is limited and they now are at capacity for cats, with 11 currently housed there. Councilmember Jenni Pompi asked what happens to cats that the Greenbelt shelter cannot take and was told that they go to the county shelter.

Council Questions

Jordan asked about the accuracy of crime statistics in the new Metropolitan Council of Governments (COG) dashboard (mwcog. org/public-safety-and-homeland-security/data-and-tools/crime-dashboard). Bowers said COG draws information directly from the Computer Assisted Dispatch (CAD) system to which police departments report crimes, so the dashboard is highly accurate.

Councilmember Kristen Weaver asked about license plate readers and was told that Pepco needs to connect the electrical boxes to power them, after which the vendor will install cameras. Three readers already are functional, running on solar power.

Pompi asked about GPD's role in immigration enforcement.

Bowers said that both police general orders and a city ordinance state that GPD cannot assist in civil immigration cases but may assist in cases that involve crime. If GPD officers observe federal immigration enforcement activity they might stop to see what's going on but their role is only to keep the peace.

Meeting Controversy

Near the end of the meeting, Jordan mentioned that later in the week he would be meeting with the incoming head of Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (MNCPPC). Roberts, and then Pompi, quickly voiced strong objections, saying that any stakeholder meeting should be with the full council, not just the mayor. Jordan defended his plan saying that he would brief council on what transpired. After Weaver suggested that city staff meet with the MNCPPC head and then brief council, Jordan reluctantly agreed to step back.

Council then moved to go into a closed session to discuss personnel, legal and annexation matters with Salmerón and City Solicitor Todd Pounds.


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Ridge Road Man Is Arrested For Felony Assault on Officers

Shortly before 6 a.m. on Saturday, August 16, law enforcement agents convened at Greenbelt Elementary School with eight or more unmarked vehicles. Their appearance caused alarm to some who witnessed the group of vehicles, particularly in the current climate of Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) activity and federal forces on the streets of Washington, D.C. The officers were members of the U.S. Marshals Service Special Operations Group and the Capital Area Regional Fugitive Task Force executing a warrant for the arrest of a 30-year-old resident who is charged with felony assault of a police officer. He was arrested without incident at 6:15 a.m. at his home address in the 100 block of Ridge Road. The charges stem from an incident in March when officers attempted to stop the Greenbelt man on U Street, N.W., in Washington, D.C. At that time, he fled, hitting two officers with the ATV he was driving, say Metropolitan Police.

According to the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD), at approximately 8:14 p.m. on March

14, officers from the Third District attempted to stop a group driving ATVs and dirt bikes in the area of 14th and U Streets, N.W. According to the U.S. Marshals Service, two MPD officers approached as the group of ATVs was parked near the gas pumps of a gas station in that area. The U.S. Marshals say the officers were fully uniformed and, as they approached, one of the individuals, later identified as Gerard Stokes of Greenbelt, accelerated his ATV, raised the front tires in the air and aimed it toward the officers. The U.S. Marshals office reports one of the officers was able to move out of the way, but the other was struck head-on by the ATV and dragged approximately 15 feet across the gas station. Stokes, MPD alleges, then fled the scene without stopping. MPD says two officers were struck by Stokes as he fled the scene. MPD says both officers were transported to a local hospi-

The officer who sustained serious injuries is still recovering, according to the U.S. Marshals, and has not yet returned to full duty.

On July 15, Greenbelt Police Department supported a multiagency operation at the same home address in the 100 block of Ridge Road (see the July 17 issue). According to the U.S. Marshals office, during that operation multiple firearms, including rifles, shotguns and pistols as well as 720 rounds of 5.56 ammunition were recovered. On that date, Maryland court records show that Stokes was charged with two misdemeanors: one relating to possession of a rifle or shotgun and one for illegal possession of ammunition. The U.S. Marshals office reports Stokes has a criminal history that includes robbery, aggravated assault and carrying a pistol with a large capacity magazine without a license. Maryland court records suggest the charges following the July 15 police operation were the first to be levied in Maryland.

Man Shot During Rush Hour Road Rage Incident

During rush hour on Tuesday, August 12, a man was shot while driving on Kenilworth Avenue near Edmonston Road in what has been classified as a road rage

tal for treatment.

At approximately 5:35 p.m., the driver of a newer-model silver or gray four-door Lexus sedan swerved across multiple lanes and almost collided with the victim's car. When the victim confronted the other driver, the man brandished a gun and shot at him. The victim was struck and drove away in an attempt to escape. The suspect followed him, firing two additional shots that hit the victim's vehicle before fleeing down Greenbelt Road. The victim received medical treatment at a nearby hospital for injuries that were not life-threatening.

The shooter is described as a Black man with dark brown skin, estimated to be in his late 30s or early 40s, driving a silver/gray four-door Lexus sedan. Police are seeking the public's help with the case. 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

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

following:

- 33,605 walk-in visitors, engaged across 268 open days.
- 17,522 participants in 274 free public programs, fostering STEM education and community connection.
- 6,223 participants from 43 states and D.C. and 17 international schools attended virtual field trips, extending NASA's reach beyond regional lines.
- 3,063 youth and adults took part in 96 onsite guided field trip programs, enriching classrooms with real-world science.
- Approximately 1,200 volunteer hours, with subject matter experts and dedicated community docents leading public engagement.

And all of it is free of charge. It's worth noting that a majority of these exhibits and programs are supported on weekends and after hours by many of Goddard's engineers, researchers and scientists when they volunteer as subject matter experts. They see it as a way to educate the public about their work and inspire future generations to value NASA's mission of world leadership in space exploration.

An Economic Resource

The Visitor Center is not simply an educational venue, it draws tens of thousands of visitors annually who support local businesses, hotels and

Closure of the Center would mean: Lost tourism dollars; reduced visibility for the Goddard Space Flight Center in NASA's broader mission; disconnection of local families and school systems from the U.S. space program; and a weakened ability to inspire the next generation of scientists, engineers and space leaders.

A Targeted and Punitive Move?

There is growing concern that the closure may be more than a budgetary decision. The union has yet to receive any indications of other NASA Centers closing their visitor centers. Reports the union has received suggest that this measure - like the planned closures of the Goddard Onsite Occupational Health Unit, fitness center and the onsite vending services, cafeteria and recreational center - is perceived by some employees as purposefully punitive, seemingly designed to inflict maximum institutional pain on remaining employees who chose not to voluntarily separate or resign during recent agency downsizing or restructuring. "This feels less like austerity and more like retribution," said another union member. "Rather than strengthening the agency's future, this closure alienates the very community that helped NASA thrive."

A Call to Action

The union is demanding that the closure of the Goddard Visitor Center be immediately paused pending:

- 1. A transparent economic and community impact study, developed in coordination with local leaders and stakeholders.
- 2. A community stakeholder engagement forum, hosted jointly with the union, state and local governments and NASA manage-
- 3. Congressional oversight to investigate the underlying rationale for this closure, and to determine whether it aligns with federal public engagement mandates and the agency mission strategy.

Conclusion

The NASA Goddard Visitor Center provides a representation of NASA's paramount scientific developments and exemplifies the best of public service, scientific exploration and community engagement. To dismantle it under the guise of restructuring is to diminish the scientific accomplishments and ingenuity of American spaceflight and to abandon the communities that make these things possible.

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
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
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Park and Ride the Shuttle For the Labor Day Festival

One of the best kept secrets of the Labor Day Festival is that there is a free shuttle bus that runs



It can be tough to find parking at the Festival since the main parking lot is taken over by the booths and carnival rides, and the lower parking lot by the Aquatic & Fitness Center is mostly reserved for performers and others doing Festival business, with a few additional spaces reserved for festivalgoers with disabilities.

Residents of Greenbelt Station, as well as those coming into Greenbelt on the Metro, can catch the shuttle right there, and for others it is easy to park at GES (66 Ridge Road) or ERHS (7601 Hanover Parkway) and hop

on the shuttle bus as it comes by.

At the Festival, the bus stops near the Municipal

for the booths and rides. The shuttle bus service is provided by O'Brien Bus Service, and alternates between routes to pick up and drop off festivalgoers approximately every 45 minutes. Visit greenbeltlaborday.com/ shuttle-bus for start and end times each day.

For wheelchair users there is another option available on Friday, Saturday and Sunday: call Greenbelt Connection at 301-474-4100 by 3 p.m. on Friday, let them know you need a chair lift, what time you would like to go and when you want to be transported back home. The Greenbelt Labor Day Committee will pick up the tab so that you can ride free. Note that this is for wheelchair users only. Other transportation will be provided from shuttle locations.

Residents of Greenbelt: Register To Vote for the 2025 City Election

Greenbelt residents must be registered to vote to make their voice heard in the race for the seven seats on the Greenbelt City Council in this fall's city election.

This is the first city election in which noncitizen residents can vote, following a council vote in September 2024 to amend the city charter to allow it. Residents 16 and 17 years old may also vote thanks to a similar charter amendment passed in January

Residents who are U.S. citizens must be 16 or older and have lived within the incorporated city limits of Greenbelt for more than 30 days before the registration deadline of October 6. They can register for city elections by mailing the Maryland state voter registration form to the Prince George's County Board of Elections, or in person at the Board of Elections, offices of the Maryland Motor Vehicle Administration and several other state offices. Registration can also be



done online using Maryland's online voter registration system.

Residents who are already registered to vote in the state of Maryland do not need to re-register to vote in the city elections.

Noncitizen residents must be 16 or older and have lived in Greenbelt for at least 21 days before October 15, the deadline for noncitizen registration.

The City of Greenbelt provides its own voter registration form in English, Spanish and French (see greenbeltmd.gov/191/ Voter-Registration). Besides basic information, the form requires proof of residence which can be in the form of any federal, state or local government identification card such as a driver's license or even school ID with photo. Alternatively, residence in Greenbelt can be proven with documentation such as a copy of a lease or bank statement, or some form of government document that shows the resident's name and Greenbelt address.

If neither form of proof can be produced, applicants may submit an affidavit, which can be found at the bottom of the form, attesting to their residence in Greenbelt under penalty of perjury.

The coming election will occur on Tuesday, November 4, and registered voters may vote at any polling location in the city (see greenbeltmd.gov/179/ Election-Precincts), regardless of the precinct of residence.

Cipriano

Locals know the name Cipriano as a busy thoroughfare. Originally Telegraph Road, it was later renamed Cipriano Road to honor Pop, who built the original road using logs. Cipriano came to the area in 1910 and raised a family on a farm near Greenbelt. His presence and contributions to Greenbelt life were so beloved that he was named an honorary Greenbelt citizen in 1970, was honored by the Golden Age Club and featured at the groundbreaking for the new Greenbelt library. He died in 1974. Pop Cipriano was a regular fixture in Labor Day parades, known for his flower-covered cart that was drawn by his donkey. In 1972, he was honored as a Parade Marshal.
