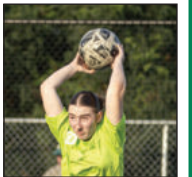

Trump Nullifies NASA Unions; GESTA Says Its Union is Strong

Just ahead of Labor Day, President Trump took aim at NASA and a handful of other federal agencies' unions, seeking to nullify them through Executive Order (EO). It comes at a time of mass layoffs and deferred resignations. The EO, signed August 28, represents "the largest rollback of labor protections for NASA's employees in

history," according to the NASA Goddard Space Flight Center (GSFC) advocacy group NASA Needs Help. The EO argues that collective bargaining agreements limit agencies' abilities to modify policies promptly and union bargaining "can delay the implementation of time-sensitive national

The dog days of summer are behind us and scorching days are giving way to the enjoyable warmth of early fall. Summer may have passed but take heart, the Farmers Market is still in full swing. Millennial Initiative, Historic Roots

Robert Goldberg-Strassler Named Greenbelt's 2025 Outstanding Citizen

Following a moment of silence for past City Manager James Giese and other past Outstanding Citizens who are no longer with us, Outstanding Citizen Committee Chair Robert Zugby drew out the suspense as long as possible before he introduced this year's Outstanding Citizen.

"One of the important characteristics of all our outstanding citizens is their role as exemplars for the rest of us – that we may be inspired to follow in their footsteps. Indeed, regarding this year's Outstanding Citizen, many of us have already been doing that," Zugby said, referring to his many accomplishments.

"Welcome to my worst nightmare," Goldberg-Strassler said when he got up to speak. In an interview he explained that as an introvert he doesn't like public speaking, and there he was, speaking to hundreds. That they were friends and neighbors didn't make it any easier.

For not being comfortable speaking publicly, Goldberg-Strassler's talk was inspirational. He read a thought-provoking statement from Amma, the Hugging Saint, which he carries with him

on an index card.

"May the tree of our lives be rooted in the soil of love, may good deeds be the leaves, kind words be the flowers and peace be the fruit. May the world flourish as one family, united in love. May we thus be able to create a world in which peace

and contentment prevail."

Goldberg-Strassler said, "Kindness is a verb, and it's relevant. Everyone can figure their own ways to do it."

Goldberg-Strassler listed several organizations and

Council Addresses Financial Scenarios, Admin Processes

At the Greenbelt City Council worksession on August 6, a draft of a staff letter to be included in the city's final budget book as well as in response to a Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) requirement was presented to council by City Manager Josué Salmerón. It specifies two possible five-year financial scenarios. Both acknowledge real estate taxes as being the city's highest income source, with all income sources increased by 1 to 6 percent. Yet, in the first scenario, the city's expenditures for the nine city departments were increased, while those in the second scenario were lowered.

Some of the factors assessed were: the cost of the new police union contract and the cost of the standard salary, as affected by cost-of-living and merit increases, and inflation.

A draft letter from council to residents was examined as well. It is a recap of the newly adopted Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 budget. It states that the budget is \$40.1M, with an increase of 5.6 percent from the FY 2025 budget, with no increase in the property tax

rate. Some of the highlights were maintaining of core city services; the continued funding and implementing of projects through use of \$22.88M in American Rescue Plan Act funds; a new four-year union agreement with the police department; drafting the Vision Zero Plan, which hopes to curtail traffic injuries and deaths; expanding EV infrastructure throughout the city; enhancing

A Little Prayer

A loving father (David Strathairn) grapples with how to protect his daughter-in-law (Jane Levy) when he discovers that his son is having an affair. A heart-tugging drama about finding kindred spirits in unexpected places, the film is a sensitive and searching portrait of a Southern family. “A movie about a family in deep disarray. But the writer-director, Angus MacLachlan, is not one to exploit turmoil. He understands that people in distress are deserving of our fullest understanding,” said critic Peter Rainer of Christian Science Monitor.

When all but one child from the same class mysteriously vanish on the same night at exactly the same time, a community is left questioning who or what is behind their disappearance. Said critic Bill Goodykoontz of the Arizona Republic, “This is definitely a horror movie, increasingly by the minute. Roger Milton Evans, age 84, died peacefully in his sleep on Monday, August 18, 2025 at Seasons Memory Care in San Antonio, Tex. Roger was born on January 27, 1941, in Wilkes-Barre, Pa. Yet the city Roger called home for much of his life was Greenbelt, where he grew up, met his late wife, Judith, and returned to live out his later years until he moved for health reasons. Roger lived a full and accomplished life rooted in service, innovation and faith.

Roger served honorably in the United States Navy from 1960 to 1964, specializing in communications. During the Cuban Missile Crisis, he was stationed near Cuba and played a pivotal role in identifying and reporting missile activity – a moment that underscored his dedication and sense of duty. Following his military service, Roger built a distinguished career in aerospace and defense. He contributed to the Apollo space flight systems while working with NASA, Lockheed and Vitro, and later oversaw the development and quality control of major defense initiatives, including the SOW, Tomahawk and Patriot missile systems.

In 2007, at a time when most people with two pensions would remain retired, Roger launched his own company – Evans Associates – employed a handful of qualified government contracting professionals and provided quality assurance, systems engineering and related services including preparing and establishing ISO and other certifications for companies seeking eligibility for NASA/DOD contracts.

Beyond his professional accomplishments, Roger was deeply devoted to his faith, family and community. He served as a deacon and Sunday school teacher at Greenbelt Baptist Church and found joy in simple passions – collecting coins and stamps and enjoying weekly fellowship with his ROMEOs (Rowdy Old Men Eating Out) Club.

Roger will be remembered for his sharp intellect, warm sense of humor, steadfast faith and deep love for his family. His legacy lives on in the lives he touched, the missions he supported and the memories his family will carry forward with pride.

Roger was predeceased by his parents, Milton Rutherford Evans Jr. and Dorothy Edna Rodgers, and by his wife, Judith Evans. He is survived by his sister, Donna Jean Evans (Edward Slivken); his son, Jack Evans (Nora); his daughter, Terri Jacobson (Jake); his son Edward Evans (Cindi); and his beloved grandchildren Blake, Clinton (Sharon), Jessica, Travis and Justin.

A memorial service will be held on Sunday, September 7 at 5 p.m. at Porter Loring Mortuary North, 2102 N. Loop 1604 E.,

San Antonio, TX 78232. Interment will follow on Monday, September 8 at 10:45 a.m. at Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery.

In lieu of flowers, the family requests donations be made to St. Jude Children’s Research Hospital or the Alzheimer’s Association, two causes close to Roger’s heart.

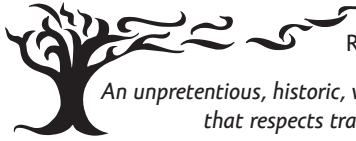

Great News: Non-Citizen Residents Can Vote in the 2025 Greenbelt City Council Election by Registering with the City Clerk!

Greenbelt residents are reminded that to participate in the 2025 City Council election - whether as a voter, a candidate for City Council, or a signer of a petition for a candidate - you must be registered to vote. U.S. citizens must be qualified and registered to vote in Prince George's County. Non-citizen residents of Greenbelt may also participate by registering to vote with the City Clerk or by accessing the non-citizen voter registration forms available on the City's website.

To register, you must:

- Be a citizen of the United States of America or Non-citizen of Greenbelt
- Be at least 16 years of age
- Be domiciled within the corporate limits of the City of Greenbelt as of the date of registration
- Have completed any court-ordered sentence of imprisonment, parole, or probation if convicted of a felony
- Not be under guardianship for mental disability

For information about registering to vote in Prince George's County, contact the County Board of Elections at (301) 430-8020 or visit www.elections.state.md.us. Forms for voter registration for non-citizens are available on the city website, Voter Registration | Greenbelt, MD.

All registration forms must be submitted by the deadlines: citizen voter forms to the Prince George's County Board of Elections in Upper Marlboro by 4:30 pm on Monday, October 6, and non-citizen voter forms to the Greenbelt City Clerk's Office by 4:30 pm on Wednesday, October 15.

In accordance with Section 14 of the City Charter, a regular election will be held in the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, on Tuesday, November 4, 2025, to elect the seven members of the City Council.

Any qualified voter of the City may be nominated for the office of Member of Council upon filing a nomination petition with the City Clerk (signed by not fewer than 50 Greenbelt resident voters), a written acceptance of the nomination, and other statements that are required by the City Charter or by law. Required forms and information are available at 25 Crescent Road, beginning Monday, August 18, from 8:30 am until 4:30 pm.

NOMINATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED FROM MONDAY, AUGUST 18 THROUGH MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 2025.

individuals that have inspired him. These include The SPACE Free Art for All, CHEARS and now Save BARC along with the late individuals Councilmember Ric Gordon, Kap Kapistan of Beltway Plaza owner Quantum Corporation and Michael Repole of Three Brothers restaurant.

At the end of his speech he led the audience in a sing-along of We Shall Overcome.

Mayor Emmett Jordan read a proclamation from the city that said, in part, “Robert Goldberg-Strassler is devoted to uplifting the community and safeguarding the essence that makes Greenbelt a truly exceptional place to call home.”

Attending the Opening Ceremonies were Maryland Legislative District 22 Delegation Senator Alonzo Washington and Delegates Anne Healey, Nicole Williams and Ashanti Martinez and Prince George’s County District 4 Councilmember Ingrid Watson. Washington and Watson each presented a proclamation.

Goldberg-Strassler has volunteered in many areas of the community, benefitting residents of all ages. He founded Random Unselfish Acts of Kindness (RUAK) in 2017.

In 2019 RUAK began sponsoring the HUG Walks (Help Unite Greenbelt With A Little Kindness). The RUAK website says, “[C]onceived as an antidote to the ongoing divisiveness and frayed social fabric being experienced in our country,” HUG Walks allow “a public demonstration of unity and community strength,” needed even more now than at its founding.

Environment

Goldberg-Strassler created the

He volunteered at a stream cleanup project for Springhill Lake Elementary third and fourth graders this spring.

Education and Literacy

RUAK’s Uplift Literacy program distributes books to children throughout Greenbelt. In October 2022 they began the bilingual Pre-K Story Hour at the Springhill Lake Recreation Center for children ages newborn to 5. RUAK was given the Jim Cassels Award in 2023 and used the money to support the story hour.

He used his volunteer time at Cookies on the Bridge to publicize, and encourage students to participate in, Learn 2 Earn, a youth workforce development program.

Food Insecurity

Goldberg-Strassler created the Flavors of Greenbelt Restaurant Week in 2022 to support local restaurants.

Greenbelt PORCH, built around the idea of a neighborhood food drive, is an all-volunteer hunger relief program that supplements the St. Hugh of Grenoble Church’s Food Pantry. Each participating neighborhood and GHI court has a coordinator. PAL – PORCH At Large – was

added later for Greenbelters who are interested in PORCH but lack a coordinator for their court or neighborhood.

As the city proclamation says, “Robert has embraced leadership roles with passion, serving as president and social action chair of the Mishkan Torah Congregation” and volunteering at Greenbelt’s monthly food distributions, the Red Cross and the National Park Service as

a youth sports coach and event organizer. What’s listed here probably misses some of his contributions to Greenbelt.

At the reception for Goldberg-Strassler and past Outstanding Citizens held in the municipal building after the award ceremony, Councilmember Kristen Weaver said, “Among your many skills you create great acronyms.”

Many are the traditions we participate in as Greenbelters: Labor Day, July 4th, Holiday Tree Lighting, among many.

But, there is another tradition that takes place on Ivy Lane at the Greenbelt Cemetery.

On a recent misty dawn, the City of Greenbelt Street Maintenance Crew, Frank Kellaher, Joe Mulhare and four team members gathered. Their charge: to prepare the burial site of life-long Greenbelt Henry Haslinger. The backhoe was warmed up and at the ready; its long arm and massive maw of a bucket carefully ate into the clay-dense earth. There were also hand tools: transfer shovels, a steel-rod poker, a tape measure – all at the ready and in use. Massive, gleaming dump trucks were staged for their part in this most noble activity.

As the excavation progressed, the team members were constantly checking and re-checking the width and depth of the site.

Team Lead Kellaher, a 38-year Public Works veteran, ran the backhoe, calling out instructions and receiving feedback from the team.

A nearby neighbor’s grave marker was briefly moved so as

to avoid any damage. Deep inside the dig, ancient, blackened oak slabs, from some long-ago purpose, have rotted their way into nature. A peaceful scene, a quiet reverence to the task at hand.

All that was left was the gathering: family, longtime friends and Father Walter Tappe of St. Hugh’s to render the blessing. A visit to Henry’s grave, just a few days later, presented a slight mound of earth, blanketed in straw and bathed in a gentle rain. The Streets Crew rose above and beyond all expectations. Now at rest: Good Night, Mr. Haslinger.

City Council Provides Public Comment on Closure of BARC

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) issued a memorandum outlining its plans for reorganizing the department on July 24. On August 25 the Greenbelt City Council provided public comment, setting out its concerns about the reorganization, including the closure of the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC), in a letter to Secretary of Agriculture Brooke Rollins. The letter outlines serious risks regarding the USDA reorganization plan’s framework. Council cited past relocations such as the 2019 move of the Economic Research Service and the National Institute of Food and Agriculture that resulted in a 75 percent reduction in employees. Council reminded the Secretary that BARC is not an office building but a world-class agricultural research facility encompassing specialized laboratories, greenhouses, experimental fields and infrastructure developed over decades. Suggesting that research can be easily shifted to new hubs ignores the fact of decades of place-based knowledge, local partnerships and investment.

collaborations that depend on geographic proximity, result in significant financial waste replacing BARC infrastructure elsewhere and undermine USDA’s global leadership in agriculture science and innovation. USDA communications to the public refer to five new regional hubs but internal communications suggest that BARC researchers are being reassigned to any of 95 Agricultural Research Service sites nationwide, indicating a lack of clarity and decision-making integrity. Finally, council stated their concern about the lack of legal clarity surrounding the reorganization. Council also noted that the July 24 memorandum does not cite specific statutory authority for the closure. Public Law 100-202 (1987) prohibits the disposal of BARC land without explicit congressional authorization, said council.

The letter concludes by stating that the reorganization plan proposes a fundamental shift in how the department operates, delivers services and supports research and that our community would be directly and negatively impacted by this closure.

Candidates Sought For Co-op Board

Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative (GCC) is seeking candidates willing to run for election to its board of directors. The Co-op will conduct the election at its annual meeting on Saturday, October 18 at 10:30 a.m. in the Community Center gym. Three board members will be elected to serve three-year terms. Incumbents Amy Drew, Kim Kash and Renee Harris are running for re-election. Members interested in serving as directors can pick up nomination forms at the Greenbelt Co-op Supermarket and Pharmacy customer service office.

To be considered, a member must: (1) have a minimum of \$100 in their member capital account and (2) submit both a brief biography and a completed nomination form which includes five signatures from other voting-eligible members by Tuesday, September 30. Return the completed form with bio to the customer service office or email it to board@greenbelt.coop. GCC does not accept nominations at the annual meeting.

Greenbelt Resident Named Oberlin, Ohio, City Manager

Greenbelt resident Greg Holcomb has been named the next city manager of Oberlin, Ohio. He was previously the Colmar Manor town administrator here in Prince George’s County.

Holcomb was named city manager at an August 18 Oberlin City Council meeting. The city has been without a manager for over a year and Holcomb’s appointment comes after a months-long search and public candidates’ forums.

Holcomb has lived in Greenbelt for nearly three years. He is a regular at local events, such as the Labor Day Festival, Green Man Festival and Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony. He may have been seen walking around the University Square Apartments with his dog Copper. He enjoyed attending trivia nights at the New Deal Café and going to the Greenbelt American Legion. Holcomb said that he “will miss how close-knit and welcoming the Greenbelt community is and walking Copper through the pathways in Old Greenbelt. Copper loves to chase the rabbits there.”

Self-renewing Prophecy

Over the years since its founding, the market has continued to thrive. Its founders have successfully passed the torch and the volunteer management team has evolved healthily over time – not dependent on the dogged support of one or two aging boosters, but recruiting generations of volunteers that self-replicate in the darkness of winter. Though none of the original members remain on the board, most remain local and are to be seen buying their veggies there every week.

Effective Management

The on-site management of the market has also evolved. Originally, the board members took turns as market manager but that proved unsustainable with the other duties as assigned, and the market is on its third successive and equally capable individual who has taken on this contract position, funded by vendor fees. A board member remains on call for each market if required. Market vendors have said that one of their reasons for continued attendance is how well it's run – standards remain high and discipline and orderliness prevail.

Though vendors do come and go, many come and stay for many years. Of over 30 vendors this year, some weekly and some alternating, more than a third have participated for almost the entire time.

Continued in-kind support from the city is also key. City public works staff reliably set up parking barrels and ensure sufficient trash receptacles and the Greenbelt Police Department maintains ongoing awareness and is prompt to respond to concerns.

A European Tradition

In visiting European cities, towns and villages, one becomes aware of each having its unique marketplace. They are usually located in the center of town, next to the main church and public buildings – with each town having its market day or days and selling the full gamut of fruit, vegetables, meats, fish and dairy products. Today's European outdoor markets still thrive and often involve large trailers with open sides that drop down revealing the treasures within. With refrigeration and running water, they are essentially portable stores. Europe's indoor markets offer the same artfully arranged and

tents are modular 10' squares, singly or up to three or four connected and held down by 24 pound weights at each corner to meet county specifications for safety in high winds. Vehicles are parked unromantically behind the tents. The food is arranged attractively but hardly gives the same sense of a bountiful cornucopia, like you might see in Paris or Lisbon. But there's still that essential free-flowing feel of openness and freshness. The vendors, returning year after year, are almost honorary Greenbelters (and some are actually Greenbelters) – and with ukelele bands and local entertainers with guitars and song, it's vibrant and down-home entertainment.

Friends and Family

One aspect of the market that does rival those of Europe, is that, like the agora of an ancient city, it is a place where people gather and encounter old friends and meet new people.

Even though the weather has lost the sparkle of spring, the market is the place to be on a Sunday morning. Buy lunch and sit on the grassy slope between it and the Community Center or pick up fresh bread and a cauliflower. It's arguably Greenbelt's freshest and most vibrant institution.

colorful displays, but may be located in fascinating historic buildings. For example, Barcelona's covered central market was designed by architect Antoni Gaudi and is a soaring and fanciful interior space.

Prosaic Greenbelt

security measures." "NASA develops and operates advanced air and space technologies, like satellite, communications and propulsion systems, that are critical for U.S. national security," it states. The latest move comes as the Trump administration seeks to make deep cuts to NASA, particularly the science budget, which is the primary funding source for

GSFC (see the July 17 issue).

Goddard Engineers, Scientists and Technicians Association (GESTA) President Tryshanda Moton and Executive Vice President Steven Hard called the order illegal. In a joint email on the day of the EO, they told members, "We expect management to ignore the collective bargaining agreement. However, we are

not finished. A union is not a contract, it's not a certificate of recognition, it's not a nonprofit. A union is a collective organization of workers – it's us, and we are still here." The union is now trying to determine how to operate while the EO is fought. Anticipating that the automatic payroll deduction of dues will be stopped, GESTA is calling on members to sign up and pay dues using an online platform operating outside the payroll system and to maintain communication and continue receiving union news by providing personal email addresses in addition to their government ones.

One civil servant at GSFC, whose name we are withholding, told the News Review that actions behind closed doors at Goddard are "mostly legal but heartless," while others fall in a gray area and some appear outright illegal. "We're not legal experts," he said of the engineers and scientists he works with, saying that's one of the difficulties they face in considering whistleblowing. He believes some recent actions are illegal, saying they are "crammed down the throats of our chain of command," and describes some recent actions as "very shady but very hard to report." "They've done away with written orders," he says of NASA's administration.

Even without a recognized collective bargaining agreement, GESTA says they can continue to be a union, and they plan to continue to support and advise employees, including with filing various claims, requests and grievances; fighting discrimination and defending workers; objecting to management mistakes; and agitating for change. "We are strong, we are many and we can still organize," they assured members in Thursday's email.

GESTA staffed a Save NASA booth at Greenbelt's Labor Day Festival Information Day on Saturday, asking everyone to help advocate for NASA's future.

the city's revenue opportunities, including looking into ways to fully cover waste collection and refuse costs; and the possible creation of a city circulator bus service with an established route (to ride the existing Greenbelt Connection bus one must call in advance to arrange for pickup).

Both letters are currently being further developed by staff for later presentation to council.

It was noted by all that the potential redevelopment of Beltway Plaza, with its addition of housing units and recreation space, will possibly require an increase in police and recreation staff.

Salmerón stated that work needs to be done to bring in more business and industry to the city. Investment in incubators and office parks was suggested.

Advisory Boards

There was a lengthy discussion on the city's advisory boards and committees, specifically around appointments, reappointments and attendance. This was a follow-up to the meeting on June 9 when feedback from these groups was gathered in an effort to increase the efficiency of these entities. Councilmember Danielle McKinney offered a comprehensive summation of the ideas and recommendations examined at this meeting.

Concerning eligibility and terms of service, it was posited that board members submit a new statement of intent when their

term of service has come to an end, and that board and committee chairs be given the chance to weigh in on a reappointment to ensure that the member has performed their duties responsibly.

A possible central tracking system for attendance was put forth. Attendance in general was an important topic, as it is essential to the proper workings of these boards. It was acknowledged that there were instances where lack of attendance should be excused due to unexpected life situations.

The application process was examined, with some of the major recommendations being greater detail requested on the forms; the creation of a more efficient and clear process on application submission and review by staff and council; and, the important and encouraged step of an applicant attending a board meeting prior to the council interview.

With regard to reappointments, some of the recommendations were a 60-day prior notice by the city clerk to board members nearing the end of their term and a review by board chairs of reappointments 30 days before the end of term.

Some refinements to the application form and interview questions sought to gather deeper insight into an applicant's intent, relevant experience and their thoughts on how a board could better serve the city.

Man Arrested and Charged In Killing of Greenbelt Man

The Prince George's County Police Department (PGPD) has made an arrest and charged a man with the fatal shooting of 33-year-old Greenbelter William Denard Askew in late July. On July 25 at approximately 10:20 p.m., officers responded to a shooting in the 13200 block of Laurel Bowie Road in the unincorporated section of Laurel. They located Askew in the roadway near the shooting scene, suffering from gunshot wounds. He died on the scene (see the August 7 issue).

On Friday, August 29, county police announced the arrest of 48-year-old James King IV of Laurel, who is charged with Askew's murder.

It is not yet known whether King and Askew knew each other and the motive for the shooting remains under investigation.

King is charged with first- and second-degree murder and related charges. He is in the custody of the Department of Corrections on a no-bond status.

It was noted that vacancies on boards can be infrequent, often resulting in applicants having to wait months, if not years, for an opportunity to serve. Salmerón offered the idea of a 60-day update to applicants.

All stated that there needs to be greater transparency concerning the application process and expectations for service on these boards in order to increase recruitment. The recommendations discussed will be brought before council in a future meeting for possible codification.

Tracking Petitions & Requests
Mayor Emmett Jordan felt that it was important that any petitions and requests to the city be properly recorded and tracked as to their status. McKinney said that there is such a record on the city's SharePoint site. Councilmember Kristen Weaver said that there is paid software available that can enhance a city's ability to log and track these queries. Council decided to create a sign-in list for petitions at meetings to more efficiently present them.

Stakeholder Meetings
Jordan stated his desire to better reach out to the city's stakeholders, noting that in some cases, years have transpired between meetings. He was keen on meeting with Greenbelt Homes, Inc. and the city's HOAs. He added that some of these stakeholders do not wish for a face-to-face meeting.


Concerning the disagreement over the meeting with the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission at the August 4 meeting (see the August 21 issue), council reiterated its wish to be given advance notice of such requests in order to participate if desired.

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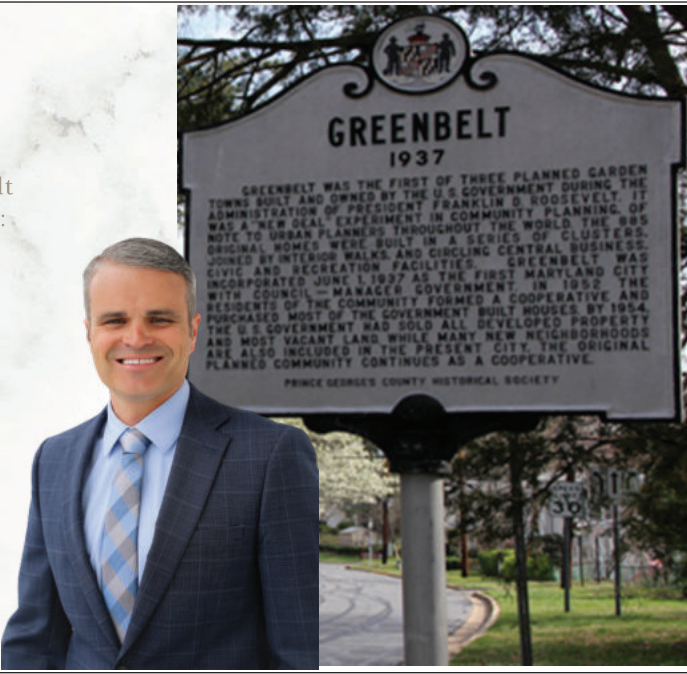
