
American, if elected Fritz would be Greenbelt's first city councilmember of Asian descent.


Fritz is running to prioritize improving our quality of life




# Council Advances Potential Plans For Annexation of Federal Land

On September 24, Greenbelt City Council took its first concrete step toward a potential annexation of portions of large, neighboring federal properties, approving funds and survey work that supporters say will help the city protect green space and gain leverage if the land's status ever changes. The ordinance for a \$70,000 supplemental appropriation to the general fund to cover survey costs and legal fees was introduced for both first and, via a suspension of the rules, second reading at the meeting, and passed 6 to 1.

#### Survey Work and **Target Areas**

The supplemental appropriation authorized hiring Charles P. Johnson & Associates to map legal bound-

aries, known as metes and bounds, for two target areas contiguous to the city's boundaries, tied largely to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC). Those areas, referred to as Area 1 and Area 2, cover land near the WMATA rail yard and within portions of BARC, and are part of roughly 2,215 acres under discussion across three potential annexation zones. A third area, focused more heavily on Goddard Space Flight Center property, was set aside for now.

The survey work for the two areas of BARC will generate the legal descriptions and

# Ranked Choice Proposition Now on November City Ballot

This November, Greenbelters will cast their votes to decide whether ranked choice voting the process of ranking candidates based on preference - will be adopted for future city elections.

Over the summer, Maryland has seen "incredible momentum," when it comes to ranked choice voting, according to the advocacy group FairVote. City councils in Rockville and Annapolis have held recent hearings on the issue and could join Greenbelt in putting ranked choice before their voters.

Greenbelt's current election system, known as plurality voting, allows voters to select up to seven candidates for city council without having to make any distinction in terms of their prefer-

ers will sometimes exclude their less-preferred candidates on the ballot to "bullet vote" in order to give an advantage to their favorite candidate. Under ranked choice voting, more emphasis is placed on ordering the candidates based on preference. Such preference is important in Greenbelt, where traditionally the highest vote-getter becomes mayor.

Nicole Shyong, City of Greenbelt Elections Board member, shared the wording of the question that will appear on voters' ballots.

"Do you approve of the City

using Ranked Choice Voting for all City Council Member elections and amending the City Charter's forty percent (40 percent) threshold criteria (Sec 31)?"

Currently candidates must reach a 40 percent threshold, a number set by the city to make sure they have broad support, says Shyong. Under ranked choice voting, the threshold to be elected is dependent on the number of available seats. Since there are seven seats on council the threshold will become





I'm a member of the Greenbelt Cinema and have learned to trust Dr. McGrath's judgment on movies that I otherwise would not have seen ... keep it up. I've also watched her and the crew climbing the ladder to change the sign. The present system is absurdly unsafe and if we must change the "snap in" sign, digital is probably inevitable.

That said, I agree with the three people who signed the letter raising the issue. I want the original look and feel (and light levels) to remain. Dr. McGrath says the new marquee can "mimic exactly the typeface, color and lighting levels" of the existing sign. Assuming that this is an LED or plasma sign, I suggest the following:



**Great News: Non-Citizen Residents Can Vote in the 2025 Greenbelt** City Council Election by Registering with the City Clerk!

Greenbelt residents are reminded that to participate in the 2025 City Council election - whether as a voter, a candidate for City Council, or a signer of a petition for a candidate - you must be registered to vote. U.S. citizens must be qualified and registered to vote in Prince George's County. Non-citizen residents of Greenbelt may also participate by registering to vote with the City Clerk or by accessing the non-citizen voter registration forms available on the City's website.

#### To register, you must:

- Be a citizen of the United States of America or Non-citizen of Greenbelt
- Be domiciled within the corporate limits of the City of Greenbelt as of the date of registration
- · Have completed any court-ordered sentence of imprisonment, parole, or probation if convicted of a felony
- · Not be under guardianship for mental disability

All registration forms must be submitted by the deadlines: citizen voter forms to the Prince George's County Board of Elections in Upper Marlboro by 4:30 pm on Monday, October 6, and non-citizen voter forms to the Greenbelt City Clerk's Office by 4:30 pm on Wednesday, October 15.

by emphasizing steps to make Greenbelt a more affordable and inclusive city. Their platform focuses on supporting federal and local workers, holding landlords accountable for code and lease violations, capping rent increases to 3 percent or the rate of inflation, enhancing bus, bike and pedestrian transportation options, and protecting our immigrant and LGBTQ+ neighbors.

Fritz has worked on numerous electoral campaigns in Maryland and in the labor movement including with unions such as the United Food and Commercial Workers and UNITE HERE! Fritz has also served as the chair of the Montgomery and Prince George's County Branches of the Metro D.C. Democratic Socialists of America (DSA), organizing members in fights to repeal tax giveaways for country clubs, for reproductive justice and for historic rent stabilization legislation to give tenants deeply needed relief in the wake of Covid-19.

An avid history nerd, Fritz was drawn to the rich New Deal and cooperative history of Greenbelt and organized several tours to the city's museum with friends in 2019 and gave a lecture on the history of Greenbelt in 2021. University of Maryland's Academy for Excellence in Local Governance, adding to his training in municipal leadership.

Jordan's time as mayor has emphasized local economic sustainability, improved city infrastructure and environmental initiatives. Thanks in large part to his advocacy, Greenbelt added a grant writer and economic development staff to its team. These new roles help the city remain resilient and adaptable as it faces ongoing economic challenges.

As the Covid-19 pandemic receded, Jordan led council in allocating American Rescue Plan Act federal relief funds. This money was used to fund more than 60 local projects, providing assistance for residents and small businesses and improving infrastructure, public safety and social services. Several programs focused on workforce development and improvements to Schrom Hills Park and Braden Field are soon to be completed.

Beyond Greenbelt, Jordan's public service extends nationally. He serves on the board of directors of the National League of Cities, the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments and the Maryland Municipal League. His advocacy in these organizations centers on issues such as housing, transportation and economic development, giving Greenbelt a voice in wider policy conversations. Locally, he supports many Greenbelt organizations and serves on the board of CCI Health Services.

Jordan also has more than 30 years of experience in nonprofit leadership, marketing and capacity-building strategy. His professional background includes positions with the Smithsonian Institution, the University of Maryland and the United Negro College

Jordan is known for his hands-on leadership and commitment to making decisions based on evidence and input from others. Away from city hall, he enjoys tennis, cycling and supporting Greenbelt's vibrant arts community. He remains dedicated to keeping Greenbelt a city where collaboration and practical problem-solving benefit every resident.

# Low Teenage Voting Here Gets Boost with Registration Help


In January 2018, Greenbelt lowered its voting age for municipal elections to 16. However, during the last city election, in 2023, Greenbelt had only two voters under the age of 18 turn up at the polls.

In an effort to increase awareness of their right to vote, local teen and Eleanor Roosevelt High School student Emerson Gary is spearheading a teen voter registration effort. It's a topic she feels passionate about and has dedicated her Girl Scout Gold Award to voter registration and teen voting awareness. "I want to get the word out on teen voting," says Gary.

Over recent weeks Gary has met with local groups, created flyers and

is letting her peers know they can register to vote. She will have a voter information table at next week's Candidate Forum at the Greenbelt Firehouse, which is co-hosted by the Greenbelt News Review and Greenbelt Access Television.

When asked why teens aren't voting Gary said, "People don't really know about it. ... The only reason I knew is because my mom is an election judge and on Greenbelt's Board of Elections. She told me and I was like 'Why aren't people voting?"

Maryland is one of only two states with municipalities that allow teen voting for all local elections. According to the National

Youth Rights Association, eight

Maryland towns have implemented teen voting for local elections: Greenbelt, Hyattsville, Riverdale Park, Takoma Park, Cheverly, Somerset (the town, not the county), Chevy Chase and Mount Rainier. Vermont is the other state that allows teen voting for all elections, in the town of Brattleboro.

The deadline to register to vote in the upcoming Greenbelt election is Monday, October 6. Sixteen and 17-year-olds who will be eligible to vote in county, state and federal elections at age 18 should use the Maryland State Voter Registration Form, as Maryland allows 16-year-olds to pre-register to vote using this form. Voter registration forms can be found at greenbeltmd.gov/175/ Election-Information.

math and science, and since 2013 has worked as an outreach specialist at Goddard Space Flight Center, currently with Science Systems and Applications, Inc. She has lived in Greenbelt since

Weaver has advocated for reducing Greenbelt's carbon footprint through electrification of the city fleet and providing for additional public EV charging infrastructure. She is also eager to implement the Save As You Throw by-the-bag pricing, which will incentivize reduced trash generation, saving on tipping fees while promoting environmentally sustainable behaviors. Weaver has served as Greenbelt's representative on the regional Transportation Planning Board, as well as the National League of Cities' Transportation and Infrastructure Services committee, and looks to bring that experience to local projects.

Council approved the Buddy Attick Master Plan in May, and next steps are gradual implementation of that plan as well as developing a broader plan to address the disparity in amenities across Greenbelt's neighborhoods. A start is the 20,000+-squarefoot indoor recreation space promised to the city with the Beltway Plaza redevelopment, and eventually the possibility of making the Dora Kennedy building a Greenbelt West community center.

Weaver supports efforts to increase voter engagement, including the recently implemented all-resident voting, and further ideas such as this year's advisory referendum on ranked choice voting and mailing ballots to all voters in future elections, while still allowing in-person voting.

We face economic and social disruption caused by the haphazard and cruel policies of the current federal administration, which will bring new challenges to Greenbelt and surrounding communities. If re-elected, Weaver will work to enact policies to provide as much support as possible for all our residents. She hopes to continue to be part of bringing neighborhoods together and building a stronger sense of community for all city residents.

divided by number of seats +1).

Elections Board President Steven Gilbert explained that to tabulate votes, the top choices of each voter are compared to this threshold, and if a candidate reaches the threshold, they would be elected. And the cycle continues where the votes are redistributed to the other candidates to determine more winners.

#### **Voter Thoughts**

Two residents, Glenda Banks and Lisa L., were not aware that ranked choice voting was a ballot proposition, even though they both plan to vote in the November election. However, Lisa L., a social worker, would vote in favor of ranked choice voting and thinks the idea of it being the norm in Greenbelt is exciting.

"I think ... it'll be more work for people to organize it on the back end, but I think it'll be a really nice opportunity for the people," Lisa said. "It'll refine the results because people can identify a second candidate or a third, instead of just all or noth-

Celieah Barlow, a physical therapy assistant, also likes the idea of ranked choice voting, citing that in local politics a lot of the time people don't vote or are uninformed of who's on the

"Being able to rank ... I think it would at least help get more input as to what the people who are voting are thinking about each of these candidates," Barlow said.

Another resident, Sandra Roberts, is also in support of ranked choice voting, but is concerned about certain downfalls - like it potentially being difficult to count

"It would be okay with me to have our city elections [be] ranked choice voting, as an experiment to see how well it works," Roberts said. "It sounds like it might be complicated, but it might not."

#### Voter Education

Steps have already been taken to help Greenbelt residents further understand ranked choice voting.

In a June 18 worksession for

12.5 percent (number of votes the Greenbelt City Council, Shyong put together a presentation for council to understand whether or not it was appropriate for ranked choice voting to be added to the ballot this year. Shyong created her presentation with the hope that residents could also use it as a reference when posted online with the meeting agenda and minutes.

> Councilmember Kristen Weaver organized a ranked choice voting demonstration with ice cream flavors at the city council booth at Labor Day Information Day. In a video posted to Facebook, she explains the process, as illustrated by Greenbelters ranking their favorite ice cream flavors.

Weaver collected 64 ballots and found that there were some spoiled ballots, indicating that more community outreach may be necessary

The results were determined by utilizing a threshold modeled after the city council election, using the 12.5 percent threshold. It was calculated by taking 100 percent divided by the seven city council seats plus one. The number of ballots was multiplied by this threshold to determine the minimum number of votes needed for a flavor to be considered a winner. After each winner was selected, other votes were then redistributed to other flavors to select a new winner in the next round. Ranked choice winners in Weaver's ice cream election in order of election were: mint chocolate chip, chocolate, mango, cookie dough, coffee, vanilla and rocky road. Results using the current system with the 40 percent threshold would have been: vanilla (75 percent), chocolate (72 percent), coffee, cookie dough and mint chocolate chip all with 64 percent and lemon and rocky road with 61 percent.

"This is a bit of a different system for people to get used to," Weaver said in the video. If the city decides to adopt this method for future elections, there will be a lot of education and outreach conducted to make sure everyone understands how it works.'

The deadline to register to vote in the upcoming city election is Monday, October 6. All residents who are 16 years of age or older and have lived within the city limits for more than 30 days can vote in the upcoming election. 

# Beating the Drums for Breast Cancer Awareness Fills Center

Part of the large group that came together for the Let's Beat Breast Cancer Rally on September 13

What do Drumming for Wellness, D.C. Warrior's Drumline and Ruff Ridaz all have in common? These talented musicians, along with breast cancer survivors and supporters, teamed up to make some noise Saturday, September 13 at the Let's Beat Breast Cancer Rally in Greenbelt's Roosevelt Center. Attendees were welcomed by Mayor Emmett Jordan, who proclaimed September 13 Let's Beat Breast Cancer Day. A second warm welcome was delivered by former mayor J Davis, who shared a heartwarming message and her encouragement as a breast cancer survivor. She talked about how options to prevent and treat breast cancer have improved compared to 40 years ago when she had two extensive surgeries in a short time. The National Cancer Institute reports that one in eight women born in the U.S. today will develop breast cancer, and, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Black women have a disproportionately high breast cancer death

Studies show that eating vegetables, fruits and soy products, as well as increased fiber intake, are associated with reduced risk of post-menopausal breast cancer. In addition, the National Cancer Institute, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, American Institute for Cancer Research and other authorities have determined that individuals may reduce their risk of breast cancer incidence and/or mortality by maintaining a healthy body weight, limiting alcohol intake and having regular physical activity.

The rally was action-packed, with Katy Gaughan of Greenbelt and Drumming for Wellness delivering their magical drum beats. Before long everyone was led in a chant of the campaign's fourpronged approach. Eat Plants, drum, drum - Exercise, drum, drum - Limit alcohol, drum, drum - Maintain a healthy weight drum drum! Webster Phillips and the D.C. Warriors were next on stage with their eye-catching blue, white and black uniforms. The young drummers delighted the crowd with their lively drum performance along with an accompanying girls dance group to boot.

Special guest eight-year breast cancer survivor Jenny Lazaro told her poignant story of reclaiming her health. After breast cancer surgery, Lazaro adopted a plant-

based lifestyle and hasn't looked back. Her husband and family jumped right in and also started plant-based eating. Lazaro now assists as a sous chef with her husband Geraldo, a Certified Food for Life Instructor who teaches in both English and Spanish. Food for Life is a nutrition education program created by the Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine that teaches plant-based eating to help prevent and reverse chronic diseases.

The crowd also heard an uplifting message and prudent reminder about mammograms from Dr. Regina Hampton, breast surgeon at Luminis Doctors Hospital. Hampton shared her hope that all new breast cancers are "found early, at stage zero or stage one." Finding a breast cancer that early makes treatment much simpler and now comes with excellent survival rates. She also did a big shout-out for people with cancer to "fully live their lives" and encouraged everyone to adopt the four-pronged approach.

The last musical performance was by George Wilkins and the talented Ruff Ridaz Performance Percussion Squad from Washington, D.C. The drummers played their music as they moved about the stage captivating the crowd, who showed their delight with a big round of applause.

Rally organizer Geraldine Adams, RN, invited everyone to visit the resource tables with breast cancer and lifestyle information from the Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine, the rally sponsor. The Physicians Committee is a Washington, D.C.-based nonprofit health, research and advocacy organization dedicated to advancing human and animal health, and educating the public about the benefits of plant-based nutrition. Founder and President Neal Barnard, M.D., in collaboration with breast surgeon and author Dr. Kristi Funk developed the Let's Beat Breast Cancer campaign.

Other groups represented included Food for Life, CHEARS Three Sisters Gardens, Greenbelt Recreation, Greenbelt Grows and Hope Connections. The day concluded with a delicious lunch prepared especially for Let's Beat Breast Cancer Day. Chef Alisa Plaza of Sunrise Caribbean Restaurant cooked up a delicious crowd-pleasing vegan stir-fry. To make it even sweeter, Mel Butz,

samples of her delicious cookies


and brownies.



boundary maps that the city needs before it can draft an annexation resolution. These documents will formally define which parcels could fall under city jurisdiction and outline the groundwork for later steps, such as public notices and hearings. Council approved contracts for the first two areas at a combined cost of about \$36,000.

#### Purpose, Impact

"It's about protecting the Green Belt. It's about protecting the green space, and it's what we can do," Mayor Emmett Jordan said, referring to a long-held community desire to protect the green space north of the city. He added that although the city does not have zoning or land-use authority over federal property, annexation would give Greenbelt "a seat at the table" and a chance to weigh in if the land's ownership ever changed.

Jordan and city staff emphasized that annexation would not transfer ownership. "Annexation simply brings the property into the municipal corporate limits of the city," City Manager Josué Salmerón said. He explained that while the land would remain federally owned, a change in ownership would make it subject to city codes and local regulations.

Supporters on council say the move could strengthen Greenbelt's voice in future land-use discussions involving nearby federal properties. They note that the BARC and Goddard campuses are among the largest undeveloped tracts next to the city, and argue that any change in their status could significantly shape how the surrounding area develops.

#### **Development vs. Preservation**

Councilmember Rodney Roberts cast the lone no vote and delivered a lengthy critique, arguing annexing portions of the city and neighboring jurisdictions aims

to facilitate development instead of preservation. Roberts also objected to spending money on consultants. "We are a city that is facing multimillion-dollar budget deficits ... we need to get our fiscal house in order," he said.

"This is not about land preservation," Roberts said. "This is going to make it easier for developers to develop BARC. College Park and others want to annex large portions of BARC for tax revenue. I want it preserved, and that's why I'm voting against this." On September 9, the City of College Park held a worksession on annexation options for that city, and on September 11, it published a series of annexation options for the city, including one potential annexation option closely aligned to the area Greenbelt is considering.

Several councilmembers pushed back on the suggestion from resident Michael Hartman that the city's influence would be negligible even after annexation. They cited recent examples inside city limits where, despite county control of zoning, Greenbelt shaped major projects, including commitments for indoor recreation space at Beltway Plaza and design elements at Greenbelt Station.

Responding to resident and current city council candidate Bill Orleans' objections to pushing through a second reading without public comment, Jordan said, "Greenbelt has learned the hard way in discussing potential annexation." Neighboring municipalities also have aspirations for annexation. There will be "plenty of opportunities for the public to weigh in," in the process, said Jordan.

#### Next Steps

Staff outlined a multistep process that must occur before any annexation can move forward. The first step is completing de-

tailed land surveys and legal descriptions for Areas 1 and 2 — work that Salmerón said will take three to four months. Those documents are required before the city can draft an annexation resolution and begin the formal approval process.

Once a draft resolution is prepared, the city would need to issue formal public notices and release a municipal services and fiscal impact plan as required by state law. At least one public hearing would follow, and residents would retain the right to petition against the proposal.

City officials stressed that these next steps are procedural and do not commit Greenbelt to annexation. Instead, they represent the legal framework the city must complete before the council could vote on whether to incorporate any of the federal land into its boundaries.

Supporting councilmembers framed Monday's votes as positioning rather than a done deal. "It puts us in a position where we can take action," Jordan said. "But it's not actually doing the annexation. It's preparing everything, so we're in position to do something quickly, if it's the council and the public's will."

# Greenbelt Man Charged With Assaulting Officers

On September 24, a National Security Agency (NSA) police officer, stationed at a checkpoint, observed a vehicle approach the NSA campus in Fort Meade and drive through the checkpoint without presenting the appropriate credentials required to enter the protected property. According to the U.S. Attorney's Office, District of Maryland, the vehicle was operated by 23-year-old Amir Phillip Wilson of Greenbelt.

Eventually, law enforcement attempted to stop Wilson, but he accelerated to upward of 40 to 50 miles an hour in an attempt to evade the officers, said the U.S. Attorney's Office. During the pursuit, Wilson's vehicle struck two marked NSA police vehicles

responding to the scene, injuring one of the officers, it reports. Upon hitting the second police vehicle at a high rate of speed, Wilson's vehicle careened into a concrete retaining wall, where it came to a stop, said the U.S. Attorney's Office. Law enforcement then took Wilson into custody.

Wilson is now charged with assaulting federal law enforcement officers and was scheduled to appear for a detention hearing on Wednesday, October 1. Previous Maryland court records list Wilson's address as Springhill Lane, Greenbelt.

### Annual Basketball Match at SHLRC



# Information Day Offers Something for Everyone

There is always so much to do at the Labor Day Festival, all happening at once so that no one can possibly do everything. For anyone who missed the Festival's Saturday Information Day booths, here is a brief description of some of the 54 organizations that participated. Religious and commercial booths were intentionally omitted here.

Each booth had such ardent volunteers and supporters that it was sometimes hard to move on to the next. No surprise to Greenbelters - either there were many honorary Greenbelters at work or the volunteer spirit rubbed off on visitors.

I visited these social and activist groups before going on duty myself in the News Review

At NASA Needs Help, an anonymous Goddard engineer and Kyle Helson said the agency is not just about space. Data from their science research "is shared within 24 to 48 hours of availability," something that wouldn't happen that fast, or at all, if produced by a corporation. They urged calling Congress to support

At Save BARC, Jane Young and Susan Barnett advertised the extended deadline for public comment to the U.S. Department of Agriculture on the proposed closure, which had been extended to September 30. To get on Save BARC's mailing list email savebarc@gmail.com.

Nick Orrick has been in the Sierra Club for 50 years. He and Martha Ainsworth, chair of the Maryland Chapter's Zero Waste Committee, talked about reintroducing the Maryland Bottle Bill in the Maryland General Assembly, toward increasing Maryland's

recycling rate from 25 to 90 percent. The bill would enable bringing recyclable glass, plastic and aluminum containers to stores with reverse vending machines and get the deposit back, or continue to recycle curbside.

Chesapeake Climate Action Network (CCAN) Central Maryland Coordinator Beth Landry said "there is nothing else if you have no place to exist." The organization is

working on legislation for education on building electrification.

Liquin Cao and Jessica Fomalont said the goal of United Poultry Concerns is to ensure respect and compassionate treatment of poultry and domestic

At Moms Demand Action, Rachel Alexander and Edith Beauchamp said the organization supports restricted access to and safe storage of guns and learning how to ask questions about guns, such as when a child visits a friend's house.

Jill Vanderweit of Greenbelt Toastmasters said the benefits of membership are surprising. The



# Greenbelt Recognizes Peace Day

Greenbelters and other local residents held three events September 20 and 21 recognizing September 21's United Nations International Day of Peace. The events contained unexpected cross-connections.

#### **Rotary Peace Day Event**

The Greenbelt Rotary Club hosted speakers from local Rotary clubs and faith communities at Buddy Attick Park on Saturday, September 20. Building peace is at the core of the Rotary's humanitarian mission to address root causes of conflict, including disease, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, education and literacy, economic development and protecting the environment.

Farinaz Firouzi of the Greenbelt Bahá'í Community described the Bahá'í belief that peace is built on individual spiritual foundations, not government actions. External conflicts reflect inner turmoil and prejudices, while purifying inner hearts and thoughts builds external peace. She said peace is a continuous process of listening with an open heart, seeing the world with compassion, propagating kindness and building justice and unity for one human family, not for competing groups. She described opposing thoughts of war with stronger thoughts of peace, destroying thoughts of hatred with more powerful thoughts of love and believing we can change the structure of our society from the ground up.

Poet and Rockville Rotary Club president Ukpeme Akpan Okon read a poem expressing that small and large actions add up to make peace possible. Noting small waves rippling across Greenbelt Lake, she described individual and collective acts of kindness and respectfulness to ourselves, families, friends and coworkers propagating peace outward.

Joe Parks of Soka Gakkai International Buddhism read his poem based on the Buddhist principle that "evil is that which provokes good, so when great evil has swept through the land, great good will surely follow." "And so, we the people will always prevail simply whenever we refuse the lies ... All that we must do is to remain true to each other and refuse to repeat the lies, and eventually, everyone including the politicians, will become wise."

Chuck Woolery of Rockville Rotary distilled his message to 10 words: "Keep people and nature healthy" and "Don't believe everything you think." He said, "It's not about governments, it's about us," and "Īt's not 'America First' but 'We the People First,' our inalienable rights, because taking care of nature and of people will get us on the path to peace."

Nelson Gibson, advisor to the Rotary-chartered Boy Scouts of America co-ed Greenbelt Venture Crew 764, said that in teaching scouts how to prepare for life, two of the Scout Law's 12 points relate to peace: being courteous and kind.

After Greenbelt Rotary President Jennifer Dudley invited attendees to visit the Greenbelt Rotary Club meeting Thursdays at 8 a.m. at the Greenway Center IHOP restaurant, participants engaged in a short dance party before the afternoon's downpour.

monthly Community Gathering hosted by the Greenbelt Bahá'í Community and Greenbelt Rotary, participants seated in a circle offered their thoughts on peace, indoors at the Community Center during the downpour.

Bill Orleans said Woolery's suggestion to not believe what we think, reminded him to reflect more on why we believe what we think we believe. He said since we tend to believe that what we think is the way things should be, being kind isn't enough. We need to question ourselves and others to achieve deeper understanding,

After the next speaker acknowledged the challenge in being open to perspectives they don't agree with, Lucy Silver suggested that attaining peace doesn't require agreeing with someone with different ideas. "Before trying to convince them to agree with what I agree with, we should step back to what we agree everyone should have: to feel safe, feel fulfilled, to have a home, be able to raise children and feel joy. Then you can start talking with that person to build a relationship. Then you can foster some kind of respect, and maybe once you have their respect, you can ask them about A, B, C, D that you believe -'tell me more about that so I can understand why you believe that?' And then maybe they ask you the same question. That's what I feel we can do to advance world peace."

#### **Sing For Unity**

On Sunday, September 21, Roosevelt Center was one location in the worldwide Sing for Unity initiative, promoting peace, community and equality by encouraging people to sing together at 2 p.m. in their local time. This global event included 20 countries, 176 cities, 183 choirs or events and over 10,000 people gathering to sing and create a worldwide "soundwave of hope."

Organizer Amy Murray-Kraft opened the Greenbelt event by saying "Together we can raise our voices to promote unity, community and peace across the globe. It is our sincere hope that this event will not only lift your spirits, but inspire you to act in meaningful ways to spread peace whenever and wherever you can."

Greenbelt Peace and Justice Singers, with the Rapid Response Choir, performed 13 songs, accompanied by the audience. According to its website, the Rapid Response Choir of Maryland and Washington, D.C. formed in early 2025 to sing for truth, justice and democracy.

Songs came from composers as diverse as Pete Seeger (If I Had a Hammer) to Danish choir director and Sing for Unity founder Vibe Ulbrandt (Sing for Unity) to South African Bishop Desmond Tutu (Goodness Is Stronger than Evil). Ann Dunn told the News Review she came "Because I don't want to feel alone and this music helps me feel not alone."

Participants at all three events demonstrated this year's International Day of Peace theme Act Now for a Peaceful World, in support of which the U.N. encourages "Let[ting] our actions for peace resonate louder than
