Greenbelt Anticipates Return Of Career Firefighters in February

This month Berwyn Heights Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad will be fully staffed with career firefighters for the first time since they were pulled on June 30, 2024. City officials now anticipate Greenbelt will also celebrate the return of career firefighters, likely in February.

“Fire and EMS services remain a top priority for the City of Greenbelt. Since the staffing announcement earlier in 2024, we have continued to advocate for the restoration of full staffing at our local fire stations to ensure timely and reliable emergency response for all residents,” City Manager Josué Salmerón told the News Review. “Following my recent meeting with senior leadership at Prince George’s County Fire/

Increased Need, Stopped SNAP Benefits, Food Cuts Hit Greenbelt

In Greenbelt, a community food distribution by the Greenbelt Assistance in Living Program (GAIL), in conjunction with the nonprofit Shabach! Ministries on October 16, had a turnout that encompassed three car lines and traffic that stretched along Crescent Road with hundreds of people. This was representative of the community’s current need, said Greenbelt resident Robert Goldberg-Strassler, who launched a nonprofit to fight hunger.

“I’ve never seen a line that long ever, in fact, it’s typically one line,” Goldberg-Strassler said. The current government shutdown, during which many federal workers are unpaid, has now surpassed 40 days, making it the longest in history.

SNAP benefits officially expired on November 1 because of

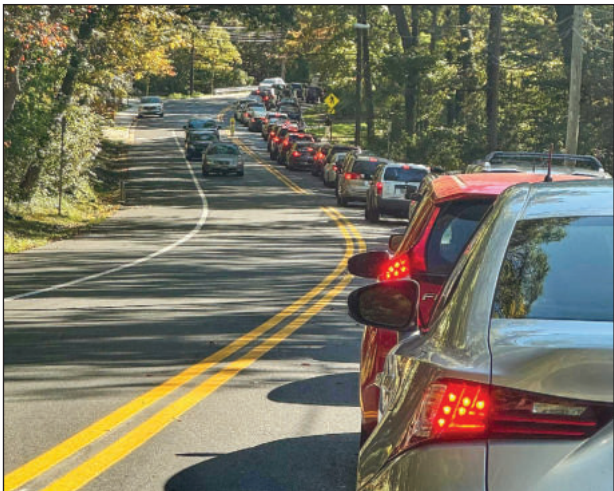

Department of Human Services.

The increased need comes at a time when GAIL, which provides a monthly food distribution in Greenbelt, is bracing for less food from the Capital Area Food Bank. “The Mobile Market Program, as we have known it, will discontinue in December,” said Christal Batey, the assistant director of GAIL. Starting in January, GAIL will no longer operate as one of the food bank’s

mobile market sites, which distribute fresh produce to neighborhoods in the Washington, D.C., region, Batey said. “The city will

NASA Warned to Halt Goddard Closures; But Building 11 Is Next

On Monday, November 10, Zoe Lofgren (D-CA), ranking Democrat on the House Science, Space and Technology Committee, sent a letter to National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Acting Administrator Sean Duffy demanding that NASA “halt any and all laboratory, facility and building closure and relocation activities at Goddard as well as the relocation,

disposal, excessing or repurposing of any specialized equipment or mission-related capabilities, hardware and systems, and it must do so now.” Lofgren stated NASA must respond in writing within 24 hours to confirm all such activities have been put on hold. In addition, Lofgren demanded a full accounting within seven days of the damage inflicted thus far and expressed her intent to demand an investigation by the NASA Office of Inspector General (OIG).

Lofgren said the closure of laboratories and facilities puts NASA missions at risk of delay or failure and NASA must ensure continuing operation of the facilities at the Goddard campus, “especially work on the Roman Space Telescope.” “NASA made a grave error by failing to properly disclose its changing plans

for Goddard to the Committee [and] ... in a requested briefing, ... failed to mention that an accelerated evacuation of additional facilities would occur within just eight days. NASA compounded its error by taking advantage of a government shutdown to rapidly accelerate the timeline for the Goddard moves while broadening their scale and breadth to a degree that risks drastically negative consequences for agency scientific capabilities. This all must end now. NASA needs to stop what it is doing at Goddard, explain itself to Congress and convincingly justify its actions before it can even think about continuing to move forward,” said Lofgren.

The Shutdown’s Impact on One Greenbelt Family, 41 Days In

On Monday, 41 days and two-and-a-half missed paychecks into the longest government shutdown on record, a Greenbelt resident and single mother described how the current political stalemate has been impacting her. She is a federal employee, and she asked that we withhold her name out of fear of reprisal for speaking to the press.

She’s been through four government shutdowns, through sequestrations and bailouts, but this is her first as a parent. “Now it definitely feels different being a

single mom with responsibilities,” she told the News Review. In the past, being furloughed and having delayed pay didn’t have the same impact. “It was just me. I was riding bikes,” she recalls of the forced time out of the office. “Yes, I would have liked six weeks off to take a break,” she says of this shutdown, “but the mental toll, as you lose confidence,” is huge, she says. “You know you did everything right to work hard and get a good job and be responsible but it’s out of

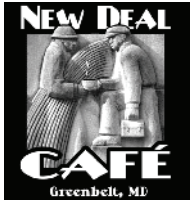

Obituaries

Bonnie Staughton

On December 29, 2024, longtime Greenbelt resident Boneta “Bonnie” Sue Staughton died of natural causes. Born in Nashville, Tenn., on August 3, 1947, Bonnie moved with her family to College Park in 1950 and then to East Pines near Hyattsville in 1952. The family moved once more in 1958, this time to Beltsville, where they lived on enough land to support horses and where Bonnie received her first horse called Thunder.

Bonnie attended High Point High School, where she met Harry Staughton, who would become her husband, and graduated in 1965. They were married in 1971 and enjoyed a happy life together for the next 53 years. Bonnie worked as a medical transcriptionist at Providence Hospital in Northeast D.C. and then at Doctors Hospital in Lanham until she retired.

The couple moved to Greenbelt in 1971, first to a GHI home on Plateau Place and then, in 1976, to a GHI home on Hillside Road. Bonnie and Harry spent the next 51 years living in Greenbelt where Bonnie’s favorite activities included the Christmas Craft Festival, shows in the Community Center, the Farmers Market and, most of all, the Labor Day Festival book sale.

She loved animals, particularly horses and cats. Bonnie owned a number of horses through the years, all Arabians, including Chessie and Mystery. There was always a cat or two or three in the house.

Bonnie is survived by her husband Harry and her sister Annette, who lives in Maine. She will be missed by all who knew her, especially her loyal friends who shared a love of horses.

Donald Mac Wirick

Donald “Mac” Wirick of Greenbelt died on October 15, 2025, surrounded by loving family. Born on November 10, 1941, he grew up in Fort Wayne, Ind., where he graduated from North Side High School and from Indiana University with a master’s degree in political science. The Peace Corps sent him to Thailand to teach middle school English

from 1966-67. This introduction to the international community shaped his life. Returning to the U.S., he found like-minded friends in the International Education Department at Indiana University (Bloomington).

In 1972 he married Mary Griffin. They set off for three more years in Thailand, where, with a Fulbright-Hays fellowship, Mac did field research and wrote his doctoral dissertation, *Primary School Dropouts in Northeast Thailand: a Study of Student, Parent and Teacher Attitudes* (1977). The Wirick family, now with two children, moved to 13 Court Ridge in Greenbelt in 1981. Mac worked in Washington, D.C. at Peace Corps headquarters and the Departments of Education and Energy.

Mac coached his children’s soccer teams and shot the starter gun at their Greenbelt Swim Team meets. He gardened in Greenbelt community garden plots with friend John Henry Jones. He served on the GHI board of directors from the mid-1980s through the early 1990s and taught English for immigrants with Betty Sonneveldt at Eleanor Roosevelt High School in the evenings.

From 1999 to 2019 Mac and Mary gardened and kept bees and chickens in Shepherdstown, W.V.

Mac lived and taught self-sufficiency, from the frugal postwar 1940s through creative resourcing during Covid. While he and Mary homeschooled Reed and Meadow, he gardened and canned, raising much of his family’s food through the years and sharing his skills with others. Mac loved a fresh tomato: he was known for his 25-year quest to breed a Mac heirloom tomato.

As aging recapitulates youth, he was ever inclined to find a treasure in the trash, to dig in the dirt or sit in the corner with his nose in a book, to make friends with every dog he passed, rescue an injured bird or study a bee

colony as long as it would stay. Mac’s world view and compassion are a deep legacy to his family and community.

Mac is survived by his wife, Mary Griffin Wirick; son Reed (Laura) Wirick of San Diego, Calif.; daughter Meadow (Tim) Platt of Greenbelt; and six grandchildren, Abigail, James, Griffin, Rose, Samuel and Benjamin Mac. Government Shutdown

your control,” she said.

Her confidence in the political system has been shaken. “You think, ‘What’s the point,’” she reflected. “But that’s dangerous because it makes people not want to vote. But I can feel myself losing my confidence in our representatives. ... I see no strategy.”

Getting Benefits

Applying for benefits is not easy, one of the things she would like people to know. “Do people think they’re just handing stuff out? I have a graduate degree and am struggling to figure things out,” she said. She’s applied for SNAP, unemployment and deferments from utility companies. “But none of that’s really come through so the main thing I’ve really benefited from is being able to go to the capital area food pantries,” she said. Many of the food banks say no walkups and she doesn’t drive, so that’s been an additional challenge in accessing resources. She’d been trying to hold out on filing for unemployment but has now applied and now there’s a backlog. She also notes that colleagues considered essential and required to work through the shutdown can’t file for unemployment even as they receive no pay. She didn’t qualify for cash assistance and has taken one of the personal loans offered to federal workers by her bank. However, she’s afraid to use it. If it’s the only money she has access to she doesn’t know how she’ll pay it back if the shutdown goes on too long. She has already made a hardship withdrawal from her Thrift Savings Plan. She needed to pay credit cards and clear debt, and she needs to be able to build up a cash reserve if this is something that federal workers will continually be dealing with, and she believes it is. She thinks the government might shut down again in January. She’s just applied for Medicaid to see what she is able to access, to possibly cut her health insurance costs.

Shutdown Ending

Asked how she feels about the possibility of the shutdown ending as the Senate reaches a deal she says, “I’m kind of struggling with it. I know the Democrats didn’t have the leverage to really pursue this fight but what it hopefully has done is help everyone to see that when placed under pressure the length they were willing to go.” The tax subsidies were going to expire; she wishes there had been work on both sides to address it sooner to avoid this. “I don’t know if we are organized enough as a society to provide support for families to wait it out,” she said of the shutdown. There’s no shame in using benefits, she stresses, but she has struggled. “I know that I can claw myself out of it, but I don’t know if other people standing in this waiting room can,” she says of the experience of applying for benefits, “and that’s what’s hard.” That’s where there’s a loss of confidence that our representatives can govern successfully, she says. She’s hopeful she’ll receive back pay, which is why she hasn’t made a second hardship withdrawal.

She has a graduate degree in public administration and has

always wanted to be in public service. She still wouldn’t want to work for private industry, she says, though she might consider the nonprofit world if she had to. Despite her belief that another furlough period will be on the horizon, she plans to return to her federal service. She considers herself mid-career. “I’ve grown a lot in my career which is awesome, but there were definitely more seasoned folks ... but now with all the Deferred Resignation Plans people like myself with 20-25 years of service are thrust into the senior positions. Maybe the purpose of my remaining career is to help younger people know what my agency was like and what it could be again. My reason for staying is to hopefully get back to the essence of what we once were that I got to experience.”

If the government hadn’t shut down she’d be reviewing proposals for projects she’s no longer certain they can carry out. They’ll have to check and see where things stand after being shuttered and closed up without oversight. “There’s not a lot of transparency or even insight into what’s next,” she said.

Outside this Region

In the capital area, people are living in the midst of the impact of the shutdown and the news about it, but it’s not the case for the rest of the country, she believes. The advantage of this is that her parents in a rural state are shielded from news of what she and her agency are going through. She’s trying to hide it from her aging parents, she says, while also worrying about the system in which today’s children will grow up.

Living with Less ... and More

Meanwhile, she’s having tough conversations with her child about being careful with money. She’s using the local Buy Nothing group more. Christmas is going to be tough, she thinks.

“Living in Greenbelt gives me more hope, though,” she says. If she didn’t live in Greenbelt there would be more than a passing thought of leaving the U.S.

The kinds of things that would be helpful in the community? Rides to food banks, she says. Also, companionship. She attended a gathering on Sunday with many others who are also furloughed. “It was so great to be around people that are in the same boat,” she said. “It doesn’t have to be something fancy,” any chance for community will do.

still have access to produce at no cost, but our poundage will be limited to approximately 2,000 pounds per month and be based on availability of produce on the Capital Area Food Bank menu. Historically, The Mobile Market Program provided approximately 6,000 pounds per month,” said Batey.

GAIL’s monthly free produce distribution serves approximately 500 to 600 residents per month. Recently the shutdown, federal funding restrictions and the overall increase in need have impacted the Capital Area Food Bank, which supports the distribution, Batey said.

“We will see a reduction in fresh produce that will be available to us as a standard delivery,” she said. “We will still have produce, but it will not be in the same quantities that we’re used to as a mobile market site.”

Greenbelt families who rely on GAIL will also receive smaller quantities of food. Batey said that families that used to receive multiple bags of produce will now receive just one.

“Historically, families would receive a third of a bag of onions, or half a bag of potatoes, or whatever the item might be,” Batey said. “I would see that [amount now] being reduced, obviously, by more than half.”

Support

Greenbelt Grows is a community initiative that encourages people to grow and share food. It’s a reminder that the community is able to take care of itself in creative ways, according to one of its initiators, Jennifer Dudley.

“Our farmers need us, you know, our neighbors that are recipients of food security benefits on SNAP, they need us,” Dudley said, commenting on how the lack of funding for food-related programs is influencing community members. “A lot of our seniors are hungry, and are quietly not saying anything and going without.”

Goldberg-Strassler is the visionary of Greenbelt’s PORCH program, and he has seen an increase in need as a result of the shutdown. PORCH is a nonprofit that unites neighbors in commu-

nities to fight hunger, according to the organization’s website.

“An individual family, who may have been donating before ... now they’re on the other side. They’re needing to receive food from the food pantry as opposed to donating food to the food pantry,” Goldberg-Strassler said. “It’s come full circle.”

The best thing the Greenbelt community can do right now, according to Dudley, is think about what they can accomplish together.

“All of us are one unfortunate situation away from being in the situation where we need help,” said Dudley, “so I think we need to be looking at what resources we have in Greenbelt and around us in general, and [try to] connect them.”

County Councilmember Ingrid S. Watson will host a food giveaway in the Community Center on Thursday, November 20.

Meanwhile, at NASA Goddard, over the last week clearing of Building 11 has begun, two sources on the campus told the News Review. Building 11 is where the propulsion systems for spacecraft are designed. Engineers there have been ordered to report to work every day but November 11, Veterans Day, and so far staff are being verbally ordered to interrupt their excepted critical project work during the shutdown to instead dismantle their test labs in Building 11, a source working in that building told us on Tuesday. Our sources requested anonymity for fear of reprisal.

In Building 11, occupants were told some large, expensive and unique pieces of equipment will be moved to other buildings on the campus while other equipment will be divested (excessed or auctioned off in bulk). Like others we’ve spoken to about the moves, they were given less than a week’s notice to label everything, pack and prepare for professional movers.

Disassembling large machinery to be moved would ideally be planned weeks in advance to allow for consultation with manufacturers, arrange for professional rigging staff to lift multi-ton parts

and coordinate, said one engineer. Due to the minimal notice, however, engineers had to prepare large pieces of equipment for what our source calls a “hastily ordered move.” It’s a move he said obliged engineers to perform all equipment disassembly by “guessing,” and thereby “risking functionality of ‘saved’ equipment once relocated,” and involved lifting multi-ton equipment without safety protocols or professional rigging staff.

“Engineers were told to disassemble their labs under an extremely compressed schedule without adequate resources,” complained the Building 11 engineer. They dismantled their labs, preserving what equipment management would allow, but also were ordered to prepare aislesworth of spacecraft components, rooms full of tools and supplies for excess.

They complied under threat of losing more equipment and supplies, our source told the News Review, and in the hope of salvaging the most critical items for current and upcoming flight projects. He describes a scene of dedicated engineers trying to prioritize and work efficiently, but on occasion breaking down into

tears or stunned into silence by the long-term damage they knew they were performing.

“Higher levels of management, career NASA employees, worked alongside the NASA engineers. All under verbal orders and all trying their hardest to salvage what they could and protect taxpayer funded congressionally appropriated space flight projects,” he said.

Some, especially those awaiting the move from Building 11, hoped Lofgren’s letter on Monday might have an impact. However, one scientist told us the move-out at Goddard had resumed early Wednesday morning, following a pause for the federal holiday on Tuesday. Equipment began to be moved out of Building 11 at 7:30 a.m., Wednesday, November 12, despite its owners and subject matter experts being told the move would begin at 9:30 a.m. he told the News Review. “Equipment has already been damaged,” he reported of the latest move that was underway. A second source confirmed moves were underway at Building 11 Wednesday morning and believed they were deliberately begun before the engineers were told to arrive.

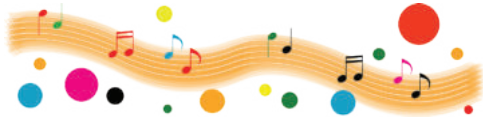

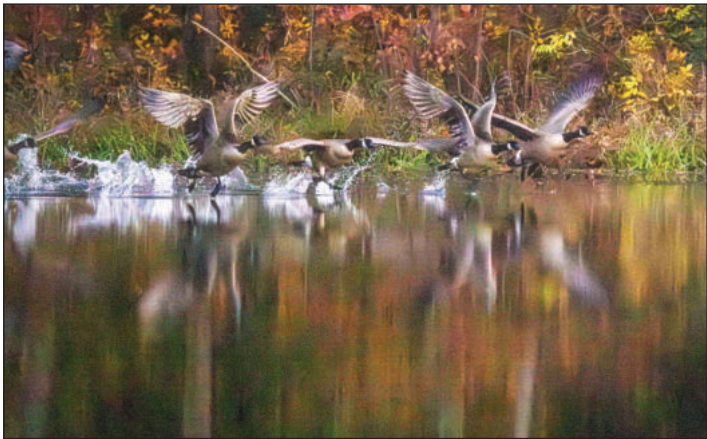

Poetry, Song and History Exhibits Commemorate Emancipation Day

On Saturday, November 1, the 161st anniversary of Emancipation Day in Maryland, the Greenbelt Black History and Culture Committee hosted Kaylee Joge, the 2025 Youth Poet Laureate of Prince George’s County and a junior at Parkdale High School, along with the Prince George’s Community Choral Society.

Program

Poetry speaks directly to the soul, which Joge understands. Her command of language was impressive and her poetry complex. She expressed the concerns of her generation for their future and the hope and desire for humanity to reflect on the damage that human behavior is causing to the planet. Several of her poems focused on the environment, and she lamented about what would be left for her children to see. She stated: “They won’t know flowers, and they won’t know bees. They’ll never know landscapes.” In another poem titled 100 Million Years Ago, she warns about how technology is damaging human connection and interpersonal communication. Joge is an eloquent and gifted poet.

Regina Smith, a member of the Black History and Culture Committee, introduced the Prince George’s County Choral Society

Smith then introduced Edryn Coleman, artistic director of the Choral Society, who described the singing society, a very diverse group, who were accompanied by Anthony Pezelle on the piano. He also encouraged members of the audience to join the group, as they are always looking for new members.

The Choral Society sang a variety of spirituals, including His Eye Is on the Sparrow, Be Thou My Vision, All My Trials Soon Be Over and others. At the beginning of the program, they led the audience in singing Lift

Every Voice and Sing.

Both the spoken word performance of Kaylee Joge and the songs of the Prince George’s County Choral Society provided the audience with a relaxing and rejuvenating afternoon. Random Unselfish Acts of Kindness (RUAK) distributed free Black American themed books for all ages which the children and adults present could take home.

On Saturday, November 8, the Sankofa Mobile Museum kiosks were placed in Room 202. About 30 Greenbelt residents availed themselves of the historical modules present on the kiosks. Greenbelters were able to sit and learn history at their leisure and view eight modules. Those who attended praised the exhibits and were able to select and take home free posters.

Emancipation Day programs were sponsored by the Black History and Culture Committee, the Recreation Department, RUAK and the Greenbelt Museum.

GRACE Aids Ukrainians And Others in War Zones

The Greenbelt Refugee Aid Committee (GRACE) started in March 2022, initially to help the over 10 million Ukrainian refugees fleeing the full-scale Russian invasion. Since then and due to relentless daily bombings, over 2.5 million Ukrainian homes have been seriously damaged or destroyed. Vladimir Putin’s Russia attacked both small cities and large in a campaign of terror all Ukrainians have been living through for almost four years now.

After becoming a 501(c)(3) charitable organization, GRACE raised funds and brought three Ukrainian families to apartments we rented in Greenbelt Center, furnished almost entirely with locally donated furniture and household goods. GRACE and other volunteers also taught them English, which they didn’t know on arrival here and helped them get integrated into our society with jobs and services. Hard-working Tetiana Orlova lived on Parkway for about a year and a half. She returned to Ukraine because she felt she could be of more help there.

GRACE’s focus has been Ukrainians whose homes were destroyed and who now live in shelters. Resources are stretched thin there and with the demise of the U.S. Agency for International Development, humanitarian aid everywhere has taken a huge loss. Whatever we can do

is appreciated by those whose lives are so hurt by the ongoing aggression and other challenges. One exciting thing GRACE has been doing is helping orphanages in Ukraine. They gave one with 50 children a huge custom couch. To another they provided a high-quality camera – and received charming photos and videos of them learning how to use it. GRACE is in the process of providing therapeutic parallel bars to an orphanage in central Ukraine that houses children with cerebral palsy. A big need there is for electric generators, as the Russians target power stations across the country.

Reparations Town Hall Saturday Will Present Findings, Requests

On Saturday, November 15, the Greenbelt Reparations Commission will host a town hall in collaboration with the Piscataway Indian Nation (PIN) and the African-American Redress Network to share their initial findings with community stakeholders and residents. The Reparations Commission reports that several issues have emerged that concern harmed communities, including housing, education, transportation, public safety, recreation and especially senior services and youth development. There are also demands by Indigenous People to have their land returned, relics and artifacts repatriated, and economic independence and sovereignty restored.

The Reparations Commission is entering the recommendation phase and asking the African American community for their input for redress remedies on the topics they have identified through focus group meetings, surveys and interviews. Their recommendations will enable the commission to complete its work, said commission member Lois Rosado.

The PIN’s recommendations are ready to present and will be shared at the town hall on Saturday. The PIN was initially hired by the Reparations Commission as a contractor to review a report and provide an Indigenous voice and perspective. They have, in addition, created a formal report containing reparation requests. The PIN’s summary and recommendations were not part of the contract’s Statement of Work and their recommendations have not been endorsed by the Greenbelt Reparations Commission.

To learn more of the initial findings of the Reparations Commission and the recommendations of the PIN, attend the town hall on Saturday. Participants will be able to join small discussion groups to identify additional issues and offer suggestions for repair and redress to inform final recommendations to the Greenbelt City Council.

The town hall will take place Saturday, November 15, in the Community Center, Room 201 from 2:30 to 5:30 p.m.

Rotary Club Hosts Invasive Species Talk

Got Trash? City Pilots New Program to Meet Rising Cost

Earlier this year the City Council instructed Public Works and the Greenbelt Advisory Committee on Environmental Sustainability (Green ACES) to investigate ways to reduce the huge deficit the City incurs for providing trash collection. The group looked at what neighboring cities and counties charge and found all charge more than Greenbelt — in some instances, a lot more.

A Trash Cost Deficit

Public Works calculated that Greenbelt would need to charge each household nearly \$400 a year to break even. The fee is currently \$280 per year. More than \$200,000 was drawn from the general fund over the last two years to fill that gap, money paid through taxes from all Greenbelt taxpayers, including those not receiving City trash collection, such as all apartment dwellers.

Landfill Fees Increase

Green ACES and the Green Team explored ways to reduce the deficit, while seeking fairness and environmental responsibility. The county raised landfill fees, which is the cost of disposing of the trash at the landfill, by 21.5 percent on July 1 this year and will raise it again another seven percent next July 1. The writing is on the wall: the landfill is filling up and landfill fees will continue to rise. Doing nothing to reduce our trash will only cost us more in coming years.

Save As You Throw

After many City Council meetings, and a town hall meeting, Council approved a new way of paying for trash collection called Save As You Throw. This is a one-year pilot program, beginning January 1, 2026. The results will be evaluated next year to determine how to move forward from that point. This system charges residents based on the amount of trash a household generates. We pay for the amount of electricity we use and water we consume, so why shouldn't we pay for the amount of trash we produce?

This unit-based pricing is common in New England, Minnesota and in cities throughout the world. Results show a 44 percent

reduction of trash going to the landfill, as households get better at recycling, composting food scraps and donating usable items.

Maryland Streamlines Benefits Application

The new Maryland Benefits One Application will make it easier to apply for Medicaid; Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP); Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF); Women, Infants, Children (WIC) programming and energy assistance in a single application from a computer or smartphone.

The new streamlined application is available through Maryland Benefits, the State of Maryland’s online benefits access platform. Formerly known as MD THINK, Maryland Ben-

efits reflects collaborative effort between Maryland’s Departments of Information Technology and Health and Human Services to stabilize benefits access.

The improvements also increase convenience for the 1.3 million Marylanders that Maryland Benefits serves, relieving the need to drive between state offices or wait in long lines to complete lengthy separate applications. On average, an application takes 28 minutes to complete. To access the Maryland Benefits One Application, visit Marylandbenefits.gov.

Report Potholes for Fixing

Greenbelt is close enough to the Beltway and Baltimore-Washington Parkway that in some places we can hear their traffic, want to or not. Proximity to these major roadways can be mighty handy for getting to and from Greenbelt. Sometimes, though, they’re unpleasantly bumpy. School News

Most Greenbelt Schools Earn Three Stars in Report Card

“The Maryland Report Card offers one view of student achievement, and together with our recent MCAP results, it tells a story of real progress. These outcomes reflect steady, measurable growth and a district that’s trending up. As we build on this momentum, our work ahead is about accelerating progress for every student,” said Prince George’s County Public Schools (PGCPS) Interim Superintendent Dr. Shawn Joseph.

Academic, Climate Gains

Across the county’s schools, math proficiency rose 3.9 percentage points, nearly double the statewide increase of 2.0 points, said a PGCPS statement. Meanwhile English Language Arts (ELA) scores improved by 2.8 points, closely matching the statewide average.

Multilingual learners and students with disabilities achieved consistent gains across both math and ELA, and Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) schools are closing gaps faster than comparable schools statewide, according to the district.

Middle and high schools also recorded notable reductions in chronic absenteeism, while sur-

vey data show that students and staff feel more positive about school climate and engagement districtwide.

Five Stars

Six PGCPS schools earned five stars (two elementary, one high, three combination). They include Dora Kennedy French Immersion (DKFI) in Greenbelt. DKFI’s elementary school was ranked in the 89th percentile and its middle school 99th.

Four Stars

Twenty-six schools (16 elementary, 1 high, 9 combination) earned four stars. They include Eleanor Roosevelt High School, which ranked in the 68th percentile for high schools.

Three Stars

One hundred eleven schools (75 elementary, 13 middle, 14 high, nine combination) earned three stars. These schools include Greenbelt Elementary, which ranked in the 32nd percentile; Magnolia Elementary, which serves Greenbelt students and was ranked in the 11th percentile for elementary schools; and Greenbelt Middle School, which ranked in the 67th percentile for middle schools.

Two Stars

Forty-five schools (23 elementary, 12 middle, eight high, two combination) earned two stars. Springhill Lake Elementary earned this rating and was ranked in the 9th percentile.

One Star

No PGCPS schools earned one star.

How the Ratings Work

School star ratings are based on multiple indicators, including non-academic measures.

With an insatiable thirst for knowledge, she earned a master's degree in nuclear physics from the University of Warsaw in 1967 and a Ph.D. in nuclear engineering from the University of Maryland, College Park in 1981. Throughout her illustrious career, she held a faculty position at the University of Maryland Marlene and Stewart Greenebaum Comprehensive Cancer Center, where she held countless honors and awards, taught future medical students and physicians and worked tirelessly in the field of radiation oncology.

Elizabeth married Robert Zdzislaw Kubiczek and embraced the joy of motherhood with the birth of their daughter.

Her professional affiliations included memberships in Phi Beta Kappa, Radiation Research Society, Women in Radiation Research and the European Society for Radiation Research. She was also a member of the Our Lady Queen of Poland Catholic Church.

Elizabeth's love for life was evident in her varied interests. An avid reader, she loved mysteries, most notably those of Agatha Christie, whose books she learned English from after arriving in the United States. Her musical taste spanned from Elvis and the Beatles to classical music. Elizabeth appreciated Polish art and works by Indigenous people, and she cherished listening to and attending performances of opera and the ballet, one of her favorite spectacles. She often sought respite at her favorite local spots: Greenbelt Cinema, New Deal Café and Cedars of Lebanon. As for vacations, Elizabeth held a special place in her heart for the Southwest.

Arrest Made in Hit-and-Run That Killed Cyclist Lisa Martin

Greenway Shooting Near Bus Stop: Two Youths Arrested

Greenbelt police officers have arrested two male youths for the October 28 shooting at Greenway Center (see the October 30 issue). In that incident, shortly after 4 p.m. close to the shopping center, witnesses reported that one juvenile male opened fire near a bus stop and then another juvenile male also fired a gun. No injuries were reported.

On the morning of November 6, in the 8200 block of Canning Terrace, the Greenbelt Police Emergency Response Team (ERT) and detectives executed a search warrant leading to the arrest of a juvenile male. During the search,

additional evidence was collected. Fortunately, no one was injured during this operation, and the juvenile was safely transported to the Upper Marlboro Department of Corrections.

On the evening of November 6, a second juvenile male was arrested in connection with the same shooting. This youth also had an outstanding warrant for his involvement in an armed robbery that took place on October 4. He was safely transported to the Upper Marlboro Department of Corrections, where he has been charged as an adult with multiple crimes.

Reel and Meal:
Nonviolent Resistance

In a time filled with conflict, protests and political upheaval, the film *How to Start a Revolution* shows how real change can happen without violence. It features the work of Gene Sharp, whose ideas have inspired movements from Serbia's nonviolent overthrow of Milosevic to the student-led protests in Tahrir Square during the Arab Spring. The film also depicts his influence on movements in South Korea, the Philippines and Eastern Europe. Success depends on careful planning, unity among participants and persistence.

Sharp documented 198 distinct nonviolent tactics, categorized into: protest and persuasion (marches, vigils, leafleting), non-cooperation (boycotts, strikes, refusal to obey laws) and intervention to disrupt the functioning of an oppressive system while minimizing bloodshed. For Sharp, nonviolent resistance works best when it is strategic, disciplined and widespread, and not spontaneous or disorganized. Success depends on careful planning, unity among participants, and persistence. The film suggests that such tactics that challenged entrenched power, toppled dictators, and made real change across the world are ones we can use here at home. Anyone concerned about civic engagement will find the documentary insightful.

The film will be shown at the New Deal Café on Monday, November 17 at 6:30 p.m. Note that the start time of 6:30 p.m. is earlier than usual. Its organizers are The Utopia Film Festival and the Prince George's County Peace & Justice Coalition, which presents this month's program. While the film is free, the Café has a dinner menu with several plant-based options available for purchase. The screenings are hybrid – in-person at the Café and via Zoom. Those unable to attend in-person can register to watch via Zoom at tinyurl.com/ReelMealNov2025.

progress within the Prince George's County Fire/EMS Department. Most of the vacant positions have now been filled with new recruits who are completing their training and field experience through the county's fire academy and fire stations. As these recruits become fully certified and field-ready, they will be assigned to stations throughout the county, including Greenbelt and Berwyn Heights."

Last summer, firefighters were removed from stations in Greenbelt, Berwyn Heights, Bowie-Belair and Bunker Hill in what was initially called a summer staffing plan. "Beginning in November 2025, the Berwyn Heights Fire Station will receive a six-person day work crew (7 a.m. to 3 p.m.) to staff both a fire apparatus and an ambulance. This marks an important step in improving daytime coverage and emergency readiness for our area," said Salmerón. As we reported on January 8 this year, since 24 career firefighters were pulled from Greenbelt's station, Berwyn Heights had become the most frequent responder to Greenbelt calls, thus their full staffing this month is additional cause for celebration in Greenbelt as well as neighboring areas that benefit from their coverage.

The return to a full complement of six career firefighters at the Berwyn Heights station

is also a hopeful step under the new Prince George's County Fire Department leadership. Prince George's County Fire Department's new Fire Chief Thelmetria Michaelides was sworn in on October 21 after her appointment by County Executive Aisha Braveboy. Former Fire Chief Tiffany Green was appointed assistant deputy chief administrative officer for Public Safety and Homeland Security but later was suspended pending an investigation relating to her time as Fire Chief.

"The Greenbelt Fire Station is expected to return to full 24/7 staffing around February 2026, once the department's new firefighters and EMTs complete the training necessary to operate independently. This progress reflects the strong leadership and transparent communication under Fire Chief Michaelides, which has been a welcome change and a clear improvement over past staffing projections," said Salmerón.

"The City will continue to work closely with the Fire/EMS Department and the County Executive's Office to ensure that public safety remains at the forefront of county priorities. I am confident that, through collaboration and accountability, we will see full restoration of staffing at the Greenbelt Fire Station in early 2026."

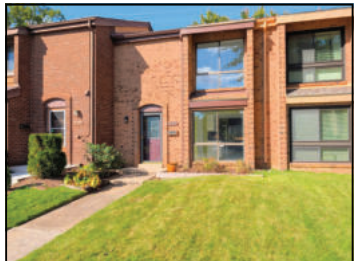

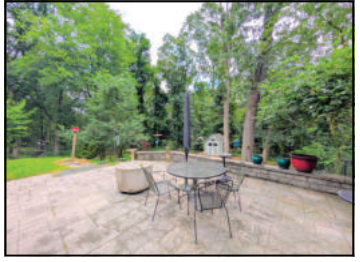
