



## Council Hears Balanced Budget, Economic Outlook for FY 2027

At the Greenbelt City Council meeting on March 23, City Manager Josué Salmerón presented the proposed city budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2027, which runs from July 1, 2026 to June 30, 2027.

The balanced budget showed \$41,748,149 in revenue in the General Fund (up 3.92 percent from FY 2026) with \$41,741,246 in General Fund expenses (up 3.96 percent from FY 2026).

The majority of the city revenues come from real property taxes and income tax receipts. There are no property tax rate increases this year. The Recreation Program and Speed and Red-Light Camera Enforcement Programs are also important revenue sources.

Included in the General Fund budget are: 1) General Government; 2) Planning and Community Development; 3) Public Safety; 4) Public Works; 5) Greenbelt CARES; 6) Recreation and Parks; 7) Miscellaneous; 8) Non-Departmental; and 9) Fund Transfers.

Salmerón presented key influences on the budget. One was

the broader fiscal condition that includes the end of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding and reductions in federal jobs and contracts.

Another influence was increasing Greenbelt's employee compensation based on the FY 2024 Compensation Study. A 2 percent Cost of Living Adjustment was given to all employees, both full and part-time. In addition, employees are eligible for up to a 3 percent merit increase. The total number of employee full-time equivalents (FTEs) increased by one to 235.5. This increase was due to ARPA funds ending so the city now must directly pay the crisis intervention supervisor.

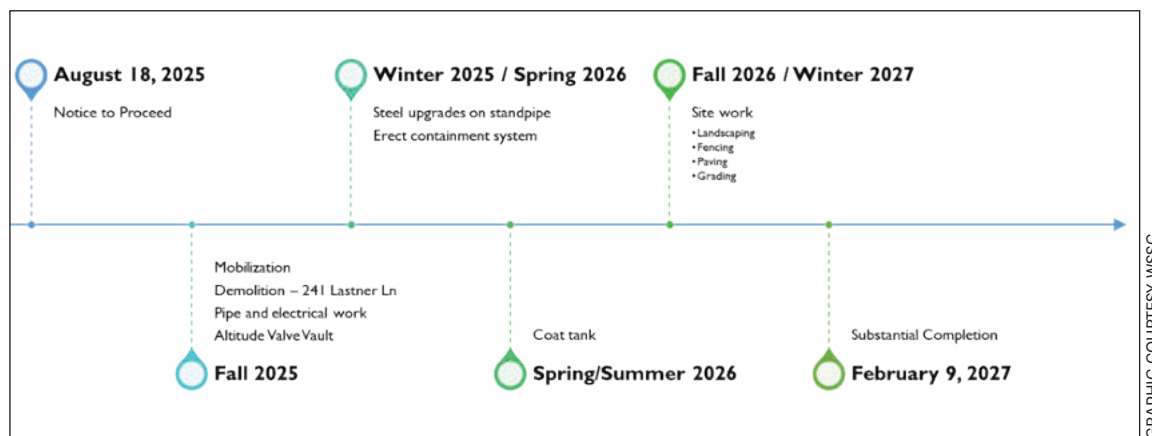
A third influence cited by Salmerón was providing for capital projects and reserves. Much of the capital project funding will come from grants.

Some new initiatives in the FY 2027 budget mentioned by Salmerón were \$10,000 in

## Noise, Poor Notice: Standpipe Project Disrupts Neighbors

Residents living near the Greenbelt Standpipe Rehabilitation Project say construction and ongoing sandblasting began without adequate notice, bringing prolonged noise and disruption to dozens of nearby households.

Neighbors say while they understand the need for infrastructure repairs, a lack of consistent communication from the Washington Suburban Sanitary

Commission (WSSC) has left families scrambling to cope with unexpected construction impacts.

### House Demolition

Residents described being caught off guard when the house at 241 Lastner Lane, purchased by WSSC, was demolished without warning. They had not re-

ceived any recent notification leading up to the demolition.

"We voiced our concerns about getting prompt communication, because they had done various small staging tasks before without giving the community, the surrounding neighbors, any kind of

### Election 2026

## State and Federal Primary: Preview of Election Races

Maryland's primary election will take place on June 23. Greenbelt voters will see seven federal and state races on the ballot, ranging from House of Delegates to governor, with no ballot measures included.

### Governor

In the governor's race, incumbent Wes Moore currently faces one Democrat challenger, Eric Felber, while Republicans have a crowded slate of candidates, including 2022 candidate Dan Cox. Other Republicans running are Carl Brunner Jr., L.D. Burkindine, Ed Hale, Douglas Larcomb, John Myrick and Michael Oakes. The lieutenant governor race mirrors those tickets, as candidates run in pairs.

### 4th Congressional District

At the federal level, in the 4th Congressional District, Rep. Glenn Ivey faces six Democratic challengers: Khyre Edwards, Anthony Field, Joseph Gomes, Shavonne Hedgepeth, Jakeya Johnson and Jonathan White. One Republican, George McDermott, is running.

### Attorney General and Comptroller

Several statewide offices are uncontested on the Democratic side, including Attorney General Anthony G. Brown and Comptroller Brooke Lierman. Republican Sonya Dunn is also running for Comptroller, and Republican James B. Rutledge, III is running for Attorney General.

## Greenbelt to Begin Stop Sign Camera Enforcement April 1

The City of Greenbelt is conducting a warning phase for its new automated stop sign enforcement program from April 1 through April 30, with citations to follow after the initial rollout.

The cameras, recently approved by the Greenbelt City Council, were installed at six intersections across the city. Officials say the program is intended to improve compliance with stop signs and increase safety for drivers, pedestrians and residents.

Locations include Southway at Ridge Road, Ridge Road at Gardenway, Ridge Road at Laurel Hill Road, Cherrywood Lane at Breezewood Drive, Springhill Drive at Edmonston Road and Springhill Drive at Cherrywood Lane.

During the warning period, drivers who fail to stop will not receive citations. Instead, the city will issue warnings in an effort to educate drivers and reduce viola-

come to a complete stop at or before the stop line will not be cited. State law requires drivers to come to a complete stop at the stop line or, if none is marked, at the near side of the intersection.

According to the city, the cameras are limited strictly to enforcing stop sign violations under Maryland law. They cannot be used to cite drivers for other offenses such as failure to use a seatbelt or distracted driving.

### Vendor

The city confirmed that the vendor operating the system is Obvio, which installs, maintains and operates the camera system

## A New Deal Heritage Center?

We are in an auspicious time and place. Our nation is focused on the meaning of democracy.

Greenbelt is the crown jewel of over 100 communities built during the 1930s New Deal. Eleanor Roosevelt called Greenbelt "the

first garden community in the land built for the uplift of the human spirit." How progressive and idealistic is that?

Our country needs to know that government exists for the people, not the other way around. We need to educate Americans on the amazing progress made by Franklin Roosevelt and the New Deal. Social Security was enacted. They solved an enormous environmental catastrophe, the Dust Bowl. Renewable electric power generated by Tennessee Valley dams and the Hoover, Grand Coulee and others produced 25 percent of the country's electricity by 1941. Bad government might have done that with coal. Almost all those hydro plants still operate today.

They built thousands of projects around the country. Art, music and culture were supported as at no other time in our history. The New Deal lasted until 1942 and created FDR's Arsenal of Democracy, essential to defeating WWII dictatorships. Developing New Deal style programs like Medicare and Medicaid continued into the 1960s and beyond.

Roosevelt said he wasn't concerned with those with plenty, but those without enough. The government that gave us our town strove to help people, not hurt them.

**The Drama**  
A happily engaged couple (Zendaya and Robert Pattinson) is put to the test when an unexpected turn sends their wedding week off the rails.

In this 2026 animated adventure comedy Mario, Luigi and Princess Peach embark on an adventure across the galaxy. Based on the 2007 video game Super Mario Galaxy and its 2010 sequel, as well as Nintendo's broader Mario franchise, the film was produced by Illumination and Nintendo and is the sequel to The Super Mario Bros. **Project Hail Mary**  
Science teacher Ryland Grace (Ryan Gosling) wakes up on a spaceship, light-years from home with no recollection of who he is or how he got there. 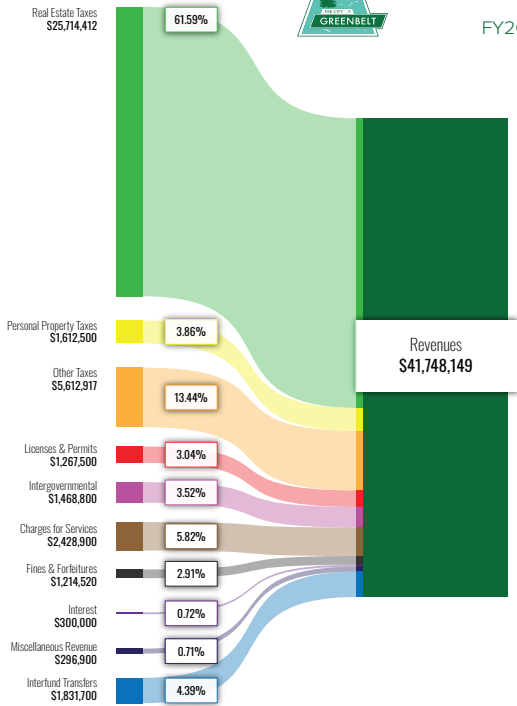

# With Sweat, Greenbelt Arts Center Continues Rolling

The current season has been outstanding for the Greenbelt Arts Center (GAC). Greenbelt audiences have seen exceptional local theatrical talent brought together by some of the most experienced local directors performing, in several instances, original creations by local writers. GAC hosted four original productions, some of which received high praise from local reviewers. Additionally, a Best Off-Broadway play from 1972; an Arthur Miller play that won multiple Tony Awards for a Broadway revival; and now, recognized as one of the best American plays of the year, *Sweat*, a 2017 Pulitzer Prize Winner for Drama, is coming to GAC. A masterful depiction of the forces that divide and conquer us, it addresses issues of identity, race, economy and humanity in a Rust Belt town.

The mission of bringing such an award-winning play to the GAC stage has been accepted by Bob Kleinberg, a longtime resident of nearby Silver Spring, who is experienced in all things GAC. For decades he has volunteered to run various behind the scenes operations, but he has also acquired a long list of credits for both acting and directing at GAC. However, with all his experience, Kleinberg still needs a cast to portray the many diverse ethnic

characters in *Sweat*. Kleinberg credits last year's productions and the current outstanding season's success for bringing attention to GAC from an actor's perspective. Recent shows have had significant increases in actors auditioning for parts. Kleinberg said *Sweat* had one of the biggest turnouts in recent history for auditions, with multiple actors from which to choose for every character.

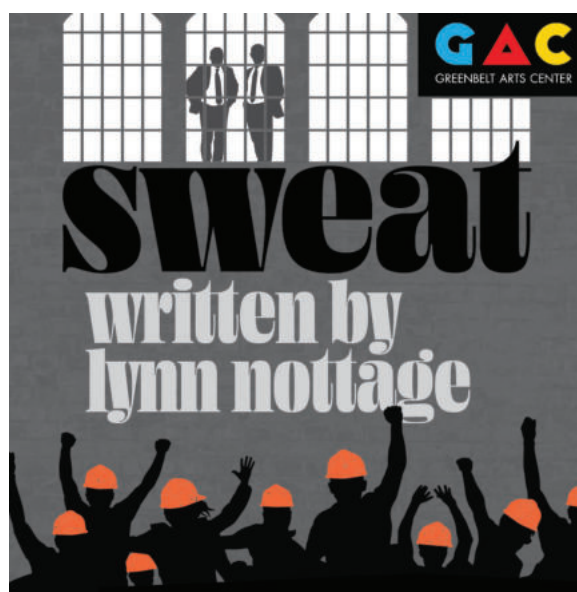

The story revolves around a bar where a small group of factory workers in a small city (Reading, Pa.) spend time together discussing their lives, sharing secrets and laughs and, of course, drinks. It is a cautionary tale to all of us in the changing political, social and economic climate. Having had the opportunity to watch the first rehearsal, a readthrough and then recently a first act run-through, assurances can be given

to the Greenbelt arts community that they once again will not be disappointed. Kleinberg has molded an excellent selection of diverse thespians into driving "a force de theatrical."

*Sweat* opens Friday, April 10, and runs through April 25. There will be a talkback with the cast and crew following the Sunday, April 19 performance.

# Dancing Joy: A Field Trip Across The World in One Artful Afternoon

As the Greenbelt Cinema welcomed moviegoers through its doors on Sunday, March 22, many may not have known the treat that was in store for them. After grabbing sweet and savory snacks, visitors settled into their seats to watch dancers from all over the world perform to one very famous musical piece, Beethoven's Symphony No.9, Ode to Joy.

The beautiful film invited the audience on a world tour that offered breathtaking scenery, energizing footwork and sometimes soft, delicate movements, as well as colorful authentic costumes and regalia with dedicated dancers, all designed to share in the hopeful message of joy, unity and brotherhood. Dancers from Fiji, Indonesia, Botswana, South Korea, Rwanda, Honduras and other countries graciously shared their culture and traditions in one accord; all done without words. The music and universal body movements told the story.

Lauren Rankel, the Cinema's education and outreach coordinator, served as moderator for the program of the day. After the free screening, she ushered in and introduced the all-woman filmmaking team of *Dancing Joy*, Producer Kate Tsubata and her daughters Director Lan T. Lee and Editor and Film Educator

Mie Smith.

### The Film's Journey

The mother-and-daughters team spoke about the genesis of the film and the artists who they say co-created it. Tsubata, the producer and idea generator, explained that the idea was formed in 2005 during a family trip to the Dead Sea in Israel.

It would ultimately take 12 years to go from the idea to completion. Working on other projects provided Tsubata with the tools needed to bring her vision to life. However, it was the "terrible division and violence" she saw after the 2016 election that made her say, "We have to do it now." The year 2017 was a year of preparation.

Director Lee said that 2018 began the intense journey of creating the award-winning piece during two months of intense filming, covering over 56,000 miles, 10 nations, local venues, almost 200 dancers and overcoming language barriers. To lessen the project's

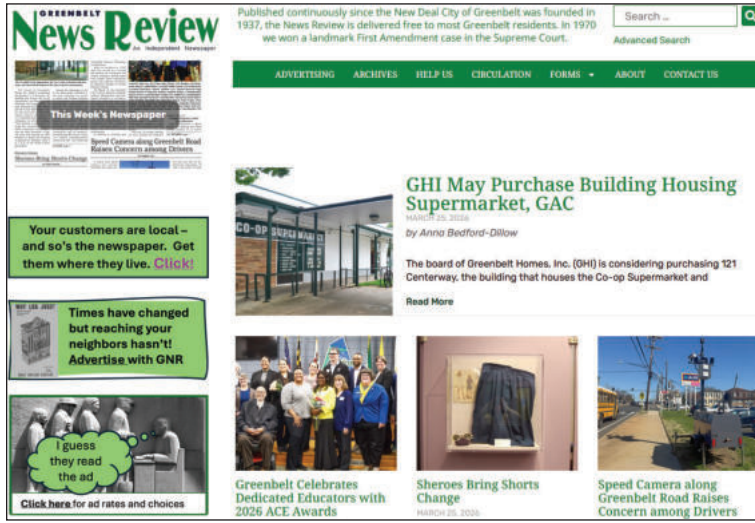
# Greenbelt News Review Is No Luddite: See the Newly Ad-enabled Website

carbon footprint, they used a small film crew who nevertheless captured extraordinary ground and aerial views without detracting from the essence of the dancers' movements. To help tell the story they incorporated views of crashing waves, mountains standing a quiet watch, a gleaming temple and even the dust on the feet of some dancers.

With painstaking attention to timing, rhythm, pace and emotion, Smith, the editor, pulled together the message, environmental shots and dancers. She gracefully hopscotches the audience through 21 cultures and varying terrains. In 2020, after 18 months, with the film finally ready to be released, the filmmakers were on their way to their first theater screening in West Virginia when they got the call that the state was closed due to Covid. Even with multiple film festival awards it would be five years before this trio would experience a live theatrical premiere, which finally occurred in Greenbelt this past Sunday. Tsubata said, "This film was always intended to give people an immersive experience. To watch people's visceral reactions was heartwarming, encouraging and exhilarating."

### Modern Resonance

More than 200 years later, the four movements of Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 Ode to Joy, which first premiered in 1824, continue to resonate with new and old audiences. The themes of human rights, unity and reconciliation are often associated with this symphony.

This women's project has breathed new life into the symphony, introducing it in a new way that enhances the underlying intended messages, which sometimes shout and at other times gently whisper the hope and joy that is a love letter to the world and humanity. As one audience member stated during the question-and-answer portion of the program, "My eyes have never feasted on so much."

### A Gift of Peace

"What if our world was truly at peace? What would human-

ity do if we were all free? What would we do without hatred and division bringing misery, suffering and poverty in our lives?" These were the questions that propelled Tsubata's quest to discover the answers.

Tsubata said, "My long-term hope is that what we portray in the movie would become the reality in the world, that all people could dance together and all people could celebrate together, value each other, live in joy. If that could happen as a result of our movie, I would be very, very happy."

The film is available to rent or buy on the Vimeo on-demand video site. The team is open to bringing the film for screenings at other locations and invites folks to reach out to them via dancingjoymovie.com.

The free film screening was made possible through the Greenbelt Recreation Arts Program.

the Korean War. He was a radio operator on the USS Oriskany and was honorably discharged in 1952. He continued his service in the Navy Reserves for several years.

John was an usher in church where he met a cute girl named Ruth Fadden. With a playful spirit, he would nudge the offertory collection basket toward her and shake it to capture her attention. He married Ruth, the love of his life, on December 1, 1956, and they had their first child, Jacquelyn Waters, in 1957. When she was 18 months old, they moved into the Lakewood subdivision in Greenbelt into the first completed house on the street. They had two sons, Larry Waters and Shawn Waters, in the early 1960s and the family of five enjoyed everything Greenbelt had to offer young families. He was proud of his family. The neighbors were very friendly and the family made special life-long friends with the neighbors on the street and elsewhere in Greenbelt.

He worked for Pepco for a short while. In 1959, John joined the Metropolitan Police Department in Washington, D.C., where he served with dedication and courage. He walked a beat in all seasons and weather, soon joining the K-9 Division in the second K-9 training class. Alongside his police dog, Major, he solved numerous cases. During his service, he was proud to be assigned to the funeral detail for President John F. Kennedy. He also served during the civil unrest of the 1960s, including the riots along 14th and U Streets where the area was badly burned and the only thing left standing was Ben's Chili Bowl, where it still stands today. Later, he transferred to the communications division. He retired after nearly 20 years due to a disability.

John's love for the outdoors remained a constant throughout his life. He enjoyed hunting, fishing and gardening. The backyard in Lakewood was home to a variety of animals, including a pet owl, chickens and even a rooster and a brood of baby chicks.

As a skilled communicator, John spent many hours in the Lakewood house connecting with people around the world using Morse code, carefully transcribing his conversations. As a dedicated ham radio operator, his broadcasts were well known in the neighborhood - sometimes interrupting the neighbors' TV shows.

In 2022, John was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease. His daughter, Jacquelyn, became his devoted caregiver spending each evening by his side where they shared simple joys. She dutifully

watched every episode of his favorite TV show, Big Bang Theory, with him, often laughing together.

John was a proud life-long member of the American Legion Post 136 in Greenbelt, dating back to when the club operated out of a converted farmhouse. During the last several years, Jacquelyn brought him there regularly, every Friday and Saturday for dinner as well as Sunday mornings for breakfast where he enjoyed meals, companionship and camaraderie of fellow veterans and friends who always welcomed him warmly.

The family were members of St. Hugh of Grenoble Catholic Church since 1959 when the parish gathered in the Center Elementary School, which is now the Community Center.

He is survived by his wife of nearly 70 years, Ruth Waters of Melbourne, Fla.; daughter Jacquelyn Waters of Greenbelt and Melbourne; his sons Shawn of Melbourne and Larry (wife Joy) of Hayden, Idaho; and his granddaughters Minna Dalton (and her son Koda with a new baby expected in June) of Spokane, Wash., Alura Waters of Missoula, Mont., and step granddaughter Melody Gimlin of Arizona (husband Dan and son Vincent).

under a contract with the city. Obvio also operates automated traffic enforcement cameras in College Park. Under the agreement with Greenbelt, Obvio owns and manages the camera equipment and processes violation data, while city officials make the final decision on whether a citation is issued. The contract allows for multiple cameras to be installed, though only a limited number can be active for enforcement at any given time. The contract was presented to council on January 28.

### Data Handling

The agreement also includes provisions for data handling and review. Violations are first processed by the vendor and then reviewed by an authorized city employee before being approved. City officials said data collected by the cameras can only be accessed for stop sign enforcement purposes. Under a 2025 state law, a subpoena or warrant is required to use that data for any other purpose.

### Costs

Financially, the program is structured so that program costs are recovered through citation revenue. Under the contract, the vendor is paid \$8.50 for each processed violation, along with \$1,000 per month for each active camera, with the remaining citation revenue going to the city. The News Review estimates that with the city keeping \$31.50 from each citation they would need to issue a minimum of 32

citations a month to cover their costs. The contract defines processed violations as those prepared and ready for approval, which means the city could stand to lose money (\$8.50) every time it declines to issue a citation that is processed by the cameras.

The initial contract term runs for 12 months from installation, with the option to renew annually. The announcement drew nearly

50 comments on the city's Facebook page, with residents showing support for stricter enforcement and skepticism about the need for cameras. Greenbelt officials say the program is expected to reduce crashes and improve pedestrian safety.

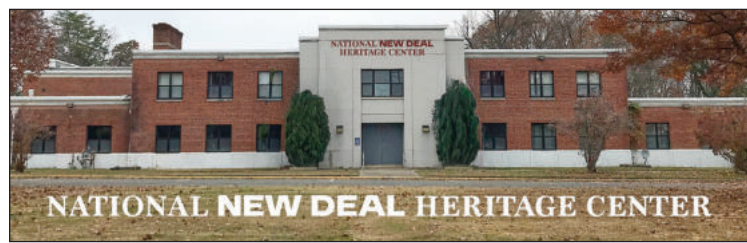

financial assistance for families for Recreation programs, \$10,000 in contractor costs for the Learn 2 Earn program, \$5,000 for senior trips and enhanced recreation offerings including more spots in circus camps and field trips.

Salmerón also mentioned that some items could not be covered: stipends for Learn 2 Earn that were previously covered by ARPA

funds and staffing for the Schrom Hills clubhouse.

Sections of the budget will be reviewed at worksessions over the next two months with the aim to approve the budget at the May 26 council meeting.

Other items were also addressed at the March 23 meeting. March was declared Colorectal Cancer Awareness month. Ify

Nwabukwu, executive director of the African Women's Cancer Awareness Association, was present to accept the proclamation. March 31 was recognized as Transgender Day of Visibility. Council also authorized the city manager to approve a contract with VMP Construction Management for roadwork improvement at Cherrywood Lane.

# Greenbelt Corp Pays \$4 Million Over "Unnecessary Procedures"

CVR Management, LLC, of Greenbelt, along with the Center for Vein Restoration, Center for Vascular Medicine (CVM), LLC and Sanjiv Lakhanpal have agreed to pay the United States government \$4 million in a settlement over allegations they billed Medicare, Medicaid and TRICARE for medically unnecessary vein treatment procedures.

The Center for Vein Restoration is a multi-state collection of physician-led vein treatment practices and medical centers specializing in diagnosing and treating vein disease. It operates 16 locations in Maryland. The CVM is a related practice group, specializing in the treatment of deep venous and arterial disorders in the legs, feet and pelvic areas. CVM operates several offices located in Maryland, Virginia and North Carolina. Lakhanpal is the entities' CEO and president and CVM's chair of the board. He leads the Greenbelt location of CVM, located at 7300 Hanover Drive.

The case came after complaints filed by two former employees and whistleblowers.

According to the government, over a six-year period, CVR submitted claims to Medicare, Medicaid and TRICARE for chronic venous insufficiency treatment procedures that were medically unnecessary.

Patients were treated for chronic venous insufficiency and symptoms such as varicose veins, cramping, swelling, skin discoloration, ulcers or skin necrosis on the legs. Between January 1, 2010, and December 31, 2016, the government alleges CVR knowingly billed Medicare, Medicaid and TRICARE for sclerotherapy, radiofrequency ablation and endovenous laser ablation procedures that were not clinically indicated and were medically un-

necessary. Neither Medicare, Medicaid nor TRICARE cover the treatment of varicose veins for cosmetic reasons alone.

"Billing for medically unnecessary procedures saps public confidence in the health care system and is a drain on [public funds]," said Kelly O. Hayes, U.S. Attorney for the District of Maryland, who announced the settlement on Friday, March 20. "We will hold accountable health care providers that knowingly engage in such conduct."

The federal share of the civil settlement is \$3,395,634.93. The total Medicaid recovery is \$604,365.07, with eight Medicaid participating states and the District of Columbia slated to receive \$325,208.84 of the civil settlement and the United States \$279,156.23 of the Medicaid recovery. State Medicaid programs are jointly funded by the federal and state governments.

Under the qui tam, or whistleblower provisions of the False Claims Act, a private party can file an action on behalf of the United States and receive a portion of any recovery. In this case the two former employees, Karen Fulton and Jane Doe, will receive a \$752,000 share of the settlement.

The claims resolved by this settlement are allegations only and there has been no determination of liability.

Information for this article was gathered from the Maryland U.S. Attorney's Office, among other sources.

notice," said Kemari Legg, who lives near the project. "But also, on the weekend, you're going to do something."

"We woke up, and as Kemari said, there was a crane, and it just like, took the house down," said Kelly Brower, another nearby resident.

The home had been bought to create a staging area for work on the standpipe, which stores and supplies water for the city. While broader project information was shared publicly, residents say immediate neighbors received little direct, timely communication or added specifics.

### Sandblasting Work

More recently, residents say sandblasting work to remove old paint from the standpipe has created sustained noise levels exceeding 100 decibels outdoors. Decibels varied depending on their house location and where within the house the resident stood.

"That sander causes around over 100 decibels of sound in that area," Legg said. "From our house, it was 100 decibels."

Inside homes, residents reported levels between 60 and 80 decibels for hours at a time, accompanied by physical vibrations of the sandblasting.

"For us, it was 65 decibels in the house, 85 decibels outside of the house, and it was just constant," said Brower. "We're not as close, but you could still feel it. It's like a vibration and shaking for eight straight hours."

### Impacts on Residents

The noise has affected daily life, particularly for families with young children and pets. Without timely notice, residents need to brace for the noise impact or create an impromptu plan of action.

Residents were provided with earplugs, said Legg, but they are not entirely effective with children and toddlers.

"We both have toddlers and young babies as well," Legg said. "So, it's not something that you can just put headphones over them easily."

Residents say the response from project representatives has been inconsistent. In one instance, residents said they were informed of ongoing work only after it had already started.

"This is going to be a two-day

job today and tomorrow," Brower recalled being told. The work ultimately extended beyond that timeframe without clear follow-up communication.

Residents emphasized that their frustration is not with the necessity of the project itself, but with the lack of communication surrounding it.

"At the very least, they can let us know when it's happening, so I can make a plan to be gone as much as possible," Brower said.

Other impacts include, but are not limited to, disrupted sleep schedules, inability to use outdoor spaces and stress on pets.

Legg has moved his daughter's nap location to the basement because it is 80 decibels in her room.

"You can't relax in your own home," said Brower.

### Outreach, Operations

WSSC facilitated various city and outreach meetings since 2023 to inform Greenbelt about the rehabilitation project and types of construction to expect. The last meeting was held virtually on November 12, 2025.

The construction contractors use a digital sound level meter to ensure they stay within 90dB at 100 feet from the source, says WSSC. In the next phase of work, which begins late spring/early summer, they will work on other methods to reduce noise and its impact on the community.

Construction hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, with potential work on Saturdays, according to WSSC.

Prior to demolition, lead and asbestos were found in the house and standpipe. Careful removal, testing and disposal of both were strictly followed in accordance with all federal and state safety/environmental regulations, says WSSC.

"We understand this work has been disruptive at times, and we sincerely apologize to the community for that impact. We are

committed to doing better with advance notification, especially ahead of louder construction activities, so residents know what to expect and when," said Lyn Riggins, WSSC section manager, External Communications and Livestream Operations.

So far, the project is 40 percent complete.

While acknowledging the importance of maintaining public infrastructure, residents say clearer, more consistent communication would significantly reduce the burden.

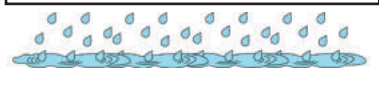

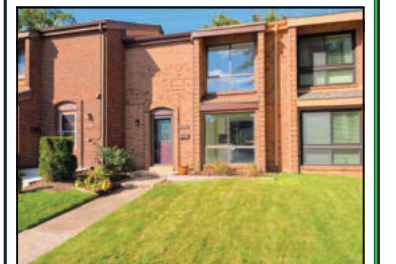

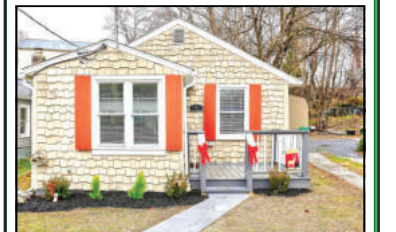
