## Beltway Plaza Redevelopment Six-year Extension Approved

The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC) Prince George's County Planning Board has accepted Quantum Companies' six-year extension for the redevelopment of Beltway Plaza, citing financing challenges tied to high interest rates and shifting economic conditions.

The redevelopment of Beltway Plaza, which originally opened in 1963, has been discussed for near-

ly 30 years, according to Kenny Wine, vice president of operations at Quantum Companies, the property owner of Beltway Plaza.

### Phased Project

Plans call for a phased, mixed-use project that would add 2,500 residential units and 700,000 square feet of commercial space, including community amenities, while preserving most of the existing mall.

## From Pockets of Excellence: PGCPS' Vision and Budget

Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) Interim Superintendent Shawn Joseph has had to cut \$150 million from the budget. In fall budget discussions, he pledged to keep those cuts as far from the classroom as possible. Joseph's budget, which was presented in January, despite requirements it be shared earlier (see the February 12 News Review) is only a proposal until a final board vote and adoption by the county. Along with his proposed budget, Joseph's Budget Equity Plan, presented in February, aims to address variance within the district. In his 100-day message in the fall Joseph said, "Variance shows up in opportunity, access and expectations, where a child's experience can depend too much on their school, their zip code or the adults around them." The budget "is a strategic tool to move the district from isolated pockets of success to systemic opportunity for all," said a February press release. Joseph's equity presentation offers three existing pockets: magnet, immer-

sion, and International Baccalaureate (IB) and Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) programs. "These programs are strong, but they do not serve most students," states the slide entitled "What We Built." The News Review interviewed Joseph to ask about his vision for moving the county's schools "from pockets of

excellence to excellence at scale" and what that means for specialty programs.

### Budget Cuts

Program cuts in the proposed budget for next school year already include eliminating boundary, middle and high school language immersion (though

## Consultants Report to Council On Current State Legislation

On March 25, the Greenbelt City Council held a worksession with the two city contractors who monitor state and county legislation for the city's information and possible action. The worksession was timed to coincide with cross-over day, the point in the legislative session (approximately the 69th day) in which proposed bills cross from one chamber to the other, indicating a bill's progress toward enactment. All councilmembers attended as contractors Darrell Carrington of Carrington Associates and James Tarlow of LA Perez Consulting presented.

### State Bills of Interest

Mayor Emmett Jordan began the session by asking Carrington which, if any, of the proposed state bills required council atten-

tion. Carrington noted that coordination between city and county has already begun by City Manager Josué Salmerón for House Bill 34/Senate Bill 189 (HB 34, SB 189), requiring municipalities to improve open drainage and inlet sites. Carrington told council that grant funding to aid municipalities in completing required work was available, but did not offer details.

Carrington informed council that he is especially monitoring other bills for recommended council action. One bill, HB 0172, expanding requirements on body-worn cameras, would have "fiscal

impacts" if enacted, according to Carrington. There may be requirements for enforcement, equipment purchases and data retention in the bill. Proposed legislation modifying funding for Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (HB 386, SB 281), increasing resources for dementia and other brain health disorders (HB 446, SB 555) and consumer data privacy (HB 711, SB 504) is being closely monitored, Carrington said.

A proposed bill concerning correctional services and

Four candidates, all Democrats, are running for three available spots in the 2026 Maryland House of Delegates District 22 election. Two current delegates, Anne Healey and Nicole Williams, are not seeking reelection. Ashanti Martinez is the only incumbent on the ballot.

### Ashanti Martinez Candidate Statement:

"I'm running for re-election to continue fighting for what matters most to Maryland families: strong public schools, affordable healthcare and real economic opportunity. As State Delegate and House Majority Whip, I've focused on policies that improve daily life like lowering barriers to care, supporting working families and investing in safer, healthier communities. I believe government should expand opportunity and protect people's dignity. That means fully funding public education, strengthening our workforce, addressing housing affordability and making smart, responsible investments that move our state forward. I'm proud to represent District 22 and remain committed to showing up, listening and delivering results. This work is about building a Maryland where everyone, regardless of background, has a fair shot to succeed."

ton, is a Maryland state delegate and House majority whip. He attended Parkdale High School and Howard University. Martinez has worked as an aide to the Maryland Legislative Latino Caucus, political director for a congressional campaign, a constituent aide in Prince George's County government and a policy analyst at CASA. He also served as chief of staff to a county councilmember before being elected to the House of Delegates.

### Tracy Gant

Gant did not provide a candidate statement to the Greenbelt News Review.

Gant is mayor of Edmonston and has served in local government since 1992, when she was

## Springhill Lake School Enrollment an Issue

I write in reaction to the recent article published on March 19, 2026, entitled, Springhill Lake School Plans Shared at Town Hall Meeting. I commend Ms. Charleston for providing an informative summary of the meeting. However, it appears that the meeting may not have included a discussion of school enrollment data vis-a-vis the plans for the new school construction. You see, at the beginning of the 2025-26 school year, Springhill Lake had 803 students enrolled in a school building that has capacity for 605 students (more than 30 percent oversubscribed). The new school design, as presented to the Advisory Planning Board on January 7, 2026, indicates a projected capacity of 850 students, which exceeds current enrollment by only about 5 percent. Given the anticipated construction of three multifamily residential buildings (approximately 750 units total) at Beltway Plaza, it seems likely that the new school capacity could be

exceeded before or soon after its doors are opened.

To avoid such oversights in the future, PGCPs must engage community stakeholders in discussions about community schools before the design stage. One assumes they would have quickly discovered that the plans were inadequate for near-term enrollment. We can only hope that PGCPs has already gotten this feedback and is acting upon it as we speak.

## City Notes

Spring camps and activities offered by Recreation included two annual egg hunts and, at Springhill Lake Recreation Center, a five-day basketball clinic and a community soccer game with Greenbelt Police.

Parks/Ballfields repaired the skate park fence and installed wood fiber chips in the dog park. Streets removed a concrete pad at Braden Field and installed a camera at Schrom Hills Park. Facilities Maintenance installed chiller pipes on the Community Center roof and replaced a pump at the Aquatic & Fitness Center. Recycling/Sustainability attended a national meeting on recycling plastics.

Animal Shelter residents are five cats, five kittens and a dog after three adoptions. Of 117 spay/neuter vouchers issued, 71 have been redeemed. Code Enforcement inspected 14 commercial suites and 15 rentals.

Therapeutic Recreation, Rangers and Information Technology met with seniors for a monthly Tech Café.

During March, CARES counseled 212 clients, mentored 17 aspirants for GED and six for workforce development, tutored 17 school students and 13 ESOL students.

## New Deal Heritage Center Not Needed

In reference to Frank Gervasi's proposal to have the Armory house a New Deal heritage site, while laudable, cost concerns along with other proposed city

uses for the Armory make this proposal unnecessary and duplicative.

Greenbelt has a museum highlighting the Roosevelts and the New Deal era. Over the past decade it has doubled in size and programming. There are numerous 1930s structures, sculpture and architectural elements throughout the city from the New Deal era, as well as a number of informative plaques.

Anniversary books have been published and the various local co-operatives reference the New Deal era. The Greenbelt News Review periodically publishes articles on events and people from the 1930s and 1940s.

The FDR memorial at the D.C. Tidal Basin pays homage to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, as does the museum, visitor center and presidential library in Hyde Park, N.Y., along with the nearby Eleanor Roosevelt home and visitor center. I have visited both. I recall references to the three Greenbelt towns and public housing projects at both sites.

These, along with numerous written and archival materials, show there is no lack of tributes to the New Deal and the Roosevelts.

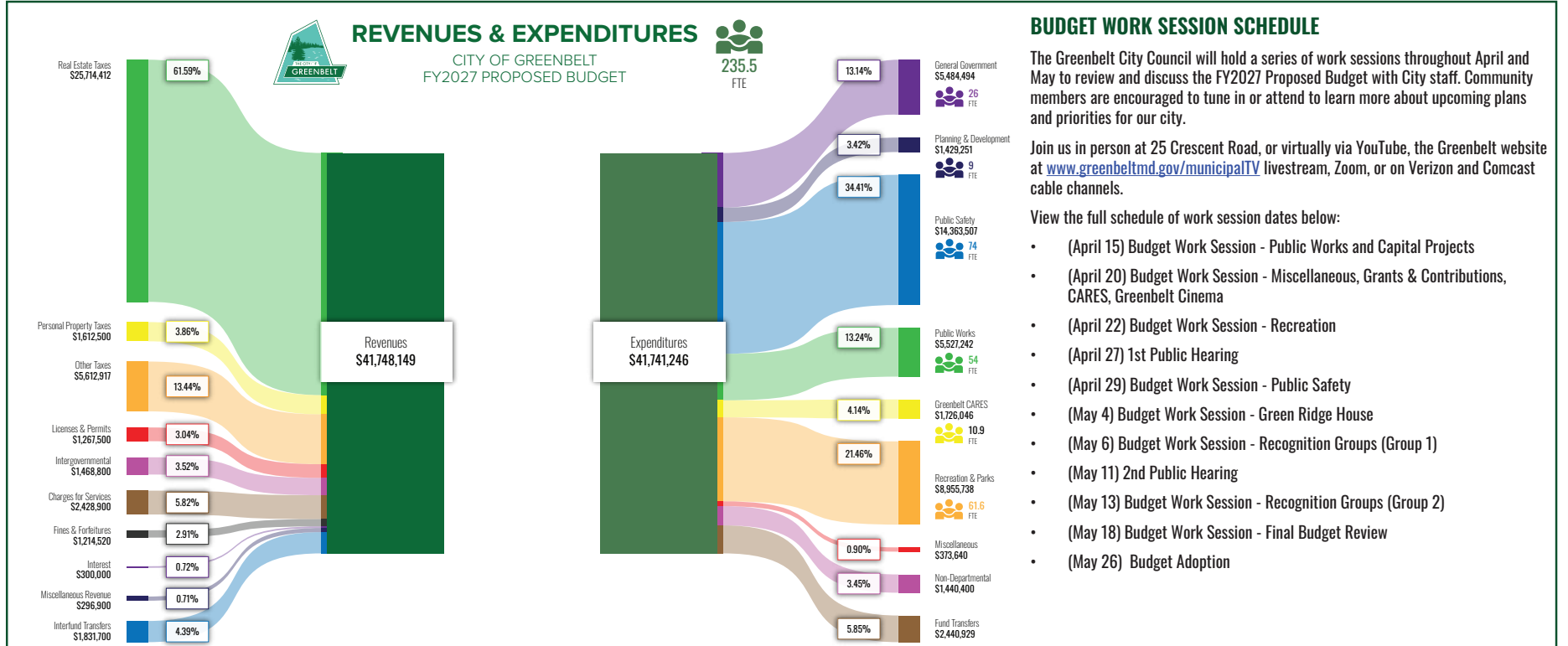

not language immersion programs at K-8 lottery schools), cutting IB programs at the elementary and middle school levels (though continuing the high school program) and discontinuing AVID courses (for college and career readiness in grades 6-12). The rationale for these cuts is under-enrollment and disproportionate costs that serve few students, says Joseph (see the February 5 issue).

However, the budget also cuts funding for staffing at magnet programs, an assistant principal and professional school counselor for the science and technology (S&T) magnet programs at Eleanor Roosevelt, Charles Herbert Flowers and Oxon Hill high schools and an assistant principal and counselor for the aerospace magnet program at DuVal High (see the February 19 issue). Entrance to those programs is competitive and capped by the district.

Families are currently selecting programs for their children to enter this fall; some are accepting seats for specialty programs or watching waitlist numbers with anticipation.

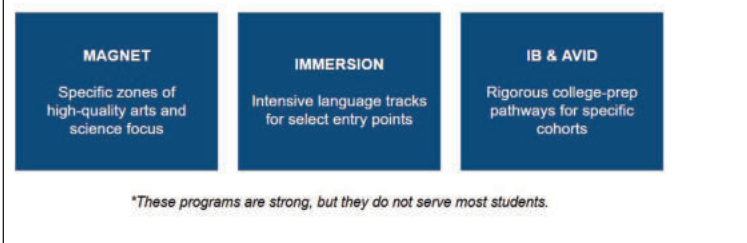
"Families should feel confident that [they] are accepted into our specialty programs, including our science and technology program, that they will continue to operate and remain a part of Prince George's County Public Schools offerings," said Joseph. "As all districts facing significant fiscal pressure [we] will continue to monitor enrollment, monitor outcomes and sustainability to ensure programs remain strong and equitable," he told the News Review.

Asked if he felt confident those programs can continue at the caliber that they have been despite the reductions outlined in the budget snapshot, Joseph said, "Absolutely."

### ERHS S&T

We also asked Eleanor Roosevelt High School (ERHS) Principal Portia Barnes about how the cuts to S&T staffing will impact the program there. "Science and Technology students will receive the same support from their grade level team," said Barnes. "Each team has an administrator and two professional school counselors, [so] while the cut has an impact, it does not impact in a manner that prevents the Science and Technology students from receiving the direct support from those positions," Barnes told the News Review. "While it is certainly impactful, the ERHS Science and Technology program has a very strong academic and organizational structure; I feel very confident we will be able to pivot and it will not place our program or students at a deficit," Barnes said. "While we are losing the positions, the program is designed with a Science and Technology Coordinator who is supported by our STEM staff and the entire administration and guidance teams," she explained. This summer, under the proposed budget, S&T programs will also lose the summer bridge program that has traditionally oriented incoming S&T students and helped prepare them for the program. "Summer Bridge is an opportunity for our incoming Science and Technology students to get acclimated to the program expectations and be exposed to lessons, activities and

team building. It requires funds for staffing and resources. If we do not have the funds we cannot offer it; however, the ERHS Science and Technology team along with the support of the PGCPS STEM office are brainstorming how to provide some form of engagement," Barnes told the News Review.

### Redeploying Resources

PGCPS has to look at the current resources they have and figure out how to "redeploy them in a way that allows us to have greater consistency in building capacity," says Joseph. "You have to have high support and high expectations and rigorous curriculum to scale. ... We're in the process of building a new strategic plan that will be out July 1. And when that plan comes out, a big part of that plan is thinking about how we build capacity and what that looks like, particularly in reading and mathematics."

### Pockets of Excellence?

We asked Joseph if he sees what he has called "pockets of excellence" and "islands of excellence," as programmatic rather than geographic and if he sees a way to expand successful programs, to admit more students to science and tech models, for example, and how he sees specialty programs and magnet programs fitting into a system that's moving away from "pockets of excellence."

"I think it's important for me to say, I was the principal of one of the highest performing magnet programs in Maryland," replied Joseph, who was principal of Roberto Clemente Middle School in Montgomery County, which he explained had both a mathematics magnet and a humanities and media magnet program. "I was the Maryland State Principal of the Year in 2009 for the approach we took to not only look at the resources that those schools within the schools carry, but how we leveraged their presence to raise

the level of quality expectation ... across the entire school there back from those days in 2005 to 2009. So, I believe in magnet education," he says. "I'm very versed with what it takes to really not only run one, but to make sure students are going off and living out their wildest dream. But I believe that we must focus on ensuring all kids in every neighborhood have high quality options. I think we have to use the limited resources that we have to ensure just that."

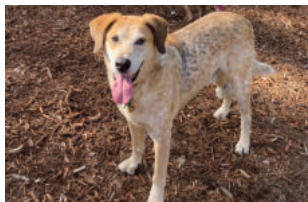
Prince George's County's magnet schools and specialty programs have origins in attempts at desegregation and equity themselves. They give children opportunities to study at a school outside their geographical boundary, through lottery applications or seats that are offered based on grades rather than parent applications. "I think Prince George's County's magnet history had ... more to do with working with the desegregation policies and things we went through. We're a much different district than we were in the 1980s at this moment. And so ... I think that there's an opportunity to keep the strength of the current specialty programs that are in place, but also work to scale quality in those non-specialty programs. And that's really what I'm focused on."

### Scaling Quality

How do you scale quality? "I think you invest in professional development. You invest in technology that helps you focus on consistency and feedback much better. I think you make investments in resources, high quality resources so all kids have access to high quality resources. You look at the ecosystem," he said. "We are an environment that is rich in science and technology and institutions," said Joseph. "We can partner with them. We've got to be competitive to recruit and retain the best teachers."

### IN MEMORIAM: JENKINS

We don't know much about Jenkins' first year, but he found his way from Florence, S.C., to the Washington, D.C., area thanks to an animal rescue service in September, 2009. He lived in Hyattsville with his adopted family for the next 10 years, where he earned a reputation as an escape artist and congenial fellow, connecting his people with many neighbors.



Over time, Jenkins grew into a canine who commanded respect, demonstrating maturity and purpose. Many who met him addressed him as "Mister," "Sir," or "Mr. J."

After the family moved to Greenbelt in 2019, Jenkins explored all the streets and trails of Old Greenbelt, often wanting to find new ways to navigate through the city. He carried an expectation of acceptance through any doorway, frequenting dog-friendly businesses regularly. He loved to go shopping and to hang out with people listening to music or dining. As an elder, Jenkins was a steady presence, gently guiding, inviting us to savor every moment, as he seemed to — well into his 17th year.

He departed from this existence March 13, with his loved ones by his side. A Celebration of Life will be held on April 17 at the family home. Contact Elizabeth Arnold for details.

So, with a focus on reducing variance, does Joseph see magnet schools, immersion and IB in the future of Prince George's County in five years and 10 years? "I do," says Joseph.

Asked about his equity presentation that advocates a "reversal" from concentrations of excellence and "redistribution" to "excellence at scale," Joseph says, "I wasn't talking about taking anything away. The term [reversal] ... referred to reducing systemwide variance and access and resource allocation, not abandoning the excellent specialty programs we have. And again, under fiscal pressure over time ... excellence can become concentrated in specific programs. And our goal ... the

reversal is about interrupting the patterns of inequity by strengthening high quality opportunities more consistently across the district, not eliminating the programs that we currently have."

"I feel good about where we landed," says Joseph of the budget. "I feel like we can continue to grow all of our students, all of our 132,000 students in the district, and be very thoughtful and methodical."

## PGCPS Adds Five Extra Minutes To School Day; Buses Unchanged

After spring break, Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) returned to a slightly longer school day on Tuesday, April 7. The day will be five minutes longer until the end of the school year on June 18.

The Office of School Support and Leadership worked with IT and transportation to provide guidance to school principals, Senior Public Information Specialist Lynn McCawley told the News Review. "Every school was asked to add five minutes to their bell schedule, either at the start or the end of the day — whichever worked best for their schools — to help meet state-mandated hours for instruction that were lost due to inclement weather."

"Schools will determine how this additional time is scheduled within their daily routines," says the PGCPS website announcement.

There are no changes to school bus schedules with the slightly longer day. That is be-

cause there is "a buffer built in that can absorb those five minutes without needing to change route times," says McCawley. Some parents report that their children already routinely miss the start of the instructional day due to the bus schedule, while others arrive within the buffer that McCawley says is in place.

The five minutes a day, along with converting some early dismissals and previous days off to full instruction days, is part of PGCPS' agreement with the state to make up lost time due to inclement weather days. The state already granted county schools a waiver of the requirement of 180 instructional days in the year so that they do not need to hold school past June 18.

## New Policy to Protect Students During Immigration Enforcement

The Prince George's County Board of Education has approved a new policy establishing clear protocols for Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) staff when interacting with immigration enforcement agents. Adopted March 26, the policy outlines how administrators and staff should respond if immigration enforcement agents are present on school property, with an emphasis on safeguarding students' rights, minimizing disruption and maintaining secure learning environments.

The policy has several important provisions: "The Board does not consent to the conduct of immigration enforcement operations on school property" and designates private spaces (classrooms, school buses and other instructional spaces) where immigration officials may not enter without permission unless they have a judicial warrant or in case of exigent circumstances (emergency situations that constitute an imminent threat to public safety).

The policy designates a PGCPS official from the central office to be "the primary point of contact for issues related to immigration enforcement." The designee will be tasked with developing a communication plan that informs the community about immigration enforcement activities occurring in PGCPS schools and making resources (immigrant students' rights to receive an education, information about protections, and legal and mental health information) available to parents. The superintendent/designee will also oversee staff receiving "professional development addressing the steps that they are required to take if immigration enforcement agents appear on school property, or during extracurricular events," whom to contact at PGCPS and how to document any actions that ensue. Staff can deny immigration enforcement agents access to private spaces in the school, but they may not interfere with or "attempt to conceal any person ... or assist any person in evading the immigration enforcement agent." There are also procedures in cases where agents present a judicial warrant or assert that exigent circumstances exist or where students or staff members are taken into custody as a result of an enforcement action.

District leaders say the policy is designed to ensure schools remain safe, supportive spaces

where all students can learn without fear, while providing staff with consistent, legally grounded guidance for handling these situations. "This policy underscores the district's dedication to equity, student protection and compliance with federal and state laws, while providing guidance on safeguarding student information and outlining procedures for school personnel when interacting with immigration authorities," said Board Member Aimee Olivo, vice chair of the Board's Policy and Governance Committee which was instrumental in drafting this policy.

Several representatives from We Are CASA, the immigrant advocacy organization, attended a news conference on Thursday evening in support of the measure. "The new school policy reflects the protective measures urgently needed to ensure that all students, regardless of race, ethnicity or circumstance, feel truly welcome and valued in our school communities. When students feel safe, attendance improves and families are more engaged. PGCPS has demonstrated a clear commitment to our Maryland values and stands as an example to all school systems seeking to establish protective policies that are truly responsive to the authentic needs of their most impacted students during this time of deep fear and anxiety," said Shannon Wilk, director of education at We Are CASA.

Schools may enact a shelter-in-place protocol if immigration enforcement enters or comes within 1,000 feet of school property. Principals have the authority to implement this measure.

## ERHS Robotics Club Advances To VEX World Championship

“The plan is to leave the mall untouched for the most part,” Wine said.

The project is designed to be built in phases, with construction largely focused on underused areas of the property, including parking lots. Existing businesses are expected to remain open throughout the process.

“We’re not going to be evicting anybody, no one,” Wine said. “The whole plan is to keep everyone open.”

### Stalled Progress

Despite early approvals, progress has stalled in recent years due to financial obstacles. Wine said the primary barrier has been securing funding in a difficult economic climate.

“That’s the entirety of the obstacle,” he said, referring to financing challenges.

According to Wine, a previously lined-up development partner withdrew from the project due to rising costs, forcing the company to restart its search.

The requested six-year extension is intended to address that uncertainty.

“The extension is really just to buy us more time to find someone that can help finance the project,” Wine said.

### Potential Impacts

For residents and local business owners, the delay raises questions about when the long-anticipated transformation will take shape.

Some merchants remain optimistic about the potential impact. Regina Bethea, owner of Laugh Out Loud (LOL) Stations Mega Fun Center, said the redevelopment could bring new life to the area. LOL came to Greenbelt in 2011 and Bethea had a vision of a family venue where people could come together and make memories. She went on to bring children’s theater to the mall (see the September 28, 2023 News Review) and had plans for a childcare facility in the mall. Though Bethea has since decided to retire, she’s excited about what the redevelopment will mean for the area.

“It’s an amazing concept to be able to have that vacant space in the back parking side to create affordable housing,” said Bethea. “I’m hoping it’s affordable, but at least to create more housing in the area that’s multi-mixed use.”

In February, however, the Greenbelt City Council sent a letter to M-NCPPC expressing concern that the new Springhill Lake Elementary School building will not accommodate the estimated 350 additional students projected to live in the 2,500 new units approved in the Beltway Plaza residential construction (see the March 5, 2026 issue).

### New Recreation Facility

Plans also include community-oriented features, such as a recreation facility to be created after part of an existing building is removed during later phases of development.

Community member and Chair of the City’s Advisory Planning Board Ben Friedman is particularly excited about the recreation possibilities for the Franklin Park area that will be part of the new development. The part of the building that once housed Sports Authority and is currently home to LOL Stations will become a recreation facility for the city, Friedman told the News Review.

### Upcoming Upgrades

Betha suggests that revitalizing the aging shopping center could help retain local spending.

“It’s high time that that mall was redeveloped and improved to keep the money in Greenbelt,” Betha said.

In the meantime, Wine says Quantum Companies is continuing to invest in the current mall, including upgrades and new food options to keep the space active.

“We’re adding a mini food court with lots of different ethnic foods, which is very exciting,” Wine said.

While the extension does not guarantee the project’s completion, it preserves the developer’s ability to move forward if financial conditions improve.

For now, the future of Beltway Plaza remains in a holding pattern, one that reflects both the ambitions and the challenges of redevelopment in an unpredictable economic climate.

detention facilities (HB 1018, SB 985) may, if enacted, have policy implications but limited direct impact on the city.

### Not Moving Further

Several bills of interest which are not moving further through the legislative process include the “bottle bill” (SB 342) as it is opposed by some groups. The Voting Rights Act of 2026 (HB 350, SB 255) did not cross over to the Senate. HB 577, SB 159 SB 334 regarding firearm modifications, a bill about ambulance medical services (HB 779, SB 0439) and related to it, HB 797 about employment discrimination against fire and rescue employees, and HB 1223 about farmers markets and street vending, which could have affected inspection and enforcement, also did not cross over.

Pausing the presentation for questions, Jordan expressed disappointment that the bottle bill is not moving forward, as many residents had expressed strong feelings that it would have a positive effect on the environment. Carrington informed council that in states in which it was law, it had become controversial.

### County Legislation

Tarlow began his presentation by reminding council that national issues such as immigration, law enforcement and the environment are influencing local legislation

without naming specific bills. He said county council is responding aggressively to immigration enforcement and childcare issues. A resolution to set up a workgroup to streamline development, including changing permitting requirements (CB-014-2026), has passed.

“Quality of life” issues were the basis of new legislation now in committee. One bill would raise fees for liquor stores, storage facilities and tobacco and firearm retailers. Tarlow noted that Prince George’s County has the second highest concentration of liquor stores per resident of any municipality [sic] in the country.

A bill that would remove the exemption from site plan review for data centers is in committee, Tarlow reported, from which ensued a council discussion about regulating data centers.

### Impact on Greenbelt

Of the legislation he is monitoring, Tarlow said, the recently adopted Prince George’s County Council Community Ownership Program Rules and Regulations resolution (CB-005-2026) may impact Greenbelt most by imposing new requirements on communications within homeowner and condominium associations and housing cooperatives.

Jordan asked Tarlow and Carrington for their opinion on how council may have the most impact

on legislation affecting Greenbelt, and both said that attending committee and public hearings would be the most beneficial.

In conclusion, Jordan noted that the end of one legislative session leads to the beginning of the next and council needs to remain continuously informed.

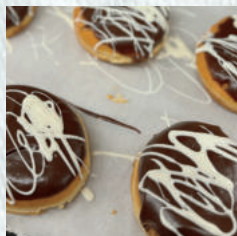

## Greenbelt Makerspace to Hold Monthly Repair Cafe Events

The Greenbelt Makerspace has announced a new schedule for its popular Repair Cafes: they will take place from 10 a.m. to noon on the third Saturday of every month, with the first events planned for April 18, May 16 and June 20, coinciding with their regular tool library open hours on those days. At these community service events, Makerspace tools, resources and volunteers will be available to help fix household items at no cost. All are invited to bring personal items that need repair, including small appliances, bicycles, jewelry and clothing.

Until now, the Makerspace had held Repair Cafes every three months, one week before Greenbelt's quarterly electronics recycling pickup, offering community members a chance to fix items before disposing of them. This move to monthly events is a response to popular demand. Past Repair Cafes were several hours long, typically supported by 15 to 25 volunteers and drawing 30 to 50 attendees. Meeting last month, Makerspace volunteers decided to try out shorter but more frequent events, hoping it would make the events more accessible to the public, easier to prepare for and less strenuous for the volunteers.

The Makerspace (officially, the Greenbelt Makerspace Cooperative, Inc.) is a nonprofit, community-owned cooperative, run by a group of about 60 volunteers and located in the Granite Building (115 Centerway, Suite 108), open Thursdays from 6:30 to 8 p.m.,

Saturdays from 10 a.m. to noon and Sundays from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Membership is open to all adults - not only Greenbelt residents - with annual membership fees suggested based on income, starting at \$20. In addition to the Repair Cafe sessions, which are open to all free of charge, it offers a tool-lending library and a members' workshop area, where members can work on personal projects during open hours.

The tool-lending library is currently the Makerspace's primary function. During open hours, the Makerspace is often buzzing with activity, and volunteers assisting members who have stopped in to borrow or return all manner of tools. The catalog of over 800 items includes the kind of tools one might expect in a well-stocked workshop - drills, wrenches, saws - as well as garden tools, kitchen appliances, sewing machines and other miscellaneous tools. In the future, the Makerspace aims to also offer instructional classes on various topics related to DIY projects.

The Greenbelt Makerspace is a member of the Repair Cafe International Foundation, which was founded in the Netherlands in 2009. When the Makerspace started holding Repair Cafes in 2014, they were the first such events in the Mid-Atlantic region (see News Review, January 9, 2014). Although the concept has grown in popularity since then, with around 400 locations in the United States, Greenbelt is still

one of only three in Maryland. In addition to promoting repair rather than disposal, the Repair Cafes encourage people to repair items themselves, with support from Makerspace volunteers and resources. One of the main goals is for attendees to experience the accomplishment of repairing and building things themselves.
