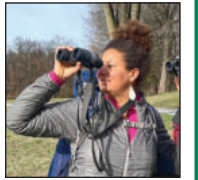

Save As You Throw Program Shows Early Reduction in Waste

Greenbelt's new Save As You Throw trash program is beginning to reduce waste, with residents saying it has changed how they manage household trash.

Early data show about 72 percent of households are using the pay-per-bag system, while 28

percent opted for the flat-rate Max Trash option, according to Sustainability Coordinator Luisa Robles. The city has also seen roughly a 16 percent reduction in waste so far.

Four Teens Indicted in Shooting Of 14-Year-Old Carltin Bayong

Carltin Bayong was a 14-year-old who had just begun his first year at Eleanor Roosevelt High School when he was killed in a drive-by shooting near Cherrywood Terrace and Breezewood Court in the middle of a Sunday afternoon. The shooting, which police said at the time

was thought to be targeted, took place at approximately 1:45 p.m. on October 5, 2025, and shook the community (see the October 9, 2025 News Review). On Friday, April 10, Greenbelt Police Department and Prince George's

Cooperatives Host Info Session On Possible Centerway Purchase

Greenbelt Homes Incorporated (GHI) and Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative (GCC) (known as the Co-op Supermarket and Pharmacy), co-hosted a well-attended meeting in the Youth Center on Thursday, April 9. The topic of discourse was whether both cooperatives should further explore GHI purchasing 121 Centerway, the Roosevelt Center structure that currently leases space to GCC and the Greenbelt Arts Center, and which includes the currently vacant ground floor space that formerly housed RCCG Restoration Church and the Greenbelt Post Office.

GCC approached the landlords about the potential purchase last spring and approached GHI about being the entity to make the purchase in August. This possible property purchase, which has been the subject of much discussion, brainstorming and volunteer fact-finding between the cooperatives' boards since October, would require earnest investigation involving preliminary expenses by GHI to procure assessment

and building information, legal counsel and potentially other forms of expert advice. GHI's current governance bylaws limit the resources its board can expend without getting formal input from the membership, and this meeting was held to gauge exactly that: whether the membership believes the next step is for the board to spend the money needed to

answer two questions: 1) Can/should we do this? 2) If so, what would that look like?

At kickoff, representatives from both GHI and GCC gave an overview of how this opportunity came about, the information gathered thus far, the universe of likely outcomes for each co-

On Screen at Greenbelt Cinema

The Christophers

Desperate for an inheritance, two siblings conspire to forge their father's unfinished paintings so they become valuable after his death. Said critic Bob Mondello of NPR, "A film that could have settled for being a masterclass in technique, but instead goes deeper, exploring questions of artistry, authorship, legacy."

Miroirs No. 3

During a weekend trip to the countryside, Laura, a young piano student from Berlin, miraculously survives a shocking car crash. Awakening in a nearby house, Laura finds herself in the care of a local woman, who tends to her with motherly devotion. As she recuperates, Laura begins to integrate herself into the lives of the woman and her initially reluctant husband and son. By turns haunted and hopeful, Laura and her adopted family reawaken to the world and come to find a strange harmony together. However, they cannot outrun the ghosts of the past, which begin to stir, as acclaimed director Christian Petzold (Phoenix, Transit) spins a modern gothic fairytale about the lies we tell ourselves and the strange ways that grief, connection and humanity bind and sustain us.

Plastic People

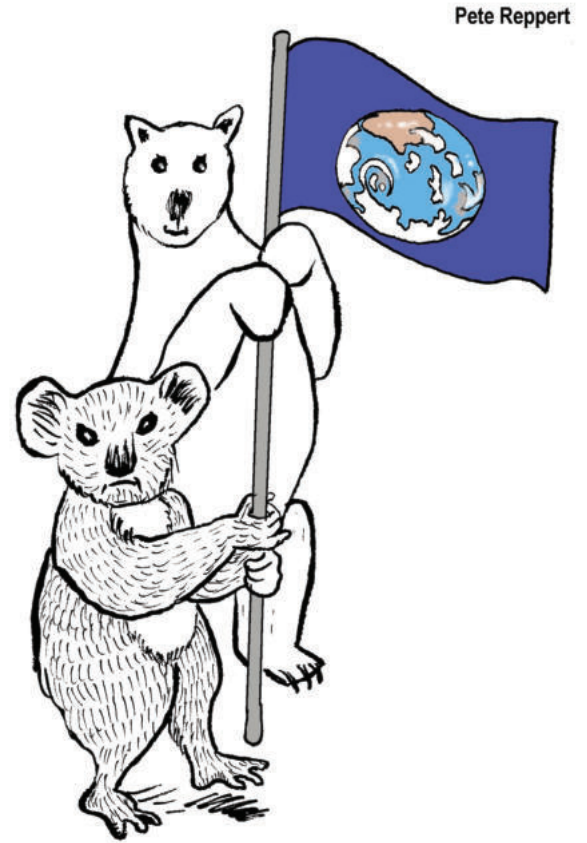

Razz Documentary Director's Cut Redux

On Sunday, April 26, enjoy a Greenbelt Cinema show followed by an after-party at the New Deal Café.

Razz was one of the most explosive, entertaining and influential live bands in 1970s Washington, D.C. From their start in 1971 to their breakup in late 1979, a cast of talent - including lead singer Michael Reidy, drummer Greenbelter Doug Tull, bassist Ted Niceley and guitarists Bill Craig, Abaad Behram and Tommy Keene - became a wholly original rock band amid a club scene dominated by cover bands, and a record industry that found them impossible to label. One year after their Director's Cut premiere screening, the filmmakers return with even more Razz stories, music and memories in honor of iconic front man Reidy, who died in March.

WSSC STANDPIPE REHABILITATION UPDATE

Beginning around Tuesday, April 21, a contractor will begin using specialized equipment called a Faster Blaster as part of the Greenbelt Standpipe rehabilitation project. This robotic machine performs blasting and painting work along the structure's walls and is expected to complete about 80% of the required blasting.

While still audible, it operates at a lower noise level than the conventional equipment used earlier, which will help reduce overall noise later in the project. This phase of work is expected to last approximately two to three months, with crews working between 8 am and 5 pm. Residents are thanked for their patience as the project continues to support reliable water service.

had activities that built our leadership skills and heard from inspiring guest speakers. Matt May, who works at Morgan Stanley, taught us the Rotary Four Way Test, which is a guide to help build healthy personal and professional relationships. We learned when solving a problem to ask ourselves: 1) Is it the truth? 2) Is it fair to all concerned? 3) Will it build goodwill and better friendships? and 4) Will it be beneficial to all concerned? Gregor Baum also spoke with us about his journey of having to end his professional tennis career due to injury. He created a workbook called The Inner Journey to help others on their path while navigating personal challenges. Lastly, Dr. Unnatti Jain, a behavior change expert, spoke with us about motivational speaking and how to build better relationships to create a more empowered life.

Team Projects

The main project over the weekend was a team community service project. As a group, we had to choose an issue in our community and present our solution to three judges, who determined whether or not our solution was applicable. For the project, we had to pick a nonprofit organization that focused on the issue we wanted to address. Three winners would win money for the organizations. First place won \$1,000, second place won \$500 and third place won \$250. The group that won first place would also be able to turn their project into reality. My group focused on ICE raids in the DMV and we came up with solutions to help families and youth that were affected. The nonprofit organization that we chose was CASA, which focuses on improving the quality of life for low-income immigrants through advocacy, legal services, job placement and community organizing. So many teams had amazing ideas and worked together to come up with solutions that will change society for the better. Although my group didn't win, I was glad to see that everyone was so passionate about their ideas and genuinely wanted to do good for their community.

Learning Experience

While at RYLA, I learned a lot about myself and how to be a better person for those around me. I made genuine friendships and became more motivated to be a leader. What's amazing is that RYLA doesn't stop there. I learned that teens can become Group Leaders, who manage the groups, almost like a camp counselor. My Group Leaders told me that I could become one next year if I wanted by asking and being recommended. I love that teens have the ability to make an impact with RYLA in so many different ways and that after attending RYLA camp, they still can participate.

I think RYLA is an amazing opportunity for teens; it teaches that speaking up can change lives around them. Rotary and RYLA prove that teens can make an impact. Bringing together teens to work on leadership and charity is powerful and inspiring. I believe that more teens should have this opportunity, as it has changed my way of thinking.

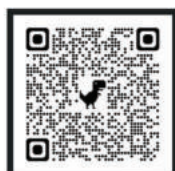

operative and the known and unknowns facing both potential action and inaction. Presenters came prepared with answers to and context for questions received through many avenues (including social media) and laid out either the best present understanding for each and/or the steps necessary to fully and accurately answer those inquiries requiring more intensive investigation than has been possible thus far.

Members were also asked to contribute suggestions or insights if they had them, and a poll for GHI members designed explicitly to rapidly capture feedback on this topic was made available to all eligible attendees.

Attendees brought many insightful and creative questions about what, ultimately, a potential purchase by GHI of this building would mean for members of each cooperative. While dozens of questions were posed to both co-op delegations, several key themes emerged from questions, such as:

Is GHI allowed to purchase the property under its current bylaws, or would the bylaws need to be amended prior to such a purchase, at the upcoming annual meeting, for instance?

What sort of lease terms would be appropriate and mutually beneficial for both GHI and GCC, and what process would be followed to increase the chances of successful financial outcomes for both entities?

What is the maintenance situation of the building?

Is GHI able to move quickly enough to see the deal through?

Multiple members also stressed the profound importance to the community of having a viable anchor business like GCC, citing the effects of its stability on other businesses in Roosevelt Center as well as food security, curb appeal

and quality of life considerations for many Greenbelters. Anxieties and curiosities surfaced as well, particularly around whether GHI's potential purchase of the building would slow or accelerate the rise in GHI monthly membership fees.

Today, GHI engages in real estate business through a wholly owned subsidiary, Greenbelt Development Corporation (GDC), which maintains the Parkway Apartments which generate rental income. Under current regulations, GHI is already permitted to realize revenue other than membership fees (rentals, fee for service, GDC), which could contribute to its balance sheet and potentially offset member fee increases, though there is no guarantee that such endeavors would do so.

The next step for GHI members is to contribute feedback to the Board of Directors, as to whether the remaining investigatory work should be conducted with GHI resources, as well as the urgency and transparency with which GHI should pursue or avoid this opportunity.

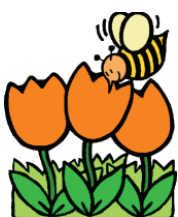
GCC President Kim Kash told the News Review the current deadline the cooperatives are working towards is May 19, which is the date by which GCC must indicate to the current owners of 121 Centerway whether or not the agreement will move forward.

Throughout the meeting, members of both boards stressed the importance of the pace of the decision, as finalization deadlines and annual meetings quickly approach.

Some details, including the proposed price of the purchase and GHI's bond holdings, were shared with members at the meeting but are not reported in this article due to the sensitive nature of the ongoing negotiation.

GAC's Sweat Depicts Workers' Pain During Economic Insecurity

Bob Kleinberg directs *Sweat*, Lynn Nottage's vibrant and hard-hitting play about how factory workers fight, strive and suffer as corporations squeeze unions and move equipment and jobs offshore. The play, which premiered nationally in 2015 and regionally at Arena Stage in 2016, is now onstage at Greenbelt Arts Center (GAC). It won a Pulitzer Prize for Drama - Lynn Nottage's second. She is the only woman in history to win two Pulitzers for drama.

The action is set in Reading, Pa., in 2000 and 2008. Nine skilled actors breathe life into the narrative of how, in Nottage's words, "poverty and economic stagnation shift the American narrative" at the start of the 21st century. Those characters - co-workers, friends, family members, a barkeep and a busboy - work through plans, pain, prejudice and the rupture that comes to workers' lives as Olstead's factory abruptly shifts from a union plant to a cost-cutting business model.

Snippets of morning radio newscasts introduce each of the 15 scenes of *Sweat* in soundbites that alternate the action between the years 2000 and 2008. They evoke the major issues of the day that form the context for actions the play's characters must navigate: the North American Free Trade Act, the tech bubble that burst at the end of the 20th century, the financial collapse of 2008 and national elections in both years. These stresses on a large scale are made particular and devastating for the lives of the play's characters. Most of those characters share a hangout in a neighborhood bar where much of the action occurs - wonderfully realized by set decorator Roy Peterson. Their off-stage workplace is a tubing plant that traditionally offered secure employment for these people, their parents and grandparents, but is already cutting costs in 2000 and has cut those lives loose by 2008.

All of the actors (Lauren Barnes, Emily Canavan, Cristian Hernandez, Larry LaRose, Taylor Peppers, Joshua Prescott, Melvin Smith, Ryan Willis and Jacqueline Youm) give strong performances and the ensemble superbly realizes the playwright's design. In a 2016 interview Nottage said she wanted to write an ensemble piece that functioned as a collective narrative, but "each of the characters has their own aria."

Several characters perform moving arias in this staging. As owners at Olstead's squeeze their workers to accept 60 percent wage cuts, the union strikes and management advertises for "scabs" to cross picket lines. Conflict, disillusionment and occasional wisdom erupt among the regulars at the bar. Tracy (Canavan), a white woman passed over for a promotion to management that her best friend Cynthia (Youm), a Black woman received, spits out that management just wanted "a minority." She bitterly recalls her family's decades-long history

at Olstead's and her craftsman father's many achievements. Brucie (Willis), Cynthia's estranged husband, spirals downward after management locks out workers at another factory for 93 weeks. He advises Chris (Prescott), his son, and Jason (Peppers) that "they never got back in." Take the concessions, he advises the young 'uns. Cynthia, doing her best to look after her fellow workers' interests, feels pride in having a desk and computer in the air-conditioned office suite after 20 years of working on the floor. "Sweet," she says, "doesn't even begin to describe it." Chris, working on a college degree before the strike and reflecting back on the whole process of deindustrialization, concludes, "the writing's on the wall; it's like we can't read."

The most powerful performance of the ensemble occurs in July 2000 when Cynthia's family and friends confront her at the bar upon learning that Olstead's will cut retirement and wages, and has taken three industrial machines to Mexico, dramatically downsizing the plant's capacity. Everyone shouts at once, but the ensemble so carefully choreographs the dialogue, that the audience hears every point of view and grasps the full impact of the news, person by person.

Sweat shows at GAC through April 25, Fridays and Saturdays at 8 p.m. and Sundays at 2 p.m. There is a talkback with cast and crew scheduled after the April 19 matinee. The running time is two and a half hours with one

15-minute intermission. Viewers are warned that *Sweat* contains abundant profanity, including one mention of the N-word, as well as smoking and violence.

In summarizing her play, Nottage says that in a fractured community where characters are hurting in isolation, she wanted to put those people into dialogue. "Some of the characters do have questionable morality ... everyone on that stage in some way is culpable and takes some responsibility for the outcome."

MAD's Moon Over Buffalo Brings Authenticity to "Mad" Characters

Fans of live theater will be in for a treat with *Moon over Buffalo*. More than a lively, door-slaming farce, it's a love letter to theater by Tony Award-winning playwright Ken Ludwig. Director Randy Barth has put together a terrific cast who work together beautifully. Every other line of this play is a zinger, but still, the talented NASA Goddard's Music and Drama Club (MAD) actors bring authenticity to the regrets and dreams of these "mad" characters.

The play catches George and Charlotte Hay (played with relaxed familiarity by Jon Gardner and Jill Goodrich) as their floundering theater company attempts to stage *Cyrano de Bergerac* in repertory with Noël Coward's *Private Lives* at the Erlanger Theater in Buffalo, a real-life venue that was famous for hosting this kind of touring production. Not only does this play incorporate versions of these two famous plays, but theater fans will love the quotations from Shakespeare peppered throughout.

The Hays' daughter Rosalind (Katie Frye) is fed up with her parents' crazy theater lifestyle and is now engaged to Howard, a starstruck weatherman (James Pildis), but her old flame Paul (Courtney McIntosh) is still the Hays' stage manager. Frye, Pildis and McIntosh bring youthful energy to their triangle, as their characters try to decide what they really want out of life.

George first appears in full *Cyrano* garb, with long false nose and pumpkin pants, trying to drag some enthusiasm from a corps of stage soldiers with a rousing speech. George is a ham, who according to his mother-in-law Ethel (Joanne Breen), should be stuck full of cloves and served with pineapple, and Gardner brings bluster and verve to a character who seems to be nearing the end of his rope. You can't bring a nose (and pants) like that on stage and not have it pay off later. Goodrich gives a steady and long-suffering portrayal of an actor who still hopes to become a star.

The crux of the play is that famous director Frank Capra is planning to come to their afternoon matinee to see if George and Charlotte might be a good fit for his film *The Twilight of The Scarlet Pimpernel*. The Hays are so unprepared they are not even sure which play is scheduled for the matinee, leading to a wonderful scene where Rosalind has to do the opening of *Private Lives* all by herself. Frye does a wonderful job as Rosalind ad libs half the lines, only for George to finally appear, staggering drunk and still dressed as *Cyrano*. Industry attorney Richard Maynard (Bob Singer) wants to take Charlotte

away from it all. He swears they will go on cruises, everywhere "from Rochester to Schenectady!" Because he has made "one, simple, innocent mistake," George is reduced to a drunken mess who repeatedly wakes up, screaming, "Oh my God! Charlotte!" every time, crying with joy and remorse as he thinks his wife has decided not to leave him after all. Despite their poor life choices, these characters are lovable, and the MAD cast and crew bring out the best in them. Don't miss the opening cabaret, *Wrong Turn, Right Song*, directed by Cathy McCoskey and

Keshav Swaminathan, whose performance of *Rainbow Connection* with special guest stars, the Muppets, is a tour de force!

DNR Firewise Program Offers Guidance on Wildfire Protection

March 2026 marked the one-year anniversary of the large brush fire that burned through the woods behind Greenbelt Elementary School and in the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC). (See the April 2, 2025 issue.) Though there were no fire-related injuries or structures lost - thanks to the Prince George's County Fire Department and other units - this is a good time to consider how to reduce the risk of future wildfires damaging homes and woodlands. There are many things Greenbelters can do, said Lance Carroll of the Maryland Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) Firewise program. Carroll toured Greenbelt on January 7 at the invitation of Greenbelt Homes, Inc.'s Woodlands Committee and the Greenbelt Forest Preserve Advisory Board, and met with a small group of residents on Plateau Place to share his assessment and tips.

Healthy Forest, Low Risk

Fortunately, Greenbelt's overall risk of woodland fires is "low," Carroll said. "Hardwood trees are predominant in Greenbelt forests and much less flammable than evergreens, such as pines," he said. Fires in a healthy hardwood forest usually remain at ground level, which makes them easier to extinguish. Greenbelt's March 2025 fire was indeed a leaf-and-brush fire which never reached the tree canopy. Still, a warming climate, increasing droughts and the spread of invasive plants stress everything that grows, and our risks will likely increase over time. (Track Maryland's drought status at <https://tinyurl.com/yck63jji>.)

In Maryland, 97 percent of wildfires are started by human activities. Carroll explained that outdoor fires pose the greatest risks. He was pleased to see no evidence of encampments in Greenbelt's woods, and the City of Greenbelt prohibits fires in our woods. He surprised the group by emphasizing that the most effective way to reduce wildfire risk to our homes starts in our own yards. The Maryland Firewise Program recommends creating "defensible" space 30 feet around the home and outbuildings, free of flammable materials. Evergreen trees and shrubs (including bamboo), piles of firewood and even wooden fences are examples of risk factors near a house. The program's webpage provides more details and many recommendations, dnr.maryland.gov/forests/pages/fire/firewise.aspx. See also sidebar.

Because the overall risk is low, gardeners living next to the woods may decide to densely plant their yard for aesthetics or ecological reasons, but they should consider keeping at least a few feet clear around their home. Four feet is good; 10 feet is better. As the climate continues to change, Greenbelt homeowners closest to the woods will need to develop larger defensible spaces.

Helping Firefighters

Firefighters need easy access to all sides of a home. In GHI, access lanes should be clear behind garden-side fences. Carroll often sees tangles of invasive plants blocking access to structures they

are trying to save. Examining a section of Plateau Place, where wisteria and other invasive vines were thoroughly removed by GHI volunteer woodland caretaker John McGovern, Carroll said, "It doesn't get much better than this" to reduce wildfire risk. Other preventive actions noted in surrounding yards included shrubs and flower beds that were planted several feet from the house (possible even in very small GHI yards). Homeowners should also keep leaves away from the perimeter of houses, decks, porches and latticework, and never store flammable materials under a deck.

In Greenbelt, invasive shrubs and vines have taken root in the forest, and Carroll said such plants can create a heavy fuel load and act as "fire ladders" making it easier for a fire to reach the tree canopy. Volunteers can help build the resilience of Greenbelt's woods by joining community workdays and learning best practices to remove the plants that choke trees and destroy habitats. Both the GHI Woodlands Committee and the City of Greenbelt host workdays in most seasons. Residents can also avoid planting invasive vines and shrubs such as wisteria, porcelain berry or bamboo in their yards.

The group discussed that in any fire, firefighters will need to triage and put their energy where they will have the most success. The biggest lesson the group learned from the state's Firewise program is: we each have a responsibility to prepare for wildfire.

The Prince George's County Fire Department has a tip sheet listing county rules for small recreation fires: keep the fire under adult supervision at all time; keep a hose, fire extinguisher or other means to extinguish the fire at hand; and no fires during drought or windy conditions. Fragile but Unbreakable: Porcelain War at the New Deal

A poster frequently displayed during protests against the Vietnam War stated simply: "War is not healthy for children and other living things." I thought of that while watching *Porcelain War*, a 2024 documentary filmed in Ukraine about the war that demonstrates how beautiful things are imperiled by war. The film shows the way the Russian invasion has devastated that country - and the refusal of people to allow war and destruction to define who they are. Geopolitical arguments begin to fade into insignificance when one looks at the impact foreign invasions have on people whose land is occupied.

Co-directed by Slava Leontyev and Brendan Bellomo, the film was screened on March 16 as part of the Reel and Meal series, wholly on-line for the first time since Covid restrictions were in place, due to a threatened storm (which didn't materialize until well after the film and subsequent discussion were over). Nonetheless, the post-film discussion was as lively and informative as those that take place in person.

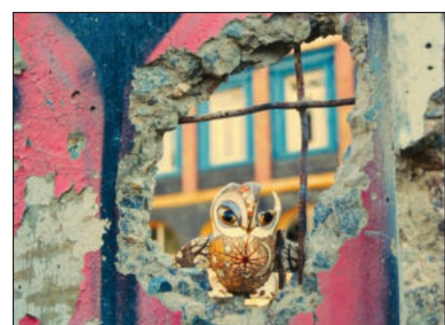
Central to *Porcelain War's* theme was the assertion that art is a form of resistance: "creativity, the opposite of war." The beautifully filmed documentary focuses on Leontyev and Anya Stasenko, who create figurines, objects that exemplify a refusal to give in to the horror of war, out of a material - porcelain - that is easy to break, but impossible to destroy. They continue to create despite constant shelling, staying in their village even as war surrounds them. This is itself a commentary on Ukrainian culture. Viewers get a sense of the beauty of the landscape and of the architecture, notwithstanding the scars of destruction wrought by bombing. The movie is largely filmed by their friend, Andrey Stefanov, who makes the difficult decision to remain and document the war - the resistance via art and personal integrity, resistance via arms. Leontyev becomes an arms instructor, as civilians become soldiers, taking up weapons to defend their town, defend their country.

Wars don't simply target buildings and fighters, they target families and children, creating disruptions and loss in a form that can never be calculated. Stefanov stays to document the destruction, while his wife and children leave, joining countless others who become refugees - like all refugees, through no fault of their own. Visuals of a snail remind us that, while snails travel with their homes on their backs, refugees are like snails without a shell. Music, perhaps, is a way of carrying one's home. The film's score is by DakhaBrakha, a Ukrainian folk band that combines traditional and modern music, mixing styles of different ethnic groups. The quartet gave their music to the film as a way to signal their support for the project. Listening, one is reminded of the music and sounds of *The Trumpeter* by Ukrainian playwright Inna Goncharova, which was performed recently at Dupont Underground; the musical themes and styles were different, but the underlying haunting notes spoke to the same spirit.

That spirit was captured in *Porcelain War* by Slava and Anya's dog, Frodo. Throughout the movie, seemingly impervious to the shattering sounds of bombs falling, he is everywhere - relentless, ever curious, gentle but courageous.

The screening was sponsored by the Greenbelt Pottery Group, based in the Community Center, which has participated in Ukrainian solidarity fundraising initiatives, and the Greenbelt Refugee Aid Committee (GRACE), which has been supporting Ukrainian refugees. Greenbelter Peter Vosekovsky led the post-film discussion, joined by Natalia, a Ukrainian English teacher who cheerfully spoke via Zoom from the war zone, although it was the middle of the night all those time zones away. The wide-ranging discussion moved from learning more about the film itself to learning about the war firsthand.

Baseball's Opening Day: A Season of Joy on the Field

Greenbelt Little League's opening day festivities on April 11 included an unusual feature: a public art dedication. Project supporters gathered around the sculpture *Joy* near the Braden tennis courts to reflect on the significance of the piece which depicts an abstracted figure mid-way through a cartwheel. The project was developed over the span of a year, culminating in the installation of the sculpture in December 2025. The piece was created by Impact Art and lead artists Ali Mirsky, Duffy and Howard Connelly, who also facilitated the installation. The project was managed by Nicole DeWald, arts supervisor with Greenbelt Recreation, and supported by Brian Townsend, Brian Abbott and colleagues at the Department of Public Works, who provided landscaping assistance and concrete work. It was funded through the American Rescue Plan Act as part of the Braden Athletic Complex renovation.

Thanks abounded also for the contributions of the project advisory committee (LaShel Baravechia, Chris Corson, Robert Goldberg-Strassler and Bill Wilkerson); Recreation leadership, City Manager Josué Salmerón and the Greenbelt City Council; users of the space who provided thematic and design input; and over 250 summer campers, Artful Afternoon participants and Golden Age Club members who helped to make, glaze and configure the mosaic elements that form the surface of the sculpture.

The rainbow colors of the mosaic celebrate the diversity of the Greenbelt community and the spirit of the Greenbelt Community Pledge. The cartwheel, in addition to being an expression of pure joy, depicts a fleeting moment in which an individual holds the entire earth in their hands; it is a moment of connection and a subtle reminder of our shared responsibility. Structurally, the sculpture is built around a steel armature covered in high density foam and fiberglass-reinforced concrete; while it should be treated with care, the sculpture is designed to be climbable.

The following is the language of the official dedication, delivered by Mayor Pro Tem Kristen Weaver:

"So much more than a feeling, joy can be seen as an indicator of both personal and community wellness. These values were close to the heart of Roy S. Braden, Greenbelt's first town manager - a champion of Recreation services for whom the Braden Athletic Complex is named. We honor his memory today, and all the keepers of his legacy.

"On behalf of Mayor Jordan and the entire Greenbelt City Council, I hereby dedicate the sculpture *Joy* as an enduring tribute to the richness of the Greenbelt community and our spirit of cooperation. Joy affirms the child in us all, powerfully present, full of awe and flourishing in freedom. Inspired by this uplifting artwork, may we all renew our

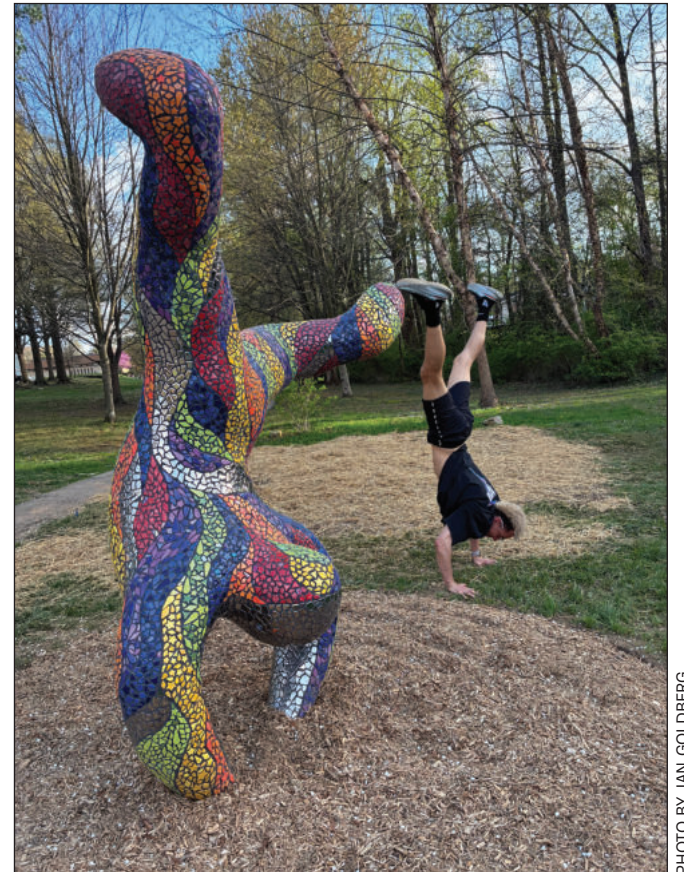

January, charges residents a base fee and then ties additional costs to how much trash they produce. Households can either buy special city bags or pay for a Max Trash sticker that allows up to three large bags (equivalent volume 99 gallons) of trash per week.

Resident Experiences

For some residents, particularly those in smaller households, the change has led to lower costs and less trash. Deborah Kijak Hess, who lives alone, said she chose the Save As You Throw option after reviewing the pricing.

"I'm in a one-person household, so when I looked at the cost analysis, Save As You Throw appeared that it was going to be a lot cheaper," she said. "And that's turning out to be the case."

Hess said the program also changed how she manages waste. Instead of putting out a bag every week, she now waits until it is full, reducing how often she sets trash out. "I don't throw out nearly as much trash as I thought I did," she said.

She said the program, which she initially thought would be complicated, has been easier than expected and works well for her neighborhood, which is made up mostly of one- and two-person households.

Evelyn Reisenwitz, who lives with her spouse and young child, chose the Max Trash option, citing the volume of waste from diapers and a preference for a simpler system. "I didn't want to have to think about what bags I was using," she said, adding that her household may reconsider once their child is older.

Reisenwitz said her own experience with the rollout was smooth, but she was concerned by confusion among other residents. "I think that my biggest concern is that folks were not open to the program because they did not understand the program," she said. She added that the city could have done more early on to clarify how the system would affect different households and what changes would be required.

Despite those concerns, Rei-

senwitz said she supports the program's overall goals. After initially feeling skeptical, she said the approach made more sense as she learned more about it and considered the alternative of raising costs for all households.

Reisenwitz said changes to trash collection, such as new requirements for placing cans outside GHI trash enclosures and closets, were a bigger adjustment than the pricing itself. Needing to remove trash cans from closets and enclosures created challenges for some households, particularly those with mobility limitations. "I'm sure for some folks, that was actually quite a transition for them," Reisenwitz said.

Waste Reduction Goal

City officials have said the program is intended to encourage residents to reduce waste and delay reaching capacity in existing landfills. The alternative would have been raising flat fees for all households, regardless of how much trash they produce.

Reisenwitz said that while the rollout was difficult for some, the program appears to be stabilizing after its first few months. "I think the toughest part of the program was the rollout," she said. "Change is hard."

Hess said she hopes the program continues, pointing to the reduction in waste and its potential to encourage recycling and composting. "I will not be a happy camper if we end up having to go back to the way we were," she said.

City officials said more data will be analyzed in coming months as they evaluate whether the program is meeting its long-term goals. Further financial details will be shared at a city council budget worksession on Public Works scheduled for Wednesday, April 15.

County State's Attorney Tara Jackson announced that four teenagers have been indicted for Bayong's murder.

At the time of the murder, Greenbelt police believed there were multiple occupants of the car from which multiple rounds of gunshots were fired. Witnesses reported seeing a silver Infiniti with dark tinted windows and no front license plate, driving at a high rate of speed in the area. "We believe at this point that these were known individuals and that everybody involved in both shooting incidents was familiar with each other. This was not a random event," said Greenbelt Police Chief Richard Bowers the Monday after two fatal shootings took place during daylight hours that October weekend.

Nineteen-year-old Jamarri Ruffin, 18-year-old Abdourahmane Sylla and two male juveniles who cannot be named have been charged with first-degree murder, second-degree murder, first-degree assault and use of a firearm in the commission of a violent felony, said Jackson in a press release. In Maryland, the first-degree murder charge means all four will be tried as adults. They are all being held without bond.

No further information has been released about the male juveniles who are being charged. Court records show both Ruffin and Sylla have been charged in other crimes since turning 18 (any court documents or charges related to juveniles under 18 are not public record.)

Jamarri Ruffin

Ruffin, who turned 19 in January and was 18 at the time of the murder, is a resident of Clinton. In Bayong's death he faces first-degree murder, second-degree murder and first-degree assault charges, as well as firearm use in a felony violent crime, second-degree assault, unlawfully taking a motor vehicle, handgun in vehicle, loaded handgun in vehicle,

malicious burning and theft less than \$100.

Ruffin is also involved in an open case in which he is charged with attempted second-degree murder from an incident on September 23, 2025, less than two weeks before Bayong's murder. In that case he faces charges of first- and second-degree assault, firearm use in a violent felony crime, attempted theft scheme between \$1,500 and \$25,000, unlawfully taking a vehicle, a loaded handgun in a vehicle, rogue and vagabond, loaded handgun on his person and more. In Maryland, rogue and vagabond charges relate to breaking and entering a vehicle and/or stealing its contents or carrying the tools to do so. Ruffin was ordered to be held without bond in that case on March 3, prior to the other charges.

A third open case against Ruffin stems from October 23, 2025, over two weeks after the murder of Bayong, in which Ruffin is charged with theft between \$25,000 and \$100,000, having a loaded handgun on his person, unlawfully taking a motor vehicle and more.

Abdourahmane Sylla

Sylla, a resident of Lanham, turned 19 this week while being held without bond for the murder of Bayong. He faces charges of first- and second-degree murder, first- and second-degree assault, use of firearm in a felony violent crime, unlawfully taking a vehicle, having a loaded handgun in a vehicle, malicious burning and theft under \$100.

Sylla also has open charges from an incident on October 23, 2025, the date of one of the other incidents Ruffin was involved in. Like Ruffin, he faces the charge of theft between \$25,000 and \$100,000 on that date, as well as unlawfully taking a vehicle and rogue and vagabond. In that case he was released on recognizance, awaiting trial.

In a third case brought by the state, and one that involves seven

co-defendants, Sylla is charged with possession of narcotics with intent to distribute last month, on March 3. In that case he is also charged with possession of a controlled and dangerous substance (not cannabis) and use of firearm in a drug-trafficking crime. He was released on recognizance on March 4 until he was charged with Bayong's murder and held without bond beginning March 24.

"This outcome would not have been possible without the dedication and persistence of the detectives who worked diligently throughout this investigation," announced the Greenbelt Police Department, which also extended its appreciation to the Prince George's County Office of the State's Attorney, the Prince George's County Police Department and their other law enforcement partners who provided assistance and collaboration.

Ruffin has a preliminary hearing set for April 16 and Sylla's is scheduled for April 27.

Closing Cases

On Friday Greenbelt Police also announced three arrests, similarly including two juveniles, for the murder of Mancel Johnson, who was also fatally shot in the Franklin Park neighborhood in the fall (see page 13). Since October, detectives have conducted a thorough and methodical investigation, carefully reviewing all available evidence to identify those responsible, said the Greenbelt Police Department. "These guys have been working really hard and using all the resources available to close so many cases," Greenbelt Police Department's Public Information Officer Ricardo Dennis told the News Review on Tuesday.

Arrested for Sept. 12 Murder: 21-Year-Old and Two Juveniles

Greenbelt Police announced the arrest of three suspects charged with the murder of Mancel Johnson. Johnson, a 49-year-old resident of Lanham, was shot multiple times on September 12, 2025, in the 6100 block of Springhill Terrace, in what was believed to be a targeted shooting.

At approximately 9:24 p.m. on September 12, officers in the area heard three or four shots being fired. They ran toward the sound of gunfire and found Johnson suffering from multiple gunshot wounds near the intersection of Edmonston Court and Springhill Terrace. Greenbelt Police searched the area, assisted by a U.S. Park Police helicopter. Johnson was transported to a nearby hospital, where he died on October 5 as a result of the shooting.

In our September 25 issue we reported that Public Information Officer Ricardo Dennis said the shooting was an "isolated incident and is not part of any broader trend within the Greenbelt community." (For prior reporting of this shooting see the September 18 and 25 and the October 9, 2025, issues).

Greenbelt Police announced three arrests for the murder: Halberth Heneddy Deras Ramos, the only suspect to be named, is a 21-year-old man from Laurel, who was arrested on April 3 with the assistance of the Prince George's County Police Department's Emergency Services Team.

A 15-year-old and a 16-year-old boy were also arrested in connection with this killing. All three are facing charges of first-degree murder, second-degree murder, first-degree assault and the use of a firearm in the commission of a violent felony. The juveniles' names will not be released at this time. In Maryland, the first-degree murder charge means both juveniles will be tried as adults.

Johnson died the same weekend as 14-year-old Carlin Bayong and 25-year-old Juan Gonzalez, who were both also shot and killed in the Franklin Park neighborhood. Separately, arrests for the murder of Bayong were also announced by Greenbelt Police on Friday (see the front page).

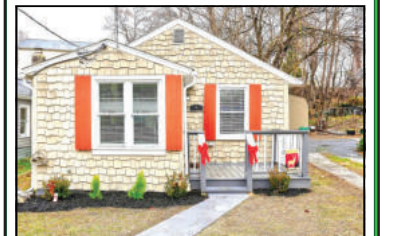

Birding 101: In Search of Birds At Greenbelt Lake, with Friends

We stood there, quiet, near the new pavilion at the Lake, peering up the tree trunks and across branches, gazing into the briars and bushes, adjusting new binoculars to bring things into focus - eyes straining to notice movement, ears piqued to hear a song, feet still for a moment but not for long.

Suddenly a sighting - a downy woodpecker flew into nearby branches and climbed its way up and around to the top of the tree trunk. Nearly 20 mostly new birders excitedly lifted their binoculars to catch a glimpse of the woodpecker.

This early rising group joined Birding 101 with Kevin Carpenter-Driscoll and several Greenbelt Rangers on March 14. The birding walk led the group around Greenbelt Lake to listen, look and learn about the resident and visiting birds that frequent the lake and surrounding woods and ponds. Moving at a comfortable "observers' pace", the group had a celebrity sighting of a bald eagle (being chased by a crow!), popped out onto the peninsula for a peek at ducks and geese and a pied-billed grebe and looped around to the field and pond where goldfinches, red-winged blackbirds, Carolina wrens, north-

ern cardinals and blue jays sang out to greet the morning.

"As a novice to birding, I enjoyed noticing birds small and big and listening to their songs," said Thomas Zeller, an 18-year resident of Greenbelt, who has been walking and running around Greenbelt Lake hundreds, if not thousands, of times but got a new perspective on this walk.

Resident Natalie Bailey said, "It was helpful that they had binoculars on hand. And Kevin was great at pointing out and telling stories about the birds we saw."

Three thousand, five hundred steps, more than 25 species and so much fun and enjoyment.

Missed this Birding 101? Interested folks can look for another walk in May (tentatively May 16) and will be able to sign up a few weeks beforehand - be on the lookout on the city website/social media and in the Greenbelt News Review.

Migratory birds arrive in the spring, and the month of May will bring singing, nesting and resting birds to Greenbelt Lake and environs. Come join the flock.
