Board of Elections Updates Council on Past City Election

The city Board of Elections (BOE) provided the Greenbelt City Council with a summation of the events and the workings of the past city election at a worksession on June 3. Representing the board were Chair Steve Gilbert along with members Nicole Shyong, Edith Beauchamp and Beth Terry.

The 2025 election saw 3,255 votes out of the city's 15,979 registered voters; a number up 21 percent from 2023 when there were 2,685 votes.

Of note, there were 2,151 votes in favor of the ranked choice voting referendum question — a majority of the total votes, though only 13 percent of the registered voters.

The BOE noted some complaints from residents about candidates accessing homes of residents, when signs were posted for no solicitation. The board decided to refrain from any formal action with the candidates as it violated BOE's official purview. However, in regard to multifamily buildings

in future elections, BOE upheld the rules in locations that have a strict policy on access only by residents.

One candidate was allowed to use his nickname on the ballot, as he pointed out that few residents would recognize his actual name.

Training Sessions

There was a discussion on training for poll judges and poll workers. There was a general consensus that judges should receive the most training, perhaps separate from workers, as more is required of them should problems arise.

Poll workers typically are trained the night before. Suggestions were presented that training could be spread out over a couple of sessions to achieve better understanding, yet Terry stressed misgivings over burdening workers with a larger time commitment.

Should ranked choice voting be adopted, all workers at the polls will need to be prepared to

Murray Negotiated Employment Contract with Longtime Friend

In November 2025, the Prince George's County Council voted to appoint David Murray as their Council Administrator. The council then voted "to authorize the Chair to negotiate the terms of employment, including compensation, benefits, and duties of the Council Administrator position with David Murray" (meeting minutes from November 10, 2025). Murray's longtime friend Edward Burroughs III was chair at the time. Following that negotiation, Murray received an offer of an annual salary of \$240,000 for a position beginning January 5, 2026. A table of compensation and fringe benefit payments obtained by the News Review show a vehicle allowance of \$599 every two weeks and pension and supplemental retirement payments that total \$1,683.69 every two weeks, among other benefits.

The Appointment

As we reported in the January 15, 2026 issue, Councilmembers Burroughs, Krystal Oriadha, Tom Dernoga, Wanika Fisher, Ingrid Watson, Shayla Adams-Stafford, Wala Blegay, Jolene Ivey and Calvin Hawkins all voted in favor of Murray's appointment. Councilmember Eric Olson was the lone vote against the appointment, while Councilmember Sydney Harrison abstained. A motion was then made by Burroughs, to authorize the chair (himself) to

negotiate the contract and Burroughs, Dernoga, Fisher, Watson, Adams-Stafford, Blegay, Ivey and Hawkins then voted in favor. Olson, Oriadha and Harrison abstained. None of the abstainers responded to the News Review's requests to share their rationale.

Some of those conducting the vote on Murray's appointment are longtime allies of Murray.

Connections to Adams-Stafford

Councilmember Adams-Stafford served with Murray on the Board of Education. She was a member of the board that, as a whole, was accused by the

Greenbelt Museum Long-awaited Expansion Project Moves Forward

The Greenbelt Museum is continuing efforts to expand and renovate its facilities through the redevelopment of the neighboring property at 10-A Crescent Road, a project museum leaders say will significantly improve visitor access, educational programming and community engagement.

According to Friends of the Greenbelt Museum (FOGM) board member Mary Sies, fundraising for the project began before the start of the Covid-19 pandemic after Museum leaders recognized the opportunity to transform 10-A into a larger, more functional visitor and education center. Although the project has faced delays caused by the pandemic, rising construction costs and lengthy planning efforts, Museum officials say important milestones have already been achieved.

The Museum currently operates out of historic 10-B Crescent Road, an original 1937 Greenbelt residence restored to reflect daily life between 1937 and 1952.

While the Museum has been an important cultural and educational resource, the 836-square-foot house limits the Museum's ability to host visitors, exhibits and interactive programming.

Museum Director Megan Searing Young described the historic house itself as the Museum's most important teaching tool, but one that is difficult to fully interpret

without additional visitor space. Currently, Museum operations are split between the historic house and offices at the Community Center, which can create confusion for visitors. The existing house also presents challenges, including the lack of an accessible restroom on the first floor.

Reparations Commission to Hold Town Hall for Public Discussion

In the November 2021 municipal elections, the voters of Greenbelt passed a referendum to create a 21-member reparations commission to review, discuss and recommend reparations for African American and Native American residents of Greenbelt. The Greenbelt Reparations Commission (GRC) has met continually since February 2023.

The public is invited to the Greenbelt Reparations Commission Town Hall on Saturday, June 27 at 12:30 p.m. in the Greenbelt

Library Auditorium. Learn what the Commission has learned, discuss draft recommendations and provide feedback on the Commission's next steps. This Town Hall will primarily focus on African American reparations. A separate Town Hall will follow to address reparations for Native Americans.

Since its first meeting in 2023, the Commission has accomplished the following:

1. Created a website, greenbeltreparations.info, to share information with the community about events, reports, videos, updates, meeting minutes and other pertinent information. GRC

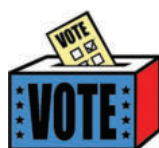
also created a commonly asked questions document with answers to questions received from the public (greenbeltreparations.info/about).

2. Distilled a historical timeline using resources from the Greenbelt Museum, Greenbelt News Review archives, National Archives and Records, Maryland State Archives, the Tugwell Room at the Greenbelt Library and hundreds of articles in scholarly journals and other sources. An abbreviated timeline with key Maryland historical highlights

School Was Not Out for Summer But Camps Began This Week

On Monday, June 15, summer camps kicked off in Greenbelt, though with fewer school-aged attendees than usual. This year the summer camps begin a week before schools end.

The Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) calendar was extended to June 18 following seven snow day closures in a row as the county attempted to deal with the "snowcrete" aftermath of a storm at the end of January and into February.

Chris Cherry, performing arts coordinator for the city, told the News Review that the city had to go

ahead with their summer camp schedule — people have made vacation plans, staff have been hired and not everyone attends public schools, he said. For the first couple of days camp attendance was a little over half, Cherry said.

Kinder Camp, which serves 3.5- to 5-year-olds, was not as im-

The city is offering credits for the unused week of camp to families whose children don't attend at all this week while school is still in session. The budgetary impact for the city is not yet known.

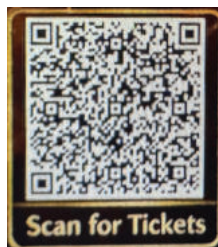
Cheri Glover's Art, Plus Art Share Friday Evening

GAC Remembers Joan Jacobs

The Greenbelt Arts Center (GAC) extends its heartfelt thanks and appreciation to Joan Jacobs, who died recently, for her extraordinary generosity and dedication to GAC over many years. Joan, a Bethesda resident, was an enthusiastic and tireless supporter of the Arts Center. Her commitment began in 2005 when she established a fund to upgrade GAC's stage lighting system. From there, she continued to champion improvements that helped strengthen and sustain the theater, often matching community donations with her own contributions. Joan's support helped make numerous projects possible, including additional stage lighting updates, an air-conditioning system, a paint room sink and her greatest challenge — the renovation of the theater's bathrooms. For that project, Joan raised more than \$55,000 and personally oversaw the work from beginning to end, ensuring that every detail was completed. In total, Joan raised and contributed more than \$100,000 to support the Greenbelt Arts Center. Her generosity, determination and belief in the importance of the arts have left a lasting impact on the organization and the countless artists, volunteers and audiences who have benefited from her efforts.

Renovation Plans

The renovation project would transform 10-A Crescent Road into a new Education and Visitor Center while preserving the historic character of the Museum. Plans for the building include an accessible first-floor entrance, orientation and exhibition space, a hands-on learning lab, an accessible restroom, expanded gift shop space, archives and storage, Museum offices and a 24-hour information kiosk featuring Greenbelt history and local attractions.

FOGM President Justin Donaldson said the redesign will allow the historic house at 10-B to remain largely untouched. "It's important to keep those things in the Visitor Center, so the Museum house itself can be preserved in its original appearance and give visitors the most immersive experience as they tour the home," Donaldson said.

The historic house will receive only limited upgrades, including the installation of a new HVAC system. Once completed, the expansion is expected to allow the Museum to increase its operating hours and offer programming several additional days each week.

Hands-on Experiences

Museum leaders say the new space will create opportunities for more hands-on educational experiences that help visitors understand daily life in early Greenbelt. Potential programs could include demonstrations of hand-washing laundry, mending and darning clothing, cooking with World War II rationing guidelines and allowing visitors to wear period clothing.

Museum staff believe these experiences help connect modern audiences to larger themes such as affordable housing, community planning, the Great Depression, World War II and suburban development.

Donaldson noted that the Museum also serves as an important ambassador for the city itself.

"Many of the visitors I encountered were interested in living

in GHI and visited the Museum first to learn about the town," Donaldson said. "In that way, the Museum staff and volunteers are ambassadors for modern-day Greenbelt, as much as the town's past."

Funding

Funding for the project has steadily progressed despite rising costs. The project's original pre-pandemic estimate was approximately \$575,000, but inflation and increased construction costs have pushed projections closer to \$675,000. "Since the original estimate, the cost of materials has risen along with gas and inflation," Donaldson said.

According to Donaldson, FOGM and the Museum itself have raised approximately \$330,000, while the City of Greenbelt has committed an additional \$300,000 toward the project. State funding has also played a critical role. The project has received two grants from the Maryland Historical Trust totaling \$150,000, in addition to a state municipal bond and state appropriation.

"State grants are essential for the 10-A project," said Donaldson.

While funding for the building itself is nearing completion, Museum leaders say additional fundraising will still be needed to support exhibits, programming and staffing for the expanded facility. "It doesn't do you any good unless you do something with it," FOGM board member David Aylward said, referring to the new Visitor Center. "The thinking is to take it to [the community] as well."

Next Steps

The Museum and the city

are currently exploring hiring a project manager to oversee the next phase of the project. Several major steps remain before construction can begin, including final fundraising efforts, hiring contractors, obtaining permits and removing the existing addition at 10-A Crescent Road.

Museum officials acknowledge the project could require temporary closures during portions of construction, but leaders remain optimistic about completing the Visitor Center in time for Greenbelt's 90th anniversary celebration in 2027.

Community Outreach

Community outreach will continue throughout the process. Museum representatives plan to share updates through Greenbelt News Review articles and information tables at the Greenbelt Farmers Market this summer and will organize open houses and community events. Residents are also encouraged to visit the Museum, volunteer and support future fundraising campaigns.

"If folks in the community want to support the project," said Donaldson, "we encourage everyone to visit the Museum and watch for future events and donation opportunities."

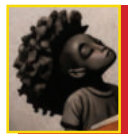

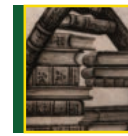

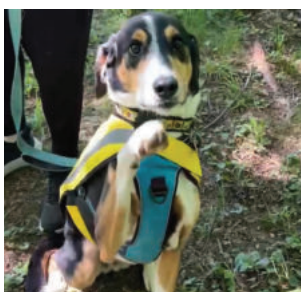

Office of Integrity and Compliance (OIC) investigation of failing to hold Murray accountable for violating attendance policies and failing to request his removal “based on willful neglect of duty” (OIC Advisory Summary and Investigative Findings on Missing PGCP Board Member, November 4, 2024). Murray’s mother, Jacqueline Murray, served as Adams-Stafford’s campaign treasurer in 2025. At Adams-Stafford’s swearing-in ceremony for county council on June 17, 2025, Murray gave remarks. Burroughs introduced the tributes saying, “There will be a special tribute from the guys. This is a group chat that was started years ago,” before calling up Murray, current school board member Phelton Moss and Larry Stafford, CEO of Progressive Maryland and husband of Adams-Stafford. Stafford has been a strong supporter of Murray’s political campaigns.

“We came to know you through our brother Larry,” said Murray, appearing to speak on behalf of the group. “You have become part of our family and a sister,” he told Adams-Stafford, a few months before she’d vote on his appointment.

In November 2024, after Murray abandoned his bid for re-election to the Board of Education, he transferred \$6,000 out of the Friends for David Murray account and sent it to Friends of Shayla Adams-Stafford.

Connections to Burroughs

Burroughs and Murray have been friends since they were teen-

agers, attended the University of Maryland, Baltimore County together and both ran for seats on Prince George’s County Board of Education at the same time, in 2012 (Burroughs was elected and Murray was not), eventually serving together for a period.

In a public social media post

on August 11, 2021, Murray wrote to Burroughs, “They don’t understand how far we go back lol. And we’re just getting started. Love you bro.” It was accompanied by six photos of the pair spending time together, seemingly as teenagers. One photo is dated March 20, 2010, and the

others are undated. Their public social media posts to each other go back at least as far as 2007, when they were in high school. In 2007, Burroughs posted photos of a young Murray with the caption, “Blood Brother.” That year the two participated in Maryland Leadership Workshops at Wash-

ington College and in 2009 they traveled together as part of the Maryland Association of Student Councils. Oriadha, current chair of Prince George’s County Council, who voted to appoint Murray but abstained from the vote to

allow Burroughs to negotiate his contract, said of the pair, "You two are friendship goals all day" in a Facebook post in 2021.

Financial ties are difficult to trace given the presence of PACs and in-kind payments but in 2021 Murray's political campaign account donated \$6,000 to Friends of Edward Burroughs.

The Employment Offer

In an offer letter dated December 23, 2025, Murray was offered the position of Council Administrator with an annual salary of \$240,000. That represents a 20 percent increase over the salary offered to Jennifer Jenkins three years earlier in December 2022. Compensation and fringe records show Murray's starting rate was higher than Jenkins was receiving months earlier after years of direct experience in the role. The position posting for the Council Administrator provided to the News Review calls for a master's degree in Public Administration, Urban Planning or related fields and extensive experience in highly responsible positions in governmental affairs or related activities. Murray's background consisted of his service on the Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) Board of Education, that ended in resignation, and under two years as Chief Academic Officer with the Ferguson-Florissant (Mo.) school district, where his title appeared to have changed to Executive Director of Curriculum and Instruction by August 2025. At the start of the 2025-2026 school year Murray was not in the organizational chart alongside the Chief Finance and Operations Officer, Chief of Staff and Chief Human Resources Officer but instead one of five executive directors reporting to the superintendent. In Missouri, Murray's salary as chief academic officer was \$163,583. Murray's LinkedIn profile states he earned a master's degree in literacy from the University of Central Arkansas in December 2023.

Records reviewed by the Greenbelt News Review show Murray began being paid for full-time hours in Prince George's County in December, prior to his offer letter, receiving payment for 80 hours of work on December 13, though he did not resign from his position in Missouri until January, according to a representative the News Review reached by phone. According to his offer letter and employment contract his appointment in Prince George's County didn't begin until January 5, 2026.

The Contract

Ramon Gonzalez, legislative attorney for Prince George's County Council, told the News Review that Murray's predecessor, Jenkins, did not have an employment contract, though she was in the position for two and a half years, so it is not possible to directly compare the contracts of the two. Murray's employment contract,

obtained by the Greenbelt News Review via a Public Information Act (PIA) request, shows the position classified as Grade 41 and benefits include cost of living adjustments, merit increases, health insurance, retirement and pension. Under termination and severance, the contract notes the position is at-will and may be terminated with or without cause, without notice. If Murray is terminated without cause, he will be entitled to one year's salary according to the contract.

Gonzalez told the News Review there were no documents

responsive to our request for a summary of fringe benefits for Murray, so we don't know how much holiday or sick leave he accrues annually, for example. However, our PIA request yielded a spreadsheet of compensation and benefits amounts to Murray and Jenkins. These records show Murray began being paid in the County Administrator role on December 13, 2025, when he received \$9,230.77 for 80 hours of work, placing his start date on December 1, 2025, over a month before his contract start date and before his offer letter. On De-

cember 13 the county also paid \$572.31 in Social Security tax for the position, \$133.85 in Medicare tax, \$900 for a pension, \$783.69 for supplemental retirement and 29 cents for life insurance. Murray was paid for his first day (eight hours) of sick leave on January 10 at a rate of \$923.08 for the day and his first day of holiday leave on January 13 at the same rate. By comparison, in 2025, at her highest rate of pay, Jenkins was receiving \$874.20 for any eight hours of leave to Murray's \$923.08. In 2025 Jenkins received a vehicle allowance of

\$532.15 every two weeks to Murray's \$599 of allowance. Where Jenkins received \$737.83 in pension per two-week pay period, Murray is receiving \$900 and in supplemental retirement payments Jenkins received \$761.42 to See MURRAY, page 8

is available on the website at greenbeltreparations.info/resources.

3. Engaged the University of Maryland to examine disparities related to race and ethnicity, income, home ownership, education attainment and disability, and to map historical demographic changes in Greenbelt. Both reports (completed by students) are available on the website at greenbeltreparations.info/resources.

4. Learned about the reparations movement and foundational principles of diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) work. Nkechi Taifa, a human rights attorney and an expert on reparations, provided a course on the history of the North American reparations movement. Tribes Consulting provided empathy and care training on how to interview and listen to members of the harmed communities without causing additional harm.

5. Hired consultants to support the GRC's research. The African American Redress Network examined historical harms to the African American community. Lawyering Clinic students from the Thurgood Marshall School of Law at Howard University researched how Tax Reform in Maryland (TRIM) negatively impacts schools and libraries in areas that are predominantly African American. The Piscataway Indian Nation identified harms committed against Native Americans, shared their history and suggested potential remedies.

6. Conducted over 30 interviews with African Americans, Greenbelt residents and Indigenous leaders, collected 153 community surveys and held two community town hall meetings. The GRC requested a collaboration with Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI; the housing initiative is the

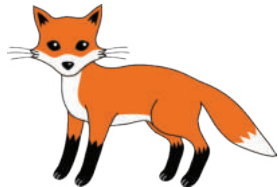
foundational basis upon which the city was built). However, the GHI Board declined to engage with the Commission.

7. Learned about other local and statewide reparations efforts across the country by reaching out to other reparations organizations and by attending the 400 Years of African American History Commission conference on Reparations in 2023; the First Repair Symposium in Evanston, Ill., in 2023 and 2024; the National Reparations Leadership Assembly in 2025; and presenting at American University's School of Public Affairs symposium on the importance of reparations at the community level. GRC also testified in favor of a statewide reparations commission at the Maryland General Assembly.

8. Summarized the research gathered to date is and currently in the process of identifying potential repair remedies, planning focus groups to vet the draft recommendations, writing the first draft of the report and hiring an editor to review and write the final report.

Murray's \$783.69.

The News Review's PIA

Government agencies have discretion to waive PIA fees if the information is in the public interest. Requests from media are frequently treated as such. The News Review has in the past received waivers of fees for its PIAs to the Prince George's County Fire Department and PGCPD. In addition, the State of Maryland requires that the first two hours of costs associated with a PIA are waived for every request.

Prince George's County Council did not grant the News Review's request for a fee waiver to obtain the employment contracts

and benefits for the current and most recent Council Administrator. Our initial request for the two contracts, benefits and related correspondence came back with an estimated six hours of staff time to produce them. By limiting our request to only the contracts and benefits, without correspondence, we were told it took a total of three hours at a rate of \$38.08 and half an hour of legal review at \$65.66 for a total of \$147.07. After the State mandated two hours free of charge the News Review was charged \$57.12 in fees by Prince George's County Council to obtain the documents reviewed for this article.



It began in 1926 with WAGGGS (the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts) and has been celebrated every year since. Girl Scout troops celebrate by participating in activities that highlight countries and cultures from around the globe. For the past two years, Greenbelt Girl Scout Troop 23007 has organized and hosted the event for troops in

our and our neighboring service units.

For this year's World Thinking Day, each troop chose a country to represent. Members of the troop researched the country, created a display with details, facts and food representing that country to share with all the other troops. At the event, each troop set up a table for its country. "Passports" created by Troop 23010 were given out for Scouts to get stamped as they toured each of the country's tables.

World Thinking Day began with a traditional Girl Scout flag ceremony led by Troop 96. This was followed by a Parade of Flags led by Troop 22065; each troop walked holding a flag for their country to recognize the diversity of Girl Scouts and Girl Guides around the world. The event was also an opportunity to recognize scouts who had earned higher awards in the past year, including



the Bronze Award, Silver Trefoil Award or Silver Award. Troops 2427, 22014, 23035 and 23017 ran events consistent with this year's theme of Our Friendship that encouraged different ages and troops of scouts to get to know one another. The event ended with a trading of SWAPS (Special Whatchamacallits Affectionately Pinned Somewhere), with troops coming together and trading these hand-made tokens representing their country.

The event was also an opportunity to fundraise for the World Thinking Day Fund, with \$202 collected. The fund, administered by WAGGGS, helps make Girl Scouting and Girl Guiding available to more girls in developing nations and helps fund leadership development programs.

World Thinking Day reminded Girl Scouts that they are part of a worldwide movement of millions of girls and young women. It encouraged scouts to build connec-

tions across cultures and work together to make the world a better place. Through friendship, service and learning, Girl Scout World Thinking Day celebrated the values that unite scouts around the globe.

Board of Elections Announces Delay in Sample Ballot Mailing

Greenbelt residents who still haven't received a sample ballot one week ahead of the state primary election are not alone. An informal survey of residents by the News Review on Tuesday, June 16 revealed none we spoke with had received sample ballots, officially called specimen ballots.

On Monday, June 15, the Prince George's County Board of Elections announced there'd been a delay in mailing them. The announcement noted there had been "minor logistical adjustments at the printing level" but that the U.S. Postal Service began processing and shipping the ballots "in continuous waves" beginning Wednesday, June 10.

Elections officials have confirmed that voters across the county began receiving their specimen ballots on Friday, June 12, but "because residential mail delivery schedules vary by postal route, residents who have not yet

received their packet can expect it to arrive over the next few days," said the announcement. "The Board of Elections emphasizes that this staggered delivery schedule does not impact voting security, voter deadlines or your ability to cast a ballot."

The Board of Elections said those who requested mail-in ballots or print-at-home ballots will not receive a specimen ballot.

Meanwhile, residents have received "sample ballots" or slates from specific candidates, which are usually identifiable because they have selections already filled out. In small print they must also say somewhere who paid for them and by whose authority. Sample ballots from campaigns don't always list all the candidates for each position nor all the positions. They should be treated as campaign materials rather than voter information material.

explain the system to residents.

Mailed Ballots

Councilmember Kristen Weaver brought up the idea of mailing a ballot to all residents, instead of the current system where ballot applications are mailed. She felt it would be a simpler process.

Terry was apprehensive of this and indicated that perhaps up to a third of all mailings are sent back, mostly for the addresses being defunct, citing the county's difficulties in purging lists of non-current voters.

Councilmember Silke Pope felt that the application process creates better voter integrity, while acknowledging Weaver's point.

Beauchamp assured them that the mail-in ballot system is well vetted and resistant to any voter fraud or invasion of privacy.

Terry stressed the board's continuing procedure to not have a list of the city's non-citizen voters included with the voting list that is sent back to the county by the city clerk after each city election.

Vendor Issues

The BOE had issues this past election with its vendor, Fort Orange Press (FOP), who has been tasked with printing ballots, ballot applications and mail-in ballots.

Due to a delay in printing, mail-in ballots were sent a month later than expected. As well, incorrect versions of mail-in ballots and election day ballots were provided, requiring city staff to work with the city's election equipment vendor Clear Ballot to eventually rectify the problem by printing ballots in-house between October 29 and November 4, 2025.

The board and the city are in the process of either choosing a new printing and mailing vendor or exploring a safe, alternative way to do it by print-on-demand. Prior to the last election, the city's past experience with FOP had been positive.

The BOE is committed to providing draft legislation to council very soon that will be used to amend the City Charter and Code for the possible adoption of ranked choice voting. This system allows voters to vote for more than one candidate in their order of preference. Council candidates must reach a 12.5 percent threshold in the final vote to earn a place. Further council meetings on this as well as public input and education by the BOE are planned.

Greenbelt Community Center, 15 Crescent Road

Greenbelt Elementary School, 66 Ridge Road

Greenbelt Middle School Gym, 6301 Breezewood Drive

Eleanor Roosevelt High School, 7601 Hanover Parkway

Although in city elections you may vote at any precinct in Greenbelt, to vote in the state primary election you must use the specific location based on the address on your registration record.

To check your specific polling place, visit voterservices.elections.maryland.gov/VoterSearch, click on Find Your Polling Place and enter your address.



Ballot Access

The Board of Elections says that in-person and mail-in voters can view, download or print their personalized sample ballot using the voter lookup tool online at elections.maryland.gov. The News Review visited voterservices.elections.maryland.gov/VoterSearch and was able to review a sample ballot but it did not include school board candidates. Voters can also confirm their polling center and registration details on the site.

Help is also available by phone, said the Board of Elections. Residents with questions regarding their registration, mail status or assigned voting center can speak directly to a local representative by calling 301-341-7300, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
