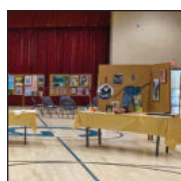

## Former Mayor Gil Weidenfeld Remembered for Years of Service

*This is Part 1 of a two-part series remembering Former Mayor of Greenbelt Gil Weidenfeld. This first article focuses on an interview with his daughter.*

When Sharon Weidenfeld Robinson thinks of her father, she remembers the day he stood before a heckling crowd in the Greenbelt City Council chambers, reading from the Supreme Court's landmark *Brown v. Board of Education* decision as residents booed and walked out. In 1972, while many in the audience urged city leaders to oppose a federal school desegregation order, Gil Weidenfeld argued Greenbelt should follow the law. Despite the opposition, he continued reading, and by the end of the meeting, the council voted not to oppose the desegregation order (See the December 21, 1972 and January 11, 1973 issues for the council's discussions of busing in Prince

George's County to achieve racial balance in schools).

"I was a little kid, and I was like really impressed," said Robinson, who was in the crowd that day. "I think that really stuck in my head to see him stand up for civil rights in that way, and to be able to withstand the booing."

Weidenfeld, who spent 22 years on the Greenbelt City Council, including 14 years as mayor, died on July 4, 2026, at the age of 93. He is remembered for the courage he displayed in the council room in 1972, as well as the years of service and dedication he devoted to the City of Greenbelt.

Weidenfeld, a first-generation American, was born in

## Bd. of Ed. Rep. Briggs' Resignation Announced after Applications Closed

Jonathan Briggs, who represented District 2, which includes Greenbelt, on the Prince George's County Board of Education, has resigned, effective June 26 or June 30\*. Almost three weeks later, his constituents and the media had not been notified by Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS), though his resignation was announced by Board Chair Brannndon Jackson during a July 9 meeting. The announcement at that meeting came two days after the county closed the application window for the vacated seat. Following questions from the News Review to the PGCPS Office of Communications and the Board of Education Office on the morning of July 20, communication about Briggs' resignation was finally shared by PGCPS that afternoon. Briggs had also been serving as the vice chair of the Board of Education at the time of his resignation.

The District 2 school board member represents the north-central portion of Prince George's County, including Greenbelt, College Park, Berwyn Heights, Riverdale Park and New Carrollton. Briggs assumed his four-year position on December 5, 2022. His term was set to end on December 7, 2026.

### July 9 Announcement

According to Board of Education Chair Brannndon Jackson at a July 9 virtual special meeting, Briggs formally submitted his resignation on June 30, effective immediately, which the board accepted. Jackson acknowledged

Briggs' service and commitment to the school community and announced that the county executive will appoint someone to serve the remainder of his term through December 7. The election in November will determine who will assume the seat for the following term. Jackson made no mention of the reason for Briggs' sudden

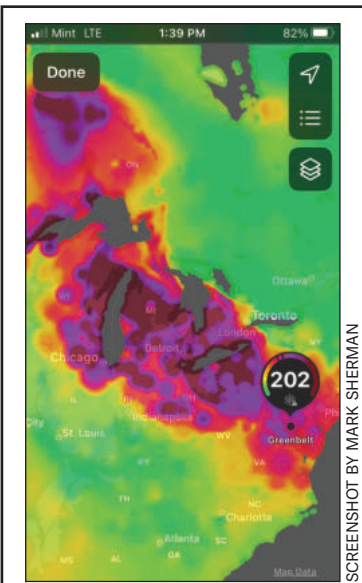

## Council Votes on Collective Bargaining, Armory Options

On July 13, the Greenbelt City Council voted unanimously to extend collective bargaining rights to a wide array of the city's employees, closing out months of discussion that began when a group of Public Works employees petitioned council in September 2025.

Council also discussed a grant proposal to fund services that would evaluate the three alternatives for the armory: all three options would raze all the buildings except the garages.

### Amending Labor Code

In approving collective bargaining rights, "[the council was] intentional ... [in] making sure this amendment will apply to as many employees in the city as it can," said Councilmember Jenni Pompei, before the council vote; applause followed the vote.

Councilmember Frankie Fritz thanked Pompei for taking leadership on this legislation, and Greenbelt's Public Works employees for initiating the reform. "Thank you to the workers,"

Gil Weidenfeld

Gil Weidenfeld, 93, was at home in Annapolis when he died peacefully on July 4, 2026, with family by his side. He was preceded in death by his beloved wife of 71 years, Muriel “Micki” Weidenfeld. He is survived by his daughter, Sharon Weidenfeld Robinson; her husband, Garnett; daughter, Ellen Vesey; her former husband, Mike; her son, Justin (Yeimi), and her daughters Jordan and Jillian.

Gil was born in the Bronx to parents Saul and Fannie and was a first generation American. Soon the family moved to a chicken farm in New Jersey. It was there Gil’s family met the farm family across the street and they all became friends. That’s how Gil met his neighbor Micki who he married in 1953. The family continued to live in New Jersey and Gil became an oil burner mechanic. He then attended college and Micki got a job to help support them. Gil attended Monmouth College and then graduated from Rutgers University with a mechanical engineering degree. Their daughters Sharon and Ellen were born. The family moved to Greenbelt in 1965. Gil began work at the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office. He also attended law school at Catholic University in Washington where he received his law degree. Gil spent his professional career first as a patent examiner, then a supervisory examiner and then as the public information officer for the office. When Gerald Ford was president, he established the Presidential Clemency Board to consider clemency for people with draft-related offenses during the Vietnam War. Gil was selected to work on this program, assisting those who were applying for clemency and making recommendations to the Board. While living in Greenbelt, Gil and Micki became involved in many civic activities and Gil’s love for the community inspired him to run for city council. He spent 22 years on the council, most of that time serving as mayor which was one of his proudest accomplishments in life. He was able to do many things for the city and the residents, including being instrumental in having Green Ridge House and Springhill Lake Recreation Center built as well as a new police station and the Aquatics & Fitness Center. As mayor, Gil made sure he was approachable by any resident, employee or visitor to Greenbelt who needed his help and he would patiently listen and do whatever he could to assist them. He treated everyone as his equal and with great compassion and understanding. He is a past president of the

Prince George’s Municipal League, a Hall of Fame Inductee for his tireless efforts with the Maryland Municipal League and a past chairman of the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments.

Besides their dedication to their community, Gil and Micki were also dedicated to their family. They regularly took Sharon and Ellen to visit their grandparents and extended family in New Jersey, especially to enjoy holidays such as Passover and Thanksgiving and to spend time at the beach. They also went on many fun family vacations to Florida, Jekyll Island, Jamaica and Ocean City, Md. Gil eventually retired from the federal government and worked for the State of Maryland Department of Transportation where he developed the first telework program for Maryland. It was a new concept that was initiated in the 1990s to help reduce traffic and pollution. Gil was a devoted father to his daughter Sharon. He was always interested in hearing stories from her career as a private investigator and he shared those stories with his friends and extended family. He was a huge supporter to Sharon especially when she worked on civil rights investigations involving police misconduct. Gil had always been a firm believer and taught his children that everyone was entitled to and should enjoy the same civil rights.

Gil was also a devoted father to his daughter Ellen. When Ellen moved to Pennsylvania and started a family of her own, Gil and Micki would travel there often to spend time with their grandchildren, often going to their sporting events, hosting them in Ocean City and on a cruise. He also kept up with Ellen’s career as a realtor and when the grandchildren got older he was interested in hearing about college and their new careers.

In retirement Gil and Micki

traveled, visiting relatives whenever possible. One of their favorite places to spend time was in Mexico, relaxing on the beach and enjoying good meals. After Micki convinced Gil to go on a cruise, he became hooked and they went on many cruises. In 2005, they started a new adventure. They left their longtime home of Greenbelt and moved to a sunny condo in Heritage Harbour in Annapolis. Sharon had moved from Greenbelt to Annapolis the previous year and now they were all close together again. They continued to travel, go out to dinner with friends, enjoy local concerts and plays and spend time with their children and grandchildren. In 2021, Gil and Micki moved to an assisted living facility in Annapolis. Gil made new friends with residents and staff alike and was active in the exercise classes.

While there, their grandson Justin brought his girlfriend Yeimi to meet them. They welcomed her as a new granddaughter and were delighted when the couple married in 2024. They waited with anticipation for Sharon’s fiancé to immigrate from Jamaica. Gil and Micki met him in person in 2023 and attended their wedding in 2024. After Micki died in 2024, Gil was alone for the first time in his life. Sharon and son-in-law Garnett were there most days to spend time with him.

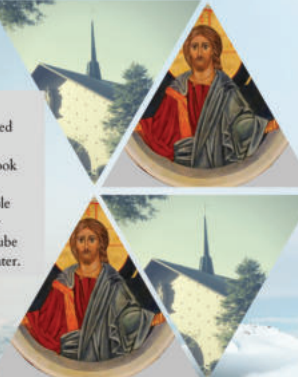

the Bronx, N.Y., in 1932, before moving to a chicken farm in New Jersey at a young age, where he later met his future wife, Muriel “Micki”. After marrying and having two daughters, Sharon and Ellen, they moved to Greenbelt in 1965. Robinson recalled a “normal family life in Greenbelt,” frequent trips to New Jersey and her father’s generous and caring nature. Weidenfeld was married to his wife for 71 years, until her death in 2024.

“He was friendly to everybody,” Robinson said. “He wanted to hear what was going on in people’s lives, and just tried to make everybody comfortable around him. He was the type of person that if we had more people like him in this world it would be a lot friendlier of a place.”

When speaking to the News Review, his daughter recalled stories that truly encapsulated her father’s spirit. She remembered him leaving his family just before the Fourth of July fireworks to help a lost child find his parents and volunteering to escort a Miss Greenbelt contestant who did not

have a partner for an event. Robinson said her father’s kindness and compassion were reflected in his years of public service. During his time on the Greenbelt City Council, Weidenfeld helped bring Green Ridge House — a city-owned apartment community that provides housing and support services for residents 62 and older — to fruition. He also played a key role in establishing the Greenbelt Aquatic & Fitness Center.

“Those are two of the things that really meant a lot to him, and I think that they’re really good things that the city has,” Robinson said.

Beyond Greenbelt, Weidenfeld was also a past president of the Prince George’s Municipal League, a Hall of Fame Inductee for his efforts with the Maryland Municipal League and a past chairman of the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments.

Robinson emphasized her father’s selflessness when it came to public service.

“He wasn’t in it for personal

gain ... He genuinely loved the city of Greenbelt and the people in Greenbelt,” she said.

Weidenfeld had not planned on being involved in local politics. However, after moving to the Springhill Lake apartment community, he wanted to ensure that everybody in his neighborhood was properly represented, according to his daughter. In a News Review interview in 1994, he indicated that he ran for the city council in 1971 because he wanted a community center for Springhill Lake.

“He probably had a more liberal outlook on things than some of the other people on the city council at the time. He felt that he could bring some of his knowledge [from] his experiences in life and his ideas of how things should operate to the city,” Robinson said.

As the mayor of Greenbelt, Weidenfeld treated his constituents with respect and an open mind, according to his daughter. She said he prioritized listening to residents’ concerns, and said her father believed effective public ser-

vice meant seeking to understand differing viewpoints, even when he disagreed.

Weidenfeld died at his home in Annapolis, surrounded by his family. He is survived by his daughter Sharon and her husband Garnett; his daughter Ellen Vesey, her former husband, Mike, her son Justin (Yeimi) and her daughters, Jordan and Jillian.

A presentation reviewed by the News Review said the interview panel would include a human resources representative, area associate superintendent, school instructional director, four educators (including representation from the school’s faculty advisory committee), two support staff, two Parent, Teacher, Student Association (PTSA) members and two community members. The presentation, which is linked from the school’s website asserts the goal is to fill the principal vacancy before the board meeting in June, a date already past. Parents who attended were not given a specific date but told the process was being expedited, said O’Roark.

Though the search is open to all candidates, “it was noted ... it seems most likely that it will be an internal candidate, given the expedited nature of the search,” said O’Roark.

Brief Input Period

An interview panel that would include two parents was scheduled to convene Monday, July 20 from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. At the meeting one week earlier, some parents expressed disappointment at the quick deadline, which they feared might prohibit parents from participating, particularly given the full day commitment.

In addition to volunteering to serve on an interview panel, parents, staff and community members were told they could share input by completing an online school leadership, skills and characteristics questionnaire. Parents we spoke with about the survey expressed confusion about when the survey would close, some believing it would be open for seven days following the special meeting on Monday but finding it closed after Friday, July 17. The results, which have already been shared, show it recorded only one parent participant.

One of the parents we spoke with, who asked we withhold their name because they are a PGCPs employee, said they had tried to access information on exactly who was serving on the hiring committee, but only received information about its general composition without names. They had hoped to reach out to the decision makers and offer their thoughts, they told the News Review, but “the only real option was the survey,” they concluded. They said they were unaware of the survey prior to the Monday meeting but were able to complete it before it closed.

Praise for Clement

As parents responded to the news of their principal’s departure, every one had praise for Clement and what he has done for the school.

The school was very lucky to have him as principal for five years, said parent Eric McKenzie, who is also the outgoing PTSA treasurer. “He was an enthusiastic partner with the community, showing up at every PTSA meeting to deliver his “Clement’s Corner” updates and to take questions from our families. He welcomed family members into the school with open houses so that they could see their children’s classes in action, and he supported school celebrations of African-American history, Hispanic heritage and international students. He was tireless in his drive to improve the school’s performance, and he updated families each year on the school’s state report

cards. He had excellent people skills, and he was an extraordinarily responsive communicator, known for returning phone calls and emails in an hour or less,” McKenzie told the News Review. “I’m sure that he’ll be welcomed in his next position and that he’ll be a terrific asset there.” McKenzie said he hopes GMS’ next principal will have “a similar ability to listen to the community, respond to their questions and keep them informed of school resources and opportunities.” McKenzie also wants the next principal to focus on rigorous instruction, improving student attendance and reducing downtime in classes, as well as creating “a caring work environment where staff are supported and uplifted.”

Another parent, whose name we are withholding at their request because they, too, are a PGCPs employee, feared Clement’s departure would be destabilizing for GMS. “I think many teachers are there because of Mr. Clement — he is well loved. And GMS definitely has a lot of needs,” they told the News Review. “I understand that a school’s leadership is made up of a team, not one single person. And yet having a strong leader as principal makes a huge impact on the team’s morale and effectiveness. It is a loss for GMS staff, students and families, especially with such a short timeframe to make the transition,” they said.

GMS Parent Lauren Rankel praised Clement’s communication and leadership. “Mr. Clement has been a devoted, enthusiastic leader of the GMS community. His promotion is so well deserved, and I’m thrilled he’ll be supporting and mentoring other principals in the county,” said Rankel. About the future, she said, “I am hopeful the search committee and the PGCPs leadership will select a new principal for us who will continue to communicate effectively with parents, motivate and encourage the GMS faculty and staff and will work as hard to know and champion the GMS students as Mr. Clement has during his tenure.”

“Principal Clement was a leader’s leader,” another parent, Brooke Kenny, told the News Review. “He was a tireless advocate for the students, staff and families of Greenbelt Middle School. He brought a breadth of skills and a depth of motivation to serve that will be difficult to replace.”

the Public Works employees who petitioned council in September — made a comment in support of the law. “We are so happy to have the support to form a union, and that you have given us a process with which to do so,” he said. “As a resident, as an employee, this is a wonderful thing to see.”

Resident Bill Orleans expressed dissent, criticizing the law for enshrining collective bargaining rights for only some of the city employees. “The organization chosen by ... employees when they’re certified in negotiation should have the opportunity to negotiate with management as to who should be in the bargaining unit.”

Orleans’ comment referred to employees who have managerial or confidential roles, who are excluded from collective bargaining by their role. To count as “confidential,” an employee must either be involved in — or have knowledge of — the city’s “development of labor relations strategy or collective bargaining positions,” or they are someone who has influence over personnel decisions like hiring or firing. Employees also count as “confidential” if they either have consistent access to personnel information or sit in on certain meetings run by the city’s manager or financial director.

Economic Development

Jessica Mailander introduced herself as the city’s new director of economic development, stressing her experience in the field. She commented that the sense of place in Greenbelt and its development would go “hand in hand.” She spoke of her recent attendance at the city’s Business Expo on only her fourth day on the job.

Armory Demolition

Council has developed three plans for the Armory, purchased in 2024 for \$1. All three options call for demolition of the building and council was requested to support the submission of grant proposals to analyze these options. Councilmembers agreed that the demolition would come as a surprise to many Greenbelters.

Resident Anguish

Longtime Greenbelt resident Frank Gervasi spoke of the petition he had begun, which already had 60 signatures. It opposes the demolition of what he referred to as a “beautiful building.” He characterized council’s three proposals as being “deficient” in any

plan to use the site. He felt, “having been in construction his whole life,” that the building was “real fixable” and wondered why council had acquired it merely to have it destroyed. Gervasi said that developers prefer to demolish and build anew because they make more money that way and recommended the preservation of the building and its use as a New Deal Museum.

Mayor Emmett Jordan agreed it was beautiful but disagreed on its fixability. The motion to apply for grants was passed, with Councilmember Danielle McKinney opposed.

Contracts Approved

City Manager Josué Salmerón noted that some contracts are multiyear contracts approved year to year. One is a new five-year contract for synchronized recording of police department interviews and body cameras/audio (brought up earlier in the meeting by residents).

A second vote approved year four of a contract for cameras in police cars (implemented prior to Salmerón’s employment). The third item replaces police cars. Of 15 vehicles requested, three Ford Interceptor hybrids costing approximately \$50,000 each will be purchased. All contracts were approved.

Other Activities

Salmerón explained that the return of county career firefighter personnel (a promise not yet fulfilled) would require firehouse updates, a city responsibility for which a list is in preparation.

The city is supporting access and traffic flow needs during Springhill Lake Elementary’s two-year relocation to the Dora Kennedy building while the new school is built. Demolition of the decommissioned building has begun.

Jordan congratulated Salmerón and city employees on a successful July 4 celebration despite the high temperatures and threat of torrential rain.

Purchasing Limits

For purchases exceeding \$10,000 in a year, the city must get contractor bids and sometimes, while no one purchase from a vendor is this high, multiple small purchases eventually exceed the threshold. Salmerón sought permission to negotiate such small purchases even if the addition takes the total over \$10,000 and, in response to Jordan, noted they use local vendors when possible, but not, for example, for Microsoft products sourced directly.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Meeting Ends Per Rules

Ninety minutes into the meeting, Councilmember Kristen Weaver proposed a 30-minute extension to 10 p.m. per new meeting rules, but Pompei objected, saying she had a hard stop that had been communicated to council and noting that only one remaining item was time sensitive.

Weaver concurred and withdrew the motion, instead re-ordering the agenda.

# St. Jerome Institute Gets Help In St. Hugh’s School Rezoning

In the Greenbelt City Council meeting of July 13, a request for support came from St. Hugh’s of Grenoble, the Catholic church on Crescent Road.

St. Hugh’s School was a private Catholic school once housed in the now mostly empty and deteriorating former school building adjacent to the church. Opened on November 1, 1949, the school was closed in 2009 after 60 years. Many now-adult city residents spent their first through eighth grade years there.

St. Jerome Institute, a Catholic secondary school now in Washington, D.C., wishes to move its operation into the building; it currently has 70 students and anticipates a maximum of 130. The nearly 17-year pause in usage as a school, however, makes the site revert to its original rural residential zoning which doesn’t permit schools – and Prince George’s County is the zoning authority.

### Support From Council

Earlier possibilities of such a move have been supported by council as a revitalization of the property, and now an opportunity to assist has presented itself. Prince George’s County and Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission authorities are in the process of reviewing a county bill (CB69), sponsored by county councilmember Timothy J. Adams, that changes the zoning requirement itself – rather than a special exception from the current zoning rules. St. Hugh’s asked the city to submit a letter to support the application.

### Thinking Outside the Box

The conventional approach is a special exception, which would take six to eight months “at a cost in the six-digits” according to land use and zoning attorney Matthew C. Tedesco, representing St. Jerome Institute. This more radical county bill approach exploits the fact that there are few sites (if any) in the county that would fit the narrow criteria of having previously been a private school, being now zoned rural residential and anticipating acquiring another private school occupant. Because the school’s situation is likely unique, a change to the zoning laws themselves, unlikely as it seems, is better, cheaper and faster.

### The Process to Date

Jaime Fearer, the city’s acting director of Planning and Community Development, summarized the situation.

She explained that the Prince George’s County Planning Board originally opposed a redesignation of the zoning because it affects all rural residential zones in the county and referred to schools in general. In a meeting, of which the city only had notice the day before and was not therefore registered to speak, Tedesco, on behalf of St. Jerome’s, suggested an amendment that would limit the effect of the bill to private schools in locations that were previously private schools.

With this narrowing of the criteria, the board voted to accept – though the current draft of CB69 does not yet consistently reflect that. Tedesco (present by phone at the meeting) said it was typical that the wording would not actu-

ally be changed until it was next presented, likely July 23, though it is not yet on the agenda for that board meeting.

Fearer urged council to act quickly, even though the county is still not quite ready. St. Jerome Institute needs to get a ruling so it can prepare for the transfer in time to open as planned, and the city and St. Hugh’s would both benefit from its tenancy.

Tedesco noted that successful passing of the bill would probably occur in the September timeframe, several months earlier than a special exception.

### Letter Versus MOU

Tedesco suggested that perhaps a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) covering elements cited by the county, such as parking, traffic, pedestrian safety, etc., would be the most effective intervention, though Councilmember Kristen Weaver was concerned that this might have wider repercussions for relationships between municipalities and county planning organizations.

Council passed a motion to provide a communication to the county leaving its format open for further consideration.

### Strengthened Resolve

A representative from St. Jerome Institute noted that they had been fighting already for two years to accomplish relocating their school to Prince George’s County and Greenbelt because most of their students come from the county and they feel another

school alternative here is important. He characterized a move to Montgomery County as much easier and less expensive to accomplish but stated that the school’s commitment is only strengthened as they work through what continues to be a difficult process.

## City Notes

During the heat and air quality advisories, Public Information designed and disseminated information about staying safe. The Aquatic & Fitness Center instituted hydration breaks and responded to a heat-related health emergency.

Code Enforcement inspected Glen Oaks, Lakeside North and Jane Apartments, three commercial suites, three complaints and 17 rentals.

Animal Shelter residents are four cats, eight kittens and a dog, after one dog adoption.

Public Works assembled and removed risers at the Community Center and Ballfields/Parks modified cabinets at the Cinema to accommodate a new popcorn machine. Building Maintenance installed a new water heater in the Municipal Building and painted and carpeted three offices in the Police Department.

Recreation and Community Center staff continued session three of summer camps. Therapeutic Recreation provided camp inclusion support and took seniors to the Smithsonian Museums.

At Green Ridge House, CARES distributed 25 senior nutrition vouchers for use at the Farmers Market and offered a Community Solar Program workshop.

departure while vice chair and before the end of his term.

## Delayed Announcements

Briggs sent a June newsletter to District 2 constituents on June 16, less than two weeks before his resignation, and did not mention his plan to resign. The News Review attempted to contact Briggs on July 2 but the email bounced. Residents with whom the News Review spoke, including those signed up for Briggs' emails and newsletters, had not received news of Briggs' resignation prior to July 20.

On July 20, in response to queries from the News Review about a public announcement and notification to constituents or media, PGCPs Director of the Board of Education Office Cindy Adlien directed us to the July 9 meeting as the official announcement and responded that notifications would be going out that day. Though Briggs' resignation was part of the chair's report at that meeting it was not on the agenda or within any board documents.

The announcement to constituents that Adlien shared with the News Review was marked "via email only" and dated June 30, though it was sent later the day of our communication, on July 20. Adlien stated, "There was a slight delay, as the Board was required to make a public announcement in accordance with parliamentary procedures." She did not respond to a follow-up question about which parliamentary procedures caused the delay in the notifications. Adlien also shared a media announcement dated July 20 and a memorandum to principals that was, like that to constituents, dated June 30. Micah McMillian, communications technician in the Board of Education office, confirmed that the notifications to constituents and principals dated June 30 were also sent on July 20. Those communications included an italicized message from Briggs within a larger letter or memo signed by Jackson and gave no indication of Briggs' reason for resignation.

## Interim Appointment

The District 2 vacancy and appointment window was announced on the County Council website in an announcement dated June 30. Nominations for the seat would be accepted until 5 p.m. on Tuesday, July 7, said the announcement. Adlien and McMillian told the News Review that the application process for the District 2 board seat is being administered by Prince George's County Council. When we asked why the application process preceded and concluded before any announcement by PGCPs of the resignation and vacancy, or even the chair's report of it on July 9, we were directed to the communications team for the county council and county executive. We subsequently sent our questions to the county, including how they publicized the vacancy and application process and how many applications were received. We did not receive a response by press time.

## New Vice Chair

Briggs' resignation left not only the District 2 seat vacant but also the position of vice chair. At the July 9 meeting Chair Jackson called for nominations. District 3 Board Member Pamela Boozer-Strother nominated District 8 Board Member Zakyia Goins-McCants as vice chair. Then, District 1 Board Member Tiffini Andorful nominated District 7 Board Member Phelton Moss and Student Board Member Sydney Mosley added his support of the nomination of Moss. District 5 Board Member Robin Brown then nominated Boozer-Strother, who said that she did not wish to run for the position. Goins-McCants then also declined the nomination, leaving only one candidate, Moss, who was announced as the new vice chair.

## Impact on Election

Several resignations from the Prince George's County Council took place in December and January when there was less than a year of the departing mem-

bers' term to serve. The ability of the council to appoint the new member, just months ahead of an election, may have influenced the outcome of the election by bestowing an incumbent advantage on the member selected by council. In the case of District 4's representative, Tim Adams was appointed by the council on January 23 and subsequently won election and defeated challengers for the seat in June.

In the case of the District 2 school board seat, the race is already underway as the field was narrowed from three to two candidates in the June primary. In November, voters will be able to choose between two Greenbelt residents. Caroline Decaire-Goldin is a former PGCPs teacher, current Director of Teaching and Learning in the D.C. Office of the State Superintendent of Education and parent of children attending PGCPs schools. Terence Clegg is a risk management administrator at the Maryland Department of Human Services and parent of children attending PGCPs schools. Clegg has been endorsed by Governor Wes Moore and District 22 State Senator Alonzo Washington.

The News Review reached out to both Decaire-Goldin and Clegg to ask when and how they learned of the vacancy and if they applied to the interim position. Clegg responded, "In the process of seeking this position, I have tried to stay abreast of local and county news. I saw the vacancy announcement posted on the County's website and have submitted my materials for consideration." Decaire-Goldin did not respond by press time.

\*Note: According to the county's notice of the vacancy and application window, Briggs' resignation was effective June 26 but according to PGCPs, it was effective June 30.

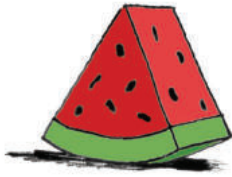

# Driver Who Died in Custody and Involved Greenbelt Officer Named

The driver who died following a crash off Southway on July 1 has been identified as 40-year-old Michael MacDougall, of Frederick. The Independent Investigations Division (IID) of the Maryland Office of the Attorney General (OAG), which is investigating this as a police-involved in-custody death, has named "the involved officer" as Greenbelt Police Officer Tyler Fahey, described as a four-year veteran of Greenbelt Police Department (GPD). A fundraising page for MacDougall says he was a new father to a 3-month-old named Jayson. The OAG reported an infant was in the vehicle at the time of the crash and was unharmed.

Assistant City Manager Tim George told the News Review he cannot share any information relating to the case until the OAG advises that the city is able to do so.

For our initial reporting of this incident, see page 13 of the July 9 issue.

GPD reported in a July 2 press release that their officers were providing assistance to U.S. Park Police (USPP) following the crash. When they arrived on the scene, USPP had already detained MacDougall, say both GPD and the OAG. The OAG announcement notes MacDougall was handcuffed by USPP and escorted by them from the wooded area to the roadway. "While in custody, the driver became unresponsive," said the OAG announcement. GPD's press release said their officers assisted with medical care as MacDougall appeared to be

experiencing a medical emergency. The GPD release also stated that a USPP officer administered Narcan.

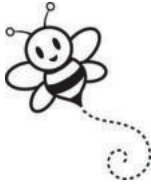
MacDougall was transported to a local hospital by Prince George's County Fire/EMS, where he was later pronounced dead.

It is so far unclear why Fahey is the sole officer to be named when both GPD's press release and the OAG's announcement indicate more than one Greenbelt officer was on the scene to assist.

The IID has authority to investigate Maryland police officers involved in incidents that result in a death or injuries likely to result in a death. As a state-level investigations division it does not usually have authority to investigate federal officers, such as USPP, which would be the responsibility of federal agencies, such as the National Park Service Investigative Services Branch and the Department of Interior's own OAG.

The most recent announcement from the OAG notes that Fahey was wearing a body camera at the time and states that the dashboard camera in his cruiser recorded the incident. The IID generally releases body camera and dashboard footage within 20 days but the News Review's Maryland Public Information Act request to the OAG for public documents, including camera footage, has so far been denied due to the active investigation.

The News Review has been told that video of the incident may be released by late next week. Officer Fahey remains in full-duty status with GPD, Chief Richard Bowers told the News Review.

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# Mayor Urges Golden Agers To Stay Active, Involved

Mayor Emmett Jordan met with Greenbelt Golden Age Club members on Wednesday, July 8 for an informal chat where he described his background and focused on current issues. The mayor, originally from Cincinnati, has been on the city council since 2009.

Jordan commented on the need for staying active as we age. Opportunities within the city include the Greenbelt Aquatic & Fitness Center as well as other gyms.

Encouraging ongoing involvement, he stated that the city has 17 advisory boards and many are looking for members. There are incentives to join a board: a free end-of-year dinner and a half-price membership at the Aquatic Center. He indicated that advisory board members may not have to be an expert in the field – sometimes just showing up to help is what is needed.

Jordan commented on activities under City Manager Josué Salmerón, who has been in office since 2023. The mayor thinks the

When a question came up about the stop sign cameras, everyone had an opinion. Many Golden Agers had gotten a ticket or knew someone who had. Suze Marley suggested that instead of a ticket, the person should get community service as that would get people thinking more. Jordan encouraged her to send a memo to the city manager.

There was a comment that the ticketing letter looked like an ad and some may have thrown it in the trash. Stop sign cameras are currently at Southway and Ridge Road, Ridge Road and Gardenway and up near Greenbelt Elementary School. There are two cameras in Franklin Park. Greenbelt East has no stop sign cameras but does have several speed cameras.

# Council Considers Changes To Annual Budget Process

In the second half of the June 10 worksession, the Greenbelt City Council discussed the annual budget process. During the recently completed budget cycle, council adopted the Fiscal Year (FY) 2027 budget at its May 26 regular meeting. City Manager Josué Salmerón said the city must move its budget adoption date earlier to align with Prince George's County's May 15 deadline for certifying the real property-tax rate. This year the county agreed to a one-time accommodation allowing the city to submit its certification forms after the May 26 budget adoption.

## Recommendations

For the FY 2027 budget cycle, Salmerón presented the proposed budget to council on March 23. Between April 8 and May 26, there were two public hearings on the proposed budget at regular council meetings and 10 worksessions focused on different components of the budget.

Salmerón recommended that, for the FY 2028 budget cycle and going forward, the budget process start in December with a pre-budget worksession, at which staff would present an early financial outlook identifying projected revenues, known expenditure increases, capital needs, reserve levels and the preliminary gap between recurring revenues and expenses. This would allow council to begin discussing potential tax, fee, service and staffing decisions well before the proposed budget is introduced. In order to adopt the budget and property-tax rate before the county's May 15 deadline, Salmerón recommended that the budget calendar be adjusted to include earlier and fewer worksessions, public hearings and decision points.

## Discussion

Councilmember Kristen Weaver said that council will need to be more disciplined in the worksessions, focusing on the department, program or recognition group budget and not receiving or asking for updates on their accomplishments. She also suggested that some worksession topics be combined. Councilmember Amy Knesel said she liked the FY 2027 schedule in that it allowed time to formulate and submit questions to city staff before their council appearance. Councilmember Jenni Pompei agreed but sug-

gested that council consider holding some budget worksessions on weekends to compress the schedule and to allow more residents to attend. Councilmember Danielle McKinney thought that council should consider budget issues before the proposed budget is presented, perhaps having them raised in the quarterly city manager's reports. She would like council to hear updates on department accomplishments throughout the year, which other councilmembers agreed with. Councilmember Frankie Fritz suggested a framework for analyzing the budget that includes a base budget review, discussions of service delivery and efficiency and a focus on outcome-based budgeting, considering how the investments being made meet the city's goals. Fritz also would like to see future consideration of participatory budgeting that would allow residents to become involved in the budget process.

Resident J Davis thought a pre-budget worksession would be worthwhile and suggested that it could even be moved into November. Salmerón countered that the city receives an expected property-tax revenue estimate from the state in December, which guides development of the proposed budget since property tax provides the vast majority of the city's revenue. Davis also suggested that budget worksessions could start in February, which drew some groans from councilmembers.

After further discussion with Salmerón about including budget information in the city manager reports, council shifted to Pompei's suggestion, made at an earlier meeting, that council establish a budget or finance task force to research policy or other issues relevant to the budget process. Although Knesel and McKinney thought creating council subgroups to research issues would be an efficient way to better inform council, Councilmember Silke Pope strongly objected to their establishment, saying council functions as a whole and councilmembers should be equally informed. Mayor Emmett Jordan said that creation of council committees should be carefully considered — should they be standing committees and would membership rotate? — and suggested it be the topic of a future worksession.
