Former Mayor Gil Weidenfeld's Reflections on Accomplishments

This is Part 2 in a series of remembrances of former Mayor Gil Weidenfeld, who died on July 4 at the age of 93. The following article, by Sandra Lange which first appeared in the News Review on February 10, 1994, reflects on his years on the city council. Omitted is a section devoted to his thoughts of running for the County Council. He did not serve on that council.

Gil Weidenfeld, private citizen, is a little lost these days. After 22 years on the Greenbelt City Council, 14 of them as mayor, he misses the meetings he attended at least three nights a week, the urgent telephone calls from citizens, the strategy sessions where he was a key player. He is proud of his role in purchasing parkland, building a new school and constructing an indoor swimming pool.

Looking back on his political life, he smiles at the parochial interests that caused him to first run for the city council in September 1971. "I wanted a community center for Springhill Lake," he says. "I lived there at the time, and there were no recreation facilities. Plus, there was a major highway dividing the city that made it difficult for Springhill Lake residents to use the recreation facilities in the core of Greenbelt."

As he and others elected from Springhill Lake achieved their goal, Weidenfeld found that he enjoyed being on the city council. He also developed a broader range of interests. He supported the development of senior citizen housing, and views the construction of Green Ridge House as

GHI Members Authorize Possible Purchase of 121 Centerway Building

Following a marathon special meeting on Thursday evening, July 23, an unprecedented number of members of the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) housing co-operative voted and, by a nearly 4 to 1 margin — 580 yes votes to 156 no votes — gave the GHI Board the authority to investigate and proceed with the purchase of 121 Centerway. The building, an anchor of Roosevelt Center, hosts the Greenbelt Co-op Supermarket and Pharmacy and the Greenbelt Arts Center, with a lower-level space currently vacant.

The vote means that the purchase can go forward if certain financial, property condition and other due diligence contingencies are met to the board's satisfaction.

The Proposed Purchase

The current building owner Glen Burnie Partners has agreed to the sale of the building for \$3.5 million. An appraisal commissioned by the National Co-operative Bank gave the property a current market value of \$3.8

million. The basic structure of the deal would be a downpayment of about \$875,000 and a 30-year mortgage for the rest, with the National Cooperative Bank as the likely lender. Rent paid by the tenants would cover the mortgage payments.

The subject of the purchase was previously discussed with members at both a GHI Town Hall on April 9 and at the GHI Annual Meeting on May 14 (see April 16, 2026 and May 21, 2026 News Review issues.) The Co-op

For Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen, Kindness is a Verb

What makes Greenbelt outstanding? The resident who was granted the city's Outstanding Citizen award at last year's Greenbelt Labor Day Festival might say, "kindness."

Whether through litter cleanup, literacy programs, food and essentials distribution, neighborhood outreach or other initiatives that help families in need and bring people together, Robert Goldberg-Strassler sees every act of service as an expression of kindness and care for others. Picking up litter isn't just for the environment, he says. It's showing you care about the people who live there. And that kindness can spread through taking the initiative, accompanying others in their efforts and inviting them to join you. "When our kids and grandkids saw us picking up trash, they started doing it too," he explained. As more people get involved, whether to volunteer or to receive help, the circle of support and impact grows.

RUAK Beginnings

In 2017 Goldberg-Strassler started Random Unselfish Acts of Kindness (RUAK). "It's not even a 501(c)(3)," he says. "It's a movement." One of RUAK's first initiatives was to encourage residents to get outside for a walk called HUG (Help Unite Greenbelt With A Little Kindness).

Each year, HUG walkers cross the boundaries that divide Greenbelt, get to know each other and learn new things to love about the city they call home. RUAK's web-

site features things to love about Greenbelt, some of them quite unexpected. Another initiative has been inviting people to pick up trash on their walk or jog. Called "plogging," the idea has spread across the world but had not yet caught on in Greenbelt.

Inviting people to walk together or "plog" may not be new, but putting an article in the News Review to invite anyone who wants

County Exec to Select Briggs' Replacement; Questions Continue

The process to replace outgoing District 2 Board of Education member Jonathan Briggs, whose date of resignation is still unclear, is being run by the office of the county executive, not the county council. This is contrary to information the Greenbelt News Review received in writing last week from the Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) Board of Education office. One of the candidates on the November bal-

lot for the seat has applied. The other candidate has not.

Appointment Process

On July 20, the News Review was informed in writing by two members of the PGCPS Board of Education Office, including the director, that the application process for the vacancy was being managed by the county council. That information is incorrect. PGCPS did not respond to a

County Data Center, Development Concerns

Prince George's County is about to allow data centers despite the two-year moratorium they voted in on July 13. Council Member Wanika Fisher's drafted bill to allow these data centers

on agricultural land was heard on July 23 by the M-NCPPC Planning Board. Despite opposition by their own Planning Board staff and all public comments, except for one electrical union worker, the Board chose to take no action. The bill will now go to the County Council.

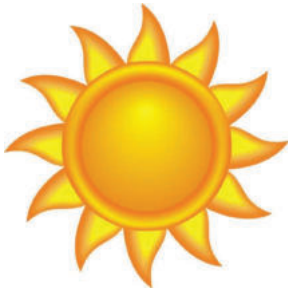
On July 30, the Planning Board will hear LDR-153-2026 to streamline site plan review, which will make projects easier to move forward without public comment. This would fast-track and undermine the public's right to know and to submit informed comments. It undermines agencies' ability to analyze projects and develop informed comments and recommendations. It undermines informed decision making. Further, Council Member Shayla Adams-Stafford is drafting comprehensive legislation that will allow the county to end the moratorium.

Elizabeth (Betty) Wellborn of Greenbelt died on July 17, 2026. She was 95.

Born April 8, 1931 on her family's dairy farm, she was the daughter of the late Elizabeth Buchanan and David Burt James, and the wife of the late James R. Wellborn.

The first of eight children, she grew up on Boggs Road in Forest Hill, Md. Growing up during the Depression, she worked on the family farm and knew the value of hard work. She started driving the mule team when she was 9. After many years off the farm, she returned to farming in 1971 in Accident, Md.

Betty graduated from Bel Air High School in 1948 and went on to graduate from Salisbury State University in 1952, earning a degree in education. She also earned a master's in education in 1981. Betty last taught in Garrett

County, Md., and often lamented how much she missed teaching.

She loved all children as her own and looked forward to seeing her great-grandchildren every Sunday. She also loved when the neighborhood children would stop by. She could easily be distracted while grocery shopping if there was a child in the store. She also enjoyed living near her grandchildren, who stopped by frequently.

She is survived by her daughter Katherine Wellborn (Chris Casey) of Greenbelt and her son David Wellborn of Lewes, Del. Her daughter Amy Wellborn died from leukemia in 2014. She is survived by her sister Anne Duncan of Charleston, S.C., brother Joe James of Baltimore and by her grandchildren: Kyle Yancey of Hyattsville; Alec Casey of Greenbelt; Caroline Casey of Greenbelt; Mark Wellborn of Austin, Texas; Emma Grier of Charlottesville, Va.; Wren Grier of Greenbelt and her son-in-law Rick Grier. She is also survived by her great-grandchildren Grayson and Miles Yancey of Hyattsville.

Betty was preceded in death by her parents and husband and by her brothers David James, Allen James, Kenny James and her sisters Nancy Munro and Janie Elliott.

Council Updates from CARES, City Manager and Planning

During the July 15 worksession, the Greenbelt City Council was given an update on efforts from City Manager Josué Salmerón, the Department of Planning and Community Development, and Greenbelt CARES.

According to Salmerón, in six months, usage of the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds bestowed upon the city will expire. Salmerón said that \$200,000 remains which can be distributed internally to existing projects. He stated that an audit is expected.

Salmerón began the meeting by stating that the budget passed in May managed to be balanced and to close a \$3M deficit with minimal disruption in services, an accomplishment that proves increasingly difficult.

Jessica Mailander, the city’s new economic development manager, has begun implementing the economic development strategic plan.

The Save-As-You-Throw program continues, with feedback from the community informing any improvements that may need to be made.

Eight new EV Level 2 charging stations have been installed in the Library parking lot.

Demolition and construction will begin this later this year on the Greenbelt Museum’s 10-A Crescent Road property, with funds being secured.

The city has received \$87,000 in credits from Pepco, a result of overbilling. A new power contract is anticipated when energy prices return to a stable level.

Annexation

Annexation of Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC) and NASA parcel 3 has been completed, with efforts ongoing to annex the Lanham Boy’s Club, which borders Greenbelt, and BARC parcels 1 and 2.

\$1M of additional work at Braden Fields remains and a state bond bill was secured for the new pavilions at Buddy Attick Park.

Salmerón said that the city’s human resources department conducted comprehensive workplace safety initiatives and that the city has contracted with Chesapeake Worker’s Compensation Insurance, replacing the previous vendor.

The IT department has shifted the city from Office 2019 to the

Office 365 subscription-based platform. T-Mobile is being used for administrative and vehicle phones. A telematic vehicle-tracking system, which combines communications and informatics to track a vehicle’s location, has been acquired.

The automated Stop Sign Enforcement Program has been implemented at six sites, with fees beginning in June. The vendor said to expect a 60 percent drop in citations after a nine-month period.

Planning Department

Acting Director Jaime Fearer, Community Planner Ryan Sigworth, Assistant Director of Community Development Gilberto Cabrera and Community Development Inspector Michael Day were present for Planning and Community Development.

Fearer stated the department’s focus is on the health, safety, welfare and integrity of the city’s properties and infrastructure, alongside fair, consistent and effective code enforcement.

Sigworth said the ARPA Pedestrian and Bicyclist Master Plan has achieved a completed traffic study, 100 percent design and engineering for the Hanover Parkway sidewalk gap and a paved shared-use path between Schrom Hills Park and Greenbrook Drive. Public Works has installed three sets of Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon crosswalk signage, six

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Labor Day Festival Launches New Online Ticketing System

The Greenbelt Labor Day Festival Committee is excited to announce a new online ticketing system designed to make attending this year's event easier, faster and more convenient for festivalgoers.

Through carnival operator Snyder's Attractions, guests will be able to purchase wristbands with all-you-can-ride options or various numbers of credits before arriving at the Festival. The new system allows attendees to securely buy tickets from any computer, tablet or smartphone, eliminating the need to wait in long ticket lines on event days.

Even the discount ticket vouchers, typically available at Greenbelt Co-op Supermarket a few weeks before the Festival, are now online. "Festivalgoers don't have to race to purchase those discount ticket vouchers before the deadline," says Karen Yoho, Greenbelt Labor Day Festival president. "Now with a few clicks, families can buy four-hour passes and all-day passes online at a discount before 11:59 p.m. on Thursday, September 3."

Another unique feature of the online ticketing is that the timed passes are not restricted to particular days or hours of the Festival. Yoho explains, "Whenever you decide to start riding rides, with a four-hour wristband the four-hour time period begins with the first ride. So riders can choose morning, afternoon or evening to use their four-hour wristband, or select a full-day wristband and ride all day." Riders can buy multiple four-hour or all-day wristbands to use on different days.

Those making advance online wristband purchases will pick up their wristbands from the machines at the Festival using a code. At those same machines, festivalgoers can purchase new wristbands and add credits to existing wristbands. The machines will accept cash and credit/debit cards for payment. No paper tickets are dispensed; everything is on wristbands.

The 72nd Annual Greenbelt Labor Day Festival will feature popular rides, games, food vendors, live entertainment and family-friendly activities. The committee expects the online ticketing system to help streamline operations while enhancing the overall guest experience.

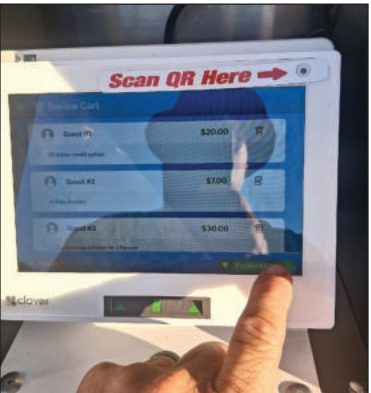

to do it to join him, without first organizing a series of meetings to plan it or applying for grants, may be a new concept to some. "It doesn't cost money," Goldberg-Strassler says. "If you check every program I've done, everything is free. I give out free books to promote or uplift literacy, healthy food, snacks."

Help for the Homeless

His philosophy is simple: "I have enough and people have needs. I go out into the woods and help the homeless." Because of the plogging article, the 30 people who responded found it easier to take action and didn't have to feel like they were doing it alone.

Another RUAK initiative that has grown steadily is Goldberg-Strassler's pre-K literacy program, where children choose free books and healthy snacks while parents read with them. At last month's event, 54 children attended, a remarkable cross-section of Greenbelt's diversity all gathered around reading. "If you saw the diversity of children picking up books and snacks, the parents reading to the children, that's transformative. That's why kindness is a verb," he says. For him, literacy is another form of kindness: giving families what they need to grow, learn and feel connected.

A Plug for Plogging

It took Goldberg-Strassler putting himself out there for plogging to get it going in Greenbelt. But when he learned he would be announced as Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen last year, he nearly didn't attend the ceremony. His daughter and grandchildren coaxed him to the Labor Day Festival that afternoon. "Otherwise, you know I have other things to

do," he says. This is because Robert is an introvert, "a recluse," as he calls it. Even so, he hasn't let this stop him from connecting to others and making a difference. For two months of every year for the last 15 he has baked for a program dedicated to a 23-year-old he'd known since birth who died from anorexia. "Her parents started a scholarship. I started an annual fundraiser and we gave out 12 scholarships."

For more than 40 years, he has quietly woven a network of kindness throughout Greenbelt. His decades of experience have made him a kind of informal guide for residents navigating services and support. People who don't know how to begin the search, know to contact Robert. He's the 411. "That's a little bit of why I was invited to become a member of the Greenbelt Interfaith Leadership Association (GILA). Just through my life experiences and Judy's [his spouse], I know where the resources are. I know who provides the services. I know what the programs are. It's real-time stuff and people need real-time. I just have that sort of network."

On the Payroll

Since Goldberg-Strassler received the award last year, that network and its influence have widened. The Greenbelt Porch Project doubled in the neighborhoods it serves. The need is when you see people struggling. Donations of food and essential items nearly doubled. Five or six new neighborhood coordinators stepped forward. People who had never donated before began showing up with bags of groceries, hygiene kits and supplies for families in crisis, "helping people who have lost their jobs, donating

food to people who need it. The timing of that couldn't be more important," he says.

"I've got two new programs I'm doing with birthday boxes for homeless children," he says. "Someone told somebody about what they heard at the ceremony about the things I do. This lady called me and met me in a parking lot. She had 50 full bags for homeless people of toiletries, underwear, socks and dental hygiene. She goes, 'I know you'll get it to the people.' And the timing couldn't have been better because it happened a week before the camp [run by the Community

newing its lease when it expires in 2037 and “bad” when GHI has to find a new tenant and the space is vacant for an extended period). In each of these, the provision projection is that the mortgage is paid off by year 30 and the positive cash flow puts downward pressure on member fees.

Member Concerns

Members had many questions following the presentation. Many wanted more information on the state of Co-op finances and their viability as a tenant. Other concerns were raised about the building condition — how accurate were the estimates for repairs? How difficult and expensive would it be to find a tenant for the lower level? Would this purchase

Crisis Services of Prince George's County] in January." Goldberg-Strassler was able to get them the supplies in time. Moments like this show how quickly kindness moves when people know where to turn.

"I am willing to share the information that I have to help improve life in Greenbelt," he says. On receiving the award, there was an influx of "people becoming aware of how connected I am to programs and service and how to solve problems." Rather than being overwhelming "it highlights the need out there."

A New Form

There does not seem to be a limit to what form kindness can take. He invited the police chief, crisis intervention director and the director of Greenbelt CARES to present at each of the GILA meetings in the summer, "to tell faith leaders what services and

programs exist and communicate those to their congregations and communities. These are the services and programs Greenbelt residents have access to," he says.

What's next? "I'm going to start giving out microgrants to any group in Greenbelt that wants to start conversations and community gatherings all over Greenbelt. The program will be called Greenbelt WON (Greenbelt With Our Neighbors). It will be inspiring civic life."

Someone who wants to do anything to bring people together, such as host a block party, can receive \$50 or \$75 to get started. Goldberg-Strassler also knows whom to call if you want the city to set up benches for that block party and take them away the next day and do it for free, he says. "If you call the Greenbelt Public Works or the Constituent Services Coordinator [Gizelle Al-

varez] and say I need five picnic tables on such and such a day, they'll bring them to you," he says.

One Person's Initiative

Goldberg-Strassler's story shows how one person's quiet initiative can ripple across an entire city. If someone you know takes the initiative to serve others in a spirit of kindness and cooperation, especially someone whose efforts help residents across the city, don't hesitate to nominate them.

one of his highest achievements. "Green Ridge House is a model for the state, and I feel real good about it," he affirms.

He lost only one battle, he says, while on the city council, and that was the first referendum in the 1970s, on construction of the indoor swimming pool. Two decades later, the indoor pool is a reality in which he feels enormous pride.

Center School Controversy

The biggest controversy during his tenure in office was the renovation of Center School as opposed to building a new school in the north end of town. "This issue caused splits in families and differences between friends," he says. "It was one of those issues where no one was right or wrong, but rather it was which decision served the community's interest more," he reflected. In the end, the community voted to build a new school and turn Center School into a community center. Weidenfeld regrets that he is no longer on the city council, as it shaped the final conversion of Center School into a community center.

He is proud of his role in renovating Roosevelt Center and building the new police station. He enjoyed the projects associated with the city's celebration of its 50th anniversary in 1987, which he describes as a high point.

Weidenfeld praises the work of the city councils over the years. He views the former councils as generally harmonious, reflecting the continuity that prevailed from year to year. With never more than one new council member elected at any particular time, that new

person generally went along with the prevailing positions, he said.

He describes the personality differences and divergent viewpoints as healthy. "Some issues get personal, but over the years most city councils worked well." He states that after the final vote, the dissenting council members usually came together to support the decisions of the majority.

Weidenfeld would like to see more involvement in city issues by Greenbelt East and Springhill Lake residents. He thinks the new community center and the indoor pool will draw these diverse communities together. "I want to bring others into the city. I want them to feel enthusiastic to serve on advisory boards and commu-

nity organizations."

Greenbelt Is Great

"We have a caring community and a high level of service," he continues. "I haven't found any place as great as Greenbelt. Even people you disagree with on issues do so out of strong feelings of service to the community," he adds.

From caring about one part of town having its own recreation center, he has moved toward a view of the city not unlike that of its creator, Franklin Delano Roosevelt. In 1936 Roosevelt said, "I have seen the blueprints for this project and have been greatly interested, but the actual sight itself exceeds anything I ever dreamed of."

sets of LED crosswalk signage and four sets of LED stop signs. Ridge Road has seen improved curb ramps and segments and new crosswalk connections at five locations. Sharrows (shared lane markings) are planned at eight corridors.

Regarding bus stop safety and accessibility, 29 concrete pads have been installed alongside six new bus shelters.

The ARPA-funded Stormwater Drainage Study remains in progress.

The Hanover Parkway Shared Use Path will likely see construction in 2027 with a search in January or February for funds to finance the final 10 percent of the design.

The Historic Greenbelt Cemetery Master Plan continues to be developed, with a final draft expected soon.

The Greenbelt Strategic Wayfinding Plan has been finalized, with an option for execution in phases.

Progress on the Greenbelt Station/WMATA trail is moving forward slowly with plan approval pending from the State Highway Administration.

The Indian Creek Park Conceptual Master Plan awaits further review by council and the county's Department of Permitting, Inspections and Enforcement, with stormwater mitigation a county concern.

According to Salmerón in a subsequent interview, a \$3M project for the expansion and renovation of the Springhill Lake Recreation Center is proposed to be funded by \$2.7M from Maryland Program Open Space (for which the county has given preliminary approval), a \$250,000 federal earmark and a \$50,000 direct city match.

A county-run outpatient medical facility on Edmonston Road is under construction. The demolition and new construction for Springhill Lake Elementary School is progressing.

Code Enforcement

Cabrera and Day discussed code enforcement. Fire protection, safety, and remediation of pests and infrastructure hazards of residential and commercial property remain their mandate. Day said that proper placement of smoke alarms can result in a 60 percent drop in death rates. There has been a reduced number of complaints and citations, said Cabrera.

Code Enforcement has partnered with the Greenbelt Police

Department and CARES to enhance the scope and effectiveness of its operations.

Councilmember Danielle McKinney expressed concern over walker safety in the coming school year at the former Dora Kennedy French Immersion School, which now will serve the students of Springhill Lake Elementary School. Many ideas were proposed, such as parent walk-throughs and walking the bus stops.

Social Services

CARES ended the meeting, represented by Director Liz Park, Assistant Director Christal Batey and Education and Workforce Development Coordinator Deji Ayoku. CARES retains its three anchor programs: Youth and Family Services, education and workforce development, and Greenbelt Assistance in Living (GAIL), led by Batey.

Youth and Family Services focuses on mental health, mainly through counseling, school-requested substance abuse assessments and crisis support services. CARES partners with the Greenbelt Police Department's Crisis Intervention Team, offering additional clinical services when needed.

Education and workforce development provides GED classes, ESOL classes and job-related training, like resumé writing and interview assistance.

GAIL provides food (primarily from the Capital Area Food Bank) and diaper distribution, senior health screenings, and a robust nursing program to seniors, mainly through nursing student interns from local universities. The nursing program has expanded from just Green Ridge House to the greater city community and is vital for many to age in place. GAIL also helps connect residents to programs to equip homes to support aging in place. Most of these services are free for Greenbelt residents.

Park said that CARES also still offers renter's tax credits, Greenbelt Interfaith Leadership Association (GILA)-funded eviction relief (in cases where the following month is guaranteed), and legal referrals, in some cases.

Council was deeply appreciative of all these efforts, citing their transformative effect on the lives of residents.

for the seat.

2025 Precedent

The county saw a similar appointment process for a school board member in 2025. At that time, then-Board of Education Member Shayla Adams-Stafford had announced her resignation and intention to run for county council in mid-December 2024. An application period was opened to fill her seat on January 9, 2025 (according to a report shared at the April 22, 2025, county council meeting). That timeline meant approximately three weeks between Adams-Stafford's resignation announcement and the opening of the application to fill her seat, compared to four days in the case of Briggs' (using the earliest of the conflicting dates of his resignation). The window for applications for the 2025 school board vacancy was January 9 to January 23 – twice the length of the window for applications following Briggs' resignation. The 2025 call for applications was

also advertised by the county executive's office, including on social media posts.

Prior Process

The previous process, as reported at the April 22, 2025, county council meeting, which included a public hearing on appointee Aimee Olivo, was said to have yielded 27 applications. Of those applications, 13 were rejected for residency reasons. Fourteen candidates were invited to interview, 12 actually interviewed and interviews were conducted by a panel of three persons over three days. The top two were then brought back for a further two-panel interview. Speaking at that council meeting, Olivo said she had gone through "a very thorough process" that included three interviews with six individuals.

This is a developing story. The News Review has submitted public information requests for records relating to Briggs' resignation and the application process to fill his seat.

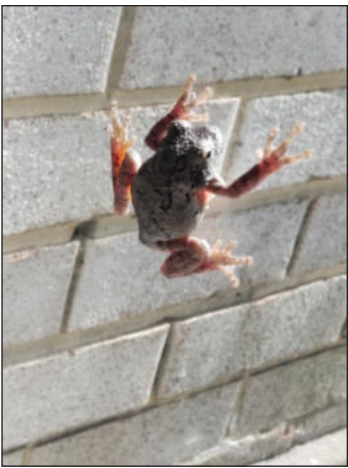

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WSSC Says Lead Samples at Greenbelt Standpipe Are Below Federal Benchmarks

Air and soil samples taken at the Greenbelt standpipe rehabilitation project have not exceeded federal safety standards for lead concentrations, the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) told the public at a virtual public meeting on July 14.

Washington-based Soil and Land Use Technology, Inc. (SALUT) performed the sampling for WSSC's construction contractor, Baltimore-based Titan Industrial Services, Inc. SALUT then sent the samples to separate laboratory testing companies based in Maryland and Virginia for analysis. All samples were taken from within, or at, the site's perimeter.

Air Quality

According to WSSC, the average airborne lead concentration at the standpipe during the recent paint removal process was less than 0.01 micrograms per cubic meter, which is far lower than both short-term and long-term federal benchmarks for airborne lead exposure cited by a WSSC consultant.

Rosalind Schoof, a toxicologist with the Ramboll Group hired by WSSC to explain the monitoring, said OSHA's lead standards provided a benchmark for short-term lead exposure, while the EPA's standards were a benchmark for longer-term.

"Neither EPA nor the Centers for Disease Control have a short-term lead standard, like an eight-hour standard," said Schoof, as the air samples were taken over the course of eight-hour workdays. "So what I did was I looked at the maximum concentrations from the eight-hour averages, and compared them with some of the [OSHA] standards, and they're still below those standards."

The EPA's National Ambient Air Quality Standard for lead is 0.15 micrograms per cubic meter, while under OSHA, workers cannot be exposed to more than 50 micrograms per cubic meter.

WSSC Water Project Manager Christopher DeHerde had also stated that air monitoring is conducted continuously while the blasting is occurring and if lead levels exceed what is "allowable," then the hygienists monitoring the project will issue a stop-work order to Titan employees.

Air monitors are stationed around the perimeter of the site, DeHerde said, in addition to those worn by the workers on site and a device that collects samples from the exhaust of the abrasive blasting equipment.

DeHerde stated that at the end of the month, WSSC would share the air monitoring samples which were taken from the first phase of abrasive blasting.

Soil Monitoring

At the meeting, Schoof discussed the results of the soil monitoring. Of six samples taken at the site in April, the highest lead concentration (130 milligrams per kilogram) found in the soil was still below EPA's recommended safe lead level (220 milligrams per kilogram).

Schoof also explained that the levels in the samples are consistent with what she expected, given what is typical per U.S. Housing and Urban Development Department data for residential areas with homes built in the 1960s.

WSSC air monitoring device

Greenbelt resident Kelly Brower asked whether individuals needed to test their own soil and whether it is safe to eat vegetables harvested from home gardens.

Schoof responded that while homegrown produce is not a major source of lead exposure, dust from the construction site can settle on outdoor gardens so she recommended washing any homegrown produce if one's property borders the facility.

Although WSSC officials described the April soil samples as predating blasting, official project documents from WSSC's website note that the samples were collected April 7, when abrasive blasting was underway according to News Review reporting and a WSSC notice dated April 14.

However, the project documents SALUT provided to Titan also describe the soil samples as having been taken "prior to start to [sic] lead work" and further state that "[n]o lead-related work was conducted" in April 2026.

DeHerde clarified to the News Review that the soil samples were collected when interior blasting was ongoing. Prior to April 7, there had been no exterior blasting, so the presentation was referring to soil samples collected at a time when, he believed, the debris did not contain lead.

WSSC external communications manager Lyn Riggins confirmed DeHerde's statement and added that interior blasting specifically started on March 19.

"WSSC Water voluntarily conducts soil sampling as an added measure to help protect public health and provide additional transparency to the community," Riggins told the News Review.

Andy McAllister, a vice president at SALUT, also confirmed WSSC's timeline with the News Review.

DeHerde stated that when the abrasive blasting and coating work is finished, a second set of soil samples will be taken.

Next Round

WSSC does not yet have a

start date for the next round of abrasive blasting; it could begin in either August or September and take two weeks to one month.

DeHerde explained that one reason the timeline was pushed back (the current timeline on the project's website shows a containment system was to be erected by spring) was partially because of Titan's decision to use a different kind of abrasive blaster, the FasterBlaster, to minimize noise.

The FasterBlaster, which Titan began to use in mid-April, according to a WSSC notice from April 14, is a self-contained abrasive blasting system that has a vacuum seal to suck in debris; so unlike other abrasive blasters, it does not require a containment system below.

When Greenbelt residents living near the project inquired about whether sound panels would be installed during the next round of blasting, WSSC project outreach manager Joy Hamilton stated that the inquiry would be referred back to WSSC "leadership."

However, Theon Grojean, a WSSC division manager who was present, denied that WSSC had any responsibility to put up panels.

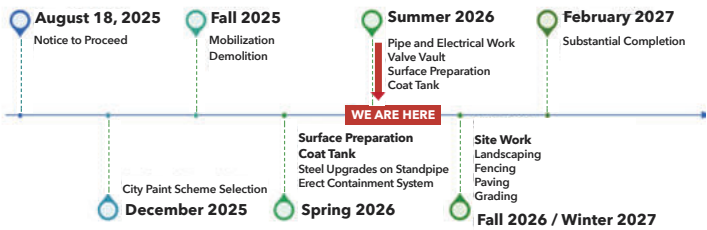
"Our leverage to require the contractor to take additional steps on sound mitigation, if they are adhering to the requirements of the contract ... we really don't have a leg to [stand on to require them to] do more," Grojean said.

However, Hamilton stated that WSSC would commit to notifying residents a week prior to when blasting would occur via posting notices to the website.

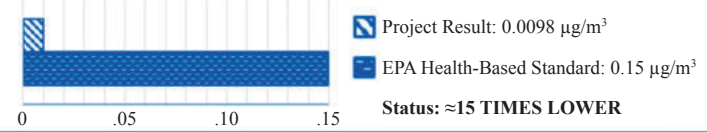
Greenbelt resident Kemari Legg, who lives near the site, told the paper that while he appreciated the update on WSSC's environmental monitoring, he wished that WSSC would contact affected residents directly about when blasting would occur.

WSSC still slates the project's completion for February 2027.

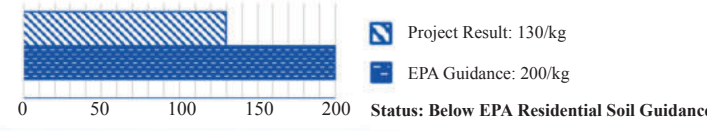
Estimated Project Schedule
