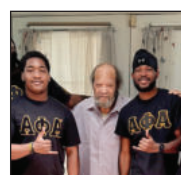

Friends and Colleagues Remember Former Greenbelt Mayor's Legacy

This is the third in a series of articles remembering former Greenbelt Mayor Gil Weidenfeld.

Following his death on July 4, 2026, at age 93, Gil Weidenfeld's family, friends and former colleagues have reflected on his life and the undeniable legacy he left behind in the city of Greenbelt. Weidenfeld was one of Greenbelt's longest-serving mayors, spending 22 years on the city council, including 14 years as mayor.

Tom Renehan, a politically engaged resident who worked in Weidenfeld's proximity as a campaign adviser to a close council ally of Weidenfeld, remembers the former mayor as a major political leader in Greenbelt's history

whose legacy "can't be underestimated." "He was an incredibly smart guy, very talented, very articulate ... he wasn't just a politician. He was really good at sorting out public issues. ... He became kind of the obvious leader," Renehan said.

Throughout his time in government from 1971 to 1993, Weidenfeld helped lead Greenbelt through a period of significant growth and development. Renehan pointed to several monumental changes that occurred during Weidenfeld's tenure, including the 1989 transformation of the former Greenbelt Center School into the Greenbelt Community Center and the construction of the new Greenbelt Elementary School in the North End.

Weidenfeld was also mayor when the Sunrise high-rise property in Greenbelt East was proposed in 1990. The project received backlash from residents

Economic Development Forum Promotes B2B, Criticizes DPIE

The city held its Economic Development Expo on June 24 at the Hilton Garden Inn on Walker Drive. Mayor Emmett Jordan welcomed the city's new Economic Development Manager Jessica Mailander, four days into her tenure with the city, and guest speaker State Senator Alonzo Washington, a day after his primary victory for the Prince George's County seat.

Development Hub

The vision promoted at the meeting was of Greenbelt as an economic development hub, well positioned for growth with an enviable location at the intersection of major highways and public transportation. Mailander spoke of collaboration and opportuni-

This is the first of a two-part series of articles looking at the absence of specimen ballots in Greenbelt in time for the primary election on June 23. This article considers the importance of the specimen ballots and the impact of their absence. A second article investigates what went wrong with the delayed mailing.

When the News Review asked readers to share when they received their specimen ballot and voter guide in the recent primary election, the response was overwhelming - a day or two after the June 23 election, said the vast majority.

What the Law Required

Maryland Election Law 8-102 states that specimen ballots must be mailed at least one week before the first day of an early voting period. Early voting in Prince George's County began June 11, so the deadline for mailing specimen ballots should have been June 4 at the latest. Instead, according to a June 12 announcement from the Prince George's County Board of Elections, processing and shipping began in waves on June 10, just one day before early voting began and six days after the legal deadline.

ties, noting that though this was only her fourth day on the job, she was already aware of the possibilities. City Manager Josué Salmerón emphasized how businesses are moving to Greenbelt and, looking around the room, observed how the Hilton Garden Inn was among several local hotels investing in refurbishments.

Washington Speaks

Guest speaker Washington picked up the theme. He emphasized that this is a time of major investments, with federal spending going to contractors. He took up the refrain that the city's team is here to help and connect local

businesses to opportunities, and assist them with regulatory barriers. To some applause he noted that he was "not afraid of asking DPIE [Department of Permits, Inspections and Enforcement]!" (See box on page 11).

Local Small Business

Washington went on to say that Mailander too was a proponent of place-based economic development related directly to the skills and interests of residents - and passionate about small businesses and entrepreneurship. He spoke of building public value and

Reparations Response

I am responding to a letter to the editor that appeared in the July 23 issue titled Reparations Illegal? The Reparations Commission welcomes input from Greenbelt residents and wants to assure the community that the repair measures that are being considered are appropriate, legally sound and will benefit the com-

munity. Commission members, like other Greenbelters, care about the betterment of our community and about correcting sustained injustices. The Commission exists because the Greenbelt residents directed council to investigate reparations through a referendum in November 2021. Our research has uncovered systemic historical injustices that continue to impact African American and Indigenous residents today. Based on that evidence, the Commission is designing recommendations that can withstand legal scrutiny and that will be submitted to the council for further deliberation and implementation. Recommendations are likely to include acknowledgement, policy changes to improve equity across all populations in Greenbelt, memorialization and a complete and accurate historical record. We believe these recommendations will contribute to healing our community and correcting past injustices. We invite Greenbelt residents to review the information about how underserved members of our community continue to be disproportionately harmed by systemic injustices. Like the author, we believe that there are appropriate ways for the city to remedy past discrimination by redirecting resources to its most vulnerable citizens. We welcome thoughts, input and evaluation by Greenbelt residents. Everyone is invited to attend our public meetings on the third Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. in Council Chambers. His interest in public affairs led him to participate actively in local political campaigns. He served as campaign manager for Mayor J Davis during multiple election campaigns, contributing his organizational skills and community knowledge to local government and civic life.

For 25 years, Ed and his family were members of Saint Hugh's Catholic Church in Greenbelt. During that time, he served as one of the parish's senior members and remained actively involved in church activities and community service. His faith was an important part of his life and informed his commitment to family and community.

Throughout his life, Ed devoted his time and energy to causes that benefited others. Whether through military service, business leadership, scouting, church involvement, civic engagement or volunteer work, he consistently contributed to the organizations and people around him.

He is survived by his wife, Jean Cook, who was recognized as Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen in 2009 for her service to the community. He is also survived by his three sons, Edward Lewis Cook, Frank Cook and Michael Cook and eight granddaughters.

Edward L. Cook will be

remembered for his dedication to his family, his service to his country, his leadership within the Greenbelt community and his longstanding commitment to Saint Hugh's Catholic Church. His contributions touched many lives and left a lasting impact on the community he called home.

Gregory "Greg" Vincent Gigliotti, 72, died peacefully on July 24, 2026, after a courageous battle with lung cancer.

Born on December 18, 1953, Greg lived a life defined by service, integrity and unwavering devotion to his family, friends and community. He believed deeply in faith, hard work and helping others. Whether serving his country, protecting his community, mentoring others or caring for his loved ones, Greg lived with purpose and left a lasting impact on everyone fortunate enough to know him.

After graduating from Parkdale Senior High School in 1972, Greg attended Prince George's Community College until receiving his draft notice later that summer.

He answered the call to serve by joining the 223rd Military Intelligence Company in Gaithersburg, and soon entered active military service. Over an extraordinary 42-year military career spanning the U.S. Army, Army Reserve and Army National Guard, Greg proudly served his country with distinction. His service included four overseas deployments to Germany, Bosnia and twice to Kosovo. He concluded his military career as the Senior Warrant Officer Advisor for the Military Intelligence Branch of the Army National Guard, stationed at Fort Huachuca, Arizona. In recognition of his exceptional leadership and dedication, he attained the rank of Chief Warrant Officer Five (CW5), the highest warrant officer rank in the Army, before retiring on June 2, 2015.

While faithfully serving in the military, Greg simultaneously built a remarkable career with the Prince George's County Fire Department. Beginning in 1980, he dedicated 28 years to protecting the citizens of Prince George's County, retiring in 2008 as a Fire Captain. Throughout his career, he served in numerous assignments, including the Office of Fire Prevention and Investigation, where his knowledge, professionalism and commitment to public safety earned him the respect of his colleagues and community alike.

His military career and fire service never interfered with his commitment to serving others. He remained deeply involved in his community and was honored to serve as Post Commander of Greenbelt American Legion Post 136 and President of the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department where he fostered a spirit of service and camaraderie.

Above all else, Greg treasured his family. He found his greatest happiness in spending time with those he loved. He was a gifted craftsman who always seemed to have another project underway

— building, repairing, restoring or improving something with his own two hands. More recently, he found peace tending his garden, where he enjoyed watching the fruits of his labor grow. Greg also possessed a remarkable artistic talent and a creative spirit. He had a deep passion for photography, drawing and painting, finding joy in capturing both the beauty of the world around him and the people he loved most. One of his final and most treasured works was a portrait of his beloved late wife, Kathy.

Those who knew Greg will remember his willingness to help anyone in need, his meticulous attention to detail and his unmistakable way of doing things. If you worked alongside him, you likely received a thorough set of instructions before getting started. He appreciated things being neat and orderly and firmly believed in the philosophy, "Work hard, play hard."

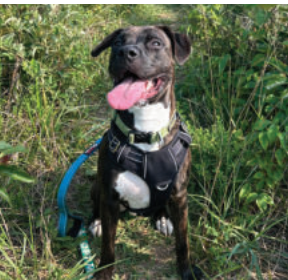

ERHS Grad Tramell Tillman Stars in New Spider-Man Movie

If you catch Spider-Man: Brand New Day in theaters, keep an eye out for a familiar face. Prince George's County native Tramell Tillman is featured in the highly anticipated film as bureaucrat William "Bill" Metzger, bringing a local connection to the latest chapter of the superhero franchise. Tillman shares the screen with major stars in the film, such as Tom Holland, Zendaya, Mark Ruffalo and Sadie Sink. Greenbelters can see Tillman on screen at Greenbelt Cinema this week and next.

"It's a dream to be part of the Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU)," Tillman said in an interview with TheWrap. "When I got the call, I nearly jumped out of my skin because it didn't feel real."

Tillman was born in Washington, D.C., in 1985, grew up in Largo and attended Eleanor Roosevelt High School (ERHS) here in Greenbelt (for more see the May 8, 2025, and September 17, 2025 issues). He graduated from ERHS in 2003, attended Xavier University of Louisiana and later transferred to Jackson State University, where he earned a degree in mass communications. In an interview with Variety, Tillman described the kind of student he was growing up:

"I was very studious. It was very important for us to be excellent in everything we did, including academics — especially academics," he said.

Tillman had his first acting experience at 10 years old, when his mother convinced him to join her in a Christmas play at their church. "I didn't want to do it," he told The Cut in an interview. "I'm pretty sure I cried backstage before going on because I was so shy. I didn't like attention. I'm still kind of that way."

When he decided to pursue acting, he enrolled in an MFA program with the University of Tennessee's theater department, where he was the first Black man to graduate from the program.

His role in the new Spider-Man movie is not his first experience in the spotlight. He rose to fame for his performance as Seth Milchick in the hit show Severance. For this role, he won a Primetime Emmy Award for Outstanding Supporting Actor in a Drama Series, becoming the first openly gay Black man to do so, marking yet another trailblazing achievement.

Tillman ended up thanking his mother for pushing him to pursue acting in his Emmy acceptance speech.

In a Variety interview, Noah Greenshner, executive vice president of development and production at Fifth Season, the production company behind Severance, called Tillman's portrayal one of the show's most powerful performances.

"Tramell brings so much subtle humor and menace," Greenshner said. "He's able to play the depth of this character and make you laugh while making you afraid."

Tillman is also well known for his performance in Mission: Impossible – The Final Reckoning, starring opposite Tom Cruise, which had its world premiere at the Cannes Film Festival in 2025.

and was seen as a threat that would overwhelm traffic and be incompatible with surrounding neighborhoods. Weidenfeld publicly opposed the project during council discussions and supported efforts to downzone the property.

“The success of modern Greenbelt has a lot to do with his political leadership,” Renahan said.

Parris Glendening, former Maryland governor and former Prince George’s county executive, worked closely with Weidenfeld and said he witnessed firsthand Weidenfeld’s dedication to public service.

“He was a good guy, a fun guy and sort of a natural leader,” he said.

When funding concerns threatened to stop the Metro’s Green Line short of Greenbelt, Glendening and Weidenfeld worked together to ensure the line was extended to the city.

Glendening said he and Weidenfeld, along with former Gov. Harry Hughes and Congressman Steny Hoyer, pressured the state to include Greenbelt on the Green Line and were successful. Glendening recalled Weidenfeld’s professionalism in meetings with members of Congress when negotiating for that project.

“His normal, somewhat cheerful, somewhat outgoing type personality dropped a level or two to kind of a stern professionalism, and I think it was exactly what was called for, for that kind of meeting,” Glendening said. “That was, for Gil, a tremendous victory.”

Glendening shared a common sentiment about Weidenfeld: he was open to hearing different opinions and genuinely cared about the people he served. “[He] was one of those municipal officials that loved their municipality, loved their job and did not see it automatically as a stepping stone to higher office,” he said.

As a former county council member and county executive, Glendening recalled riding alongside Weidenfeld during the Labor Day parades during Weidenfeld’s years as mayor. He remembered the atmosphere of the holiday and the “general enthusiasm and almost spontaneous expressions of affection for [Weidenfeld].”

Richard Castaldi, also a former Greenbelt mayor and councilmember, first met Weidenfeld when he was just getting started on city council and Weidenfeld was mayor. Castaldi said that when he first joined the city council, he knew little about how city government worked and learned much of what he knew about leadership by observing Weidenfeld. “I just basically sat there and watched him,” Castaldi said. “I was like a sponge and soaked up a lot of great information from him and how he did things in the city.”

According to Castaldi, one quality Weidenfeld demonstrated well was being a good listener and keeping an open mind when considering other perspectives. He said that Weidenfeld understood that he was a representative of all people, even those who did not

vote for him. Even when the two had differing opinions, they found a way to compromise and have respect for one another.

“Maybe we would disagree, but not be disagreeable,” he said. “When you think about politics today, which is quite frankly terrible, I really almost harken back to the times when we were on the council.”

Castaldi credited Weidenfeld with helping organize the Greenbelt Democratic Coordinating Committee, which brought local groups together and helped the city gain greater representation in county and state government. He said Weidenfeld was instrumental in helping give Greenbelt more of a voice.

Castaldi and Weidenfeld went on to become not only professional colleagues but also close personal friends, with Weidenfeld later serving as Castaldi’s best man at his wedding.

Castaldi said he hopes Weidenfeld’s legacy encourages current and future Greenbelt residents to feel comfortable speaking with local officials and sharing their concerns and opinions, “because he always listened,” Castaldi said.

Public Service Commission Limits Natural Gas Price Hike

The Maryland Public Service Commission has authorized a rate increase of approximately \$38.1 million for Washington Gas & Light Company (WG&L), less than half the \$82.5 million requested by the utility in its original filing (Case No. 9849) on December 29, 2025.

The Commission’s decision reflects an adjusted rate base of \$1.645 million and an approved overall rate of return of 7.22 percent based on a return on equity (ROE) of 9.4 percent, which has been reduced from WG&L’s current ROE of 9.5 percent and which is significantly below the Company’s requested 10.85 percent ROE. For the average resi-

dential heating customer, this adjustment is estimated to result in an increase of approximately \$4.01 per month. The new rates went into effect July 28.

The Commission’s decision follows a comprehensive review of evidence, including testimony from WG&L, Commission Technical Staff, the Office of People’s Counsel and other stakeholders, to ensure rates remain “just and reasonable” as required by the Public Utilities Article.

Hearings and Evidence

The Commission’s decision also follows extensive public hearings and evidentiary proceedings

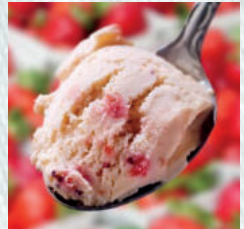

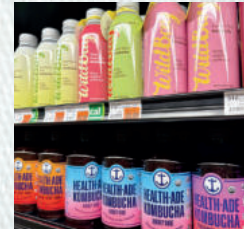

The May Shooting

July Arrests

On July 8, Greenbelt police arrested Willian Reyes-Ramos, with assistance from the Prince

George's County Police Department's Criminal Investigations Division. Two days later, on July 10, a male youth was also arrested and is being charged as an adult for his involvement in the shooting. His name was not released due to his age.

Reyes-Ramos is facing charges of attempted first-degree murder, first-degree assault and the use of a firearm in the commission of a violent felony. The juvenile is also facing attempted second-degree murder charges, first-degree assault and the use of a firearm in a felonious crime, along with other gun-related charges.

Group Seen Fleeing Latest In String of Shootings

For the third time in under four weeks, gunfire was reported in the Franklin Park neighborhood again last week, followed by witness accounts of a group running from the area.

July 27 Incident

Shortly after 5 p.m. on Monday, July 27, police received calls from people who reported hearing several gunshots in the area of 6100 Breezewood Court. Witnesses said they saw a group of four to six men wearing ski masks flee the area. One of the men was reported to have a firearm. Bullet casing evidence was found in the area, as were significant findings on surrounding surveillance equipment.

July 14 Incident

As we reported in the July 23 issue, around 10 p.m. on Tuesday, July 14, there were reports of gunfire on the 9000 block of Breezewood Terrace and a group of individuals subsequently seen running from the area on that occasion.

July 8 Incident

A week earlier, on July 8, at approximately 2 p.m. around the 9300 block of Edmonston Road there was reportedly gunfire and three male juveniles were seen running from the area.

There have been no reported injuries from any of these three incidents.

Greenbelt Police Department's Public Information Officer Ricardo Dennis was unable to confirm whether or not the three shooting events were connected. The Police Department does track similarities and patterns in events and is working to prevent further similar incidents from occurring, said Dennis. He could not release more information because detectives are actively investigating.

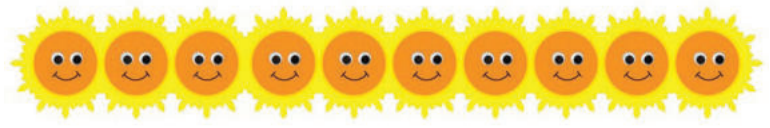

the future economy of the county as a whole. It was his desire, he said, to see Greenbelt as a true Business-to-Business (B2B) hub with strong connections among the participants.

Procurement Training

With the B2B emphasis, Washington elaborated that it is important to make it easier for local businesses to learn how to connect with procurement opportunities and utilize the resources available to learn how to respond to solicitations.

He spoke of the need for training and improved support from local government, referring again to the difficulties of navigating DPIE’s legendary constraints. He noted the upfront investment required that made it difficult to sustain a small business in the time before the effort paid off and “the money began to flow.”

Workforce Resources

Washington also referred to the provision of workforce resources. He spoke of the need for training for the jobs that are actually coming to the area and praised emerging community college programs. It was his belief that the relevant workforce isn’t here now and thus there is a need to increase county programs to provide it.

Metrics of Success

Greenbelt resident and businessperson Pragati Godbole asked how local government measures the success of its efforts to grow business in the city. Salmerón answered that they were measuring participation and business feedback from their activities.

B2B in Action

In the nearby conference room, about 20 small businesses (including the News Review) had set up tables with samples or literature about their offerings. A steady stream of participants came by to enquire. Two breakout sessions also presented options to attendees.

What is DPIE?

DPIE is the Prince George’s County Department of Permits, Inspections and Enforcement, which continues to be a major roadblock for businesses. They issue building and use/occupancy permits and such a role is certainly imperative for safety. Compared to other local jurisdictions, however, for years their approach has been a target of criticism for creating expense and delay. Some contractors won’t work in Prince George’s because of them.

In Greenbelt, for example, the Farmers Market needs a Use and Occupancy permit from DPIE annually and it’s always an anxious time. On opening day 2019, the assigned inspector watched as vehicles parked by their tents. Only when the market was ready to open, did he declare (incorrectly) that all vehicles must be removed because they weren’t shown on the submitted layout. (See the May 30, 2019 issue).

Early Printing

All groups got a short introduction to the newspaper, then the younger groups used stamp blocks to see how graphics were incorporated in the newspaper before digital printing. Of course, they all knew from nursery school how to make hand prints and it is fortunate that the News Review has a sink in its office, even if volunteer Johns had to devise a step so they could reach it.

Stories to Go

The three younger groups of campers worked with camp counselors and the volunteers to fill in the blanks on a pre-printed page about camp, set up like a tiny newspaper with the same but smaller masthead used on the front page of this issue. Older campers wrote their own digital stories, using the newspaper's computers to fill out an online template. The oldest group showed considerable skill in choosing subjects, searching for suitable graphics and pasting them into their stories. The volunteers were impressed with their ingenuity.

Topics Varied

The stories were individual or small group efforts and each camper group turned out some very competent work in terms of their age range. Stories ranged from invading aliens and love of music through learning to ice skate and what to write when you can't think of anything to write.

Other topics included catching crabs on the Chesapeake Bay, how to plan the perfect vacation and the influence of memes (no kidding). One young man wrote a touching story about his concern for his younger sister who was in the Youth Center, where the power had gone off for some period. He was afraid she would be scared in the dark.

A Lunchtime Story

The campers eat lunch on the lawn between the Community Center and the Greenbelt Library. During this time there was an incident that involved a fight at the Library (not your usual venue for a brawl) and that brought (according to the young eyewitnesses) five police cars to the scene - the boys were most precise about this. The groups after lunch were clearly using their stories to process what they had so unfortunately seen. Luckily, it's not every newspaper camp session that includes a real crime to report.

Searching

All ages got the chance to search in the newspaper archive (as readers can, too, by going to the webpage and clicking on Archive). The older campers were impressed that the archive went back so far in time and that the newspaper also has paper copies as far back as the first one in 1937 - our office copy, which was handed round in a protective cover for the campers to see. The November 24, 1937 newspaper comprises a single mimeographed letter-sized sheet, printed on both sides of green paper.

Relevance

Campers were able to find photos of previous years' camps - and some of the current participants were even pictured there in their younger incarnations - causing much merriment. Campers found Fourth of July celebrations, their schools, their sports teams and sometimes their own family or themselves. Everybody learned

that the acronym CKC - Creative Kids Camp - would turn up some good shots of previous camps.

Typewriters Rule

As always, the News Review's typewriters were the star of the show, and some of the campers could barely be pried off them to let others have a turn - the boys seemed particularly enamored of the mechanical complexity. Most campers got to have a try and at least learned how to insert paper and remove it, and what the term "carriage return" really means. Unfortunately, the typewriters are suffering from their age and only

a few of them are really workable to type a story. An overhaul is being considered for the oldest and most compromised.

Everybody Learned Something

The volunteers, who didn't really know going in what would work and what wouldn't, learned a lot - but the overall feeling at the end of the day was one of delight. Each volunteer had stories to tell of amusing sound bites, funny stories, warm collaborations and thoughtful and capable young people who are a credit to their families and their community.

Long live CKC!
