Too Late to Matter: The Failures Behind the Specimen Ballot Delay

This is the second of a two-part series of articles looking at the absence of specimen ballots in Greenbelt in time for the primary election on June 23. This article investigates what caused the delayed mailing.

Specimen ballots should have been mailed to voters by June 4 at the latest according to Maryland election law, which states that they must be mailed at least one week before the first day of an early voting period (see the August 6 article). On June 15, State Administrator of Elections Jared DeMarinis personally directed the county's Board of Elections (BoE) to draft a press release and approved it before publication. DeMarinis did not respond to the questions in our press inquiry on July 24 nor acknowledge subsequent follow-up. Residents of Greenbelt and some other areas of the county reported receiving their specimen ballots after the election.

Several issues led to the delay, including approval delay, mailing errors and communication problems. In addition, on June

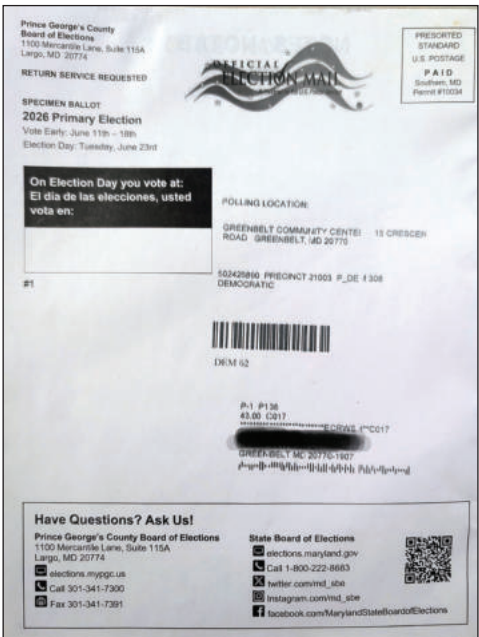

17, documents obtained by the News Review through a Maryland Public Information Act (MPIA) request show the vendor reported there were insufficient funds in the BoE's mailing account to pay for the ballot mailing, 13 days after the mailing deadline. It's not clear whether lack of mailing funds contributed to any delay, though it threatened to.

Local Venture Crew Completes Epic Maine Wilderness Expedition

After months of preparation and nearly two weeks in the wilderness of northern Maine, members of the Venture Crew 746 scouting group have returned home.

The crew's summer adventure included an attempted ascent of Mount Katahdin, Maine's highest peak, and a 100-mile canoe journey through the historic Allagash Wilderness Waterway, one of the Northeast's premier backcountry paddling destinations.

For many of the participants, the trip represented the culmination of a year of training. Crew members spent months developing camping, paddling, navigation and outdoor cooking skills through outings on the Potomac River and training weekends closer to home (see the May 21 and June 25 issues).

This wasn't a trip where one can simply show up and go. The scouts spent months planning, preparing and building the skills

needed to safely travel through a remote wilderness environment.

Katahdin Beckons

The adventure began with a two-day drive north, first camping at Salisbury Beach, Mass., before continuing to Baxter State Park in northern Maine, home of Mount Katahdin and the northern ter-

minus of the Appalachian Trail. After severe weather delayed the climb, the group seized a window of favorable conditions to begin the challenging Hunt Trail.

The climb brought the crew above the tree line and into rugged terrain featuring steep rock

Greenbelt Back as FBI Home; Court Rejects "Unlawful" Plan

A federal district judge in Maryland Monday overturned Trump administration plans to build the next FBI headquarters in Washington, D.C., restoring Greenbelt as the likely next home for the agency.

The 47-page ruling and two-page order by U.S. District Judge Theodore Chuang said the abrupt decision last year by the FBI and the General Services Administration (GSA) to say they would move the headquarters into the Ronald Reagan Building in downtown Washington exceeded their authority and was "unlawful."

Chuang's order vacated the decision by the two agencies, which tossed out years of debate and study that led to the selection of the Greenbelt site in 2023, and ordered them to reverse their plan to reprogram \$555 million of Greenbelt funding "to relocate to, renovate, build-out, and furnish" the Reagan Building as the next FBI headquarters.

The White House referred requests for comment to the FBI, which did not immediately respond to a request Monday

Higgs (2021), Maggie Cahalan (2022), Cathie Meetre (2024) and Robert Goldberg-Strassler (2025).
Collective Effort

When moderator and Greenbelt Rotarian Kristen Weaver invited honorees to discuss what led to the work their awards recognized, Ransom said, “When you contribute to a community you don’t do it thinking ‘If I do this, I’ll get the Outstanding Citizen award,’” to laughter. He and other honorees felt that others deserved the award more or that it should have gone to everyone with whom they worked on projects. Ransom’s award recognized service to organizations including American Legion, Greenbelt CARES, the Labor Day Festival and city advisory boards.

Konrad Herling saw his Greenbelt Arts Center proposal as an opportunity for the sake of the community, because “bringing people closer together and putting it together could uplift everyone because ... there’s a lot more that we have in common than items that we don’t.”

Judy Goldberg-Strassler said Robert Goldberg-Strassler (education, literacy, food insecurity, the environment and unifying Greenbelt) “gets the community to do things together. He doesn’t think he was deserving, because he felt like it was everybody who joins him in the things he does, to foster kindness throughout the entire community and see all Greenbelt as one.”

Cathie Meetre (News Review, Greenbelt Farmers Market, Co-op Rays on the Roof) downplayed her own “specialness,” instead emphasizing being a catalyst. “There are lots of people with lots to give,” she said, explaining “The question is how to make them behave in concert, to put something together that’s mightier than any one individual.” She felt most Outstanding Citizens achieve results by harnessing the

ideas, energy and contributions of a group.

You Can Do It

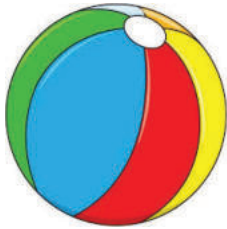
Jean Cook (noted for efforts including the Greenbelt Combined Choir and Miss Greenbelt Pageant) remembered starting with no organization and knowing very little. “It was fun to try it, to see what we could do, and we just started to do it. We didn’t know what we were doing, and we had so much fun doing it together and saying ‘Hey, that was pretty good!’”

Similarly, Maggie Cahalan, recognized for promoting environmental stewardship and co-founding the Chesapeake Education, Arts and Research Society (CHEARS), described Greenbelters as a quilt of “all the things that we can do together.” Her sentiment echoed CHEARS’ and others’ emphasis on unifying all the areas of Greenbelt.

Lore Rosenthal (honored with Michael Hartman for peace and environmental activism) remembered encouraging the 2019 award audience to act on their ideas and make them happen, because anyone can do it. Cahalan noted ideas building on each other. She remembered attending a climate change education course by Rosenthal based on Project Drawdown resources. Cahalan later won a National Science Foundation grant to use those resources with low-income first-generation college students. Meetre similarly noted that a Greenbelt News Review effort to gather evidence for a Pulitzer Prize application revealed the fragility of original newspaper issues dating from 1937, leading to today’s digital archive.

Shaymar Higgs (founder of The SPACE: Free Art For All) recognized his fellow Outstanding Citizens for being “crazy enough to take a chance on yourself and

Correction

In our reporting on the county’s specimen ballot mailing in our August 6 issue we identified the date of the county Board of Elections’ press release about the delay as June 12. The announcement itself was undated but following our inquiry, the date was provided to us in writing by the county’s Elections Administrator Wendy Honesty-Bey, who said its date was June 12.

Following documents obtained by the News Review through a public information act request it became evident that the press release was drafted at the request of Maryland State Administrator of Elections Jared DeMarinis on June 15.

We reached out to Honesty-Bey about the discrepancy and she apologized for “misspeaking” and has since identified the correct date of the press release as June 16.



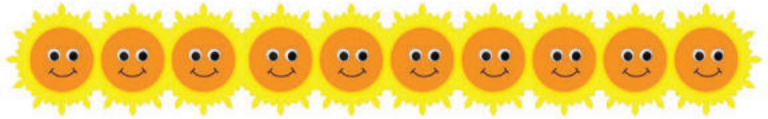
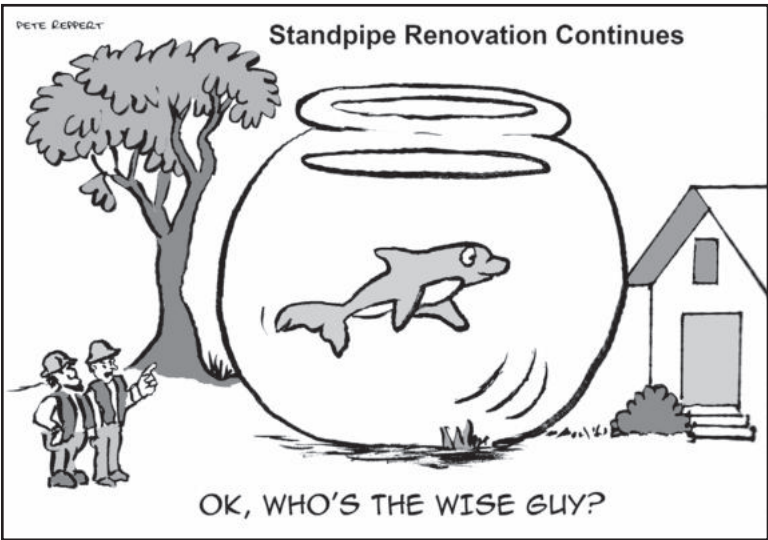

Nineteen-year-old Anthony Bourdain (Dominic Sessa) stumbles into the chaotic world of a restaurant kitchen, setting off a summer that shapes the course of his life. Said critic Justin Chang of The New Yorker, “It’s a youthful romance, a goofball gross-out, and a Karate Kid fable rolled into one. You might get so caught up in the comedy, familiar beats and all, that you forget you’re watching a biopic.”

Will Poulter and Noah Centineo deliver pitch-perfect performances as brothers Cody and Jack Parsons, each navigating a court-mandated drug rehabilitation program in a pocket of rural Ohio hit hard by the opioid epidemic. a chance on other people, to trust other people and step out there to be a mover of things.”

Outstanding Citizen Beginnings

Sandy Lange recounted Katherine Keene suggesting the award in the early 1970s, when most Labor Day Festival recognition went to young Miss Greenbelt Pageant winners, whose experience didn't yet compare to contributions of older volunteers. She said David Lange (then Festival vice chair) began organizing the award process in 1971, but there wasn't time to select an awardee for that year's Festival. (David Lange would become the 1986 Outstanding Citizen for organizing Marylanders to pressure state government to protect citizen savings during the 1985 savings and loan crisis.) In 1972 the Festival chose popular nonagenarians “Pop” Cipriano and Jerry Goodin as Parade Grand Marshals. Boy Scout Troop 746 Leader Al Cousin was the first Outstanding Citizen in 1973, and Al and Elaine Skolnik were honored in 1974 for leading the News Review through its multiyear libel case, Bresler vs. Greenbelt News Review, and U.S. Supreme Court win, after a rule change permitted honoring multiple persons who made their contribution as a unit.

Rotary Community Service
Greenbelt Rotary Club President Paul Ricketts noted the community service ethos shared by Outstanding Citizens and the Rotary Club, which is the primary financial sponsor of the Outstanding Citizen Award. The club supports local causes, including CHEARS Three Sisters gardens, Greenbelt Grows, Venture Crew 746, driver education, the Black History and Culture Committee's middle school essay contest, Springhill Lake and Greenbelt Elementary students and families, and the Greenbelt Pumpkin Festival. Ricketts noted the Venture Crew 746 inherited the first Outstanding Citizen's scout troop number 746, and that Mowatt Memorial United Methodist Church has hosted both

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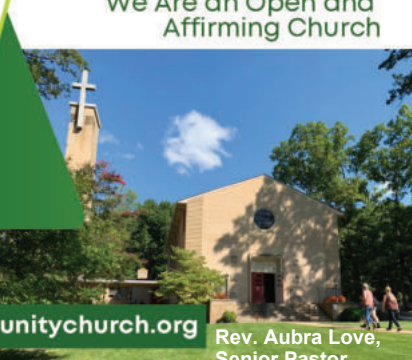

NAM Miss Greenbelt Attends U.N. Human Rights Summit

Greenbelt resident and National American Miss (NAM) for Greenbelt 2025 Mercy Akowe participated in the 2026 International Human Rights Summit held July 30 to 31 at United Nations Headquarters in New York. Presented under the theme Education for Peace: A 25-Year Legacy, the summit celebrated the 25th Anniversary of Youth for Human Rights International (YHRI) and brought together more than 550 youth leaders with ambassadors, judges, educators, legislators, law enforcement professionals, Nobel Peace Prize representatives and human rights advocates committed to building more peaceful, just and inclusive societies.

Hosted by YHRI and United for Human Rights, the summit was sponsored by the Permanent Mission of Timor-Leste to the United Nations.

Throughout the two-day program, delegates exchanged practical ideas for advancing human rights education and participated in panel discussions on leadership, community engagement and empowering the next generation of changemakers. Akowe, a student at Towson University (class of 2027) and a 2023 graduate of Eleanor Roosevelt High School, has been actively involved in Youth for Human Rights since early 2025. In May 2026 she was appointed president of the

Youth for Human Rights Chapter of Greenbelt. In this role, she has led community outreach programs, distributed hundreds of human rights booklets across parks, schools and local events, and facilitated educational conversations with students, families and community leaders.

Through her initiative Big Sis, she supports eldest daughters by teaching confidence, leadership and self-advocacy, expanding human rights education into everyday family life. Akowe has col-

laborated with organizations such as Youth for Human Rights DC, Miss Africa USA, Daughters of Zion Global Foundation and local churches to reach diverse audiences, including participating in Juneteenth celebrations and community service drives. Her work has impacted more than 300 residents in Greenbelt and surrounding cities, strengthening awareness of dignity, equality and youth empowerment. Her selection as a youth delegate at the United Nations is a significant milestone not only for her personal advocacy but for the entire Greenbelt community as a rising leader representing Maryland on a global stage.

“Being in a room with passionate leaders and youth delegates from so many nations was an incredible honor,” said Akowe. “Their speeches moved me to tears and gave me a new perspective on human rights.”

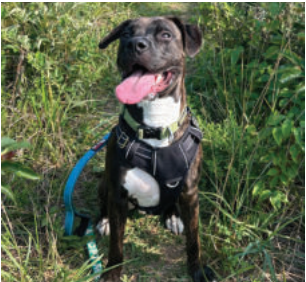

evening. But Maryland officials were tripping over themselves to cheer the ruling.

Maryland Attorney General Anthony Brown, who was first to report the decision late Monday afternoon, said that by blocking the Trump administration attempt to move the project and divert the funds, “the Court has cleared the path back to Greenbelt.”

“This victory is about more than a building. It is about ensuring that when Congress makes a decision, the Federal Government cannot simply ignore it because they do not like the outcome,” Brown said in a prepared statement.

Gov. Wes Moore (D) said Trump “tried to take from Maryland what Maryland had already won. He failed.”

“I am grateful to all of Team Maryland – especially Congressman Steny Hoyer – who have worked tirelessly for decades to make this a reality,” he said in a statement released by his office. “Now it is time to stop the games and get to work building the world-class FBI headquarters that our public servants deserve, where it belongs: in Prince George’s County, Maryland.”

Team Maryland is a reference to the coalition of state, local and federal officials who pushed back against the Reagan Building proposal, and filed the lawsuit last November that Chuang ruled on Monday.

All sides agree that a new headquarters building is needed to replace the current facility, the J. Edgar Hoover Building on Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington. The brutalist, concrete building, which opened in 1974, long ago outlived its usefulness and has been literally falling apart for years, with pieces of concrete falling off the building at times.

The dilapidated building is too small for current agency functions, forcing the FBI to lease office space around Washington, which is not only costly but does not allow for efficient management of the sprawling FBI.

Repairing the Hoover Building has been determined to be neither technically nor economically feasible. Congress in 2011 directed the GSA to find a new site on federal land in the Washington area, within 2 miles of a Metro station and 2.5 miles of the Capital Beltway, for a new consolidated headquarters building. Proceeds from the sale of the Hoover Building were

to be dedicated to the project.

The GSA quickly developed a short list of sites: Greenbelt and Landover in Maryland, and Springfield, in Northern Virginia. In 2017, Congress approved funding for the project.

But in July 2017, during Trump’s first term, the FBI and GSA hit the brakes on the project, saying Congress had not appropriated sufficient funding for the entire project. It stalled for the rest of Trump’s term.

In 2022, Congress restarted the process and in November 2023 – after serious wrangling between lawmakers in Maryland and Virginia – the director of a special GSA selection committee announced Greenbelt as its choice.

The Trump administration upended that on July 1, 2025, when the FBI and GSA jointly announced that they were abandoning Greenbelt and moving the headquarters to the Reagan Building, a few blocks away from its current location.

Maryland officials sued, claiming that the selection of Greenbelt had been authorized by Congress and could not simply be reversed by executive agencies.

Chuang agreed, saying the agencies exceeded their authority and their actions violated the law and the Administrative Protection Act. He also issued an injunction against the government taking any actions or spending any funds to facilitate the Reagan Building move.

The government argued in court that rejecting the Reagan Building would “likely result in the FBI Headquarters remaining in the Hoover Building indefinitely,” since it would not order construction to start on Greenbelt. But Chuang disagreed, saying rejecting the Reagan Building would have the effect of reinstating Greenbelt as the selected site for the project.

Team Maryland – eight of the nine members of the state’s congressional delegation – vowed to keep fighting to make the new headquarters in Greenbelt a reality.

“We will not stop fighting to fulfill our promise to the men and women of the Bureau to deliver a new, secure headquarters in Maryland so they can do their work without compromising their safety or our national security,” they said in a joint statement Monday night.

Prince George’s County Executive Aisha Braveboy welcomed the decision, saying the FBI project would be “the single largest economic development project in the history of Prince George’s County.”

“It is estimated to create over 7,500 jobs and add approximately \$4 billion to the GDP of the County and State,” she said in a statement released by her office. “If you look at the history of economic development in the Metro DC region, landing a major federal agency like the FBI has been the catalyst for significant economic development.

“Prince George’s County simply wants the opportunity to reap the economic benefits that would flow from locating the FBI HQ in Greenbelt,” Braveboy said.

Maryland Matters reporter William J. Ford contributed to this report.

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“After years of rigorous, well-balanced federal review, Greenbelt was selected as the best site for a consolidated FBI headquarters,” said Greenbelt Mayor Emmett Jordan in response to the ruling. “The potential benefits of this project extend far beyond Greenbelt and Prince George’s County: creating local jobs; adding resources to Maryland’s economy; and driving new growth in communities along the Metro and MARC lines,” Jordan told the News Review on Tuesday. “Hopefully, this ruling will clear the way for construction of the modern, secure headquarters campus the FBI truly needs.”

PG Fire Department Violates Public Information Requirements

On July 2, the Greenbelt News Review submitted a Maryland Public Information Act (MPIA) request to Prince George’s County Fire Department (PGFD) for call types and response times for Greenbelt.

Immediately following the removal of career firefighters from the Greenbelt station on June 30, 2024, Prince George’s County Fire Department, under then-Chief Tiffany Green, provided aggregated call type and response time data for the city’s calls, with a comparison to times prior to the career staff’s removal.

The News Review requested similar data from PGFD in June and was informed by Press Information Officer Michael Yourishin that a MPIA request would be necessary due to ongoing litigation between PGFD and the City of Greenbelt.

The city’s ongoing court case over the removal of the firefighters – Town of Berwyn Heights, et al. v. Prince George’s County, Maryland, et al. – is scheduled to be heard on September 10 at the Appellate Court in Annapolis. This follows a postponement at the city’s request after leaders believed firefighters would be returned early this year (see the January 21 issue).

Under Maryland law, a custodian of public records has 10 working days to respond to a request and provide an anticipated timeframe, any fee range and reason for requiring a delay of more than 10 working days. The request must then be denied or approved and records produced or officially withheld within 30 days.

The News Review did not receive any communication within 10 business days. We followed up on the status of our MPIA request with PGFD on August 3, 32 days after the request was made. That day Joel A. Moodie, of Records Management for PGFD, responded, “Your re-

quest for ‘Greenbelt response time data’ has been received and is under review. I do not anticipate any processing fees, but the fulfillment date should be 10 days from now.” On August 18, two weeks after Moodie suggested a 10-day fulfillment date, we reached out to PGFD again.

At time of press, on Tuesday, August 18, 47 days after our request, the News Review had not received the documents and data requested in our MPIA from July 2 nor any explanation of the delay.

Back-to-School Free Fairs, Clinics for Immunization

Maryland State Law requires all students to receive immunizations by Monday, September 14 or risk being excluded from school. PGCPs students can get free immunizations at Back-to-School Immunization Fairs or at the Cheverly Health Department.

Immunization Fairs are 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on August 22 at Kenmore Middle School, September 12 at High Point High School and September 26 at Eleanor Roosevelt High School.

Cheverly Health Dept. Clinics at 3003 Hospital Drive, Suite 2082, Cheverly, are August 10 to October 31, Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

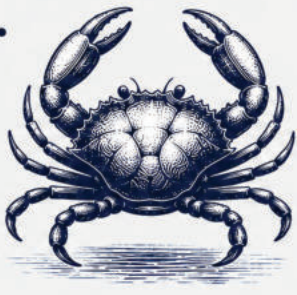

where anchors and hand holds were bolted into the rock. However, after monitoring changing weather conditions and adhering to a predetermined turnaround time, the group decided to turn back before reaching the summit. As if on cue, the winds started gusting and the skies darkened. It was time to descend.

The choice proved to be an important lesson in wilderness leadership. Adult leader Kevin d'Eustachio was heard to say that when the weather hits, "It is better to be down there wishing you were up here, rather than up here wishing you were down there."

On to the Allagash

Following their time in Baxter State Park, youth leaders Hannah Baker and Mark Coppock led their crew onto the Allagash Wilderness Waterway, beginning a 100-mile, 10-day journey through some of the most remote landscapes in the East.

The paddlers quickly discovered that nature had plans of its own. Less than a mile into the first day, rounding the point into Chamberlain Lake, the crew were forced to stop and camp due to wind-whipped, white-capped waves. These same conditions occurred repeatedly, forcing the crew to adjust daily objectives. Many days began before sunrise as the group sought to take advantage of calmer morning conditions and the long summer days in the far north. In fact, the crew had built in multiple weather days as a contingency and every single extra day was used – it almost was not enough.

Despite the challenges, the crew continued north through a landscape of dense forests, pristine lakes and winding rivers. Wildlife sightings became a regular occurrence. Loons provided a soundtrack to nearly every morning and evening, while bald eagles and multiple moose sightings highlighted the trip. One particularly memorable moose encounter occurred when the scouts quietly drifted toward an animal feeding along the shoreline, before an accidental bang of a paddle on a canoe hull sent the moose running back into the forest.

The expedition also included visits to several historical sites deep in the wilderness, including the famous "Ghost Trains" of the Allagash region, abandoned locomotives that remain as reminders of Maine's logging heritage.

While the daily paddling was demanding, the crew also found time to enjoy some unexpected

comforts.

Backcountry Cooking

Backcountry cooking became a major highlight of the trip. Scouts prepared an impressive variety of meals using dehydrated and shelf-stable ingredients, demonstrating skills they had practiced throughout the year.

Among the culinary successes was a bacon, pepper, onion and cheddar frittata prepared using OvaEasy eggs, which taste and cook like fresh eggs. Most expected it to be good enough for camp food, but it turned out to be one of the best breakfasts of the entire trip.

The crew also developed a wilderness shower system using tarps for privacy and repurposing the water filter bags for gravity-fed showers. During one weather-related layover, campers even heated water over a fire, transforming a simple rinse into a luxury experience.

Another discovery came along the shoreline when scouts encountered freshwater mussels, one of which attached itself to a scout's paddle. After discovering a large number on the lakeshore, a small sample were cooked over a campfire with garlic and butter, creating one of the most unusual meals of the expedition.

Teamwork, Adaptability

Teamwork and adaptability became recurring themes throughout the journey. From battling headwinds to navigating shallow river channels, every day required problem-solving and cooperation.

Perhaps the most memorable moment came when the crew transformed a 10' x 10' rain tarp into a makeshift sail. The six canoes arranged together in a flotilla with the homemade sail carried the crew a solid 10 miles, the length of Long Lake. During that time, the group traded hard paddling for laughter, sea shanties and smooth sailing.

A Celebration

The journey also included special milestones, including the celebration of Crew President Lucy Murray's 16th birthday. "I thought it was crazy," Murray said, "that here I am in the middle of nowhere, where few people had ever been, on my birthday." Fellow scouts baked a cake, while neighboring paddlers (with a random Greenbelt connection) helped provide ingredients to put the icing on the cake, literally providing chocolate and butter for a fresh ganache.

Expedition End

After nearly two weeks in the woods, the expedition concluded in the town of Allagash, near the Canadian border. Returning to roads, vehicles and cell service proved to be an adjustment after so many days immersed in nature.

By the time the crew arrived back home in Maryland, participants had gained far more than miles traveled, because the lessons in leadership, decision-making, resilience and teamwork will stay with them long after the memories of paddling and campfires fade.

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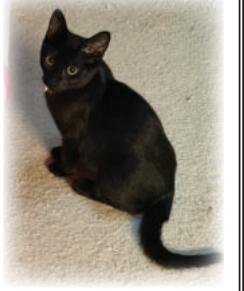


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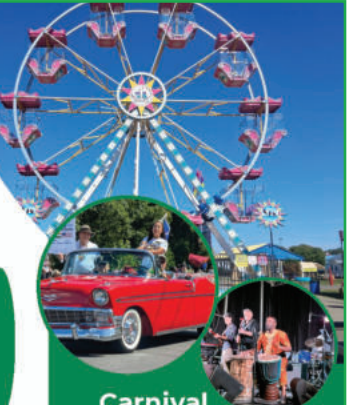

Address Errors

On June 3, the day before the shipping deadline, Adrian Salotti, postage specialist and mailing representative with the vendor Indiana Printing & Publishing Company (IPP), alerted the BoE to the address errors. He sent further emails on June 4 and June 5 with details of address issues found, stating “please advise,” in both communications. Although Honesty-Bey says the BoE treated these messages “as routine informational updates,” the message thread from the vendor had a subject line that included the word “urgent” in all caps and it was titled “URGENT MAILING INQUIRY: Addresses missing City, State, ZIP.”

On June 8, IPP General Manager Jamee Crusan intervened to solicit a response from the BoE, writing, “Could someone please get back to Adrian as soon as possible? Missing these address details is delaying the shipping process. Additionally, please verify the current balance of the postage account so we can ensure these items are shipped promptly.” Honesty-Bey responded an hour later, which was five days after the first email alerting the BoE of address issues, saying the June 4 spreadsheet “only had two names listed” and asking: “So are you tell[ing] me that based on that, you all haven’t shipped any specimen ballots out yet? Or just those that are in question.” Honesty-Bey also stated she would verify postage that day, which was June 8. At that point, no ballots had been shipped. Salotti replied that the rest of the ballots have been “getting prepped for mailing in the meantime,” and “as soon as we have confirmation on the funds being available on the permit, we can begin delivery.”

Postage Funds

The BoE in their summary of what caused delays did not mention postage funding but repeated messages from the vendor warned them that funds had to be in

the mailing account. As noted, Honesty-Bey first said she would check that funds were available on June 8, which was already past the statutory deadline for the mailings. On June 12, eight days after the mailing deadline, Salotti again asked the BoE to verify that postage amounts will be available. Honesty-Bey responded on June 12 saying there should be funds in the account and asking if ballots had been mailed yet, since they had passed the deadline.

On June 15 Crusan wrote: “We began mailing last week, and the remaining items should be out by the end of this week. Please ensure that the necessary funds are available in the permit account.”

On June 17 the Distribution Manager for IPP Terri Maughan emailed Honesty-Bey, “We are currently scheduling the truck to pick up the voters’ guides for tomorrow’s delivery. While preparing the mail permits, we noticed that there are still insufficient funds in the postal account.

“Could you please verify when the postage will be paid? I want to ensure there are no issues with tomorrow’s deliveries, as they will consist of two truckloads.” In an email shortly after, Maughan clarified: “I cannot schedule the trucks until postage payment is confirmed. If this is not resolved by 2 p.m. today, we will have to reschedule the deliveries for Monday, assuming funds are available by then. We want to avoid further delays and are doing everything possible on our end to stay on schedule. However, we require confirmation of payment before we can move forward.”

The Monday referenced was June 22, one day before the election.

Honesty-Bey did not respond by the 2 p.m. Wednesday deadline but at 4:45 p.m. wrote that she had informed “Mike” (likely IPP President Mike Donnelly) the day before that funds would be available on Thursday and

“you all can [send] it out.” “So now, they won’t be going out until Monday???” asked Honesty-Bey. Maughan responded, “When we ran the report it said insufficient funds. We have it resolved and we are on track with tomorrow’s delivery.” It’s unclear if the trucks made the delivery on Thursday but Honesty-Bey has given the final delivery date as a day later, Friday, June 19.

The News Review has not yet obtained documents that confirm the dates of the mailings, which the BoE says were sent in waves with the first on June 10 and final on June 19. We have submitted a supplemental MPIA request for USPS receipts and postage statements to confirm mailing dates.

Announcement of Delay

Prince George’s County Board of Elections did not announce the delay until June 16, 12 days after the deadline and five days after early voting began. Honesty-Bey previously told the News Review via email that the date of the undated press release about the delay on the Prince George’s County BoE website was June 12. Internal communications obtained via an MPIA request show the press release was drafted on the evening of June 15 following a directive from DeMarinis and was approved by him the same evening prior to posting. DeMarinis emailed Honesty-Bey on the afternoon of June 15 saying, “We are receiving many calls regarding the specimen ballots. You should issue a statement that they [were] sent out. I would acknowledge the fact that they were sent late. This will stop some of the mis/disinformation being circulated around them.” Honesty-Bey this week apologized for “misspeaking” and gave the actual date of the press release as June 16.

Delivery Timeline

The vendor informed the BoE that “ballot styles under 200 in

quantity do not qualify for bulk rates and must run as first class.” Those mailings were set to arrive within one to three business days, according to IPP. The majority of the mailings were a bulk mailing, which are not required to be sent first class. At time of press Honesty-Bey had not responded to our inquiry about whether they had been provided with delivery estimates for bulk mailing timeframes or what they understood those to be.

However, based on Honesty-Bey’s assertion that final mailings were sent on Friday, June 19, if delivery took more than two business days (Saturday and Monday) the specimen ballots would have arrived on election day or later.

Complaints from Public

Records reviewed by the News Review show the BoE received documented complaints from voters across the county who did not receive specimen ballots prior to the primary. At least two complaints in the MPIA file are from voters who complain of receiving specimen ballots for the wrong legislative district, and at least one Republican household says they received a specimen ballot with blank pages where candidate information should have appeared.

No Competitive Bid Process

Prince George’s County paid

IPP a total of \$370,293 for the specimen ballot mailing contract. It is not yet clear what the postage cost itself was for the mailing.

The contract was a sole source or no-bid contract “due to the time-sensitive nature of election preparation and printing deadlines” and the need for a vendor “capable of producing and distributing three high-volume voter guides within a limited time-frame.” The BoE’s justification for bypassing the competitive bid process was partly based on volume but the justification gave a figure approximately 30 percent higher than the actual mailing need.

In the justification for the sole

They ran, and officers stopped three of them. One had a replica 9mm Glock 17 BB gun in his backpack. All three were detained and the parents were called. The juveniles were released at the scene. The firearm was seized and placed into evidence.

Armed Person

On August 13 at 8:32 p.m. near the 6100 block of Breezewood Court, two men came to a residence looking for a man’s brother, stating that he had stolen two firearms from them. The brother fled and the men chased after him. Officers did not locate them. The man believed one of them was armed because he kept placing his hand into his waistband.

DUI Arrests

On August 12 at 2:23 a.m. near Greenbelt Road and Southway, a U.S. Park Police officer notified Greenbelt Police of a driver in the middle of the road asleep behind the wheel. The driver was arrested for DUI.

On August 13 at 9:11 p.m. near 5900 Breezewood Drive, officers stopped a vehicle operating at night without its headlights or taillights illuminated. The driver said he did not have a driver’s license and that he lived around the corner; he admitted to consuming alcohol, submitted to sobriety testing and was arrested and charged with DUI.

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Non-Contact Shootings Continue; Latest Occurred August 16

At approximately 4 p.m. on Sunday, August 16, Greenbelt police officers received multiple calls from residents about gunshots in the area of 5900 Cherrywood Lane.

One caller described seeing a white vehicle leaving the scene shortly after the shots were heard. Officers found multiple shell casings of different calibers, along with multiple vehicles damaged by gunfire, including a Ford van, Toyota Camry and Chevy 1500 truck. One building window was damaged. As no injuries or victims were reported, this is described as a non-contact shooting.

This shooting adds to a string of non-contact shootings that have been happening almost weekly during July and August.

Another non-contact shooting took place on August 7 near Lerner University Square apartments, 157 Westway. Police received calls from people who had

heard the gunshots and one person was detained, questioned and released. Evidence was collected from the scene, police reported (see the August 13 issue).

In the August 6 issue we reported that there had been three non-contact shootings in under four weeks and at each of those shootings – July 8 on Edmonston Road, July 14 on Breezewood Terrace and July 27 on Breezewood Court, a group had been seen fleeing following the gunfire.

Following the July 27 incident witnesses reported a group of fleeing men wearing ski masks. Police said that bullet casings were gathered from the area, as well as surveillance footage.

Greenbelt Police Department has not announced any connection between the shootings.

source contract, IPP was said to have “the required paper stock reserved and production capacity available to meet the schedule for printing approximately 629,000 voter guides and coordinating mailing services.”

“Delays associated with a competitive procurement process could jeopardize the timely distribution of voter information to registered voters prior to the election period. Therefore, this vendor is considered the only practical source capable of meeting the required timeline and production requirements.” Though the justification cited 629,000 specimen ballots, documents obtained via MPIA show BoE IT Manager Shafiq Satterfield stated on May 11 that the

number of specimen ballots to be mailed “may be slightly under the 486,000 marker.” Honesty-Bey did not respond to our inquiry about the origins of the 629,000 number by press time.

Our MPIA request returned that there are no internal reports, formal assessments, or after-action documents that followed the specimen ballot delay.

The News Review has submitted a supplemental MPIA request for USPS delivery records and also awaits a response to questions sent to IPP.

Fall Tryouts for ERHS Begin; Scrimmages Start This Week

As summer swelters on, high school student athletes are already preparing for their fall seasons. Tryouts at Eleanor Roosevelt High School (ERHS) commenced on Wednesday, August 12 for the school soccer, volleyball, football and cross-country teams; flag football is soon to follow. Teams begin scrimmages this week in preparation for the start of the season in September.

The ERHS girls soccer program proved busy all summer as prospective team members competed in the Prince George's Parks and Recreation 7v7 summer league that featured teams from county high schools, including Bowie, Parkdale, Flowers and Bishop McNamara. Roosevelt entered two teams, Roosevelt United and Raiders FC, that included new and returning players.
